The 38th annual Lynn County Pioneer Reunion will be held Saturday, June 24 in the air-conditioned Tahoka School Gymnasium. Registration will begin at 8 a.m. and old timers will have a chance to sit and reminisce and enjoy re-creating old acquaintances. The annual barbeque meal will be served at noon and will cost \$1.50 per plate. The program is planned for Saturday afternoon and John Edwards will be the M.C.

Awards will be presented to the person coming the greatest distance, the eldest man and woman present, who have not previously received these awards. Plaques will also be presented to the first and second place winners in the downtown store window display decorations.

The rodeo coincides with the old settlers reunion and will be held Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights beginning at 8:30 p.m.

Annual Rodeo Is Scheduled

The 12th Annual Tahoka Rodeo will get underway Saturday, June 24 at 5:30 p.m. with cowboys competing in all ages, floats, bands, and riding. At 8:30 p.m. the rodeo will begin with the color guard entry. The first queen will take place. Girls vying for the honor are Karen Edwards, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwards of New Home, daughter of Mrs. A. N. Crowson of Tahoka, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Adams of Tahoka, daughter of Mrs. A. A. McNeely of Tahoka, the 1972 Rodeo queen will be on hand to crown the new queen. The girl selling the most advance rodeo tickets will be the next rodeo queen. The girls work hard to sell tickets so help out and buy your tickets in advance. Adults tickets are \$1.50 and children are \$1.00.

This year the stock is Campbell and Cordell from Childress. The first event each night will be the Wild Bull Riding. The other events are Bareback, Saddle Bronc, Calf Roping (entries fee for each of these is \$25.00), Jr. Ribbon Roping - 17 and under (\$10 entry fee) and Barrel Races (open with \$15 entry fee.) SPAG To Receive Grant

South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock was one of 26 regional and metropolitan area planning councils awarded criminal justice planning grants for fiscal year 1973 by Governor Preston Smith today. Amount was \$29,200.

The awards, totaling \$793,718, will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

The South Plains grant will be used in implementing action projects outlined in previous plans and in updating the comprehensive five-year criminal justice plan for the 15 counties of the South Plains State Planning Region.

Early in 1972 SPAG realigned the multi-year criminal justice program for the region to keep pace with other developments and updated priorities for the regional criminal justice plan.

Programs receiving emphasis include law enforcement training and communications, and others dealing with courts, juvenile delinquency and probation. SPAG furnishes professional criminal justice planning services to each local governmental unit in the region's 15 counties and serves as a regional clearinghouse.

These counties are Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum. The regions' cash contribution to the criminal justice planning effort will be \$3,244. Two criminal justice action grants to the area served by the South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock were among those approved today by Governor Preston Smith. Total was \$36,687.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

Lubbock County will receive \$18,488 as second-year funding for its adult probation pro-

ject, subject to a cash match of \$20,944. The probation project serves Lubbock and Crosby counties with a staff of six officers. The two counties have 805 probationers. The new grant will enable employment of a job training coordinator and an additional probation officer.

South Plains Association of Governments' application for \$18,199 as continued funding of the regional law enforcement teletype network also was approved. A previous award enabled law enforcement agencies in the South Plains region to update transmission

equipment from manual to automatic. The new grant will assist 17 subscribers to the system to continue service pending further refinement. Cash match of \$11,735 and in-kind contribution of \$4,482 will be provided.

Counties of the region are Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum.

The two South Plains applications were among 43 for action grants totaling \$1,718,464 considered by the CJC Executive Committee June 9.

Technical Training Program Explained

The vocational training program of Texas State Technical Institute which has schools at Sweetwater, Waco, Amarillo and Harlingen was explained by Homer Taylor of the Sweetwater school at the Rotary Club last Thursday.

Enrollment in the school is open to high school graduates or drop-outs, and 62 courses are offered by the system. Training is currently being offered at Sweetwater in air conditioning and refrigeration mechanics, auto body repair, automotive mechanics, combination welding, dental assisting, licensed vocational nursing, radio and television servicing, technical drafting, technical secretary; and soon to be added are courses in cosmetology, livestock, and ranch operation, and building trades.

Other courses are available at the other schools, and still others will be added in fields where there is a shortage of skilled workers.

The Institute is fully accredited by Texas Education Agency, and also with Southern Association of Colleges and Schools as a special purpose institute.

The speaker pointed out technicians are well paid and job opportunities far exceed the

number of graduates. Costs of attending any of these schools are moderate, and there is a comprehensive program of loans, grants, scholarships, and student employment opportunities to assist eligible students.

Maurice Small introduced the speaker.

Thursday night of next week, the annual officer installation meeting for the coming Rotary year will be held in the Methodist Church fellowship hall when Rotary Anns will attend and a cover dish luncheon will be served.

one son, Townes, who lives in Lubbock.

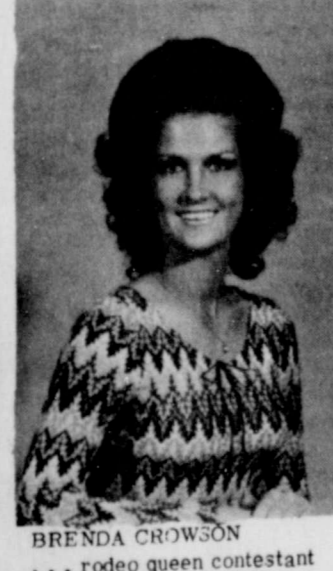

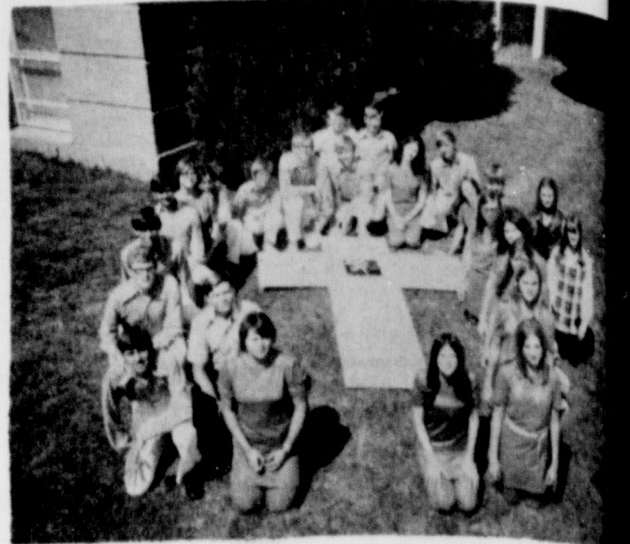

Mexico opened an institution of higher learning in the United States this week -- in San Antonio, Texas. Why?

The answer to that question lies in the personality, leadership and goals of Mexico President Luis Echeverria Alvarez. The new dynamic President of Mexico is visiting the U. S. this week to discuss a couple of major problem areas between Mexico and this country.

If his track record here comes close to his achievements in Mexico since his inauguration December 1, 1970, he will go back home with some commitments about the Mexican laborers in California and the salinity problems of the Mexicali Valley caused by the Colorado River water.

His visit to Texas gave this state a clue to his major goals in Mexico. He dedicated the San Antonio Mexican Cultural Institute -- located in HemisFair's Mexico pavilion. It is symbolic of the principal changes Echeverria is attempting in Mexico's way of life.

His enthusiasm and determination to solve Mexico's problems has become contagious among all government leaders in his country.

His common workday is 12 to 14 hours -- with no complaints from Mexico's government leaders and their staffs.

There is no "siesta" in Mexican governmental circles these days. The new leadership in Mexico is determined also to get rid of the "mangana" image -- and turn it to "today and tomorrow."

They recognize internal problems" and have programs to do something about them.

"Most of Mexico's problems can be solved by education," Echeverria believes.

His program for educational reform in Mexico points out the fact that he means what he says.

Echeverria anticipated the country's education problems before he started his six-year term as president (a president may not succeed himself in that country).

"President Echeverria studied the country's population statistics and discover-

ed that 500,000 children per year will be entering the elementary education program," states Mexico's Secretary of Education Victor Bravo Ahuja.

"Mexico has a population of 50,000,000 -- half of which is in the rural areas. One-fourth of the population is between six and 14 years of age. There were no schools for 150,000 students wanting to enter elementary school.

"More than 12,000 new teachers must be trained each year to educate these new students," the Secretary of Education continued.

He does not believe all high school graduates should go to college. (There are 133,000 students attending the University of Mexico this year.)

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

Texas cotton farmers have very little use for DDT. There fore they have no cause for concern that the well-known insecticide is about to be banned in the U.S. Right? Wrong, says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock-based cotton producer organization.

DDT is used in some parts of the cotton belt, primarily for bollworm control, and is an important production tool in those areas. In Texas DDT is recommended only for control of cutworms and garden webworms, which are minor problems, and for control of fleahoppers in a mix with toxaphene. It is not used in Texas for control of boll weevils or bollworms, the major pests.

"But the significance of the DDT ban, important as it is to cotton production in some areas, goes far beyond the im-

mediate effect on cotton production," Johnson said. Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Admin-

istrator William Ruckelshaus on June 14 announced an almost complete ban on DDT usage in the United States beginning December 31, 1972. DDT for several years has been under fire from "environmental purists" who maintain its use creates an unreasonable hazard to human health and various species of wildlife. They claim this hazard outweighs the benefits to crop production and to humanity as a means to controlling mosquitos and thereby furnishing protection against such scourges as malaria, yellow fever, encephalitis and a number of other deadly diseases.

Seven months of hearings were held by EPA in Washington during which DDT opponents attempted to show that DDT causes severe damage to the environment. They failed. At the conclusion, hearing examiner Edmund Sweeney said "There has been proof that, on balance with the benefits, the present essential uses of DDT. . . . do not create an unreasonable risk."

Accordingly, Sweeney recommended to Administrator Ruckelshaus that essential uses of DDT be continued. But the Administrator has apparently ignored the recommendation of the hearing examiner ignored the absence of evidence to support claims of detrimental DDT effects, and announced a ban on DDT.

"The alarm being voiced by agriculture is totally justified," Johnson says, "because the ruling denies use of a valuable production tool. But to many of us it is even more alarming that the ban can be made by the EPA Administrator without cause having been shown."

DDT manufacturers and agricultural groups will no doubt take the case to court in an effort to set aside the Administrator's decision. And, if the evidence presented in court is the equivalent of that presented at hearings, the EPA ruling should be reversed. "Hopefully that will be the case," Johnson said.

"If minority groups of ill-informed environmentalists can pressure the EPA into banning DDT in the face of massive evidence that its benefits to society far outweigh any possible ill effects, then one is forced to ask what will be banned next, chocolate ice cream?" At stake in the final court

Farm Bureau News

The workers' side of the issue of farm labor unionization will be depicted in a special showing of the film "Road to Delano" on local television soon, according to Howard Moore, president of the Lynn County Farm Bureau.

The film will be shown on KCBD Channel 11, Lubbock, on Tuesday, June 27 at 9:30 p.m., and on KSEL, Channel 28, Lubbock, on Wednesday, June 28, at 9:30 p.m. County Farm Bureaus in the viewing area of the stations are purchasing the time for the showings.

The film, produced by the American Farm Bureau Federation, is built around interviews with some of the grape vineyard workers in the Delano, California, area who were forced to join the farm workers union led by Cesar Chavez without the privilege of secret ballot elections to determine which union, if any, they wanted to represent them.

The tactic used by the Chavez forces was the secondary boycott which effectively closed markets for grapes. Unable to sell their produce, the growers had no alternative but to sign their workers over to the Chavez organization. The secondary boycott is outlawed for industrial unions, Mr. Moore pointed out. Farm Bureau is backing legislation to guarantee workers secret ballot elections and to outlaw the secondary boycott, prevent strikes at harvest time, and create an Agriculture Labor Relations Board.

This action led to the Chavez forces launching an all-out campaign recently to discredit Farm Bureau, Mr. Moore said. He added that Farm Bureau would not be intimidated and is continuing to support legislation that would benefit the grower and worker alike.

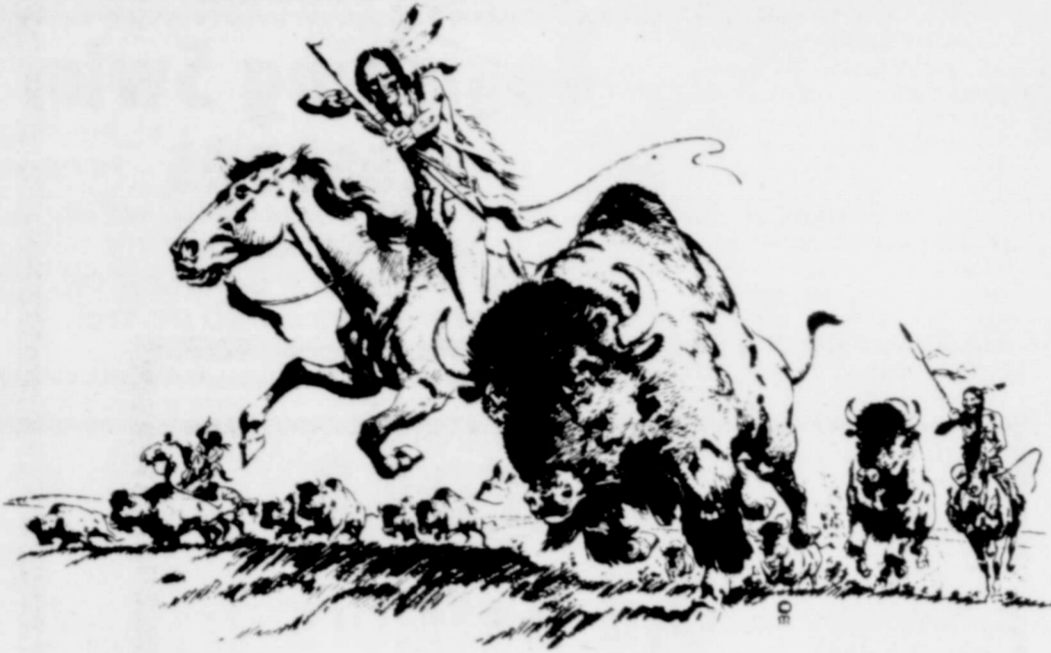

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS ...



A "red alert" is being sounded throughout the state as screwworms continue to assault livestock and other animals. Lynn County has recorded 2 cases to date, and it's vital that all animals be inspected closely and regularly so that infestations can be pinpointed and treated with steril flies.

Weather conditions were favorable for heavy screwworm buildups last winter in Northern Mexico as well as in parts of the Southwest. Some infestations were also spread by transporting infested livestock last fall, and the insect pest spent the mild winter in new quarters. This spring overall conditions were "ripe" for a massive screwworm invasion.

More than 5,000 cases have been confirmed in Texas this spring the earliest and heaviest outbreak in the history of the Screwworm Eradication Program.

Although sterile fly production at the Mission Lab is running at its peak--200 million a week--treatment with these flies is not enough to stop the destructive, flesh-eating livestock pest.

All livestock producers and owners of other animals (dogs, cats) should follow certain precautions:

1. Carry out all approved preventive practices to help eliminate screwworms.
2. Inspect animals regularly and carefully and treat all wounds whether they are wormy or not.
3. Delay all surgery until cool weather this fall. Shearing, docking, castrating and dehorning only provide additional wounds for worm infestation. Studies show that almost 90 percent of all worm samples come from calf navels and man-made wounds.
4. Spray animals with an approved product before shipping them. This is a preventive measure against spreading the infestation.

5. Be cautious of livestock shipments coming from infested areas. If buying such animals, be sure to check them thoroughly for wormy wounds.

6. Care should be taken not to move infested livestock across state lines. Infestation resulting from this practice may bring about a quarantine and the regular movement of livestock.

7. As soon as a wound is found, send a sample to the Screwworm Laboratory, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. If the case is positive, sterile flies will be dropped as soon as possible to further protect animals in the area.

Everyone must cooperate in the screwworm eradication program is to be effective. This means farmers, trainers, pet owners, auctioneers and others who work with or own animals.

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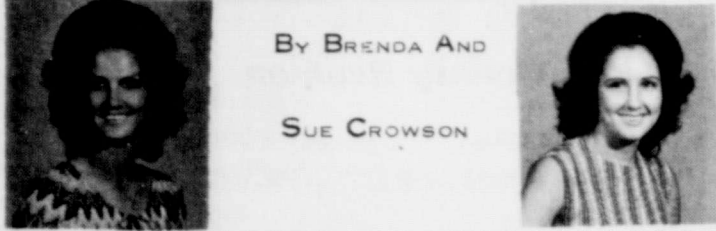

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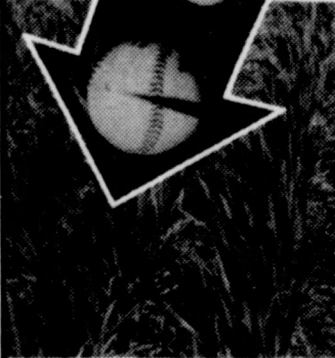

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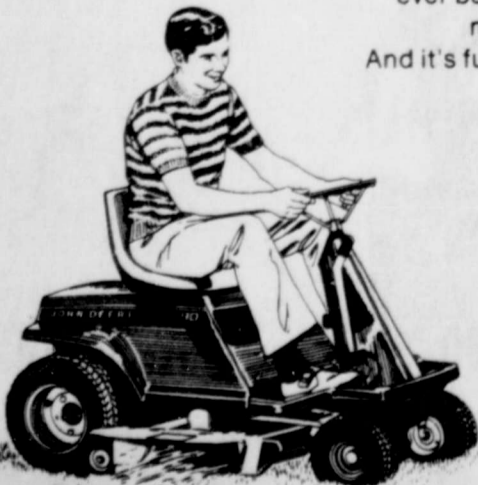
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Texas Pythian Sisters Diamond Jubilee Held

LINDA HUFFAKER SAYS ...



Home sweet home is where accidents happen. And the kitchen is a potential accident area.

To make the kitchen hazard-free, follow the guidelines to safety. Turn pot handles away from the edge of the range to prevent snagging on clothing. But be careful not to put the handle over another burner or an exposed pilot light.

Put out a fire in the broiler or oven by pouring baking soda or salt over the grease. And keep a fire extinguisher handy.

Never pick up broken china or glassware with fingers. Use dustpan and brush or dampened paper to sweep up any jagged pieces and sharp bits.

Sharp knives should be kept in a rack where children can't reach them. Store them so you can easily grasp their handles.

When using a knife, always work on a board, and cut away

from yourself. Unplug an appliance that is not in use. Always dry hands before using or you're risking the chance of an electrical shock. And when buying an appliance, check for the UL label.

Never poke a knife or fork into the toaster. Unplug the toaster then remove the troublesome slice of bread. Keep cabinet door and drawers closed to prevent bumps and bruises, and use a sturdy step stool or ladder instead of a wobbly chair to reach high shelves.

Prevent unnecessary falls by wiping clean spilled food, liquids and grease immediately, and by using nonskid wax on the floor.

Don't lean mops and brooms against a wall where they can slide, causing an accident. Store cleaning compounds in a locked cupboard or another place inaccessible to children.

Never store them near food it-

ems. Double-check the refrigerator door. If it's not tightly closed, a curious child could crawl inside. **RECIPE OF THE WEEK:** Cooks Corner Frozen Strawberry Squares
1/2 cup butter
1 cup sifted flour
1/4 cup packed brown sugar
1/2 cup chopped almonds
1 10-ounce package frozen strawberries, thawed
2 egg whites
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
Dash Salt
1 cup heavy cream, whipped. Combine butter, flour and

brown sugar; mix evenly into 9 x 13 in. pan. Bake at 300 degrees for 30 minutes. Combine butter, flour and brown sugar; mix until crumbly. Stir in almonds. Press mixture into 9 x 13 in. pan. Bake at 300 degrees for 20 minutes. Cool and crumble. Sprinkle crumbs evenly in pan; pressing 4 tablespoons. In a mixer bowl combine strawberries, egg whites, sugar, lemon juice and salt. Whip at a high speed for 15 seconds or until stiff. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon over crumbs in pan; top with reserved crumbs. Freeze until firm.

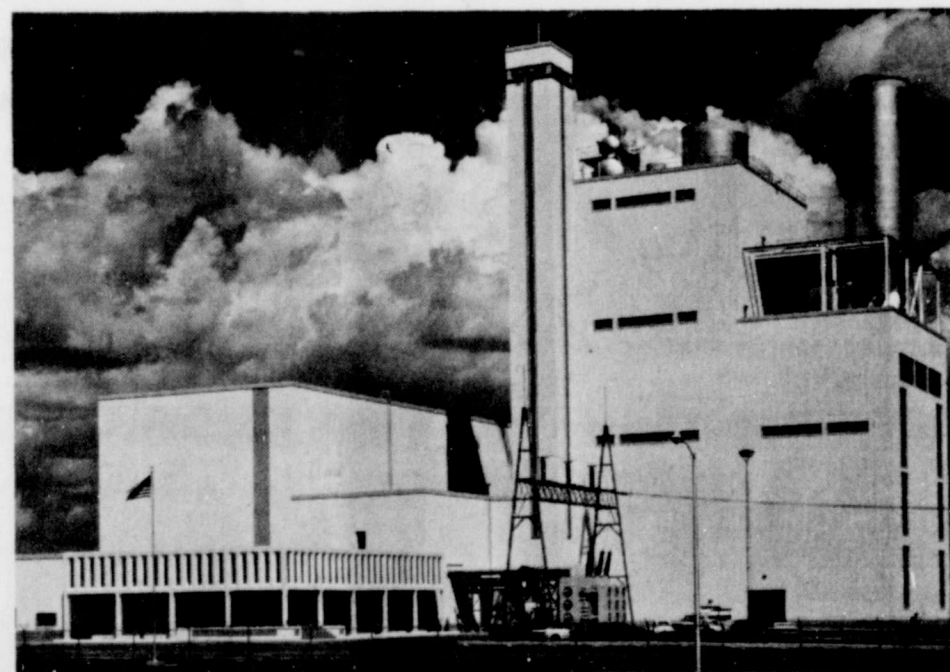

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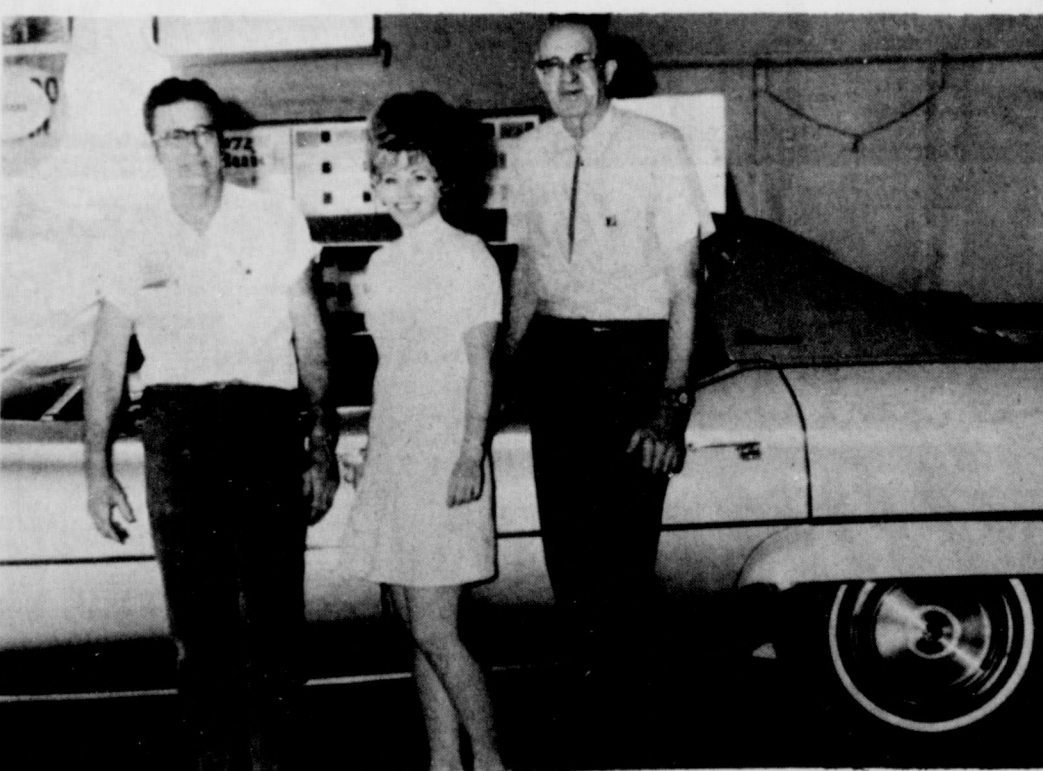

But, as a whole, crop observers say, prospects at this time for a good crop are excellent.

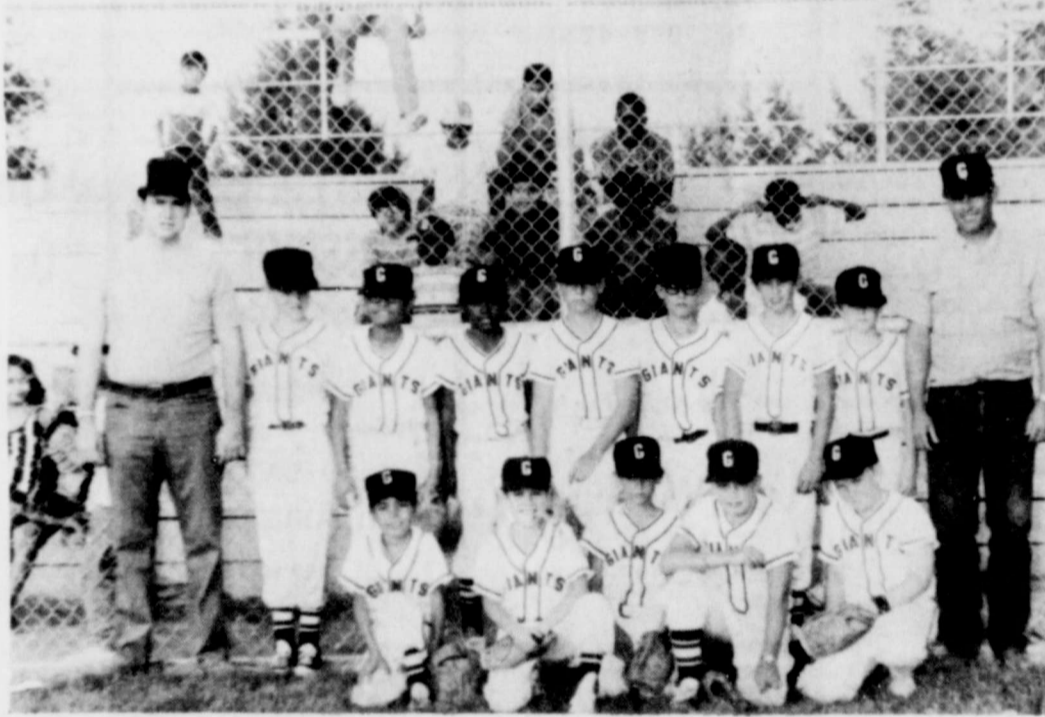
