Food Stamp Sales By Postal Service

Beginning next Tuesday, September 4th, food stamps will be available for purchase at the Lynn County Post Offices in Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson, and will continue to be available for Purchase Monday through Friday of each week, except on Federal holidays.

Food stamps may be purchased ONLY between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. by persons certified as being eligible by the State Department of Public Welfare. The person will receive an identification card at the time he is certified and will receive an Authorization to Purchase (ATP) card in the mail each month. Both cards must be presented at the time of food stamp purchases.

Much time will be saved in the food stamps transactions if each purchaser will present the exact amount required.



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

Are you in a pickle when it comes to making pickles? If so, read on - you may find some help.

Pickle products require heat treatment to destroy organisms that cause spoilage and to inactivate enzymes that may affect flavor, color and texture. Research indicated that processing pickles and relishes in a water bath improves color, texture and flavor and eliminates spoilage. Spoilage organisms may enter food as it is transferred from kettles to jars.

To process, pack pickle products into glass jars according to directions given in recipe. Adjust lids according to manufacturers directions. Immerse the hot jars in boiling water bath. Be sure water comes an inch or two above the jar tops; add boiling water if necessary, but do not pour directly on jars. Cover the container with close fitting lid and bring water back to boiling as quickly as possible, and continue to boil gently and steadily for the recommended time. Remove jars immediately, and set them upright several inches apart to cool.

Processing for fermented cucumbers and fresh pack dills is slightly different from the usual water bath procedures. For these, start counting processing time as soon as the jars are placed in the boiling water. This prevents a cooked flavor and loss of crispness.

The altitude around the Tahoka area is 3,000 feet above sea level; therefore 3 minutes will need to be added to processing time given in recipe. If your recipe does not indicate a processing time, call my office for information.

and peel. Cut the peeled melon into cubes or cut into balls the size of large marbles using one of the small spoon - scoops sold for the purpose.

Pack into freezer containers and cover with cold syrup made in the proportion of 1 cup sugar to 2 cups water. Leave enough headspace for expansion in freezing -- 1/2 inch for a pint container with wide-mouth opening and 1 inch for a similar quart container. Freeze at zero degrees F. or below and keep stored at zero.

You can also freeze cantaloupe and honeydew melons. Commercially frozen packages of melon balls usually include several kinds of melon for variety in color and flavor.

PAGE 9 1974 Wheat Program **Details Announced**

Texas wheat producers' allotments for 1974 will be about three times the size of their 1973 allotments, according to Tommy Lawson of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office.

Tommy said 1974 allotments will be based on the national allotment of 55.1 million acres, announced August 16 by Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz, and that individual allotment notices will be mailed to farmers in a few days.

The allotment represents the number of harvested acres of wheat, based on the estimated average yield, which would result in production equal to estimated domestic and export disappearance in the 1974-75 mar-

keting year. The allotment does not restrict the amount of wheat that can be planted.

Secretary Butz announced the 1974 wheat program shortly after the four - year Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 was signed into law, Lawson said, noting that the Secretary said the program is designed to encourage all - out production.

Tommy listed the following 1974 wheat program details:

New to the wheat program is the target price feature. If the average market price for wheat is at or above the \$2.05 per bushel target price, the producer will receive no payment. If the price average is below the target, the producer will receive the difference between the target price and the average price received by all farmers during the period from July through November 1974.

There will be no preliminary payment. Any payment due will be paid after December 1, 1974. If the five . month average price falls below the \$2.05 target, a producer would be paid on an amount of bushels determined by multiplying the farm allotment times the projected yield established for the farm.

As announced earlier, there will be no set - aside requirement for 1974 and there will be no coserving base requirements for the four . year life of the 1973 Act, Lawson said.

For 1974, producers may substitute any annual non - conserving crop or a cropland conserving crop used for having or grazing in order to preserve their wheat allotments and to make them eligible for any payments under the target price feature. Crops for which a marketing quota is in effect are, of course, excluded.

Loans will be avilable to producers on their 1974 crop wheat at a national average of \$1.37 per bushel, an increase of 12 cents over 1973 crop loans.






