AMAZING BULLDOGS 13, FRENSHIP 6

Make Homecoming Big Success

The Amazing Tahoka Bulldogs made their 4th straight victory Friday night by defeating Frenship Tigers by a score of 13-6. The Bulldogs made homecoming a big success by good offense and giving Bulldog fans a very exciting game. Bulldogs had 340 yards of offense for the night with the help of Jimmy Bailey getting 27 carries.

Frenship Tigers won the game and rolled up 3 first downs. Tahoka took over on a punt from their own 15 yard line. Bailey ran for 17 yards but on the 3rd series of downs Tahoka was forced to punt. Starting from their own 26 yard line, Frenship moved 74 yards and 6 first downs with Van Gilder and Harp leading off big gains. At the 12 yard line, Tahoka's defense stiffened and on fourth down the visitors had a first at the Tahoka 2 yard line. Quarterback Booker on a keeper went off right tackle to score. PAT was wide and gave the Tigers a 6-0 lead in the first quarter with 34 seconds left in the first period. Frenship returned the kickoff from the 35 yard line to the Frenship 5 and the last defender got tackled on him to trip

moved the ball downfield for a first on Frenship's 10 yard line. After drawing a five yard penalty to the 15, Bailey and Warren moved the ball to the 6 yard line but failed to get first down on the 4th down play. The first half ended two plays later.

In the third period White almost took the kickoff all the way when he brought the ball from Tahoka's 12 yard line to Frenship's 44, but on 3rd down Bailey lost the ball on a fumble at Frenship's 36 yard line. Tahoka's defense looked great as they stopped two Frenship possessions cold. Tahoka failed to move on one, but after taking a Frenship punt at their own 24, drew a questionable 5 yard "fair catch" penalty. Starting at their 19 the Bulldogs moved 81 yards in 11 plays for the final score, with Bailey clipping of 37 in one hunk, and Payne, White, and Warren all adding shorter gains. Then it was 4th down and 4 to go on the Frenship 13 yard line, and 5 seconds to go in the 3rd quarter. Then came a surprise play as Warren pitched out to the right to Bailey, Bailey stopped and threw a perfect pass to White in the end zone as time ran out (kick was no good.) Sophomore quarterback David Glenn saw quarterbacking action in this drive and did an excellent job for Warren after a minor injury.

Second play of the 4th period, on a desperation pass, Warren intercepted at about the 37 and ran to the Frenship 31. That was just about the ball game for Frenship, although Tahoka moved to the Frenship 14 and failed to score, but then stopped a Frenship drive, then ate up the clock in a methodical drive from their own 30 yard line to Frenship's 36 yard line. Warren punted and gave Frenship the ball on their own 9 yard line. With 30 seconds left, a Frenship pass was incomplete, Preston ran for 16 on a draw play, a pass was complete for 3, and Booker lost 8 yards as time ran out.

Coach A. J. Viertel's fighting Bulldogs travel to Cooper this week for more district action Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

Superintendent accepted the plaque on behalf of the school and read a resolution passed by the Board of Education renaming the South Elementary School as Floyd Tubb Elementary.

At homecoming festivities just prior to the Tahoka-Frenship football game Miss Debbie Raindl was crowned 1973 homecoming queen by Miss Becky Franklin,

homecoming queen of 1972. Other candidates for the honor were Marilyn Thomas, Carla Stevens, and Gwen Sterling.

The Reverend Charles Jones of Amarillo spoke to the homecoming audience which consisted of many former students, with classes as far back as 1925 being represented. Others who assisted with homecoming arrangements and activities were co-chairman John Curry who gave a pep talk at the pep rally and secretaries Jackie Stephens, Mrs. Johnette Havens and Mrs. Doris Stotts.

Tahoka Board Names School For Floyd Tubb

In its regular monthly meeting Thursday, October 11, the Tahoka Board of Education passed a resolution designating a change in the name of South Elementary School to Floyd Tubb Elementary School. Floyd Tubb, who died July 24, in a San Juan, Puerto Rico hospital, was principal of the school at the time of his death. He had been a teacher and principal in the Tahoka School System since 1949.

The resolution passed by the Board read as follows:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Tahoka consolidated Independent School District and the citizens of such District are sorely saddened by the tragic and untimely passing of one of the District's most dedicated and resourceful educators, the distinguished principal of the South Elementary School Building, Floyd Tubb; and

WHEREAS, during his long and distinguished career as a member of the faculty of the school district, Floyd Tubb was known and respected for his untiring devotion to duty and was loved and admired for his sincerity, modesty and understanding; and

WHEREAS, He attained enviable stature and esteem for his constant cooperation, his wise counsel and his broad comprehension of and planning and development in the schools over which he exercised supervision; and

WHEREAS, through diligent study of past, present and future needs of such schools over which he had supervision he gained a thorough grasp of the schools' activities and helped fashion firm policies that will guide the administration of such schools on into the future; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed appropriate because of his remarkable dedication to duty that a last-tribute to his service be recognized and established; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Tahoka Consolidated Independent School District that;

The South Elementary School Building shall be known and designated as the "Floyd Tubb Elementary School Building." Any document, record, or other paper of the District in which such building is referred to shall be held to refer to such building as the "Floyd Tubb Elementary School".

Be it further resolved that there be placed in the foyer of the Floyd Tubb Elementary Building a plaque of suitable and appropriate design.

Be it further resolved that the secretary transmit copies of this resolution to the family of the late Floyd Tubb.

Passed this 11th day of October, 1973 by the board of Trustees of the Tahoka Consolidated Independent School District.

Other items of routine business received the Board's attention, and reports concerning the various phases of the school district operation were presented by the Superintendent.

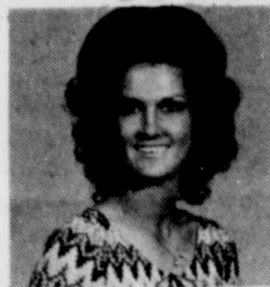
Gunnels is a central office repairman employed by Poka Lambro Co-op in Tahoka.

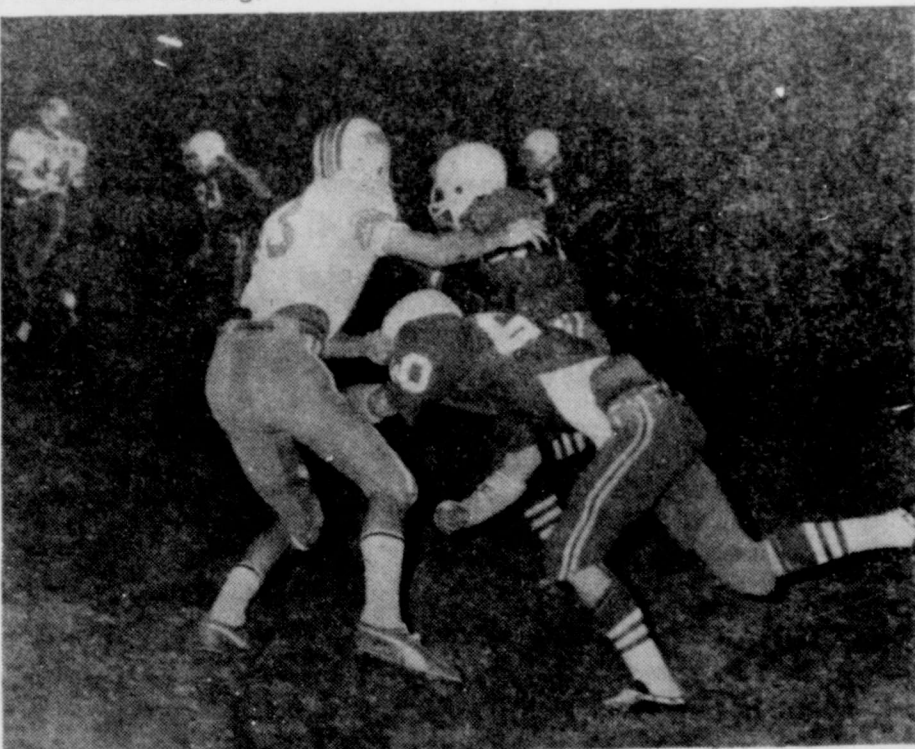

ly related to the screwworm infestations is the high number of Gulf Coast ticks. The ticks, most numerous since the summer of 1949, feed on the ears of livestock and provide a prime target for female screwworm flies to lay their eggs. Ranchers have reported that up to 30 percent of the animals with ticks have become infested with screwworms.

Screwworm cases in Texas in September totaled 1,786. More than 87 percent of these occurred in the counties of Brooks, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, Starr and Hidalgo.

During the month screwworms also hit the South Central Texas counties of Guadalupe, Caldwell and Gonzales and Jeff Davis, Hudspeth, El Paso, Culberson, Presidio, Reeves and Ward Counties in Far West Texas. Other cases included Tom Green, Schleicher, Kimble, Bandera, Lampasas, and Sterling Counties in West Central Texas; Howard Mitchell and Scurry Counties in South Plains; Fisher County in the Rolling Plains; and Bosque and Freestone Counties in Central Texas.

Screwworm activity will slow down with cooler weather, but that may still be weeks away. So checking animals and treating all wounds is still of utmost importance. Both Korlan and CoRal sprays are approved by the USDA for treating wounds and provide protection from screwworms for

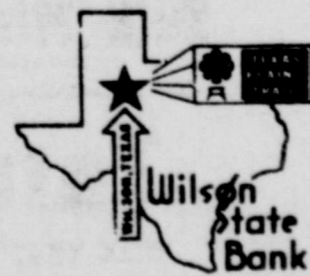

Young T. Sloan, chief meteorologist of the National Weather Service Station at Lubbock, was speaker at the Rotary Club last Thursday. He showed a film on tornadoes, and spoke on their detection, warning to citizens of the area, and some interesting facts in the business of predicting the weather.

He emphasized the difference between conditions conducive to

the formation of a tornado, or a "Watch", and the actual tornado alert or "warning". He also explained methods used in forecasting the weather, and declared usually forecasts of more than five days in the future are usually no more than 30 per cent correct. Such future predictions are based on past normals.

Stateranked O'Donnell raced past Spur 32-12 as Scotty Childress and David Pearson each scored twice Friday night.

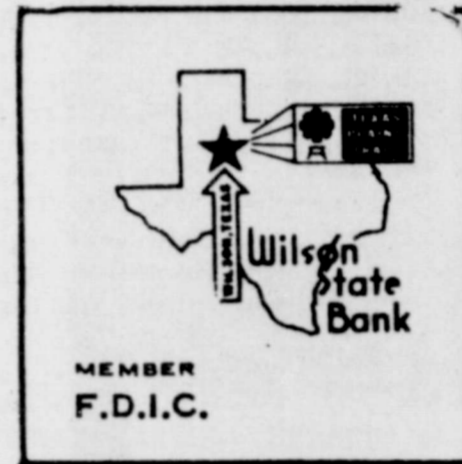

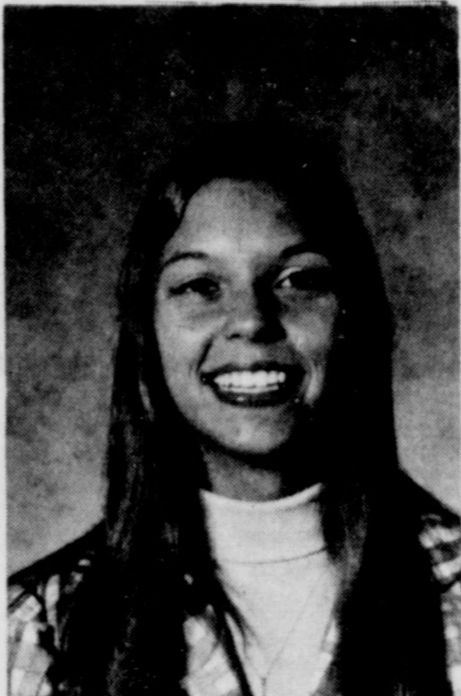

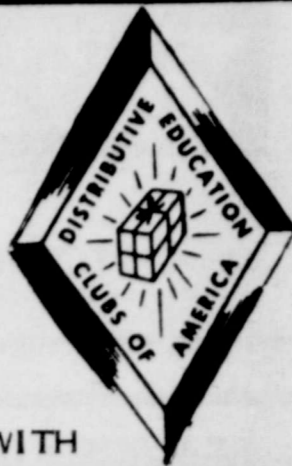

7th & 8th Film At Booster Club Meet

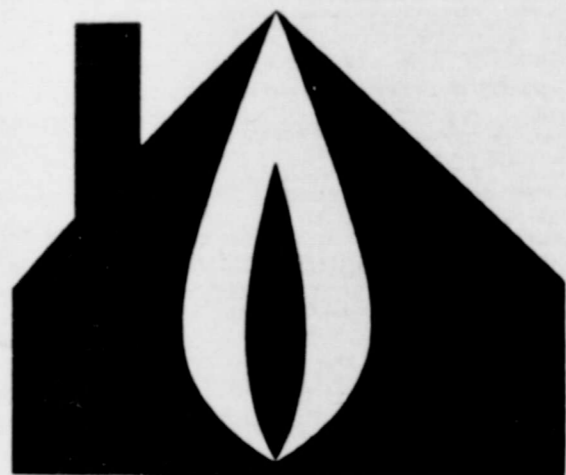
