Tahoka Senior Girls Receive College Cre.

As a result of college level examination tests taken on March 30th, three Tahoka senior girls have been given Advanced Placement Credit at McMurry College in Abilene.

Dale Rogers, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Turner Rogers has been given credit for 20 hours of college work. Staci Short, daughter of Harry Lee Short and Kim Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Turner have each been given credit for 95 hours of college work. This means that they can skip these hours and go on to more advanced work when they enroll in McMurray College this fall.

Tahoka Has Efficient Sanitation Deptment

Survey of area towns that Tahoka has one of the most efficient sanitation departments in West Texas. In order to maintain this high level of efficiency the City of Tahoka is providing a greater amount of cooperation from its citizens in complying with the ordinance. One of the problems is providing size garbage cans with

covers on them. Our ordinance states that Every owner Occupant or tenant using or occupying any building, house or structure within the corporate limits of the City of Tahoka, Texas shall provide and maintain garbage cans to hold the trash garbage and rubbish that will normally accumulate on the premises.

Every owner, occupant and tenant shall provide a container or containers for garbage of not more than 32 gallon capacity with a tight-fitting lid. The lids or covers of all containers shall at all times be kept secure and fastened so that cats, dogs, rodents, flies and other insects may not have access to the contents thereof. This definitely excludes the use of 55 gallon barrels.

Garbage containers that have jagged or sharp edges capable of causing injury to the garbage collectors, or lids that will not fit tightly, will be condemned by the City of Tahoka acting through the Superintendent of garbage department or by the Health Department.

Also grass cuttings should be put in boxes or containers and limbs and brush be cut in small lengths so that the collectors can easily pick them up.

We will continue to run the flat-bed truck on Wednesdays to pick up larger limbs and trash that we can not get on our regular runs.

A lot is being said about high food prices these days, but few explanations are being offered other than accusations as to who is to blame.

For instance, consumer demands and tastes have increased drastically over recent years. Higher quality foods are demanded and more convenience items are requested. Variety and convenience are key words in the present state of food products.

Non-food items are also getting a larger share of every dollar spent at the supermarket. Recent studies indicate that about 28 cents of each dollar spent at food outlets goes for non-food items. For example, more total money is being spent at supermarkets for paper products and foil than for eggs.

Some supermarkets now offer almost 10,000 items to meet varying consumer demands. It's difficult to compare prices with so many new items being added to grocery shelves during the past few years.

Granted, food prices have increased, some 3 percent last year, and are expected to increase 4 to 4.5 percent in 1972. But not all food items have gone up in price. Consider poultry and dairy products and pork. All these have experienced price declines in recent months, according to information from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The factors of supply and demand have a big effect of food prices.

A good example is beef. Beef has been in short supply and high demand so naturally prices have been higher. Infact, beef prices have increased to the peak level they were in 1952. On the other hand, can you list many other items that are at the same price level that they were 20 years ago?

Although beef prices are up at the present time, beef producers are not necessarily getting rich. Costs have skyrocketed, especially the cost of replacement stock. The cost-price squeeze which has been evident in agriculture in recent years has made it difficult to realize a profit.

Processing and retailing costs have also spiraled. And with consumers demanding more processing and special packaging, prices of products on the grocery shelf may be quite high compared to a few years ago. In many cases, home preparation may be the answer to high food prices.

The old adage of "you get what you pay for" may never be more true than it is today. If we were willing to go back to the standard of living of 20 years ago, the total food bill might not seem so high. Yet, back then the consumer was paying 23 cents of his take-home dollar for food as compared with only about 16 cents today.

Where do the other 84 cents of the take-home dollar go? How about a new or second car, a camper / color television, eating out and all the other luxuries we enjoy? The prices of many of these have increased more rapidly than prices of food items, yet, we are not as conscious of such increases.

A Meat Retailer Seminar will be held on the Texas A&M campus of May the 17th. This Seminar is basically designed for meat market managers and the program will cover topics all the way from market sanitation to meat processing.

Short Speaks To Junior High

Mr. Short made the students feel a real part of the Texas House. He told them the "times have changed because of the years. We live in a day of precision an age, if I may quote a biblical word, "righteousness." Government has somewhat taken away the rights of people in our democracy by directing our every step. Our watchdog of government, the Judicial part, can and must take full credit, good or bad. In my opinion they have gone too far to the right. In four short years our nation will be 200 years old and only recently the appointed judges have turned over many state laws that made this country great. They went against the intention of laws passed by elected legislative bodies all over this nation. They have by their actions intervened in state rights by saying "we have been doing certain things unconstitutional for 200 years. That a state cannot set resident requirements for voting or for welfare recipients. That we have been wrong all this time in setting our boundary lines on electing our elected officials. This was the redistricting hassle, where the economy of area means nothing. They said we must consider only the number of people in determining lines and districts. The appointed men of wisdom have recently said our way of taxing and distributing monies in financing public education in this school system is wrong. Imagine! every school except Hawaii is effected, and that students cannot go necessarily to a school close to their home and must go to a school designated for them. So we might achieve racial balance. The Judicial can have full credit in any depletion in morals of this country. Soon you will be leaving home and leaving a rural environment and raising a family and will see full well the pornography, the dirty movies and so forth on display everywhere. Don't ever believe that legislative bodies would ever permit this to have happened. Let's not condemn the Judicial System for all wrong doings because they have played a vital role in our lives and have provided the checks and balances of a free nation of free man. The people, and I mean you and I, have shortcomings by not participating in community and civic affairs and by not voting. In August of 1969, we voters stayed at home. Only 19 out of every 100 voted and the bond issue to fund the Texas Water Plan failed State wide by only 5,000 votes. I am depressed when I hear, and it is often. "That the public is losing faith in the major networks and big city reporters. That their news is slanted to fit an individual point of view. I read daily papers from all over Texas, we are fortunate here because the Avalanche Journal does a better job than any paper in Texas. I condemn those who hide behind the freedom of press and say that the House and Senate and all elected officials in State Government need a clean sweep. This is a broad statement prompted by four or five people's moral wrong doing. I know most of these people on a first name basis and most have spent a good part of their lives devoted to being a servant to the will of the people. I ask you, "Does Texas need a clean sweep because a majority of the 159 House members and 31 Senate members have had a hand in making Texas Number One?" Number one in its highway system, number one in getting new industry number one in goals for Texas to assist our small community and rural towns. The Governor's goals for Texas plan has been copied nation wide. Our state has become fifth among the states in a new industry and that is tourism. Texas has surpassed 11 states in quality education in the last three years. The Legislators that caused this to happen are still in office. In order to achieve this quality education they voted for a raise in teachers salaries. The four quarter system was initiated, and incentive for quality educators was passed to increase beneficiaries and retirements. And the kindergarten school at Texas Tech, and we could go on and on. So let's take a good look at those who want to tear down and destroy. We Texans have always been a proud people and rightfully so, with our arid Big Bend Area, the sands and beaches on the gulf coast, and tens of thousands of acres of timber lands of East Texas, this great south plains region, and the Tahoka Bulldogs! So together let's build and let's stand for something.

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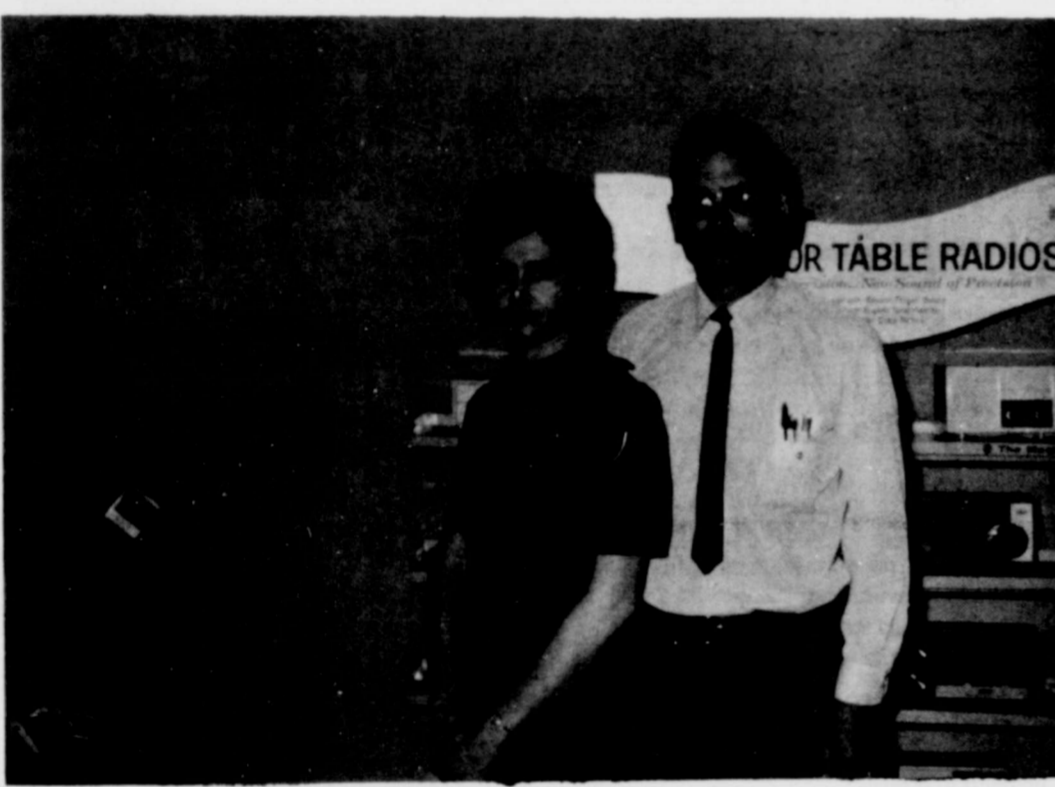


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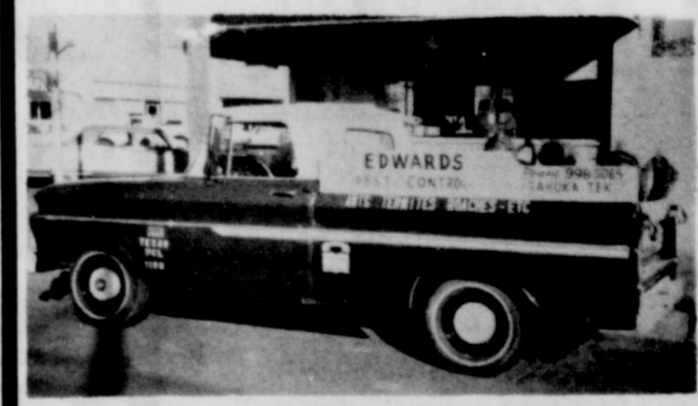
