Bulldogs Lose Opener To Stanton 26 To 6

Inexperience causing numerous mistakes was the name of the game for the Bulldogs at Kelley field last Friday night as they were defeated by the Stanton Buffaloes, 26-6.

The Bulldogs, even though they hustled well, almost everytime they were making a serious treat a fumble are some other mistake caused them to give the ball back to the Buffaloes.

Tahoka won the toss and received the opening kickoff and Martin ran from his own 9 to the 27 but fumbled and Stanton recovered. On the first play from scrimmage, Wingback Gordon Eiland bulled through left guard, broke into the open and went 27 yards for a touchdown. Vernon Brown kicked; score Stanton 7, Tahoka 0 with less than a minute of play.

Two plays after the Buffaloe kick-off, Tailback Jimmy Bailey broke away on a 30 yard run, but on the next play Tahoka fumbled and Stanton recovered. Bulldogs held, took over on its own 25, then Warren got away on a 31-yard keeper gallop, but on the next play the Bulldogs lost the ball for the third time in the quarter on a fumble.

Stanton move to the Tahoka 11, tried a field goal which failed on 4th down.

Tahoka couldn't move after the field goal, but Weldon Warren got off a 47 yard punt. Later in the second period the Buffaloes moved 54 yards on 5 first downs, and Eiland went the last 4 yards to score. PAT failed leaving the score at 0-13. Timmie White ran the kick off all the way back from the Tahoka 21 to the Stanton 35 (44 yards). On the next play Quarterback Weldon Warren completed a pass to end Terry McCord for 35 yards and Tahoka's only score. McCord had gotten behind the Stanton defenders, took the ball at about the 10 yard line and raced in for the score.

Stantons next drive was stopped when David Glenn intercepted a Stanton pass, but four plays later Stanton's Hernandez stole a Tahoka pass on the Tahoka 30 yard line. Stanton quarterback Bill Howard then ran for 5, hit David Standefer with a 14 yard pass, and with 11 seconds left in the first half he hit Eiland with a 11 yard scoring pass. The Stanton try for point after touchdown failed.

Halftime score was 19-6 in favor of the Buffaloes.

In the third period neither team could move consistently, Tahoka lost another fumble late in the quarter, and Stanton moved 33 yards in five plays with HB Mitchell Irvin hitting left guard 2 yards to score. Brown kicked, and that was the end of

the scoring, 26-6.

In the final period, David Glenn intercepted another Stanton pass early in the quarter, but Stanton returned the favor a few plays later after Tahoka had moved to the Stanton 12.

Regular Quarterback Steve Miller was out with a broken arm, and Weldon Warren took over the

position with only a day or two's practice. Late in the game Soph. quarterback David Glenn got some experience at the position.

Having lost 22 boys by graduation from last year's team, the '73 Bulldgos are very short on experience, but there were some bright spots in Friday's game,

and fans predicted the team will improve as the season progresses.

Like the football team, the THS band directed by David, Tucker, is on a building program, but the 50-member group looked good in its halftime show.

A shooting last Sunday night on the Piggly Wiggly No. 2 parking lot resulted in injury to two Tahoka men. Rudy Lazos and Joe Lazos were seriously injured by two shot gun blasts from the window of a vehicle about 11:00 p.m. Sept. 9.

The shooting took place after an argument occured when Tim Roderick told the men to leave two women alone that were parked on the lot.

The suspect then reportedly left and returned with a shot gun and told two bystanders to get out of the way, he reportedly then fired two shot gun blasts.

The two men are reported in satisfactory condition in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

The suspect is being held in the county jail and has been

charged with assualt with intent to murder.

value of forward contracting as a cotton marketing tool "despite its shortcomings," Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, told a beltwide meeting of industry representatives in Dallas September 10 that "no avenue to improving the utility of forward contracting should be

The subject of advanced cotton sales came in for full discussion by mills, shippers and producers



at a day-long meeting of the Producer Steering Committee of the National Cotton Council.

Expressing doubt that forward contracting alone or in conjunction with the up coming government cotton program can provide the stable supplies and prices needed in the industry, Johnson said it nevertheless could be a useful marketing device in reaching that goal.

But he said the usefulness of forward contracting "can be greatly enhanced" by a way or ways to assure both producers and buyers that contract provisions will be met regardless of price action after contracts are signed.

Johnson also made the point that the producer's with contract performance on the part of the buyer is significantly more complicated than the problem faced by merchants.

He explained that buyers know from the beginning that a producer has the ability to meet the terms of a contract. "The producer is responsible only for delivery of his individual crop. And if he doesn't he has land, equipment and other visible assets that are placed in jeopardy.

"On the other hand," Johnson continued, "a merchant may contract for thousands of bales of cotton from any number of producers, and he may or may not have the financial ability to perform if the price goes against him and he may or may not have his commitments to producers backed up by corresponding com- . mitments from consuming establishments. And if the buyer simply doesn't have and can't get the financing to meet his obligations, the producer in effect has no recourse."

With this explanation Johnson concluded that "The merchant's and the mill's problem with performance can be solved, largly, with more iron-clad contracts. But the producer's problem is much more complicated, and is the principal problem to which this group should address it self."

THE TENTH YEAR of insecticide application in the successful High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program began "on a happy note" and the first aerial spraying went on "in fine style," according to Ed Dean, Field Service Director for the coordinator of the program, Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The "happy note" was supplied by the fact that it was only necessary to spray about 41,000 acres in the initial application whereas earlier indications had been that up to 100,000 acres might require treatment. Officials laid the reduction in expected weevil infestation to the hot, dry weather during the first three weeks of August.

"Weevil grubs and larvae in squares that fell from the cotton plant to the ground during this period simply died from heat and lack of moisture," Dean said, "and while that kind of weather

as a whole it certainly proved a boon to the boll weevil program."

Dean went on to say that officials were highly pleased with the performance of this year's aerial spray contractors and that "this first 41,000 acres was covered in fine style, beginning August 27, in a little over two days." The contract for spraying Unit I in the program, which lies North of Highway 82 along the Eastern edge of the Plains, was set this year to Palmer Aero Services of Harrisburg, Arkansas. South of Highway 82, in Unit II, the contract is held by Slaton Flying Service of Slaton.

The 41,000 acres treated in the first aerial pass of this year's program are located primarily in Dickens and Motley Counties, with smaller acreages in Floyd, Briscoe, Crosby, Borden and Kent Counties.

The program, designed to prevent the spread of cotton's number one pest into the vast High Plains cotton acreages above the Caprock, was initiated by PCG in 1964 and weevils have been successfully knocked back off the Caprock each year since. The program is jointly financed by cotton producers in PCG's 25 county territory through a per bale contribution each year, and by the Plant Protection Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, with some equipment and personnel being supplied by the Texas Department of Agricul-

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

> NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

Section 6 of the Texas Con-

(S.J.R. 8) Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII,

stitution are amended to: Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period

not to exceed 30 days; Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular

session or special session; Provide that no ap priation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial

estimates. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January,

> NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the con-

sent of both spouses. Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other require-ments of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Extend the \$3,000 ad

valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults. The wording of the pro-

amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

> NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such

districts. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts.'

> NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the re-quired vote from a twothirds majority to a simple

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will pear on the ballot is as

follows:
'The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property taxpayers.

> **NUMBER SIX** ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distri-bution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals probate matters shall be to the courts of civil ap-

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the

ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further pro-viding that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further pro-viding that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further pro-viding that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.

> NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is

amended to: Provide for an additional

\$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those vet-erans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund,

provided they are otherwise qualified; Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

which

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a)

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations here inafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and vil-

lages. The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal prop-erty used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or

cooperative.
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes cer-tain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."
