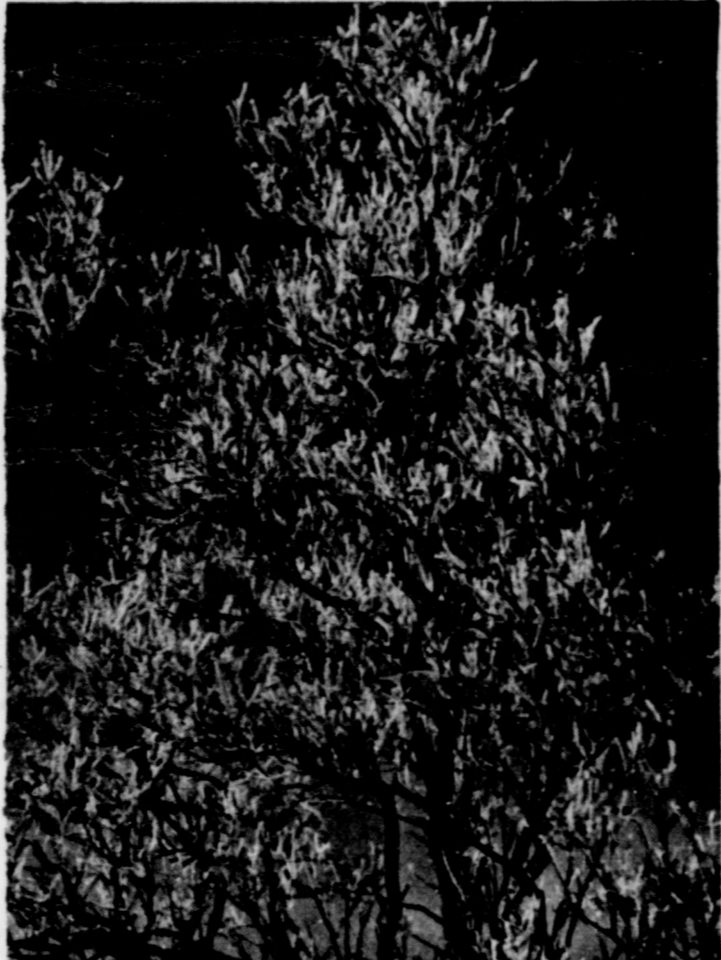

Board Approves Two New Courses For Tahoka High

In their regular monthly meeting Thursday evening, January 11, members of the Tahoka School Board approved two new courses for offering in the High School beginning with the 1973-74 school year. The new courses are Clerical Practice for 12th grade students and Hair Design for 11th and 12th grade students.

The Clerical Practice Course will be offered rather than shorthand which has generated little interest during the past several years. In the new course students will gain an operating knowledge of adding and calculating machines, duplicating and reproducing machines, posting machines and transcribing machines. They will also learn telephone manners, business behavior, letter writing, filing, business oriented spelling and vocabulary plus several other competencies required of work in the business field. Miss Barbara Kitchens, High School Business Teacher, will teach the new course.

Opportunities will be made available for the 11th and 12th grade students to study hair design at an institute in Lubbock. This new program will be provided, on a contract basis, by state funds. Interested students may schedule academic classes in the mornings and participate in the hair design institute afternoons. Expenses of tuition and required materials will be furnished, however, transportation to and from Lubbock will be the responsibility of the student and his parents. The program provides for a two year course for students in the 11th grade, making it possible for them to take the state examination for hair designers upon graduation from high school. Students who begin the course as 12th graders may receive the benefit of one year's tuition and materials and an opportunity to finish the course for \$175.00. In other business the Board

approved employment for Miss Suzanne Jacoby, a December graduate of Angelo State University, who will replace Mrs. Janice Clark in the High School. Mrs. Clark, who has taught Spanish and English in the high school for the past 1 1/2 years had submitted her resignation prior to the new semester. Also approved for employment was James Weaver, a December graduate of Texas Tech, who will replace Mrs. Carole Sanders. Mrs. Sanders taught math in

grades seven and eight.

The Board extended the delinquent tax contract, with Jack McCreary of Austin, for two more years.

Members in attendance were: Joe Brooks, President; James Brookshire, Vice President; Othell Meeks, Secretary; Maurice Huffaker, Kenneth Turner and Robert Warren. Mrs. Peggy Elliott, Director of Business Affairs, Superintendent Harold Reynolds and High School Principal Cliff Gardner also attended.

Library Receives Set Of Masterplots

The eighteen volume set of Masterplots edited by Frank Magill has recently been placed in the library at Tahoka High School as a gift from the seniors of the class of 1972 and from the local PTA.

The seniors of 1972 left the sum of \$24.30 to the library to be used in purchasing books. When the Tahoka PTA disbanded, the sum of \$40.59 was left in their treasury. This money was also given to the library.

The combined sums were used to purchase the Masterplots which is a digest of world literature. The eighteen volumes comprise a collection of digests and essay reviews covering 1,810 titles from world literature which were newly written expressly for this set.

Designed primarily for references, the format of Masterplots is styled and standardized to afford maximum information in the quickest time. Each of the digests is preceded by carefully checked, concisely-stated reference data which furnish at a glance the type of work, authorship, type of plot, locale, and first publication date. Next is the critique, a short, incisive, critical analysis of the original book.

Finally there is the plot-summary, given as a well rounded story, or the essay-reviews, which sometimes include quotations from the original works.

Nine hundred ninety six authors from Homer and Hesiod to the present day are presented in the set of books.

Weather Halts All Harvest

Extremely unfavorable weather completely halted all cotton harvest activities on the South Plains and cotton sample receipts declined to a few hundred daily at the four U.S.D.A. cotton classing offices, according to W.K. Palmer, in charge of the U.S.D.A. Classing Office in Lubbock.

All cotton received at the area classing offices was from bales of cotton harvested before the snow.

Samples from only 36,300 bales were tested and classed at the South Plains U.S.D.A. cotton classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland during the week ending Friday, January 12th. This brought the total classed for the season to 1,288,000 bales.

Estimates indicate that approximately three-fourths of this season's crop is now out of the fields.

Grades were about the same as the previous week. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) was the predominant grade at Lubbock during the week, making up nineteen percent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling (41) made up 16 percent, Low Middling (51) 18 percent and Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) 10 percent.

Micronaire readings were steady from the previous week. However, only fifteen percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock during the week had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 through 4.9, 11 percent "miked" 3.3 through 3.4, 33 percent was 3.0 through 3.2, 30 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 11 percent was 2.6 and below.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported brisk trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$2.50 to \$5.00 per bale higher on all cotton, but demand continued strongest for better grade, premium micronaire cotton. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for low grade, low micronaire cotton up to \$50.00 per bale over the loan for high grade, premium micronaire cotton.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling (41) staple 32-26.55 cents per pound, Strict Low Middling (41) staple 33-28.65, Low Middling (51) staple 32-25.30, Low Middling (51) staple 33-26.35, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 32-25.65 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 33-26.30. Cottonseed prices were steady and farmers received \$45 to \$58 per ton for their cottonseed at gins.

Basketball In Full Swing At Tahoka

The Tahoka Bulldog basketball team is vastly improved and is going to be a contender for the district crown if they continue to develop.

Friday night, January 12th, the home standing Bulldogs were red hot as they defeated Fresh 80-61. Three players were in double figures as Phil McClendon had 17 points, Larry Reynolds had 15 points, and Gary McCord had 11 points. Coach Robinson was able to use his reserves with every player in uniform seeing plenty of action. This was truly a team victory and was the best round ball effort by a Bulldog unit in many years.

On Saturday night, January 13th the Denver City Mustangs came to town to play a game that had been postponed from January 9th because of bad weather. The score was tied at the end of regulation play and again with about 10 seconds left in overtime, but Denver City sank a basket to win 68-66. Four Bulldogs were in double figures as Phil McClendon had 19 points, Jimmy Bailey had 14 points, John Thomas had 13 points and Larry Reynolds had 10 points. Fresh 91-67.

Fresh 91-67. The Bulldogs defeated the local girls varsity team on January 12th by a score of 57-52 with June Raindl scoring 31 points and Donna Draper getting 11 points. The Bulldog lassies played fine ball for the last three quarters, but a 2 point output in the first quarter was too much to overcome. As a prelude to the January 12th action the Tahoka boys

Junior Varsity defeated Fresh Junior Varsity by the score of 45-29. Gene Baxter led Tahoka with 12 points and Walt Hagood had 10 points.

The boys Junior Varsity was beaten on Saturday, January 13 by Denver City. The score was 66-55 as Tahoka had three players in double figures. Gene Baxter led Tahoka with 19 points while Walt Hagood scored 12 points, and Johnny Brandon followed with 10 points.

On Monday night, January 15 the Tahoka Freshman boys, 8th grade boys and 7th grade boys played the Cooper boys in Tahoka, while girls teams in the same grades went to Cooper to play their girls. Results of these six games saw the Freshman boys win 34-33, while the Freshman girls lost 44-19. David Glenn led the Freshman boys with 14 points while Janie Acosta led the Freshman girls with 11 points. The 8th grade boys won 57-26, but the 8th grade girls lost 24-17. Danny Moore with 20 points and Ernest Bailey with 18 points led the boys while Beverly Harvick led the girls with 6 points. The 7th grade girls won 24-14 with Maurine Reynolds and Carmen Garcia netting 6 points each. The 7th grade boys were led by Randy Meeks with 8 points but were defeated 27-19.

Income Tax Booklets On Sale At Post Office

A booklet priced at 75 cents per copy that gives information on how to fill out Federal Tax returns is on sale at the Tahoka Post Office, according to Postmaster Charles Townes.

"Your Federal Income Tax" was written by the Internal Revenue Service and contains many examples to illustrate how the tax law applies to actual situations. A special feature of the booklet is the sample, filled-in return, Form 1040, keyed to pages where explanations can be found for each entry on the return.

"By selling this booklet at postal facilities in the Tahoka area, we are offering a convenient service to our customers," Postmaster Townes
