It's not too early for farmers and ranchers to take a look at their tax situation and make certain management decisions before the end of the year. Make an estimate of income and expenses to get an idea of your income tax liability.

If your taxable income for the year is above that anticipated for next year, you may want to delay any additional sales until 1972. Also, consider buying supplies such as fertilizer, feed and chemicals for next year to reduce this year's income.

Machinery purchases will also cut your income by a substantial margin, and you can benefit from first-year depreciations and possible investment credit if it becomes effective once again.

Other items which could reduce your 1971 income tax are income averaging and advance payment of interest on loans. Income averaging is a tool for leveling income over a five-year peiod. To qualify for income averaging this year your income must be 20 percent above the 1969-70 average and at least \$3,000.

If, on the other hand, your income is down from 1971, then you will want to delay some deductions until next year. This can be done by delaying all possible purchases and payments until after January 1. This practice is especially sound if you expect a higher income in 1972.

A word of caution regarding decisions to alter your tax situation for this year. Don't make sales or purchases simply to juggle income and expenses in order to save a few tax dollars. Be sure all decisions are sound from a profit management standpoint.

What about sulfur for the Texas High Plains? Sulfur has been included in a great number of research fertilizer tests over the past ten years. With only one exception on a land leveled soil located on the Lubbock Agricultural Experiment Station where yield increases of cotton occurred the first two years after leveling, no yield increases have been found from the additions of sulfur in any form. It has been tried on cotton, grain sorghum, wheat and corn. Sulfur is present in the available sufate form in the irrigation water, thus, a very adequate supply of this element is constantly being applied.



Make your own coat to keep you warm this winter. "If you select just the right pattern and fabric, sewing a coat should not be difficult." Avoid collars, lapels, bound buttonholes and extra bulky fabrics -these are trouble makers.

Winter '71 looks feature capes, and hooped and wrapped coats. Capes are a great fashion item, yet are easy to make. Selection of a hooded style will eliminate collar and buttonhold construction. And even though the wrap coat has a collar and lapels, you can forget about buttonholes.

In addition to construction details, the fabric you choose can also create sewing problems. Select material with an interesting look, such as a tweed or tapestry. "A flannel or gaberdine material can make an easy coat pettern hard to construct. These very plain fabrics will show every stitching or pressing mistake. Bonded fabrics also deserve consideration if you make a cape. However, avoid using them to mold and shape a

Look for closely-woven fabric It's more stable and easier to handle than soft stretchy fabrics. Many fabrics sold for coats are thick and spongy,

thus difficult to sew and press. Even if you are not the most experienced seamstress, your coat-making can be a success if you select the proper pattern and fabric.

Time: 15-20 minutes Temperature: 375 degrees F.

Crust: 1/2 lb. butter or margarine cups sifted all-purpose

1/2 teaspoon sale


