Greathouse, Stone In Precinct 1 Runoff

In Lynn County races everyone got a clear cut victory except in the Precinct 1 Commissioner's race. W. E. "Ed" Stone received 422 votes while incumbent Frank Greathouse, Jr. racked up 108 votes.

The candidate for Commissioner of Precinct 1, Runt Moore received 280 votes. The two will vie for the job in the upcoming 2nd Democratic Election to be held June 3.

In the District Attorney's race Joe Smith and Vernon Adcock will be in a runoff. Incumbent for Sheriff, Norvell "Booger" Redwine took a decisive victory over candidate Reid Parker by a vote of 1611 to 936.

Doc Blanchard for State Senator, Gerald Huffaker for County Attorney, George D. McCracken for Tax Collector and Paul Sherrill for Commissioner of Precinct 3 all had no opponents.

In the State Representative race of the 77 District, Representative E. L. Short of Tahoka took a big victory in the county with 1866 votes to his opponent, Don Avery, who received 513. E. L. drew 78 percent of the voters in the County and in the District received 10197 to Don Avery's 5856. Short carried every county in his district except Don Avery's home county, Hockley.

The county went strong for Briscoe with 1325 votes to his closest Preston Smith with 565 votes even though Preston Smith received only 10 percent of the votes in Texas. Francis "Sissy" Farenthold gained the runoff with Dolph Briscoe. Briscoe received 45 percent of the total votes in Texas.

We were allowed to examine the clothes and talk with Debbie. Lynn County was well represented.

The screwworm, which at one time was one of the most economically damaging pests to livestock and wildlife, still poses a threat to the southwest. As of May 4 there were over 1400 screwworm cases confirmed in Texas. Screwworm samples have been identified from as far north as Dickens and Borden counties. At the present time the Screwworm Eradication Program is releasing sterile screwworm flies in a band of

500-600 per square mile 100 miles ahead of the last confirmed report. This band should help to slow the northward movement but much assistance is needed from area producers.

Several steps that producers can take to prevent a bad outbreak in West Texas include:

1. Inspect animals regularly for cuts, scratches and wounds. Pay special attention to the navel region on newborn calves.
2. Manage livestock to reduce injuries. Avoid surgery or any treatment that may create a wound.
3. Collect larvae and egg masses for identification. Search deep in wounds for screwworms. Send samples to: Screwworm Eradication Program, P. O. Box 969, Mission, Tex 78522.
4. Treat all wounds with a wound dressing. Follow directions on the label. Reinspect wounds until healed and re-treat when necessary.
5. Spray or Dip herds with approved pesticides. Follow directions on the label.
6. Know positively that purchase animals are screwworm-free at point of origin.
7. Tell your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow these precautions.
8. See your local county agricultural agent for screwworm mailing tubes and additional information.

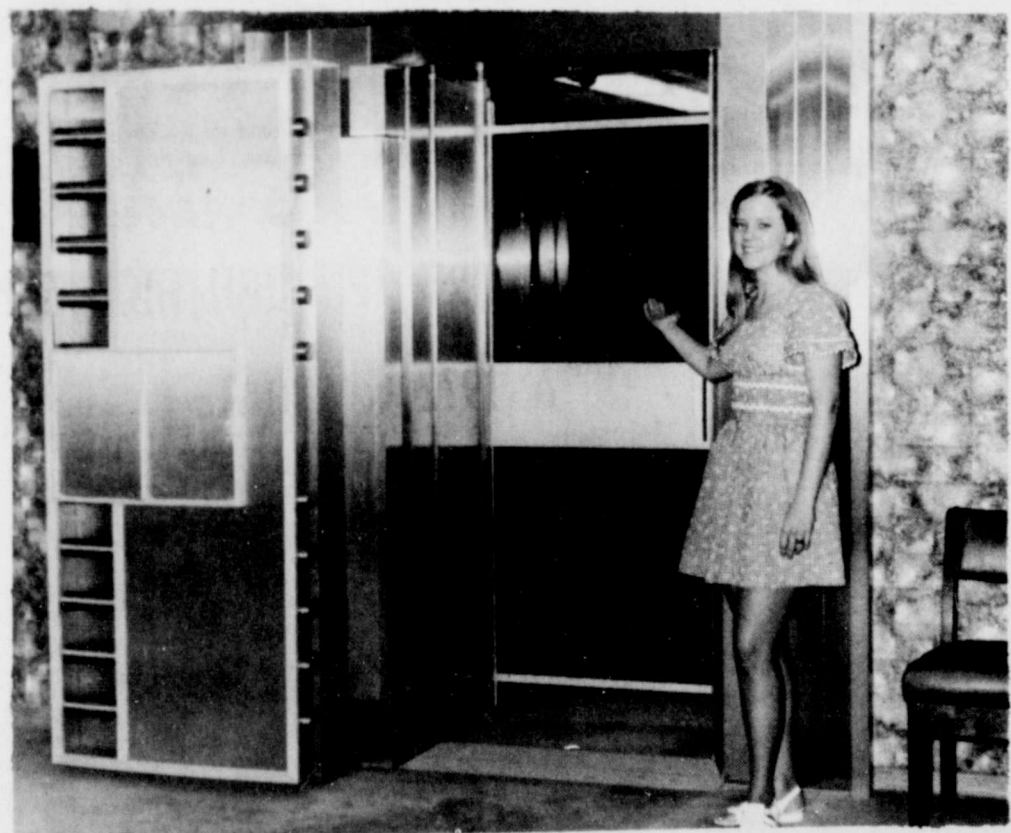

BUSINESS

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The attitude prevails in Washington that Congress is almost certain to pass some sort of minimum wage legislation in this election year, including an increase in the minimum rate for both industries.

This is the report of Ed Dean, Field Service Director of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, following a recent meeting of the National Council of Agricultural Employers (NCAE). NCAE is an association of producers, producer associations and allied interests formed in 1963 to protect the interests of agricultural employers. PCG is a charter member of the organization and Dean is one of the organizing directors.

"Legislation to force a higher minimum wage in agriculture without regard for other economic considerations will intensify what is already a tight cost-price squeeze in the industry," Dean said. "We are strongly opposed to any and all such legislation," he added, "but there are strong political winds blowing against us."

Major activity in Washington now centers around three wage bills. The Senate Labor Subcommittee has reported S-1861 which would raise the minimum for industrial workers to \$2.25 per hour in 1973. The minimum for farm workers, now \$1.30 per hour, under S-1861 would equal the industrial base by 1974. The law would apply directly to employers using more than 500 man-days of labor in any quarter of a calendar year. It would require payment of \$1.70 upon enactment, \$2.00 a year later and \$2.25 in 1974. Overtime exemptions contained in current law would remain intact for on-the-farm employees, but exemptions for processors, such as cotton gins, would be repealed.

The full Senate Labor Committee is scheduled to consider S-1861 soon, and there seems little doubt that it will be reported to the Senate floor. Chances for stopping it or softening it in the liberal-minded Senate look dim, according to Dean.

lers of agricultural commodities.

The Administration is sponsoring a bill by Representative John Erlenborn (R-111.) H.R. 1404, which is to be offered as a substitute for the Dent Bill when it comes to the floor. The Erlenborn bill proposes the same wage increases as the Dent bill, but is slightly less onerous to NCAE in that it would maintain present overtime exemptions for processors.

Dean said NCAE would make a concerted effort to defeat all three bills. "But if it becomes obvious that this can't be done, we'll work for the least possible increase and for a bill which retains overtime exemptions at all levels."

Tahoka cotton farmer Robert Warren will leave about May 11 on a 19-day trip to Japan, Korea, Taiwan and Hong Kong as a member of a "cotton trade team" promoting sales of U. S. Cotton. All four countries are large users of High Plains cotton and the extent of their imports from this country has a significant effect on cotton prices from year to year.

Warren was named to represent producers on the team by Agricultural Secretary Earl Butz. The other producer representative will be Robert Squires of El Paso.

Two sales teams the other going to Western Europe, will be traveling at the same time under joint sponsorship of USDA and Cotton Council International. Both include cotton shipper and producer representatives in addition to CCI and USDA personnel. Leaders of the trade missions will be Kenneth Frick, Administrator of Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, to the Far East, and Frank McKnight, Associate general Sales Manager of USDA's Export Marketing Service, to Europe.


Warren's preparation for the trip has included talks with Harry Arthur, Associate Director of the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University. Arthur also serves as Textile Consultant to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and PCG supplied Warren with comprehensive quality analyses and spinning test reports on High Plains cotton for use in "sales talks" with the Far Eastern cotton spinners.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Have a garden? If so, spring and summer meals will abound with fresh greens, such as mustard and spinach.

But what are you doing with the surplus? Do you have a home food freezer or locker that enables you to conserve these greens for future use? The agent explained that preserving food means money in your pocket if you have the time and know-how. Greens provide vitamin A which is needed for growth, normal vision and health conditions of skin and other body surfaces. Select mustard and spinach with young, tender leaves that are easy to freeze. Freeze as soon after picking as possible for highest quality.

The agent reminds to prepare the greens as you would for cooking. Wash and remove tough stems and imperfect leaves. It's necessary to heat greens before freezing to slow or stop the action of enzymes.

Until greens are ready to pick enzymes help them grow. After that they cause loss of flavor and color. If not heated, the enzymes continue to be active during the frozen storage. The greens then develop off-flavors in a few months and discolor and toughen.

Heating also wilts greens and makes them easier to pack. Heating too long re-

sults in softening of texture and an unnecessarily large loss of water soluble vitamins and minerals.

So, put greens in a blanching basket or a large kettle or sauce pan that can be covered or into which a fine mesh wire basket fits. It's possible to use a large cheese cloth bag in a covered sauce pan.

Lower the basket or bag into boiling water and cover. Keep the heat high and begin counting the time immediately. Heat the mustard greens in boiling water for two minutes, and heat very tender spinach for one and one-half minutes.

Plunge the heated greens into a large container of ice water or into cold running water. When the greens are cool, remove them from the water and drain.

Pack the greens into moisture-vapor proof containers, leaving a half-inch headspace if using jars or rigid containers. When working with plastic bags, press out the air before closing with a goose-neck twist.

Freeze the greens immediately, and store at zero degrees Fahrenheit or below.

The greens will be no better when you take them from the freezer than they were when you put them in. So remember—use fresh, tender greens, freeze as soon as possible and keep the freezer temperature at zero or below. Fluctuating temperatures lower quality.

Heavenly Salad
1 small box strawberry gelatin
1 carton sour cream
1 small carton non-dairy whip-

ped topping
1 small can fruit cocktail
1 small can mandarin oranges
1 small package marshmallows
1/2 cup nuts
Drain fruit well. Mix sour cream, whipped topping and gelatin. Add fruit, marshmallows and nuts. Chill overnight. Serves 6.

Shortcourse For All Horsemen

A shortcourse for horsemen of all ages and experience is planned for May 12-13 in the Hale County Agricultural Building in Plainview. The clinic will feature horse specialists from Texas A & M University and other area horsemen who will offer training on all phases of horsemanship and horse activities. It is being sponsored by the South Plains Development Program, which is administered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Activities will get under way with registration at 4:30 p.m. on May 12, according to Billy C. Gunter, Extension district agricultural agent. Registration fees are three dollars for adults and one dollar for youth under 19.

A 4-H adult leaders seminar will begin at 6:30 p.m. on planning and conducting youth horse programs. The instructors will be Ed Garnett, the area 4-H specialist, and also B. F. Yeates, Dr. Gary Potter and Doug Houeholder, all Texas A & M horse specialists.

Yeates and Potter will conclude the first evening's activities with a demonstration on how to start a young horse and use of a hackamore, along with biting a horse.

The Saturday portion of the clinic will begin at 8:30 a.m. with a discussion of "Conformation vs. Utility of Horses," by Yeates and Potter. They will then demonstrate the fundamentals of basic horsemanship.

The afternoon program will start with a lecture on horse feeding practices by Potter, who holds a Ph.D. degree in horse nutrition. Householder will then demonstrate the proper methods of showmanship at halter.

Yeates will explain Western Pleasure classes and a reining exhibition will be given by Potter and John Trimmer. He is a Hale Center rancher and leading West Texas horse authority.

Trimmer will also give a demonstration on training a cutting horse. Potter will then give a roping exhibition.

"The clinic is mainly to help our area 4-H youth with their horse programs, but anyone interested in horses is welcome to come," says Garnett, the 4-H specialist.

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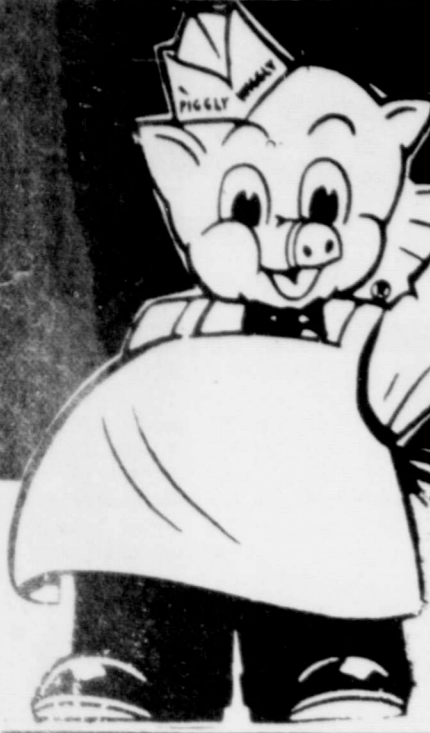
