Program ing popularity of the American Cancer Society's memorial program was given today by Mrs. Kenneth Turner, memorial chairman of the Society's Lynn County Unit.

Mrs. Turner said that memorial gifts to the unit total \$506.00 to date with the fiscal year to end in August of this year.

The rapid growth of memorial giving is due to a keener public appreciation of the fact that more tools are needed in the fight against cancer. Mrs. Turner pointed out that research against the disease has progressed so rapidly that there has not been enough money available to follow . up on the many new leads which have been uncovered in recent months. "Research against cancer has widened tremendously, and most scientists now believe that the disease will be conquered before many more years have passed," she said.

Mrs. Turner said that the memorial gifts received by the local Unit of the American Cancer Society are made not only frequently in honor of happier events, such as birthdays and anniversaries. "Some donors," she said,

"have established the habit of making memorial gifts at regular intervals during the year."

Farmer Certification Is Key To Set-Aside Program Payments

Farmer certification is the essential step preceding setaside payments to producers participating in the U.S. Department of Agriculture 1972 set-aside programs for corn, grain sorghum, and cotton, according to Tommy Lawson, local farm program official.

He urged farmers who have question about certification to call or come in to their county office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"It's important that a farmer know exactly what he is certifying before he signs his name," said Lawson, County ASCS Excectuve Director.

Final certification date this year is August 1, but certification may be made as soon as a farmer has his program crops planted and knows he is in compliance with the programs.

As soon as a producer certifies, the County ASCS Officer begins processing the data for payments to get certifications payments which will be made

soon after July 1. "While if speeds payments to get certifications in early, producers should also remember that mistakes can be costly. Once certification is made, no acreage adjustments can be made. A farmer has to be in compliance with program regulations when he certifies. That's why we're urging producers to call or come in now if they're not sure about what is required for certification," Lawson

When a producer certifies. he reports exactly what acreage he has in set-aside land

and what acreage he has in the program crops he signed up for. He also certifies he has complied with all program regulations and will continue to comply throughout the year. An error in certification can result in loss of some or all of the set-aside payments. Spot checks are made each year on farms participating in the programs.

Farm Bureau will not capitulate to the demands of Cesar Chavez and his sympathizers and stand idly by while farm workers are coereced into unions they do not want, Howard Moore, president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau said Tuesday.

Carrying out an ultimatum delivered to the Farm Bureau national leadership recently, began demonstrating at Farm Bureau desist from its efforts to secure the enactment of constructive farm labor legislation and threatened a mas-"informational" campaign to smear the Farm Bu-

"We have nothing to hide and

will not hield to such pressures," the farm leader said. He emphasized that the Farm Bureau is not opposing the right of farm laborers to organize and be represented by a union. But the farm organization contends that workers should have a choice in the matter.

Farm Bureau supports proposed farm labor legislation that would: (1) Guarantee secret ballot elections for farm workers on the question of which -- if any -- union they wish to represent them (in the only such election held to date. Chavez forces were soundly defeated); (2) prohibit the secondary boycott in

prohibited in industry under the provisions of the National Labor Relations Act. (3) Create an Agricultural Labor Relations Board to administer the act; and (4) Protect against the strike at harvest by specifying a reasonable period of notification before a strike, and by setting guidelines for fair arbitration

of disputes.

The Chavez apparatus has successfully employed the secondary boycott technique to coerce thousands of farm workers into its ranks. When growers could not market the boycotted products they had no alternative but to sign their workers over to the Chavez union. The fact that the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee, which Chavez heads, (now the United Farm Workers National Union - an AFL-CIO affiliate) had to resort to the secondary boycott is indicative of the coolness of the workers themselves toward UFWOC's organizational efforts and their reluctance to join the union

voluntarily, the farm leader pointed out.

"We feel that our position is fair to everyone concerned, and we stand by the policies of our organization which call for the enactment of constructive farm labor legislation." he declared.


Voter Registration

There is no deadline on voter registration. A person may register anytime during the year and his certificate becomes effective 30 days after it is issued. All persons 18 and above must register.

College students who wish to vote in their home county must register in same. 

Gross collections were \$337,642,53, less discount of \$6,882.33, making net collections \$330,760.20. The net collection was divided as follows, State Amount - \$43, 389.71; County - \$170,595.85; High Plains Water District -\$2603.05; and Hospital District - \$121,053.92.

Penality and interest is applied to all taxes paid after February first. All 1971 taxes that are not paid by July 1, 1972, will go on the delinquent tax roll and will draw additional penality and interest.





SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Herbicide run - off from farmland is apparently not a grave threat to the environment, according to studies by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers in the Panhandle.

Dr. Allen Wiese, weed scientist at the USDA Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, began a study in the spring of 1968 that has shown only minute amounts of herbicides dissolved in irrigation or rain water that ran off fields.

The chemicals used in the study included Treflan. AAtrex, and Milogard; all common weed control products. In the first season. the fields received either rain fall or irrigation water four to five times.

"The first water samples after herbicide application contained the most chemical, but by fall no herbicides could be detected in the run-off water," Wiese reports.

Milogard had the highest concentration in the water, which was less than a fifth of one part per million. The other two substances had much less concentration than the Milogard.

"That means that if there was one inch of run-off from acres, only a little more than five pounds of the chemical would be collected, which is well below the danger level in the area's playa lakes," the scientist added.

As a further test, the researchers wanted to determine what would happen to herbicides in playa lake water. Small ponds 20 by 50 feet in size were constructed in a playa bed. Treflan and AAtrex were applied at a rate of one pound per acre to the bottom of each pond. In addition, one-half pound of the new brush herbicide Tordon was tested.

The ponds were then flooded with six inches of water and the bottoms were kept covered for two months. Six months later, the ponds were flooded again for one month. The Treflan disappeared from the water and bottom soil at the end of the first flooding period of two months.

"The AAtrex and Tordon persisted for 90 days, but were no longer present in the soil after 18 months," Wiese con-

With the decline we must take better care of the water we have and use it wisely. This tem, proper irrigation water management and more time irrigation application. These times of economic squeeze and high risk will eventually force us to do so and we will be left by the wayside.

Hold all your water where it falls and use the water you pump wisely.

Springtime brings with it the desire to get outside and enjoy various recreational activities. Due to this interest there's an increase in advertisements of lake lots, wilderness lots and speculative land investments. If youre considering the purchas of land for a vacation or retirement home or as an investment, there are some guidelines to keep in mind.

Make a personal visit to the land to see for yourself the condition of the site. Find out what facilities, utilities and roads are there. Ask if water and electric power facilities are available at reasonable costs. Does the management permit septic

Be sure to check on recreational facilities. If the

The passage of a mederal law cuts down on land sale fraud by requiring sellers to provide information about the land. Under the Interstate Land Sales Full Disclosure Act, the land developer who offers 50 or more unimproved lots for sale and advertises across lines must file a state ment of record containing detailed information about the

property with the Officer of Interstate Land Sales Registration, U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Washington, D. C. 20411. This report must be filed before the land can be offer-

The act also requires sellers to provide prospective buyers with a property report containing information

land developer advertises a golf course, swimming pool, boat marina or other recreational activities, find out the status of these items. Ask if they're still in the "early planning stages." Find out exactly when they'll be com-

Be careful of buying land for a retirment home in an isolated area. Discover the distance to stores, medical care, banks, churches, and other public services. How close are neighbors? Many lots have been sold in remote and desolated deserts, mountains and swamp areas.

needed by the consumer to make a decision whether or not to buy. The report includes information on the availability of water, electricity sewer service and recreational facilities. The report must also include information regarding the existence of liens on the property, the type of title the buyer receives and the distances to nearby communities over paved and unpaved roads.

Study the property record carefully before making a decision. The law requires the buyer to give you a copy of the report at least 48 hours

before you sign the contract. When buying land, avoid being misled by a "free" lot offer. Many real estate promoters offer -"free" lots in development sites as a lure to sell land. Often fees. charges or other strings are attached to getting these lots.

Some companies offer a free weekend at a development site to enable potential buyers to see the land. Some developers use this as an excuse to pressure visitors to buy while others simply provide information about the site. When taking advantage of a free weekend keep in mind that travel and some other expenses may not be covered.

During May .. Senior Citizens' Month -- we're REMIND-ED ABOUT THE NEEDS OF OLDER PEOPLE.

One of these needs is available housing. Suitable housing environments are especially important to older Americans as life space decreases with age.

Low incomes, disabilities, a penchant to remain in their own homes and limited housing alternatives force many older families and individuals to live in substandard or otherwise undersirable dwellings and neighborhoods.

A 1971 study estimated that persons over age 65 spend about 80 to 90 percent of their lives in the domestic (i.e,

home) environment. Of all people only small children, the chronically ill and thoses institutionalized for law violation are as house and neigh-

borhood bound as the elderly. Others have indicated that the life space of the elderly tends to diminish with age. As energy and health decline, and financial resources shrink countless numbers of older Americans limit the physical space they occupy to the neighborhood grocery store, nearby church and to their dwell-

For the enfeebled and the ill, life space is reduced to a house or an apartment, to a room and ultimately to a be within four restricting walls. The quality of the housing environment becomes increasingly significant in the lives of many aged families and individuals. And the quality of this limited world largely determines the extent to which they'll retain their independence. It also influences their amount of privacy, how often they visit friends, their sense of place or territorial ownership and their ability to exercise a measure of control over the immediate en-

vironment. Housing is often a major factor in the physical, social and psychological attitudes of older persons. One thing to consider in providing housing for the elderly is to provide hous. ing consistent with a variety of life styles, rather than merely Grassland Cemetery producing a large number of dwelling units.

Older families, as well as younger families, should be

allowed to exercise as much freedom of choice in housing as possible.

Most oler couples and individuals want to live independently as long as possible. Types of housing and social services will enable them to be masters of their own households and achieve independent living.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK Apricot Fantastics 1/2 pound dried apricots 1 cup water

1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup melted shortening

1/2 cup brown sugar 1 cup flour 4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon soda cup quick cooking oatmeal

4 teaspoon vanilla Add water to apricots, cov-

er and cook until boiling. Reduce heat to simmer and cook 30 minutes or until -tender. Add sugar. Stir. Chill. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Combine shortening and brown sugar. Sift flour, slat and soda and mix with oatmeal. Blend with sugar mixture until crumbly. Pat 1/2 mixture in the bottom of a 9 by 13 inch pan, add apricots mixed with vanilla, and sprinkle the rest of the crumb mixture over the top. Bake 30 minutes.

The schedule of premiums and discounts for eligible qualities of 1972-crop upland cotton, to be used this year by Commodity Credit Corporation in making loans to producers, was released May 5. According to an analysis by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., premiums and discounts "are generally narrower than those ineffect for the 1971 crop," reflecting spot market prices for cotton recorded over the nine - month period from August, 1971 through April of this year.

"This will be the third year of a trend toward smaller differences between loan values for higher and lower qualities and shorter staples," notes Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President, adding that this is a "natural result of the supply-demand relationships for the various classifications." Until recent months the supply of shorter staples and lower grades of cotton has been somewhat restricted, while the supply of higher white grades of medium and longer staples has been relatively plentiful.

"However the final quality distribution of the 1970 crop has reversed the situation to some extent," Johnson said, 'and the narrowing of differentials may well end with
