Dan Blocker, son of the late 'Shock'' Blocker, O'Donnell business man, died Saturday of two blood clots in the lung. He developed an infection after undergoing gall bladder surgery May 1. He was 43.

He was buried in DeKalb Tuesday with a private burial.

Blocker was known to millions of television viewers as Hoss Cartwright of "Bonanza"

Blocker grew up in O'Donnell moving there from De-Kalb when he was 6 years.

Survivors include his wife, Dolphia; twin daughters and two sons; and his mother. Mrs. Mary Blocker of DeKalo.

Books in the Library were thrown and scattered and some were destroyed. In the School and the church the walls were written on in obscene language, typewriters and other materials being damaged.

Gas jets in the school were turned and left on plus a bottle of ecetylene was turned on and left in the Agriculture shop and typewriters were also heavily damaged in that

Fast work by Police Chief Jack Miller and Deputy O. D. Woody found out the two youngsters that were involved in the vandalism. The Vandalism at the school was estimated would run between three and four thousand dollars plus the





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A possible improvement in the successful High Plains boll weevil control program will be tested in four area counties this year. Strips of earlymaturing cotton varieties will be planted in a few fields in each county next to prime overwintering sites such as shinnery and mesquite to literally lure the emerging weevils into traps. Pheromone traps, as well as the strips of early cotton will attract the overwintering weevils into limited areas. The testing will be done in Briscoe, Dickens, Hale and Motley Counties.

"In addition, when the early cotton is planted, Temik will be incorporated into the furrow, to destroy the weevils as they are drawn to the cotton and pheromone traps,"

The program will be car. ried out by the Texas Agriculturla Experiment Station of Texas A & M University and the Plant Protection Division of the USDA. Scientists from

these two organizations will be studying the technique as to its usefulness on a large scale.

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The program will measure the effectiveness of each of the control factors. Some fields will receive only the Temik treatment or the sex pheromone traps, while others will be planted only with the earlymaturing variety.

"Producers having just the early-maturing cotton planted their farm may be concerned that large numbers of weevils will be attracted to their But the fields will be monitored closely and any damaging boll weevil levels will be promptly controlled.

The scientists believe this approach of attracting weevils can be an important boost to the current suppression program, which presently consists of spraying each fall to control diapausing weevils.

"Producers are encouraged to cooperate fully, because we must have complete cooperation for the suppression program to continue its success." The testing of teh method is

the result of research conducted by Dr. Dale Bottrell of the Agricultural Experiment Station in 1971.
