

> In the third period White almost took the kickoff all the way when he brought the ball from Tahoka's 12 yard line to Frenship's 44, but on 3rd down Bailey lost the ball on a fumble at Frenship's 36 yard line. Tahoka's defense looked great as they stopped two Frenship possessions cold. Tahoka failed to move on one, but after taking a Frenship punt at their own 24, drew a questionable 5 yard "fair catch" penalty. Starting at their 19 the Bulldogs moved 81 yards in 11 plays for the final score, with Bailey clipping of 37 in one hunk, and Payne, White, and Warren all adding shorter gains. Then it was 4th down and 4 to go on the Frenship 13 yard line, and 5 seconds to go in the 3rd quarter. Then came a surprise play as Warren pitched out to the right to Bailey, Bailey stopped and threw a perfect pass to White in the end zone as time ran out (kick was no good.) Sophomore quarterback David Glenn saw quarterbacking action in this drive and did an excellent job for Warren after a minor injury.

Second play of the 4th period, on a desperation pass, Warren intercepted at about the 37 and ran to the Frenship 31. That was just about the ball game for Frenship, although Tahoka moved to the Frenship 14 and failed to score, but then stopped a Frenship drive, then ate up the clock in a methodical drive from their own 30 yard line to Frenship's 36 yard line. Warren punted and gave Frenship the ball on their own 9 yard line. Tahoka Board Names School For Floyd Tubb

THRUSDAY, OCTOBER 18, 1973 NUMBER 42

In its regular monthly meeting Thursday, October 11, the Tahoka Board of Education passed a resolution designating a change in the name of South Elementary School to Floyd Tubb Elementary School. Floyd Tubb, who died July 24, in a San Juan, Puerto Rico hospital, was principal of the school at the time of his death. He had been a teacher and principal in the Tahoka School System since 1949.

The resolution passed by the Board read as follows:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Tahoka consolidated Independent School District and the the citizens of such District are sorely saddened by the tragic and untimely passing of one of the District's most dedicated and resourceful educators, the distinguished principal of the South Elementary School Building, Floyd Tubb; and

WHEREAS, during his long and distinguished career as a member of the faculty of the school district, Floyd Tubb was known and respected for his untiring devotion to duty and was loved and admired for his sincerity, modesty and understanding; and

WHEREAS, He attained enviable stature and esteem for his constant cooperation, his wise counsel and his broad comprehension of and planning and development in the schools over which he exercised supervision; and

WHEREAS, through diligent study of past, present and future needs of such schools over which he had supervision he gained a thorough grasp of the schools' activities and helped fashion firm policies that will guide the administration of such schools on into the future; and WHEREAS, it is deemed appropriate because of his remarkable dedication to duty that a lastminument to his service be recognized and established; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT







Buddy Knox Receives Badge

Cadet Raymond O. Knox, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leighton G. Knox, 2016 N. Fifth, Tahoka, Texas, received a parachutist badge upon completion of the three-week Airborne course at the U.S. Army Infantry School, Ft. Benning, Ga.

During the first week of training, he underwent a rigorous physical training program and received instruction in the theory of parachuting. The second week tested his ability through jumps from the 34-foot and 250-foot towers. The final week he was required to perform five static line parachute jumps.




The Annual Meeting of the Lynn County Farm Bureau was held on October 15, 1973, at 8:00 p. m. in the Lyntegar Board Room.
