## Tahoka First In Elementary Literary Contests

### VANDALS TAKE HEAVY TOLL AT SCHOOL, CHURCH

Vandalism took a heavy toll last Saturday in Tahoka. The Tahoka Church of Christ was vandalized along with the Tahoka High School Building and the Agriculture Shop.

In the Tahoka Church of Christ, chocolate syrup and

other liquids were poured out on carpets and tea and other matter were poured into the baptistry along with destruction of song books and other materials.

In the Tahoka High School building nine rooms were vandalized. In the Superintendent's office all pictures of their children were destroyed plus a picture of the Tahoka Bulldog. In one room, film was destroyed and strewn all over the room plus heavy damage to a projector with ink and other liquids and powders poured out in the floors. Books in the Library were thrown and scattered and some were destroyed. In the School and the church the walls were written on in obscene language, typewriters and other materials being damaged.

### Blocker Buried In DeKalb

Dan Blocker, son of the late "Shock" Blocker, O'Donnell business man, died Saturday of two blood clots in the lung. He developed an infection after undergoing gall bladder surgery May 1. He was 43.

He was buried in DeKalb Tuesday with a private burial.

Blocker was known to millions of television viewers as Hoss Cartwright of "Bonanza."

Blocker grew up in O'Donnell moving there from DeKalb when he was 6 years old.

Survivors include his wife, Dolphia; twin daughters and two sons; and his mother, Mrs. Mary Blocker of DeKalb.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday at the First Methodist Church in Tahoka for Cindy Gibson, 20, who died about 4:45 p.m. Friday in Methodist Hospital after complications from diabetes.

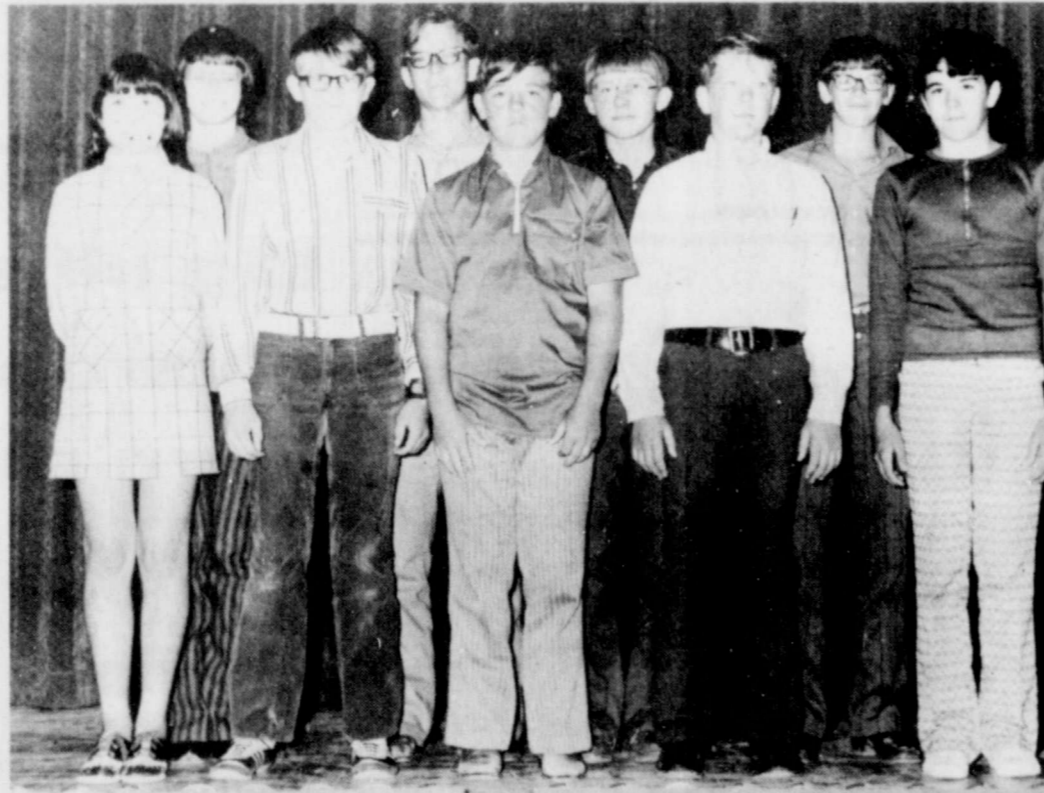

In other business the Commodity Agreement for the school lunch program was approved for the 1972-73 school year. The Board heard a report from Floyd Tubb, assisted by Mrs. Wanda Smith and Mrs. Virginia Griffing, on the District Instruction System and Remediation, or Distar, was developed at the University of Illinois. It was developed on the premise that all children can learn if they are taught in the right way.

As there are two levels to the program Mrs. Smith moved with the group to the second level this year. The Board expressed its satisfaction with most aspects of the program and ordered a modified program initiated in all first grades beginning with the 1972-73 year.

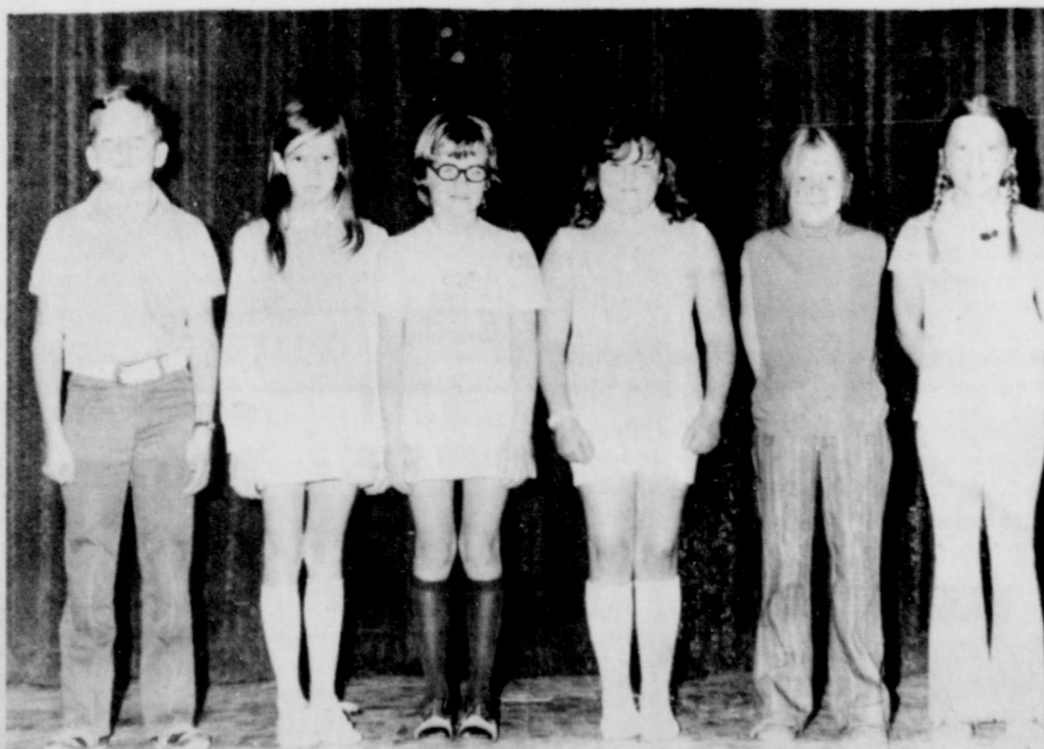

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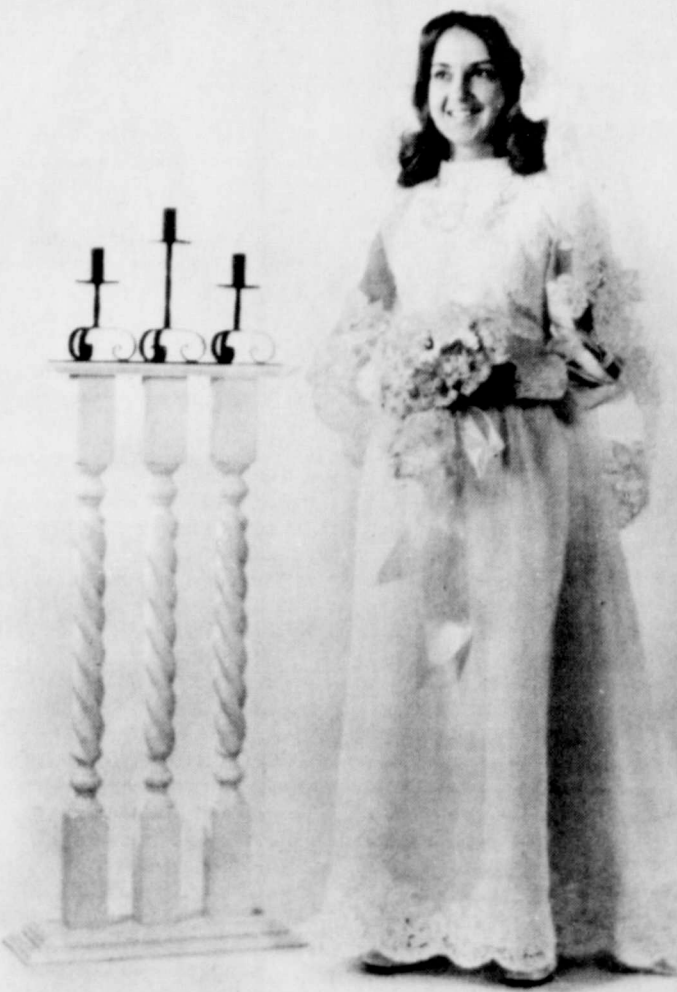

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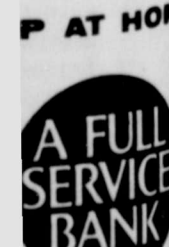
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# Small Business Workshop To Be Held In Tahoka

"Money for Your Expansion Plans" will be the theme for the workshop which is designed to point out to present industries in the area the avenues for financial and technical assistance which will aid them in expanding their operation.

The speakers from the SBA, including Phillip J. O'Jibway, district director; Hall T. Martin and Carl Lightner, community economic development specialists and J. B. Hare, from the procurement and management assistance division, will advise participants on availability of direct government loans and community loans and how to get government contracts.

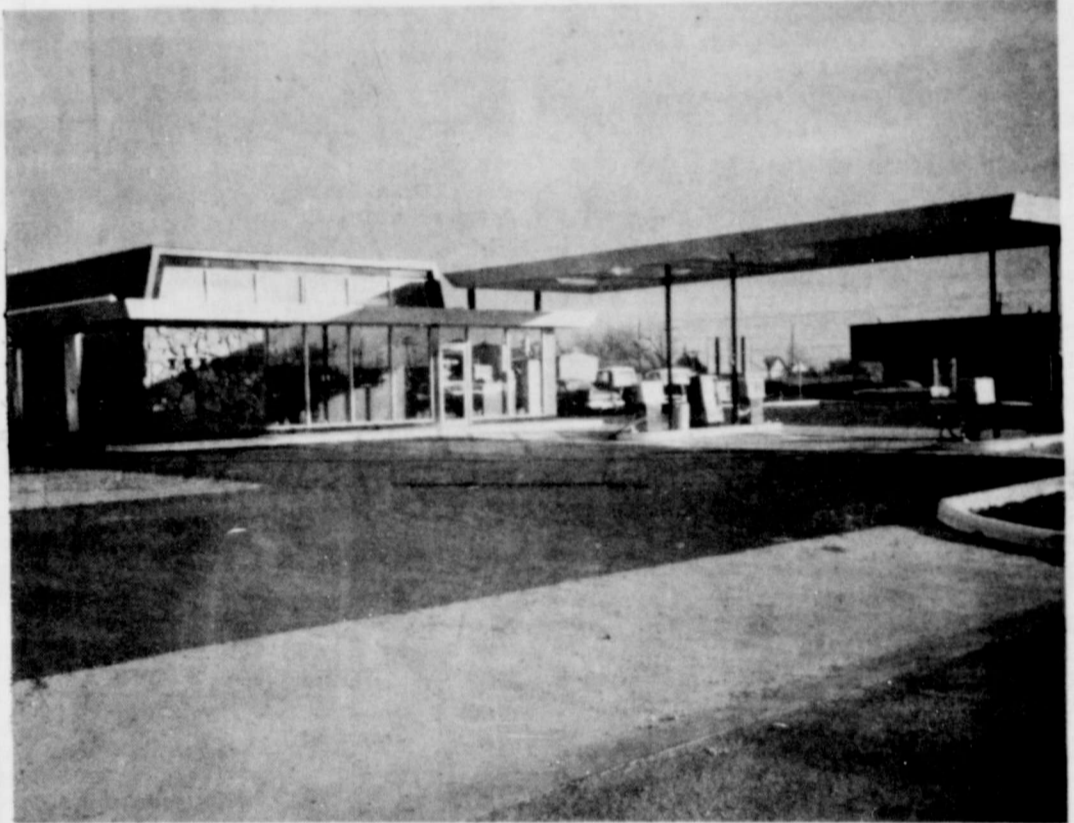

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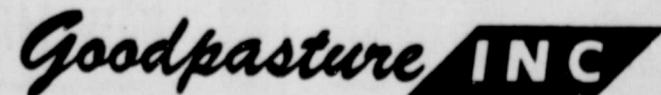

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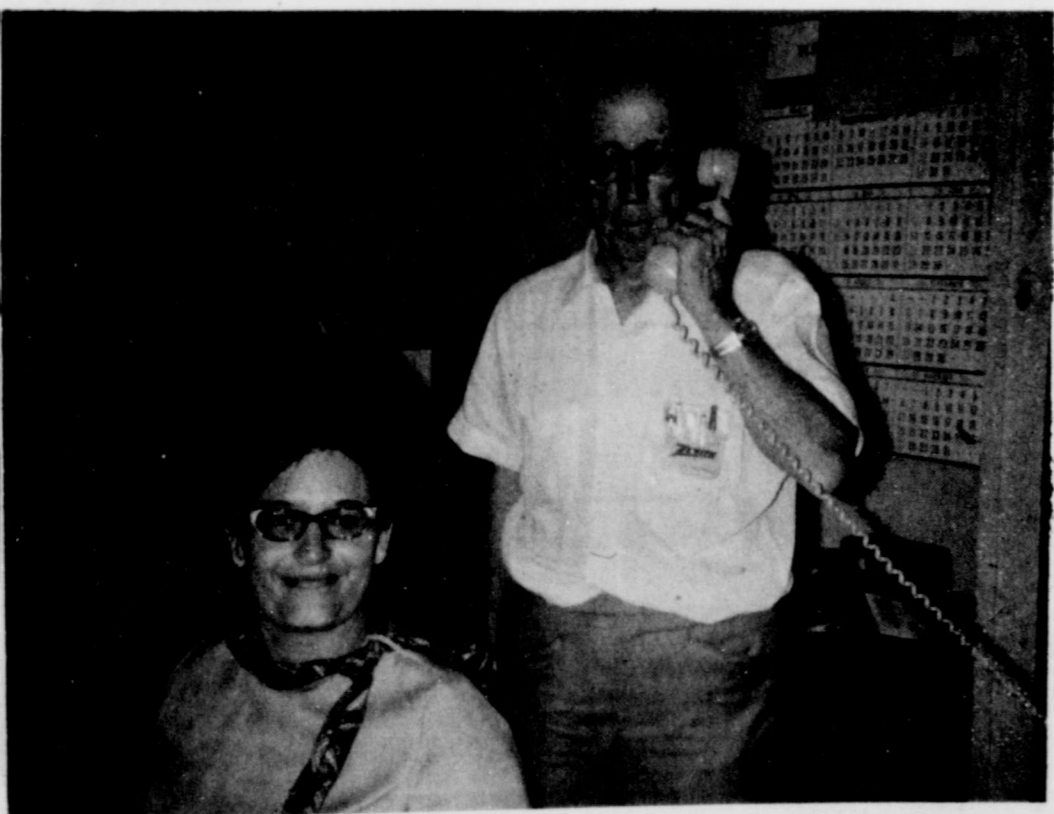

A possible improvement in the successful High Plains boll weevil control program will be tested in four area counties this year. Strips of early-maturing cotton varieties will be planted in a few fields in each county next to prime overwintering sites such as shinnery and mesquite to literally lure the emerging weevils into traps. Pheromone traps, as well as the strips of early cotton will attract the overwintering weevils into limited areas. The testing will be done in Briscoe, Dickens, Hale and Motley Counties.

"In addition, when the early cotton is planted, Temik will be incorporated into the furrow, to destroy the weevils as they are drawn to the cotton and pheromone traps."

The program will be carried out by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A & M University and the Plant Protection Division of the USDA. Scientists from these two organizations will be studying the technique as to its usefulness on a large scale.

The program will measure the effectiveness of each of the control factors. Some fields will receive only the Temik treatment or the sex pheromone traps, while others will be planted only with the early-maturing variety.

"Producers having just the early-maturing cotton planted their farm may be concerned that large numbers of weevils will be attracted to their fields." But the fields will be monitored closely and any damaging boll weevil levels will be promptly controlled.

The scientists believe this approach of attracting weevils can be an important boost to the current suppression program, which presently consists of spraying each fall to control diapausing weevils.

"Producers are encouraged to cooperate fully, because we must have complete cooperation for the suppression program to continue its success."

The testing of the method is the result of research conducted by Dr. Dale Bottrell of the Agricultural Experiment Station in 1971.

**TOMATO PANTS**  
Nice people have been setting out tomato plants for more than two weeks and it's really too bad. The tomato, a tropical perennial, will stay alive under a wide range of conditions. However, productive fruiting will occur only in a narrow range of environmental conditions. The minimum soil temperature for fruiting is 60 degrees, with a maximum is 85 degrees. Tomato plants will do best at 60 - 75 percent relative humidity. Wilting may occur when the humidity drops to 15 - 20 percent.

Some greenhouse tomato growers who have provided environmental conditions are now picking fruit from the 20th to the 25th cluster on plants they started last July. Outdoor tomato production is a different matter.

Many people have set out tomato plants in the last week or so. But, some critical conditions are not yet above the minimum. A case in point is air temperature. Although the soil temperature is now about 70 degrees F. at the eight-inch depth on the South Plains, the air temperature drops every night to the 40's or low 50's. Because tomato blossoms are receptive for only 48 to 72 hours and even cold tolerant varieties will not pollinate properly at temperatures below 60 degrees F., any open blossoms probably will not set fruit. If a fruit is set it will likely be catfaced due to incomplete pollination.

Super hotnets and plastic row covers can keep the night temperature around the plant five to ten degrees warmer than the outside temperature. In suggesting covers for tomato plants I am careful to emphasize that a vent hole must be cut in hotnets and the end walls of row covers must be opened each sunny day to prevent overheating. Dr. Roland Roberts, area vegetable specialist.

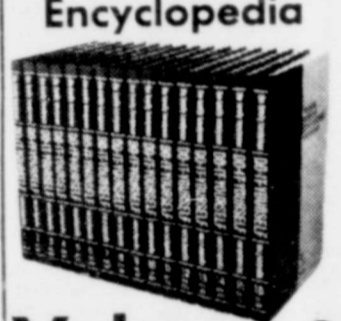
