Local Farmers Now Cashing Farm Set-Aside Payments

Approximately 85 farmers in Lynn County are scheduled to receive farm set-aside program payments totaling \$621,178.80 during the first week of July, according to Tommy Lawson, County Executive Director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

By the end of the month, the total will be about 5 million dollars to 650 farmers.

Nationwide, approximately 750,000 cotton, feed grain and wheat producers were mailed a total of \$850 million in expedited preliminary payments in time for the checks to arrive in producers' hands on July 1.

Payments under the set-aside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities. These payments help to offset the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-producing production and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Payments to producers are limited to \$55,000 per person for each of three crops -- feed, grain, wheat and cotton -- under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Nationally total payments are expected to be about \$3.7 billion. Total 1972 farm set-aside program payments in Lynn County are expected to be about \$11 million.

Feed grain producers in the nation ultimately will receive about \$1.9 billion, cotton producers about \$825 million, and wheat producers about \$1 billion. Preliminary payments to wheat producers are limited by law to 75 percent of final payments. Final wheat certificate payments will be made after December 1. Feed grain and cotton farmers may or may not get a final payment, depending on market conditions.

The expedited farm program payments are made possible by streamlined procedures inaugurated in 1970 by ASCS. The action enabled farmers to receive the entire payment due them in the 1970 and 1971 programs six to eight weeks earlier than ever before.

These early payments help many producers reduce their need for long-term credit and cut the amount of interest paid. The flow of cash at this time will again be of major significance to rural communities and the U. S. agricultural economy, USDA officials said.

Retiring workers are advised to get in touch with the Social Security Administration two or three months before retirement and thus avoid a delay in the payment of benefits. Everyone should apply for Medicare two or three months before age 65 to have the health insurance protection at the earliest possible time.

Each applicant must furnish some proof of this age and an earnings statement showing the amount he made last year. A self-employed person should furnish a copy of his latest income tax return.

Proclamation

PROCLAMATION BY THE County Judge of Lynn County TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME: I, V. F. Jones, County Judge of Lynn County, do hereby declare the week of July 25-31, 1972 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Lynn County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the unparalleled technological advances in agriculture have given the farmers and ranchers of our county the ability to produce an abundance of food and fiber, adding to their economic well-being and comforts of life; and WHEREAS, unfortunately, however, the implements of modern technology have also increased the risk of agricultural accidents or mishaps on public roads, in homes, or in recreational activities; and WHEREAS, our great State of Texas, through farm and ranch accidents continues to read "An Unwelcome Harvest" of over 200 farm deaths and thousands of painful disabling injuries each year; and WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed National Farm Safety Week and the Governor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4-H Clubs, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Lynn County Farm Bureau with the theme, "PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT - Your Defense Against Injury"; and WHEREAS, experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective equipment such as safety glasses or goggles, hard hats and bump caps, ear muffs and plugs for lengthy exposure to excessive noise, filter and cartridge respirators for work in heavy dust and chemicals, protective clothing and safety shoes with metal toe

RECIPE OF THE WEEK: SURPRISE SALAD
2 3-ounce packages Jello (1 lime and lemon)
2 cups hot water
1 pound cottage cheese
1 cup mayonnaise
1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple
1 cup evaporated milk
4 ounce walnut pieces (or more if you wish)
1 tablespoon horseradish
Mix Jello with hot water and let cook while you mix the remainder of the ingredients together in listed order. Add this to Jello mixture and chill until firm in a 9" by 13" loaf pan or party mold.

NOTE: The surprising ingredient is the horseradish. It is essential to meld all the flavors.
Serves 10 or 12, but keeps well for a few days.

The July 1 estimate of standing cotton acreage on the High Plains, made by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange, shows 2,602,000 acres of cotton in

the 25 PCG counties surrounding Lubbock. This compares with 2,499,700 planted acres and 2,324,400 harvested acres in 1971.

While the estimate is called the "July 1 estimate," according to Joe D. Unfred of New Home, chairman of the PCG Estimates Committee, calculations were not made until July 5, and acreage lost to hail prior to that time was taken into consideration.

Jimmy Cochran of Lubbock is chairman of the LCE committee, and the two groups in effect function as one. Information for the joint committee's reports is drawn from Extension Service personnel, officials of the Agri-

cultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, ginners, farmers and other sources. Acreage and production estimates will be issued following the first of each month, August through December.

Discussion in the committee meeting July 5 indicated that from 100,000 to 150,000 acres of cotton was planted on the Plains and lost to adverse weather too late for replanting. This would place total planted acres in the 25 counties at around 2.7 or 2.75 million acres, up eight to ten percent over 1971 plantings.

Normal "abandonment" of cotton from planting to harvest on the Plains runs about 7 percent on the average, and this level of abandonment in 1972 would leave around 2,530,000 acres for harvest. Abandonment in 1971 figured 7.1 percent.

Acres allotted to farmers in the High Plains area for payment purposes under the Federal cotton program in 1972 totaled only 1,685,531. Thus the current estimate indicates farmers this year overplanted allotments by about 1,040,000 acres, or 62 percent. Estimated standing acres are 154 percent of 1972 allotments.

Judge Proclaims Farm Safety Week

County Judge V. F. Jones proclaimed July 25-31, 1972 as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Lynn County, at the request of Howard Moore, Lynn County Farm Bureau President. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

In his proclamation, Judge Jones said "experience has shown that caution, common sense, skill and protective equipment can counter many hazards and keep accidents and injuries to a minimum.

Emphasizing the importance of protective equipment, Farm Bureau President Moore, said "the agricultural worker may have need for more types of personal protective equipment than the average construction worker."

Farming is an occupation that involves a number of diversified jobs ranging from construction to machinery repair, and the types of protective equipment a farm worker might need run from such commonly used items as work gloves to considerably more complex respiratory equipment.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm and ranch residents in Texas averaged over 250 per year during the decade of the sixties.

Reviewing the 1971 Texas Accidental Deaths in Rural Areas Report - which shows a total of 203 deaths, President Moore pointed out that the breakdown is as follows:

fire, explosion and burns - 35; drownings - 29; firearms - 25; machinery - 26; tractors - 22; falls - 22; animals - 17; electric current - 9; suffocation and asphyxiation - 9; poisoning - 4; hanging - 1 and lightning - 1.

"If this 'Unwelcome Harvest' of accidental deaths in rural Texas is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year," Mr. Moore concluded.

gely dependent on weather. Generally speaking, crop conditions over the area are now described as "good" to "excellent." But there are weak spots. Hockley County in particular has been plagued by hail, wind and excessive rains this Spring and a big percentage of the crop there will be late. Martin, Howard, Mildand and parts of other "dryland counties" failed to get planting moisture early in the season and most of the cotton there was planted after June 5. Overall, it is estimated that about 28 percent of the Plains crop is June 5 or later cotton.

Still, moisture conditions are the best seen in years, and a bumper crop, area wide, is a definite possibility.

An areawide yield equal to the 433 pounds per acre averaged from 1962 through 1971 assuming 2,540,000 acres harvested, would bring in 2,283,000 bales. The 1967 through 1971 average of 294 pounds per acre would produce 2,076,000 bales, and production somewhere in this range from 2 to 2.3 million

bales is probably the most likely.

On the extremes, a per-acre yield of only 264 pounds as was recorded in 1971 would turn out less than 1.4 million bales. But should the area equal the 513 pounds per acre achieved in 1965, baleage could zoom to over 2,700,000 topping the all-time record of 2,433,900 bales gathered in 1961.

The harvested acres for 1971, 1972 allotted acres and the joint PCG - LCE estimate of standing acres this year for Lynn County are: harvested acres 1971 - 189,900; allotted acres 1972 - 131,274; estimated standing acres July 1, 1972 - 223,000.

Hog Cholera In Area

Hog cholera, once thought eliminated from the High Plains of Texas, has again gained a foothold -- this time in the South Plains counties of Dawson, Terry and Mitchell. These three counties are now under state and federal quarantine, and there is a possibility that a block of South Plains counties may be put under quarantine. "This will depend on how widespread this

outbreak is," says Dr. Glenn R. Hollis, area swine specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

There have been four confirmed cases in Dawson County involving 705 head, four confirmed cases in Mitchell County involving 150 head and one confirmed case in Terry County involving 12 head. All animals involved have been destroyed and either buried or rendered under government supervision.

The specialist reminds producers that susceptible hogs get cholera by direct contact with infected hogs or via contaminated premises, vehicles, stockyards, and barns. Other means of transmission are contaminated boots, clothing and garbage. One of the reservoirs of the virus is the infected hog. This animal is in effect, a virus "factory".

Hollis relates that state and federal animal health officials feel that the outbreak on the South Plains may have originated from what is known as the "pregnant sow syndrome". This is where a sow is a carrier of the virus, shows no symptoms of the disease, but transmits it to her pigs upon birth or other swine. The sow can become a carrier by having been exposed to other contaminated animals or premises.

Sick hogs should be inspected by a veterinarian or agricultural animal health official emphasizes the specialist. Producers cannot collect indemnities on animals that die from hog cholera unless the animals have previously been inspected.
