Airman First Class Phillip M. Ascher son of Rev. and Mrs. George Ascher of Wilson, Tex., is a member of a Strategic Air Command (SAC) unit that received an Air Force Association (AFA) Citation of Honor last week during the organization's 25th annual convention in Washington.

The AFA, a national civilian organization dedicated to the support of air power for peaceful purposes, yearly recognizes outstanding Air Force individuals and units.

Airman Ascher is a missile launch training device repairman with the 4315th Combat Crew Training Squadron at Vandenberg AFB, Calif., which earned the award for significant improvement of intercontinental ballistic missile operational readiness training.

An AFA spokesman said one of the key factors in the unit's selection was the move of the missile launch officers course from Chanute AFB, Ill. to Vandenberg. The move and the subsequent consolidation of training activities resulted in a net savings of approximately \$776,725.

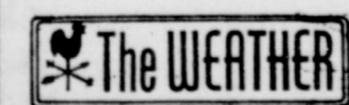

## Maurice Small Longtime Citizen Dies In Tahoka

J. M. (Maurice) Small, longtime citizen of Lynn County, born in the T-Bar Community on April 26, 1906, died here September 30 in the Lynn County Hospital of an apparent heart attack. Maurice was 66 years old.

Services were held Monday in the First United Methodist Church of Tahoka. The Rev. Ken Clark, pastor of Lubbock's St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, and the Rev. Hugh Daniel, pastor of First United Methodist Church officiated.

Burial was in the Tahoka Cemetery under the direction of White Funeral Home.

Maurice Small, born in the T-Bar Community in Lynn County was a graduate of Tahoka High School, attended Schriener Institute and as a young man, played in dance bands in several areas of Texas. Maurice also had a varied career with Higginbotham-Barlett several years in area towns, farmed several years, and was school district secretary. He formerly was active in the local Methodist Church and later joined the Episcopal Church in Lubbock.

Mr. Small at the time of his death held various positions. He was the Executive Director of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, City Judge, a Rotarian, a great Texas Tech booster and a leader in the Texas Tech Red Raider Club in Tahoka. Attending the funeral were members of the Texas Tech Athletic Department, Athletic Director, J.T. King, Polk Robinson, Gerald Myers, Leete Jackson. ## Nominations Open For ASC Elections

Lynn County farmers are encouraged to nominate candidates for Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) community committee members, reports Tommy Lawson, County ASCS Executive Director. Petitions, to be signed by a minimum of three qualified voters, must be filed by October 27 at the Lynn County ASCS Office, 1705 Lockwood, Tahoka, Texas.

"We are hopeful a slate of at least six candidates will be nominated by farmer petitions, including representatives of the minority groups in Lynn County," said Lawson. ASCS programs are non-

discriminatory and administered without regard to race, color, creed, sex or national origin.

Eligible farmers may sign as many nominating petitions as they wish. No special petition form is required, but the petition must include a statement that the nominee is willing to serve if elected. Most persons eligible to participate in ASCS programs are eligible to serve as ASC committee. This includes producers, share-croppers, tenants, and minors who supervise an entire farm operation.

Because Texas recognizes community property rights, spouses of eligible voters may also serve as ASC community committeemen.

Nominees must have farming interests within the ASC community, be qualified ASC voters and not have reached their 70th birthday by the date they take office. Further details on nominations for ASC community committee men may be obtained from the County ASCS Office, 1705 Lockwood, Tahoka, Texas; phone No. 998-4848.

**Farm Electric Course To Be Held In Wilson**

A farm electrification short course on electric motors for adult farmers will be held Oct. 9-12 under the sponsorship of the Wilson High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Gary Gardner, superintendent and Bob Lee, teacher of vocational agriculture.  
 The short course is being sponsored by the vocational agriculture department of Wilson High School.  
 Bob Jaska, Farm Electrification specialist with the vo-ag division of the Texas Education Agency and department of Agriculture Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.  
 Mr. Jaska holds a Master's degree in Agricultural Engineering. Since 1947 he has been prominent in research work in Farm Electrification in the Agricultural Engineering Department. His research and field work carried him over the entire state so that he is very familiar with all types of electrical problems on the farm. He joined the Agricultural Education Specialist program in 1958 as Farm Electrification Specialist and has served as Coordinator of the entire program since 1962.  
 Mr. Jaska states that the short course can be adjusted to interests and wishes of the farmers enrolled, but he expects to cover subjects like safety, how to choose proper wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to select, protect, maintain, and ground electric motors, how to reverse and change motors from 120V to 240V operation, and how to calculate the cost operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.  
 Short courses in Farm Electrification as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

**Bond Sales 41% Of 1972 Goal**

United States Savings Bond sales in Lynn County during the month of August totaled \$7,410, according to County Bond Chairman F. B. Hegl. Sales for the eight-month period were \$53,135 for 41 per cent of the 1972 goal of \$130,000.  
 Texas sales during the month amounted to \$17,819, 733, while the January-August sales totaled \$42,833,527 for 72 per cent of the 1972 goal of \$197.5 Mil.  
 Over the nation, Series E and H Bond sales amounting to \$562 Mil. were purchased during August - a 8.5 per cent increase over August 1971 sales of \$516 Mil. Year-to-date sales totaled \$1,302 Mil. 14.4 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$228 Mil. were reported for the first eight months of 1972, 30 per cent above the \$174 Mil. exchanged in 1971.

Experimenting with new recipes is fun. But when it comes to canning, use only tested and approved methods. Questionable canning methods may result in food poisoning, the agent explains. Some fruits and tomatoes may be processed in a boiling water bath, all vegetables and low-acid foods require pressure canning. Processing foods in ovens is very dangerous. Besides the temperature not getting high enough to prevent spoilage, there is a possibility of an explosion. Don't rely on aspirin to prevent spoilage or to give satisfactory product. Adequate heat treatment is the only safe procedure to use when canning.

For specific canning practices known to produce safe product, recommended sources are cook books or a copy of "Home Canning Fruits and Vegetables" from the county Extension Agent's office. The following recipe is designed for persons on a low sugar diet. It is very good even if it is low calorie.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK:**  
Lime Delight  
1 can unsweetened pears  
2 Tablespoons water  
1 package lime diet gelatin  
2 3 ounce packages cream cheese  
1 cup diet lime soft drink  
pecans

Add water to pears and blend in a blender until smooth. Heat pears and add diet gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add cream cheese and diet drink. Stir until all ingredients are well blended. Chill until firm. Top with pecans if desired. Serves 6.

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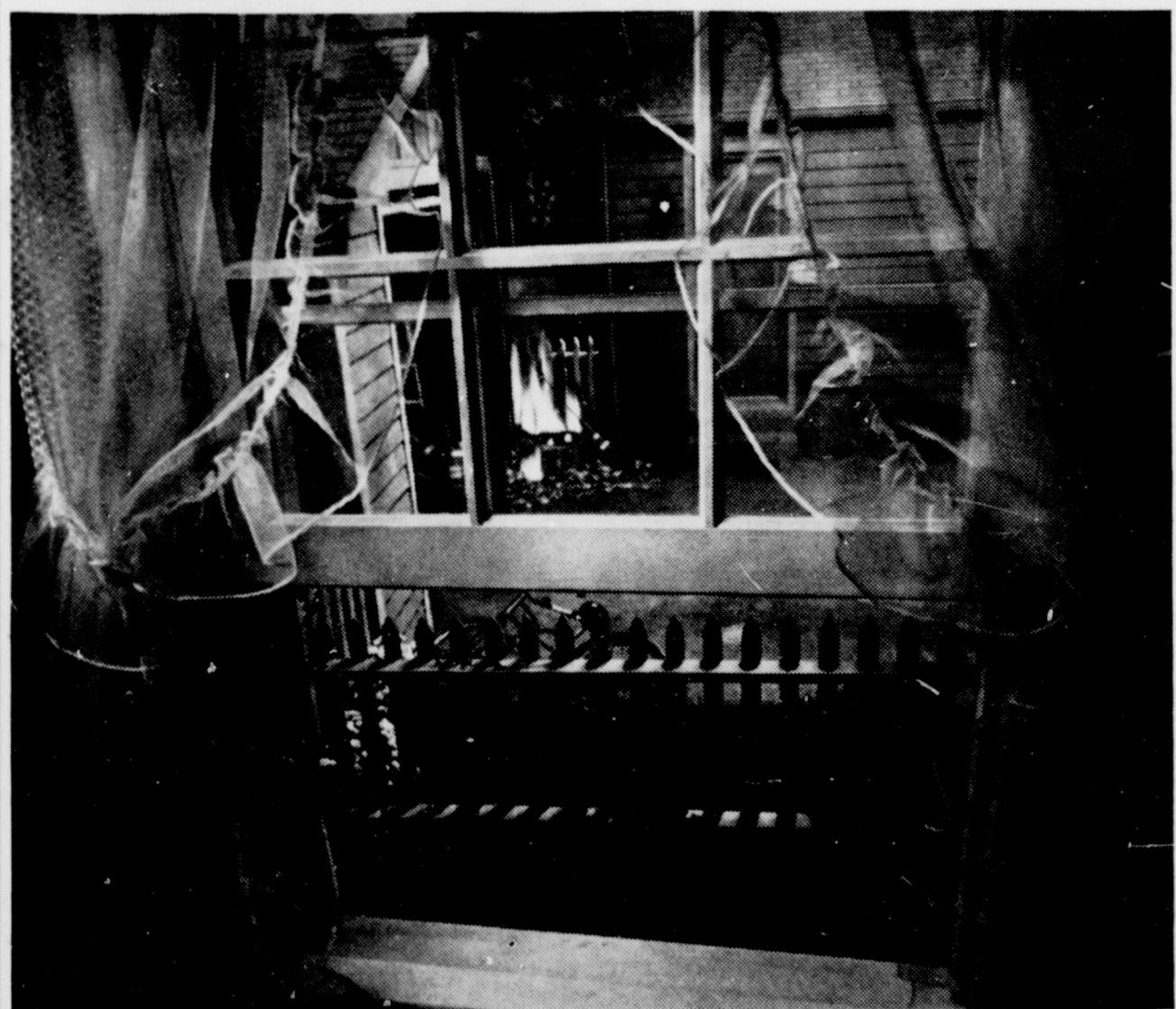
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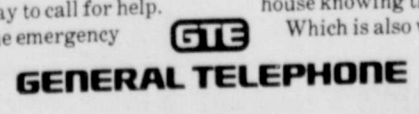

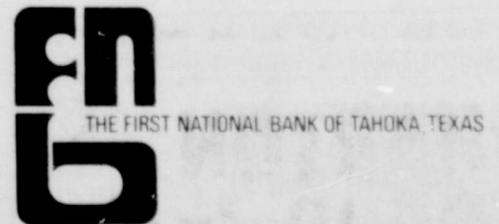

Delaying cotton harvest after the crop is ready can result in lower grades shorter staple and possible a loss in yield. In early maturing fields harvest - aid chemicals can be used to prepare a crop for timely harvest. But used improperly these chemicals can lower profits by reducing lint quality and yield. The most common and costly error is applying harvest-aid chemicals before the cotton crops mature. Some times there is a mistaken notion that these chemicals somehow speed up maturity of the crop. But just the opposite is true all fiber development stops when plant growth stops or leaves are removed. Only time and warm, sunny weather will promote maturity of cotton. So harvest-aid chemicals should be used only on mature cotton. The chemicals are only what their name implies -- a chemical to aid in the harvesting of a naturally matured crop.

There are two types of harvest-aid chemicals -- defoliant and desiccants. True defoliants are mild materials that act slow and cause leaves to drop off. In contrast desiccants kill the entire plant rapidly -- so rapidly that most leaves "freeze" or stick on the stalk. Before a defoliant is applied 65 per cent or more

of the bolls should be open. And before applying a desiccant 80 percent or more of the bolls should be open. At those stages the remaining unopened bolls are mature enough to open later. But if chemicals are sprayed too soon, smaller or immature bolls may never open and yields drop off sharply. This year, as in most years on the South Plains, we need all the time before frost to mature our crop. So as long as bolls are closed and are still producing fiber, increasing moisture, and yield the maturity process should not be stopped.

Materials such as sodium chlorate (Shed - a - leaf) and organic phosphates (DEF, Folex) are defoliants. Paraquat and arsenic acid are considered desiccants. Large, tall, rank cotton that is well open can be effectively treated for earlier harvest. Producers have obtained good results by first dropping the leaves with a defoliant, then following with a desiccant. This double treatment is more expensive, too expensive except for high yielding crops, but better grades, less boll rot and better maturity of lower bolls may result. Arsenic acid usually gives better control of regrowth and less cost than paraquat. However the acid is not as effective as para-

quat with cool temperatures, below 70 degrees F. Proper application is essential for good results regardless of chemical used. Coverage is highly important. On cotton less than two feet tall use three cone type noz-

zles per row and five nozzles per row if cotton is taller than two feet. Before application check the weather reports. If a cold front is moving in hold off application until weather settles or

some prolonged warm period follows application. Poor results usually occur if harvest-aid chemicals are applied during or just ahead of a cool, wet spell. Normally desiccated plants will be ready for stripping 8 to 10 days after chemical application. Before starting the stripper, check the crop. Leaves and stems should break and crumple eas-

ily. Remember high lint grades and seed quality come from cotton that is harvested when it is dry. Cotton should be harvested at approximately 8 per cent moisture. Have an extra cup of coffee in the morning and let the crop dry just a little more before starting after a dew.

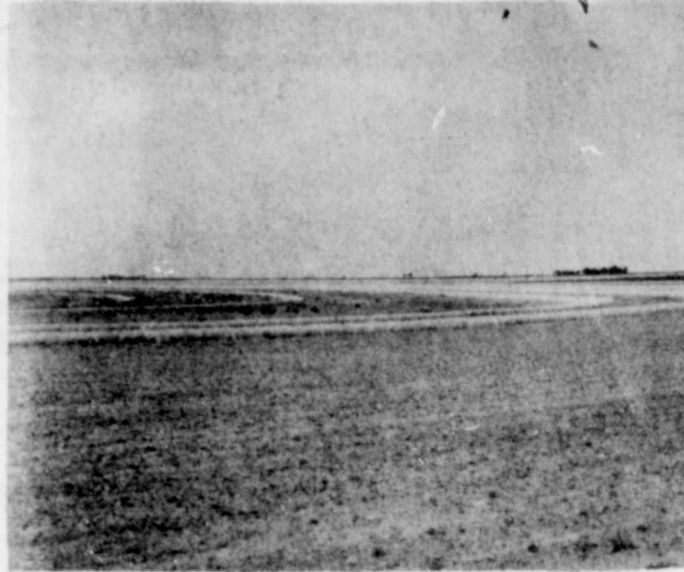
Every producer is well aware of the high costs in producing a crop from start to finish. So when we get a crop to this point, let's don't cut our profits short by starting too early with an application of harvest-aid chemicals or apply these chemicals when they are not necessary.

Keep in mind the price for low quality fiber this year is not very encouraging. We can ill-afford to pay out hard earned money for an operation that can reduce lint yields and microaire if mismanaged.

A good rule of thumb is: if the crop is not ready for a freeze it is not ready for harvest-aid chemicals. After all Mother Nature's method of killing cotton is still the cheapest method. Further information can be obtained by visiting your county Extension agent and requesting L - 145 cotton defoliation guide.

WINTER ANNUALS PLANTED ON TERRACES TO HELP STOP EROSION FROM WIND AND WATER.

With the nearing of the cotton harvest, we are also reminded that the blowing season is coming upon us. Many farmers over the district have already completed such practices as seeding blanks and turnrows to wheat, rye, or some other winter annuals.

Recently, this problem of blowing dust and sand fighting was discussed by Allen Sheppard of the Soil Conservation Service and Cecil Weid who farms near Wilson. Mr. Weid currently has a Great Plains Conservation Program contract on part of his land. Mr. Weid installed a system of parallel terraces with cost-share provided under this contract. He has been seeding his terraces each fall to winter annuals. He stated that the problem of sand fighting is considerably less on his terraced land than on his irrigated land. The height of the terraces with the small grains provides protection and the small grains on the terraces and turnrows stops blowing in "trigger areas" around the field. Since parallel terraces are at regular intervals, this is actually a form of strip-cropping. This practice should

be considered by anyone interested in reducing costs by cutting down the number of trips over a field with a sandfighter.

Federal cost-share for installing parallel terraces, diversions, and waterways is available either through the Great Plains Conservation Program or the Rural Environmental Assistance Program. For more information, contact the Soil Conservation Service or the ASCS in Tahoka.

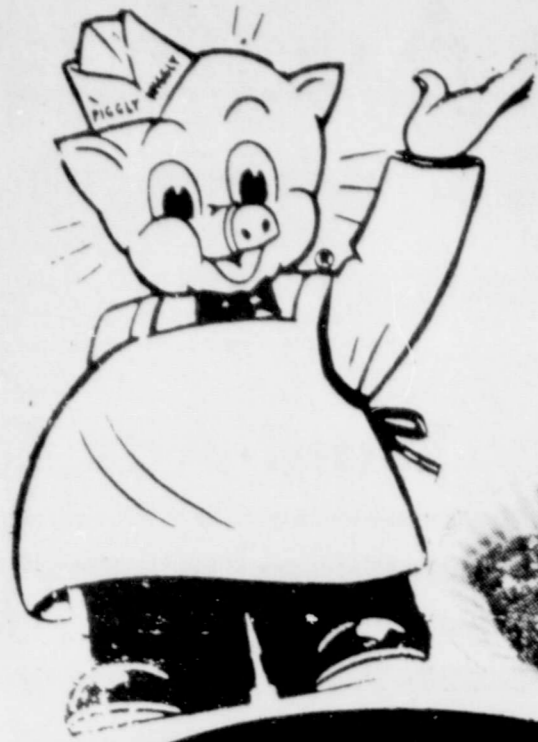

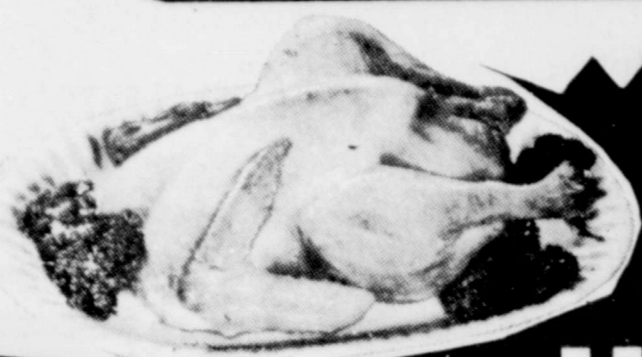
