## County Seniors To Graduate

### Track Team

Tahoka's most successful track team since Max Minor, now a colonel in the Army at the Pentagon single-handedly won second place for Tahoka behind Highland Park, Dallas, back in 1960, was recounted before the Rotary Club Thursday by Coach Ray Kindley.

Coach Findlay told how his track team had won first in every invitational meet entered this year, took first in District with 186 points, second in Regional, and then scored 20 points in the State meet.

Phil McClendon won first place in the State 880 race, Clifford Laws took second in the shot put and fifth, and Tommy Marton finished seventh in the 100 yard dash. These three, along with two other Tahoka athletes, have signed for college scholarships. McClendon has signed for a track scholarship with Baylor University, Laws has been signed to a football scholarship by West Texas State University and Tommy Martin has signed a track scholarship with Lubbock Christian College. In addition Jim and John Thomas has been granted scholarships by McMurray College on account of their scholastic achievements in Tahoka High.

President Binie White announced the night of June 28 has been set for the annual Rotary officer installation meeting when Bill Porter of Lubbock will be the installing officer.

### Rains Came, Crop Prospects Are Good

Rains Saturday, Sunday and Monday totaled from one-third inch up to more than an inch over Lynn county with most of the farming area receiving .7 or more. Tahoka, which received a shower Friday, had an official total of .9 inch.

The rains fell so slow that every drop soaked in to the soil on farm land.

Most farmers say the rain was sufficient to meet the fine deep-soil moisture which fell earlier this year, bringing the total so far for the first four and a half months to a record 7:34 inches.

Although some farmers had cotton planted and a few, especially on irrigated lands, had cotton up, local observers say others will now rush to put seed in the ground. With the good underground season, most seem to believe prospects are good for getting the crop underway.

If the moisture is sufficient to get crops up to a stand and will hold until the roots get down deep, prospects at this point are good for another fine crop this fall with some timely rains this summer.

### 73-74 Kindergarten Program In Schools

Texas Education Agency regulations permit additional children to attend kindergarten in Tahoka Independent School District next year. Children, regardless of race or family income are eligible if they were born on or before February 1, 1968. In other words, these children must be 5 years and 7 months of age on or before September 1, 1973.

In addition to this new group others who may attend kindergarten are:

1. Any child who will be years old on or before September 1, 1973, who has difficulty in understanding and speaking the English language.

2. Any child who will be 5 years old on or before September 1, 1973, whose parent's income is not more than \$3,000.00 per year.

Texas law requires immunizations for all children entering the public schools. The required vaccines and number of doses are as follows:

1. Polio - 3 doses, the last since age 4.

2. Diphtheria-Tetanus - 1 dose, or if the child has had the illness, at any age.

3. Rubella (measles) - 1 dose, or if the child has had the illness at any age.

4. Rubella (3-day or German Measles) - 1 dose, at any age.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal health records

by physicians or public health clinics is required.

A birth certificate, baptismal paper, or some proof of birthdate is also required.

Parents should bring both the personal health record and proof of birthdate to school when they come to enroll a child in Kindergarten.

If parents have further questions they may call Mr. Floyd Tubbs, Principal, South Elementary School.

## Cotton Ginnings Reach 234,463

### BIGGEST CROP IN HISTORY

Lynn County cotton ginnings reach an all time high this season reaching 234,463 bales. In a survey run this week ginneries said there were very few bales of cotton left to gin but were still a few.

The highest bale count ever reached before this season was in 1949 when Lynn County cotton farmers ginned 186,696 bales. In 1965 farmers ginned 185,619 bales. Moisture last season fell just right to make the best cotton crop ever. The gins report that most are finished or only have a few bales to gin.

O'Donnell Farmers Co-op reported ginning the most bales with a record for them of 33,200 bales.

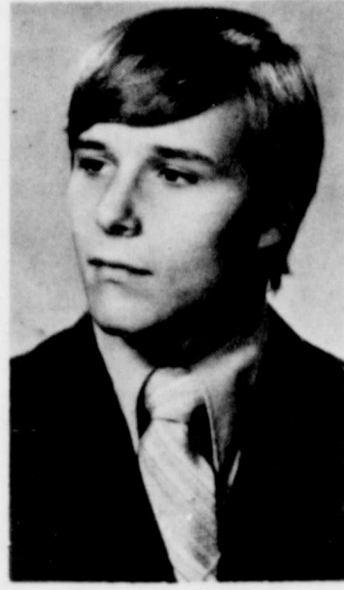


BECKY FRANKLIN

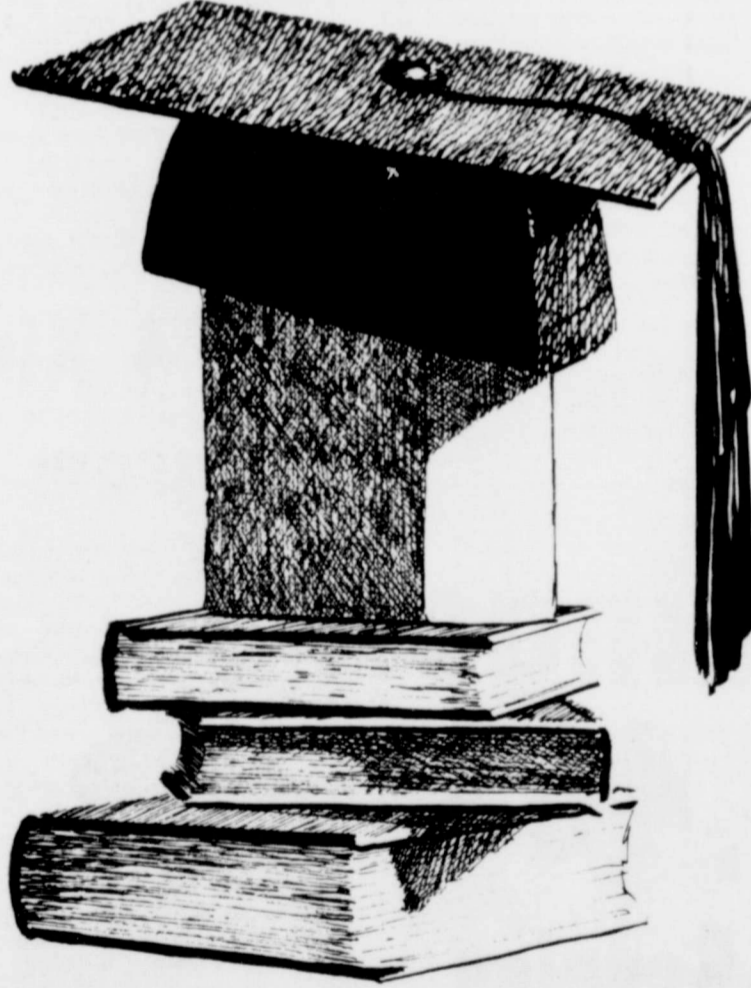

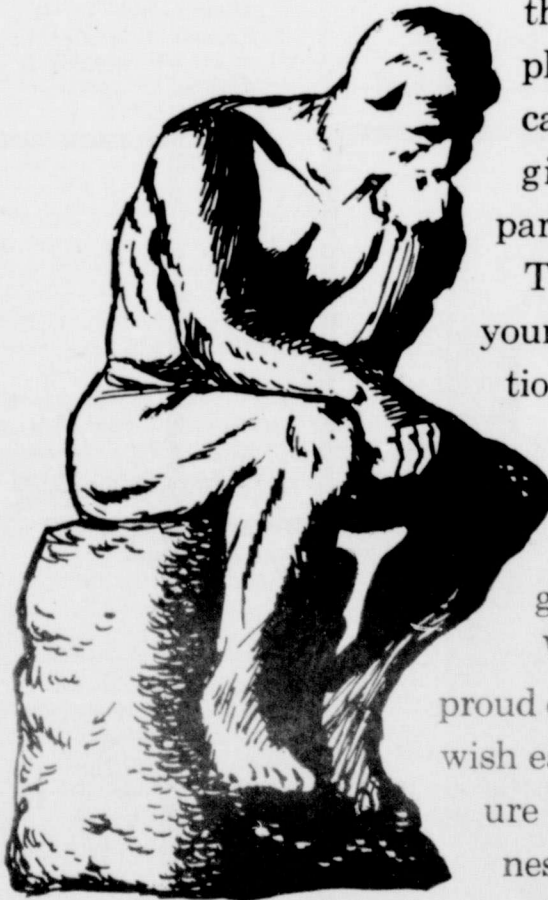

## Two Persons Killed In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of April according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1973 shows a total of 18 accidents resulting in two persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety, Region 5, for April, 1973 shows a total of 544 accidents resulting in 24 persons injured as compared to April, 1972 with 445

accidents resulting in 44 persons killed and 232 persons injured. This was 99 more accidents, 20 more fatalities and 51 more injuries in 1973 at the same period of time.

The veteran officer reminds us that the accident rate has increased about 20 percent in the 60 counties of Region 5. We have more than seven million licensed drivers on Texas Highways. Summer vacation time is approaching and more people will be using the roads.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1973 occurred in the following counties: Crosby, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn Sherman, two each, and Clay, Floyd, Garza, Gray, Hartley, Oldham, Palo Pinto, Parker, Potter, Randall, Terry, Wichita, Wise, and Wheeler, one each.



In February of this year, Tahoka Drug began its 51st year under the same family management.

Lum Haney was born on a farm in Bell County, one of seven brothers and two sisters. His father opened a furniture store and undertaking business in Roscoe where he moved his family in 1904. When in High School Lum worked part time in a grocery store. He attended ACC in 1920 and taught school one year in Roscoe. Lum had an interest in a drug store in Roscoe when he bought the store in Tahoka and moved here in February 1923. It was here he met Stella Stone, then teaching in Tahoka schools, and they were married in February 1927. Lum was a public spirited citizen. He served on the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, on the School Board, and on the City Council. He was Chairman of the Board of Stewards of the Methodist Church and was a charter member of the Tahoka Rotary Club. For a number of years he was the Volunteer Parole Officer for Lynn County. Lum died in March, 1968. Tahoka Drug is now operated by his daughter and son-in-law, Bitsie and Johnny Wells.

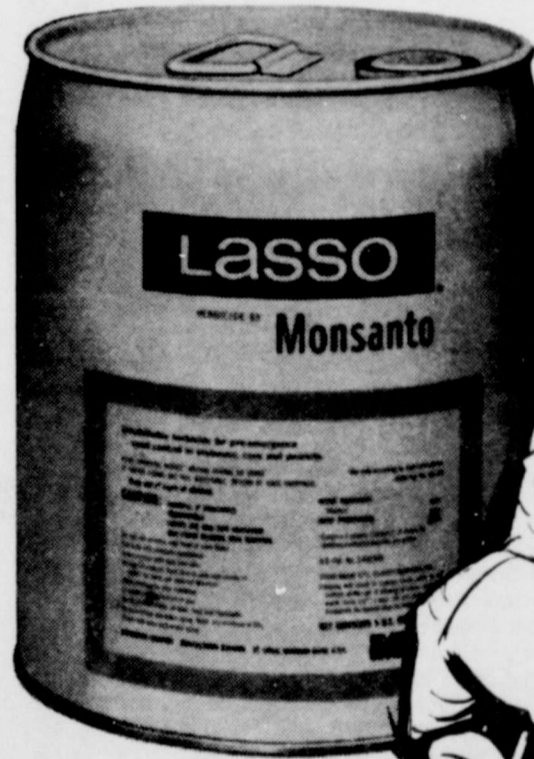

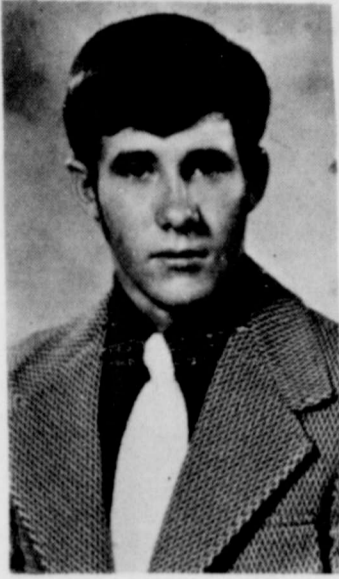

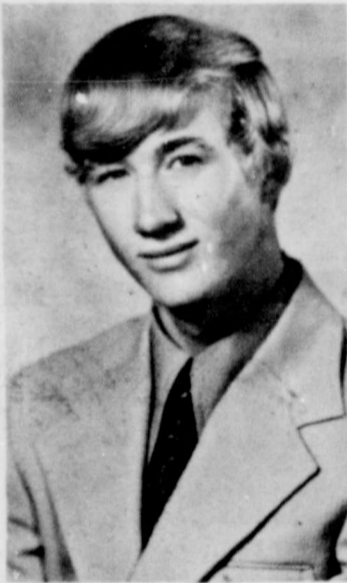

## Farm Bureau News

Financing Public Education H. B. 946 by Hale, a complete revision of the Foundation School program provisions of the Texas Education Code, was reported out favorably by the House Education Committee this week and may be brought to the House floor for debate as early as May 11. Contrary to previously announced intentions, the Chairman of the Education Committee did not lay out the Governor's proposal for financing public education as a substitute for H. B. 946. Instead the Chair announced that the Governor's proposal would be introduced in the House and Senate as a separate bill. In theory, the House of Representatives will pass H. B. 946 as approved by the Education Committee and send it over to the Senate so the Senate will have both bills before it for consideration. In theory, this would save valuable time and time is quickly running out for this session. In actuality, this is known as passing the buck so the Senate will be blamed for whatever happens.

One thing has become abundantly clear. Because H. B. 946 relies primarily on the full market value of real property to determine the ability of a county to pay into the Foundation School Program, enactment of this bill must result eventually in increased property taxes -- and the increases could be substantial, especially in rural counties. For this reason, we believe the House of Representatives should delay debate on H. B. 946 until the House Education Committee has had an opportunity to hold public hearings on the Governor's proposal. This way, the House could reach an informed decision on which proposal to pass. Such hearings would also give the public an insight into differences between H. B. 946 and the Governor's bill.

# 1973-74 Hunting And Fishing Laws Set

Texas sportsmen can start making plans for the upcoming hunting and fishing seasons.

In public session April 26, the Parks and Wildlife Commission approved seasons, bag limits and means and methods of taking game birds, animals and fish for 1973 and 74.

The commission approved a statewide Nov. 17, 1973 - Jan. 1, 1974, deer season with the following exceptions:

--Open season is Nov. 17 - Nov. 30 in Franklin, Lamar, Red River, Smith and Titus Counties. In Rusk, Harrison and Panola Counties, the season is Nov. 17 - Dec. 16.

--In the Panhandle Regulatory Districts, open season for mule and

white-tailed deer is Nov. 17 - Dec. 2.

--In the Trans-Pecos Regulatory Districts, mule and white-tailed deer season is Nov. 24 - Dec. 9.

--In Terrell and Pecor Counties, there shall be an open season on whitetails Nov. 24 - Dec. 16.

Turkey seasons were set to run concurrently with deer seasons.

Quail seasons vary according to regulatory districts:

Trans-Pecos, Nov. 1973 - Jan. regulatory districts:

--Tracu-Pecos, Nov. 1973 - Jan. 31, 1974.

--South Central, Nov. 1, 1973 Jan. 31, 1974.

-- Permian Basin, Panhandle, Edwards Plateau, Trinity-Brazos, Southeast and Oak Prairie, Nov.

17, 1973 - Feb. 15, 1974.

-- Possum Kingdom and Northeast, Dec. 1, 1973 - Feb. 15, 1974.

Quail bag and possession limits are 12 and 36 respectively.

Generally, the javelina season is concurrent with the Nov. 17, 1973 - 1974, deer season.

There is no open season on javelina in the Northeast, Panhandle, Southeast and Trinity - Brazos Regulatory Districts except Fannin County in the Northeast District.

Javelina season in the Permian Basin and Trans - Pecos District is Sept. 1, 1973 - Jan. 31, 1974; there is no closed season in other regulatory districts.

This year's pheasant season is Dec. 8 - 23 in the Panhandle District.

Antelope season is by permit only in the Panhandle District Sept. 29 - Oct. 7 in the Permian Basin, Trans-Pecos and Possum Kingdom Districts.

Regulations governing the taking of freshwater fish remain unchanged with the exception of those pertaining to Lake Cypress Spring in Franklin County.

Walleye perch season will be open in Lake Cypress Springs on June 1, 1973.

The daily bag limit at Lake Cy-

press springs on blue, channel and flathead catfish is 15 in the aggregate and possession limit of 30 in the aggregate.

Blundell Reservoir in Titus County is closed to all fishing until further notice by the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Seines and nets are prohibited in Bedias Creek between Madison and Walker Counties, except minnow seines not more than 20 feet long which can be used only for taking minnows, sunfish and rough fish.

In public fresh waters of the Southeast District, no more than 100 hooks may be used altogether in any of the following combinations: pole and line, rod and reel artificial and natural baits, non-metallic trotlines, juglines and throw lines. Trotlines are limited to no more than 50 hooks each.

The proclamations take effect on or after May 11 in all regulatory districts.

The Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education met Thursday evening, May 10, and approved the employment of Mr. and Mrs. Phil McAnelly for the 1973-74 school year. McAnelly has been a member of the coaching staff this year, however, he will assume full-time classroom teaching responsibilities in the field of science for the new school year. Mrs. McAnelly will receive her degree from Texas at the end of the first session. Her teaching fields are speech and english.

The Board accepted the resignation of Miss Kathleen Doherty, effective with the ending of the current year. Miss Doherty has taught kindergarten in the South Elementary School this year.

The time warrants are to be issued by the First National Bank of Tahoka, and they will carry an interest rate of 5 1/2 percent with payment to be made from current revenues over a five year period.

Approval was given for the Tahoka Schools' participation in the Region XVII Education Service Center's Media Services during the 1973-74 school year. The Media Services include films, Tapes, transparencies, etc., and they are provided by member schools furnishing \$1.00 per student with these funds being matched by State funding.

The Board also gave its approval for paint and body repairs on two buses plus the installation of a 2 HP submergible pump for a water well recently drilled just west of the Vocational Ag. building.

A representative of American

Family Life Assurance Company met with the Board and requested permission to write Cancer insurance policies for the school staff, with premiums being paid by payroll deduction. Approval was given to this request.

Atwell, Maurice Huffaker, Dayton Parker and Kenneth Turner. Also in attendance were Mrs. Peggy Elliott and Superintendent Harold Reynolds.

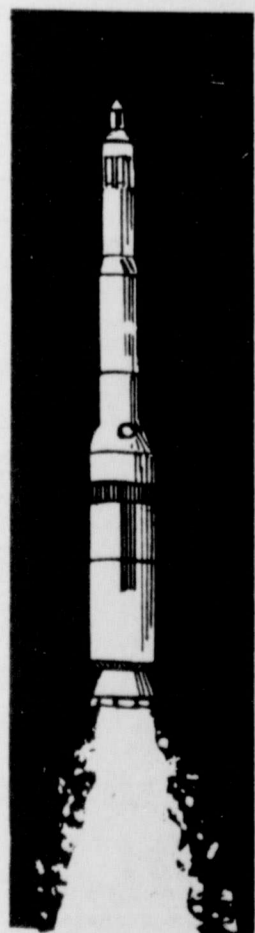
The Reader's Digest Association is presenting these awards in senior high schools throughout the United States to the highest honor student of the graduating class.

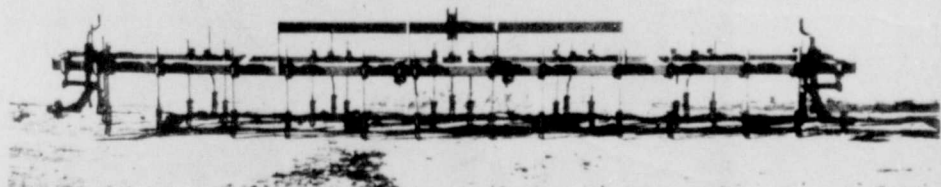

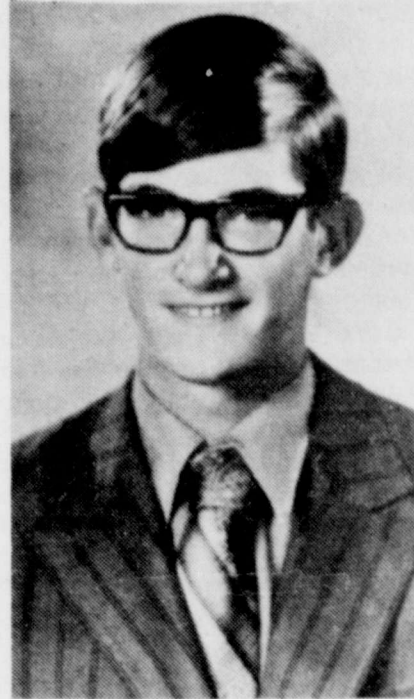


**CLIFFORD LAWS**

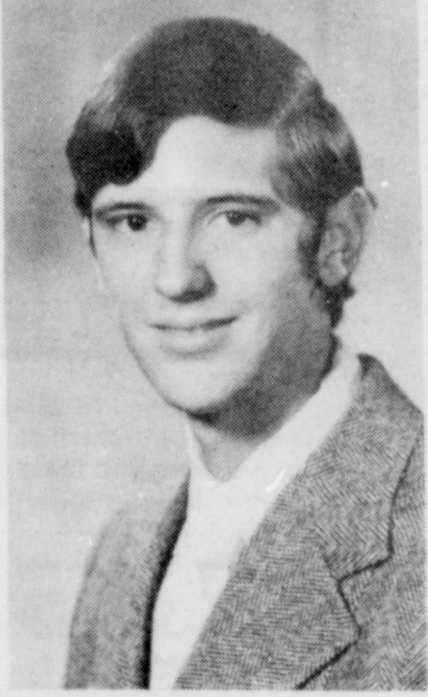

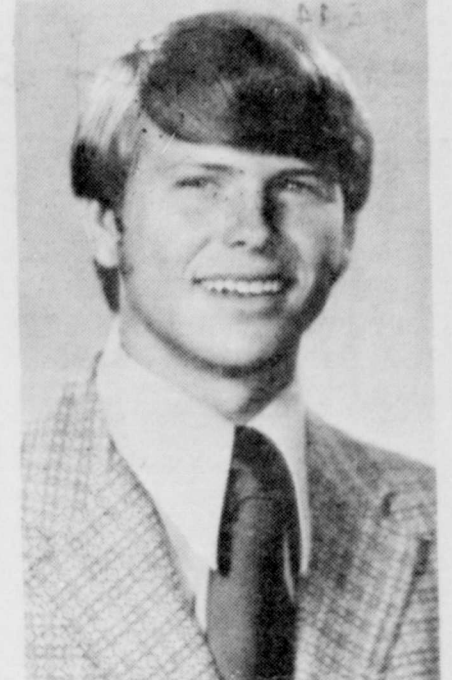

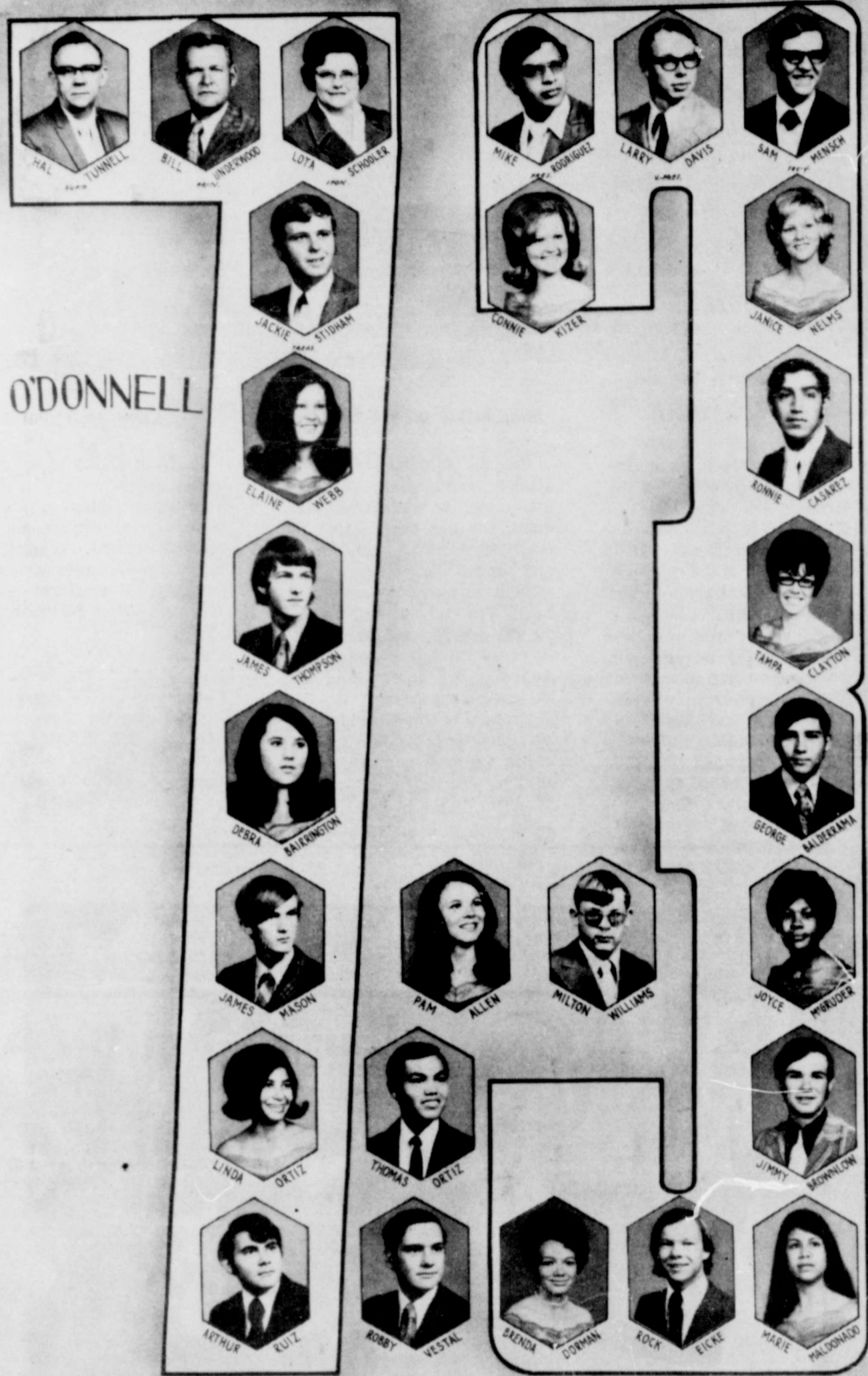

**Robbed At Work**

Hired as floor manager in a department store, Phyllis asked where she should leave her new fur coat during working hours. Since there were no more lockers available, she was told to leave the coat in a corridor closet.

A few days later, the coat was stolen from the closet. The store denied any responsibility for the loss, but Phyllis—unconvinced—took the matter to court.

At the hearing, the company said it had never guaranteed its employees against theft. But it seems the closet had neither lock nor guard. Finding a lack of reasonable care, the court said the company would have to make good the loss.



It is common for employees to deposit clothing and other personal belongings in company facilities while at work.

As a rule, the company must provide reasonable safekeeping if—as in Phyllis' case—the employee has been instructed to put the article in a particular place. This creates a "bailment" relationship, with a legal duty imposed on the company as the "bailee."

But the duty is not unlimited. In another case, also involving a stolen coat, the clothes closet was within a locked enclosure to which only employees had access. A court ruled that the company had made a reasonable effort to prevent theft, hence could not be held liable.

Of course, some responsibility rests upon the employee as well. A toolmaker who owned his own tools often left them overnight on his work bench. Right above the bench was a broken skylight. One night a thief climbed in through the skylight and decamped with the tools.

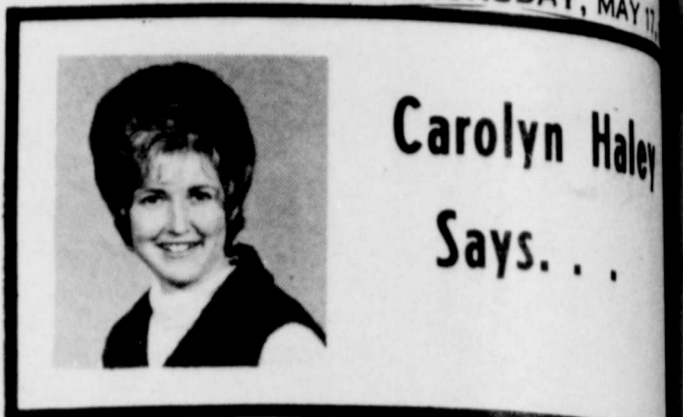
Could the company be blamed for the loss because of the broken skylight? A court said no, because the toolmaker himself was aware of the danger. By leaving his tools in such an accessible place, said the judge, he had "assumed the risk" of their being stolen.

**Carolyn Haley**  
**Says...**

Fusible webs and films simplify home sewing—by eliminating several time-consuming tasks, explains Mrs. Carolyn Haley, Asst. County Extension Agent.

These new products utilize heat steam and pressure to bond two fabrics together—that is, any fabric that can be steam pressed.

Although they're not suitable for seams, fusibles simplify addition of trims and appliques—and eliminate basting, hemming and some hand sewing.

In addition, they aid in matching designs and prevent raveling. Also, fabric and belting material are joined invisibly through use of web or film.

Several factors contribute to the products' popularity—they make in-

visible bonds yet don't alter fabric flexibility. At the same time, they reduce bulk.

Fusibles are sold by the yard, in precut sheets or as tapes of various width—and come in several weights.

For best results, test product effectiveness on a fabric scrap—before using it in the garment. Webs work better on some fabrics than others.

Although bonds usually are permanent, sometimes they loosen. When this happens, simply repress the item—resealing the fabrics.

To remove, steam the area heavily and pull fabrics apart.

Don't allow hot iron and webbing to come in contact—they'll stick together. Should some webbing stick, use a mild abrasive or commercial iron cleaner to remove it. Then restore sole plates smoothness by gliding the hot iron over wax paper, the agent advised.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK:**

**CHEESE ENCILADA CASSEROLE**

- 8 oz. cheddar cheese
  - 1/2 cup chopped onion
  - 1 can cream of chicken soup
  - 1 can chopped green chilies (4 oz.)
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 can bone chicken (5 oz.)
  - 1 pkg tortilla chips (6 oz.)
- Set oven at 350 degrees F.  
 Grate cheese and set aside.  
 Chop onion. Mix onion, soup, green chilies, milk and chicken. Heat,

stirring often, until mixture to bubble. Remove from heat. Place a layer of tortilla in bottom of dish. Add half mixture, then half of grated cheese, another layer of chips, soup mixture and top with layer of cheese.

Bake 30 minutes. Garnish with parsley, cherry peppers and chips.

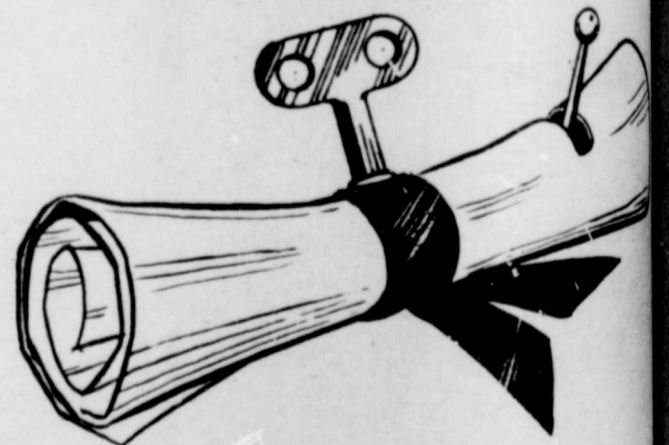

# A SHORT REPORT

BY REP. E. L. SHORT

Monday, by a vote of 97-38, a bill passed the House to reduce penalties for possession of marijuana "could let some dope pushers out of prison and back on the streets", State Rep. E. L. Short said today.

"Approximately 700 persons now serving time for possession of marijuana must be re-sentenced at high cost to the State under terms of the new bill, and many will be released."

"There is no provision in this bill that a second offender will be sent to jail on the 2nd, 3rd or even 4th offense and a person could con-

tinue to use marijuana and it would be no more penalty than habitual traffic offenders."

"It is further noted that a person in possession of 1 ounce or more would be purchasing his supply from a person that would have to be committing a felony. Our law-enforcement people tell me that their best source of information in clearing the user the drug traffic is catching the user and then him disclosing the pusher."

"If a user can get by with a simple fine, I feel he would not have any reason to reveal his source of supply."

"I did not support this bill."

**BILL GRIFFIN SAYS**



Some garden vegetables need more nitrogen than is provided by the complete fertilizer recommended for a general garden plot. Sweet corn, okra, peppers, tomatoes, squash and greens will need additional nitrogen applications. Any time after corn emerges from the soil, it should be sidedressed with six tablespoons of ammonium sulfate per 10 feet of row. This amount equals about 90 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Okra should be sidedressed after the first picking with one to two tablespoons of ammonium nitrate or three tablespoons of ammonium sulfate for every 10 feet of row. Peppers and tomatoes need a side-dressing when their first fruits are one inch in diameter. For every two feet of peppers, apply one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one-and-a-half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate. Apply the same amount around each tomato plant and repeat applications at three-week intervals during picking. For squash, apply a half to one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one and a half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate along every two feet of row. To avoid foliage burns, do not get fertilizer on wet plants while sidedressing. **Doctors Told To Expect More Insecticide Poisonings**

Doctors have been warned of a possible sharp increase in insecticide poisonings as the result of the recent ban on DDT.

The warning came in the Journal of the American Medical Association which noted that the new organophosphates to be used in place of DDT are highly toxic to humans and are easily absorbed through the skin. DDT was not.

Although the substitute insecticides are less persistent in the environment than DDT, the medical journal points out that, "Many deaths have been reported from parathion exposure, but few if any from DDT."

**Livestock May Turn Burs Into Money**

The disposal of cotton burs from gins on the High Plains of Texas, where from 1 1/2 to 2 million bales of cotton are ginned annually, was once a major problem. But, with the advent of large scale livestock feeding the burs were recognized as a valuable by-product, rather than a nuisance and disposal problem.

Cotton burs are becoming increasingly popular not only as the roughage component for feedlot animals but as a supplement for range and pasture stock. Moreover, the demand for bur feed is growing.

Realizing the potential for selling burs to the livestock industry, the Acuff Cooperative Gin, located 6 miles east of Lubbock, constructed a \$140,000 bur pelleting facility in 1970. This is believed to be the first such plant built in the Cotton Belt.

The pellets are sold for \$24 per ton at the plant, which, upon request, can have molasses or other liquid supplement incorporated into them.

Charlie Hunter, manager of the Acuff Cooperative Gin, says "We could easily sell three or four times the quantity of bur pellets we'll be able to produce this season. Trucks are on the road all the time now hauling burs from the plant at Acuff to feedlots and feed mills in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas.

"One feedyard came to recently wanting to contract 10,000 pounds of bur pellets every day for a year, but didn't have that many left to sell."

The Acuff plant guarantees burs to have 7 1/2 percent protein and the average is above that, Hunter says, with protein content of some burs running as high as 12 percent.

Cattlemen like the burs. Lubbock feedlot operator commented, "We've not used any other roughage in our ration since we started on gin trash and we plan to continue the practice."

The rapid expansion of the cattle feeding industry on the High Plains, which has developed into one of the nation's leading beef producing areas within the last decade or so, has created a shortage in roughage feeds. Although burs move into the same feed outlets as cotton seed hulls, the traditional roughage of this area, the High Plains is still classified as a roughage-deficient area.

In the past, ginners have spent large amounts of money in building incinerators for burning burs and in hauling them to the farm to be spread on the land as a conservation measure. Restrictions on the burning of burs, enforced by the Texas Air Control Board, and fears of getting noxious weed seeds or plant diseases in gin trash and contaminating clean land; and reductions in federal cost-share assistance on the applications of burs as a conservation practice, has compounded the disposal problem.

Charlie Hunter sees the pelleting of burs for livestock as a service to the feedlot industry, the solution to the bur disposal problem, and an opportunity for gins to realize additional profits.

**Greenhouse Tomatoes**

A two-session symposium on plant nutrition and soil fertility for greenhouse tomato growers will be held May 8 and 9 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service who is coordinating the event, says that the emphasis will be on fertility requirements of greenhouse tomatoes.

Roberts and Area Extension Soil Chemist, James Valentine will present subject matter for discussion and will field questions raised by growers.

"We want to have open discussions of those problems that most affect the producers," says Roberts. "We expect to cover such topics as essential mineral elements, nutrition deficiency symptoms, fertilizer application systems, and decision processes in interpreting soil tests and petiole analysis reports.

An important part of the seminar will be a tour of the soil laboratory at the Center and a complete description of the operation.

No registration is required. The meetings get underway at 1:30 P.M. for both sessions. Those interested in attending this symposium should contact Dr. Roland Roberts at the Extension search and Extension Center north of Lubbock.

# Planting Rate A Critical Decision For Cotton Prod.

producers are now facing numerous decisions regarding planting, and not the least of them is the question of rates, says an area cotton specialist here.

According to Dr. Robert B. Metzer, of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock, planting rates will vary according to row width, seed and whether producers use irrigation or dryland.

Low quality seed this year, says Metzer, "planting in many instances will be increased by 25 or more, depending on the quality of germination."

Metzer, the agronomist, says the optimum plant population for the conventional 40-inch row width is 40 to 50 plants per acre. This is equivalent to three seedlings per foot of row assuming 70 to 75 percent emergence, this would require six seeds planted per row or approximately 25 pounds of seed

per acre. It should be emphasized that to get 75 percent field emergence, a laboratory germination of 80 percent or higher is required."

For those considering narrow row cotton production, he explains, an average of three plants per foot of row is still a good rule of thumb. For 20-inch single rows or double rows on 40-inch beds, 75 to 80 thousand plants per acre is an ideal plant population.

"To obtain this population will require 32 to 35 pounds of seed (at least 80 percent germination) per acre," he advises.

"Increasing plant population much above 80 thousand puts too many plants within the drill row for the double row pattern. Likely results will be taller, barren plants, reduced boll size and delayed maturity.

"On the other hand, varieties adapted for narrow row cotton production that tend to be early maturing and compact will not have the ability to fill out skippy stands if the population is too low. Therefore, proper

plant population is more critical if these compact varieties are used in narrow row.

In fact, this type of planting offers an opportunity to avoid crowding of plants within the row. To accommodate a plant population in the 100 to 140 thousand range will require a more narrow row pattern. For example, this can be accomplished in a 10-inch row width using a planting rate of 50 pounds per acre."

Due to the adequate supply of underground moisture, many producers are considering narrow row cotton on dryland, Metzer reports. He emphasizes that successful dryland narrow row production will depend not only on proper planting rates but also on good seed placement for proper plant distribution within the row.

"This can be accomplished only with proper planting equipment," he advises. "The planting rate should be reduced from that used in irrigated narrow row production. For a 20-inch single or double row on

a 40-inch bed, a planting rate of 25 to 30 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient while 35 pounds per acre would be adequate for 10-inch row width. Producers should increase the above planting rate if the seed germinates below 80 percent."

The agronomist concludes that in addition to planting rates, producers must consider other important practices such as variety selection, weed control, irrigation, and soil fertility for profitable cotton production.

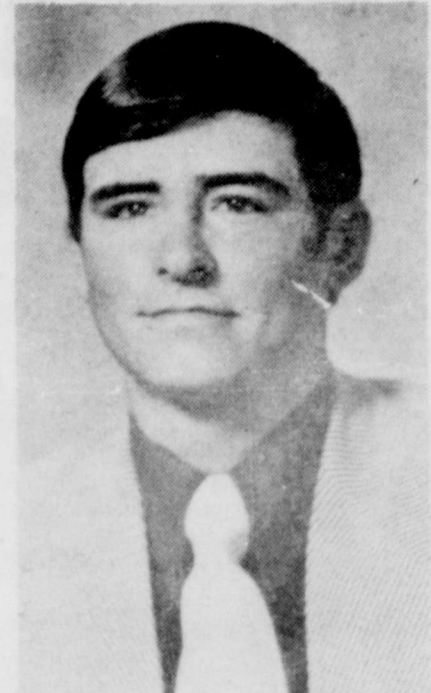

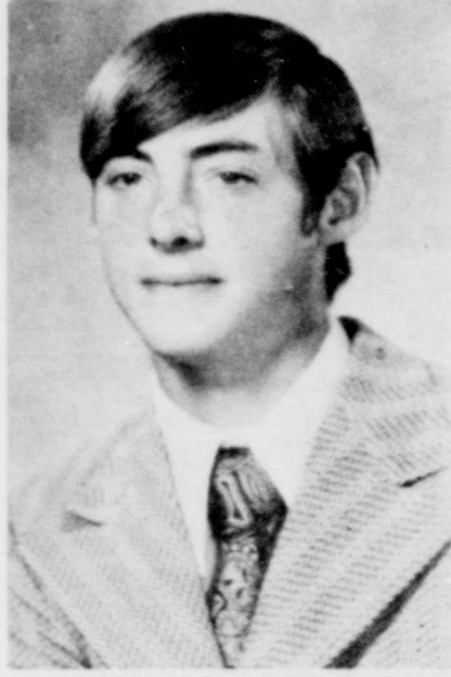


## Tahoka Senior Biographies

Taylor, a pipe fitter, was injured while working on a construction site in Odessa.

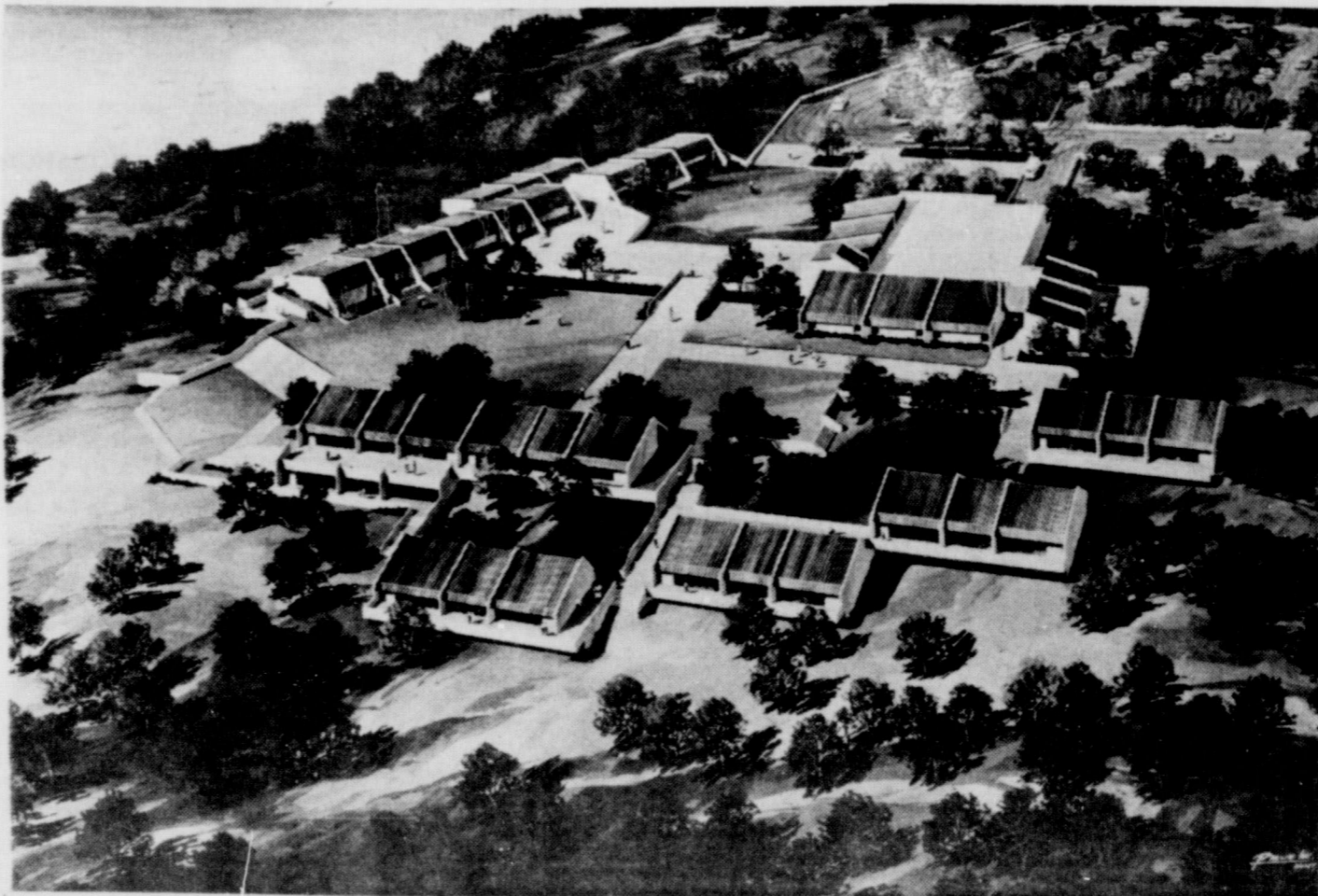

City of the City of New Home, Texas:

### SECTION 1

The regulations as herein established have been made for the purpose of promoting the health and general welfare of the city.

### SECTION 2

a. The basic water rates for residential, schools and commercial establishments shall be as follows:

First 2,000 gallons, \$3.00.  
Next 3,000 gallons, 0.60 per 1000 gallons.

Next 5,000 gallons, 0.50 per 1000 gallons.  
All over 10,000 gallons, 0.35 per 1000 gallons.

b. A tapping fee of \$10.00 will be levied for each connection.

c. In the event of a discontinuance of service for whatever reason, a charge of \$3.00 will be made to cover the cost of re-connection.

### SECTION 3

a. The basic sewer rate for residential and commercial establishments shall be \$3.00 per month.

### SECTION 4

a. The basic garbage rates shall be \$3.00 per meter per month for this service excepting for schools. Stations will be \$4.00 per month. There will be no other exceptions.

### SECTION 5

a. The basic water rates for the school system shall be as outlined in SECTION 2.

b. The basic sewer rate for the school system shall be \$3.00 per month per connection.

c. The combined water and sewer bill for the school system shall not be less than \$500.00 in any calendar year.

### SECTION 6

a. A deposit of \$10.00 shall be required of each subscriber to assure prompt payment of monthly water, sewer and garbage bills. Upon payment of the final bill the deposit shall be returned to the subscriber.

### SECTION 7

a. Monthly billings for sewer and garbage service shall be made with and as a part of the monthly water system billings, and the city shall discontinue water service to any subscriber who fails to pay the water, sewer, and garbage charge within thirty (30) days after the same is due.

b. Monthly billings are due and payable upon receipt of the bill.

### SECTION 8

The operation of the water system shall be on a metered basis only. No more than one user will be permitted on any single meter.
