BULLDOGS FALL TO COOPER

The Tahoka Bulldogs, after four straight wins, were overpowered Friday night by the Cooper Pirates in a 5-AA District contest. The Bulldogs now stand 6-2 for the season and 1-1 in District action.

Tahoka received the opening kickoff but was forced to punt. Cooper moved on four plays from their own 25 to the 47, where Bailey recovered a Cooper fumble. Two plays later Bailey ran to right and raced 33 yards for the touchdown. McCord's kick was no good leaving the score 6-0 in favor of the Bulldogs.

After the kickoff Cooper moved to Tahoka's 4 yard line in 6 plays, but the Bulldog defense stiffened.

In the second quarter neither team could move the ball consistently, but late in the quarter, aided by three 15 yard penalties

In the second quarter neither team could move the ball consistently, but late in the quarter, aided by three 15 yard penalties against the Bulldogs, Cooper moved 89 yards to score their first TD when quarterback Kelly Choban pushed over from the 1 yard line and Ronnie Jones kicked the PAT to give Cooper a 7-6 halftime lead. But, before the first half ended Cooper tried an onside kick and Tahoka took the ball on their own 48 yard line. David Glenn, who came in at quarterback in the second quarter, passed to McCord for 28 yards, then to White for 7, Bailey made 4 yards around right end to the Cooper 13; then, Glenn passed to Steve Miller in the end zone was almost completed but was deflected by a Cooper defender.

Early in the third period Tahoka covered another Cooper fumble at mid-field and moved in for its second TD, with Bailey carrying 6 yards for the score. On PAT try, pass from center fumbled giving the Bulldogs a 12-7 lead.

The Cooper Pirates came right back to march 63 yards in 8, including 2 passes of 13 yards each. Tailback Todd Hammond, ran the sweep around right end for the score on a 19 yard jaunt. The PAT was no good but Cooper was in the lead to stay being ahead at this point 13-12.

Midway of the fourth quarter, Hammond got away again on a 30 yard run to ice the game away 20-12.

On the first play after KO,

Bailey's pass was intercepted on the Cooper 37, but the Bulldogs held and forced a punt. Taking over on their own 20. At this point another Tahoka Pass was stolen by Cooper. Four plays later Hammond swept right 32 yards for the final score with four seconds left on the clock giving the Cooper Pirates their first District win by a score of 27-12.

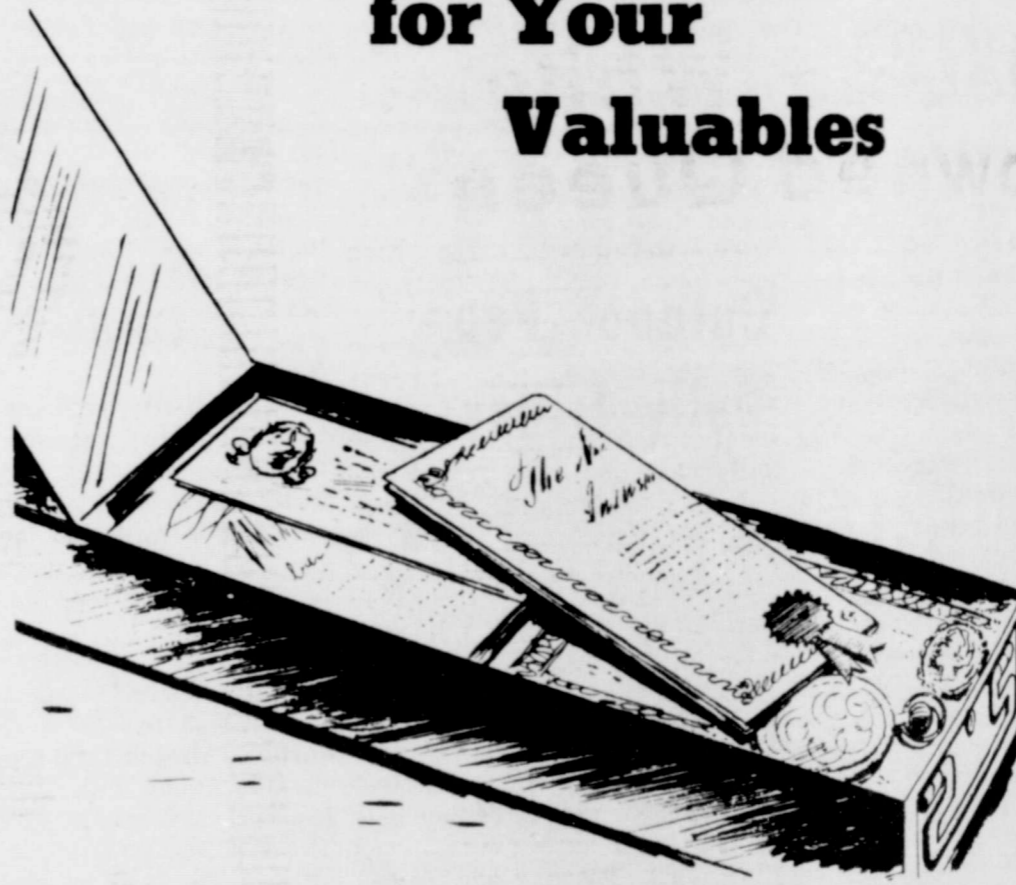

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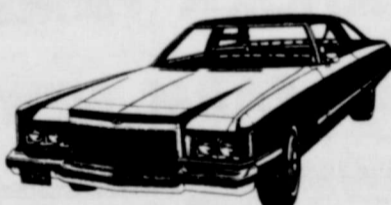

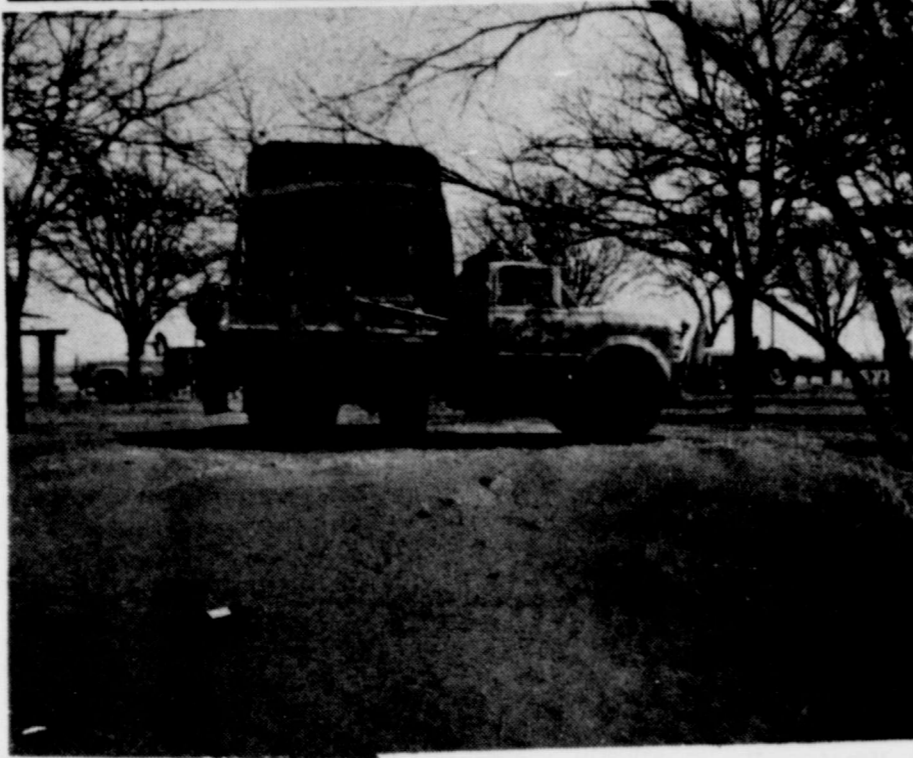

FARM news



WIND EROSION: The State Highway Dept. works hard at keeping our roadside parks in good shape for everyone to enjoy. This park is located about 3 miles north of Tahoka and in 1970 was voted one of the five "most beautiful" in Texas. A few months later in 1971, when the dust blowing season was over, the highway dept. had spent nearly \$3,000.00 hauling away someone's good topsoil which had blown into the park. All tax payers have to pay for the negligent acts of a few. Housewives will have more dust to clean up, the land will produce less and the land owner or operator will make less. The Soil Conservation Service will be more than glad to offer suggestions on how to keep your topsoil at home and save everyone some money.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The fall meeting of the Texas Organization for Endangered Species (TOES) will be held October 25 at the Lakeside Inn and Marina west of Austin.

John W. Arnn of Temple, president of TOES, said anyone interested in helping preserve threatened species of plants or animals is invited to attend. The conference starts at 9:00 a. m.

and will be highlighted by the keynote address of Texas Parks and Wildlife Commissioner Bob Bursleson.

TOES recently published a tentative list of Texas plants and animals considered to be in most danger of extinction. The watchlist contains 112 species of plants, 11 mammals, 9 birds, 6 amphibians and reptiles and

4 species of fishes.

Work is underway to compile a list of endangered invertebrates. Although little information is currently available on such species, certain mollusks, crustaceans, and butterflies are thought to be threatened.

In 1972 after the Soil Conservation Service called a statewide meeting of interested individuals and organizations to coordinate inter-agency efforts to preserve threatened species.

Members of the TOES steering committee include John W. Arnn, president, Soil Conservation Service; Dr. Frederick R. Gelbach, president-elect, Baylor University, Waco; Dr. Charles Rowell, Angelo State University, San Angelo; and Charles Ramsey, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station.

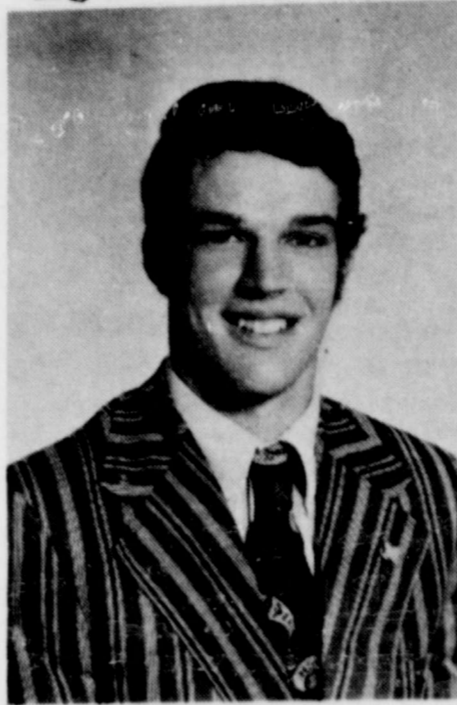

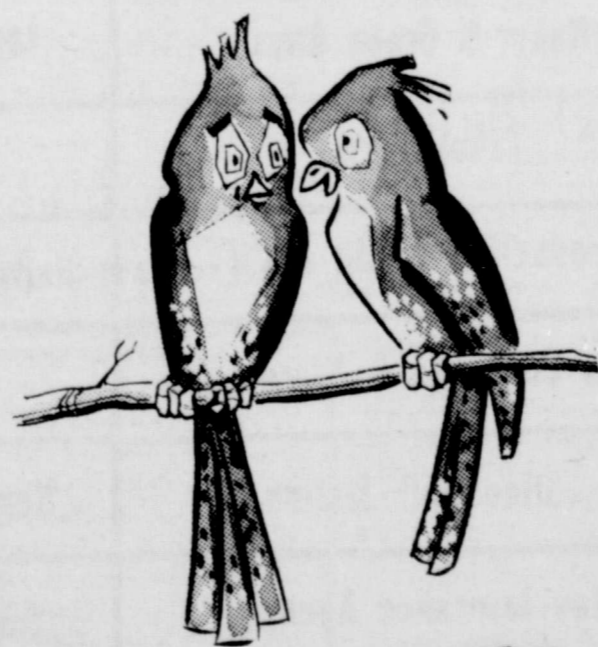

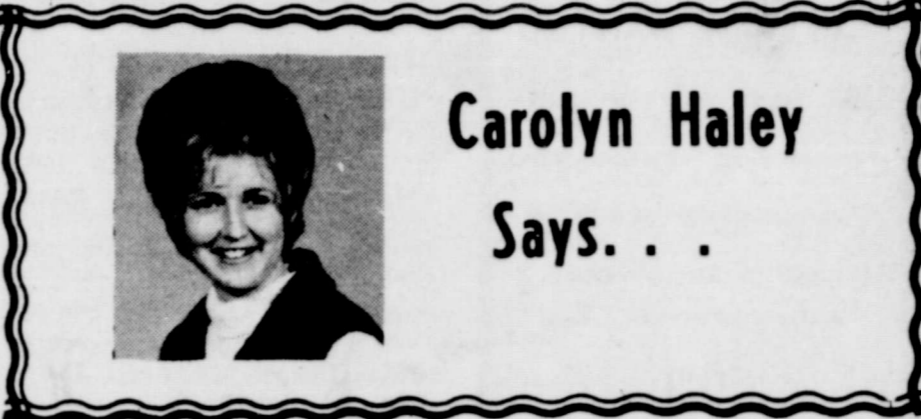
Ann Nava was high pointer for Wilson with 17 points and Brenda

Carolyn Haley Says . . .

There's almost no end of nice things to say about knit fabrics; but to be pleased with the finished product, we need to know some practical pointers about sewing them.

Let's talk about pins and needles. You may think that a pin is a pin is a pin and likewise a needle, but did you know that you can get better results and smoother sewing if you use ball point pins to fasten your pattern pieces and if you use a ball point sewing machine needle? The way it is that ball point needles have slightly rounded points that slip between the threads of the fabric. Regular needles may pierce the threads.

It is also suggested that you use a new needle for every garment or two. This seems extravagant, but really is a long-run savings. Often the chemical finishes on today's new fabric blunts the needle and then snag the fabric. You can save these needles to use on other fabrics.

Another tip, to help you recognize your ball point needles from regular is to touch the shank with fingernail polish. You might even color - code the different sizes with different colors.

Happy sewing a-la-knit!

Most of us that have carpet expect it to last for many years. Spot cleaning, when accidental spills happen, can add years to the life and beauty of carpet. But speed is the password to successful stain removal. If stains have been in the carpet several weeks, removal attempts may prove futile. The quicker it's treated, the better the chance of getting it out.

A solution of warm water and mild liquid detergent works best in most cases. However, don't get too much water on the carpet. If it soaks through to the backing, dark marks may develop on the surface. Often even a professional carpet cleaner cannot remove this "wicking."

If the stain contains grease, use a household dry cleaning compound available from carpet dealers. Stains that leave color behind are the hardest to remove - like orange juice, cranberry sauce and red candle wax.

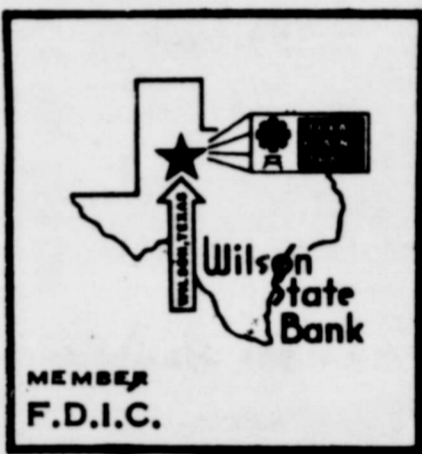
was discussed with the Board of Education. (7) Motion was made to adjourn.

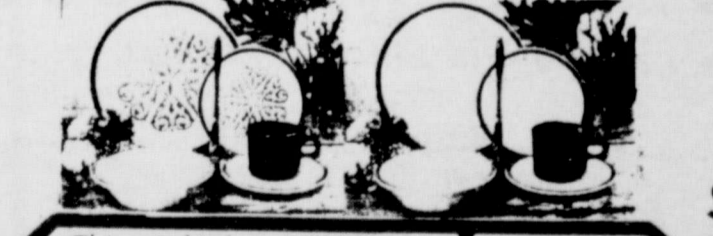
