The Wilson Independent School District Board of Education met in regular session on April 16, 1974, with the following members present: Roy L. Kahlich, Tommy Bednarz, Thomas Autry, Curtis Wilke, Alving Kitten, Donald Klaus, C.W. Slone, James L. Savell, and Loyd R. McCormick, Jr., and Gary M. Gardner, superintendent of schools.

The following business was transacted:

1. The regular board reviewed and canvassed the election results and it was approved. Donald Klaus, Curtis Wilke, and C.W. Slone were administered the oath of office as new board members. The Board was reorganized as follows: Roy L. Kahlich, President; Tommy Bednarz, Vice President; and Curtis Wilke as secretary.

2. Minutes of March 19th were read and approved

3. Accounts payable for April were approved and paid as presented.

4. The Board of Education approved maximum participation in all Federal programs that are considered feasible for the Wilson School District during the 74-75 school year.

5. The following personnel were employed for the 74-75

transfer applications into the Wilson School District for the 74-75 school year subject to final approval by the Texas Education Agency.

7. The Board adopted the United Fidelity Insurance policy for student insurance coverage and football coverage during the 74-75 school year.

The meeting adjourned.

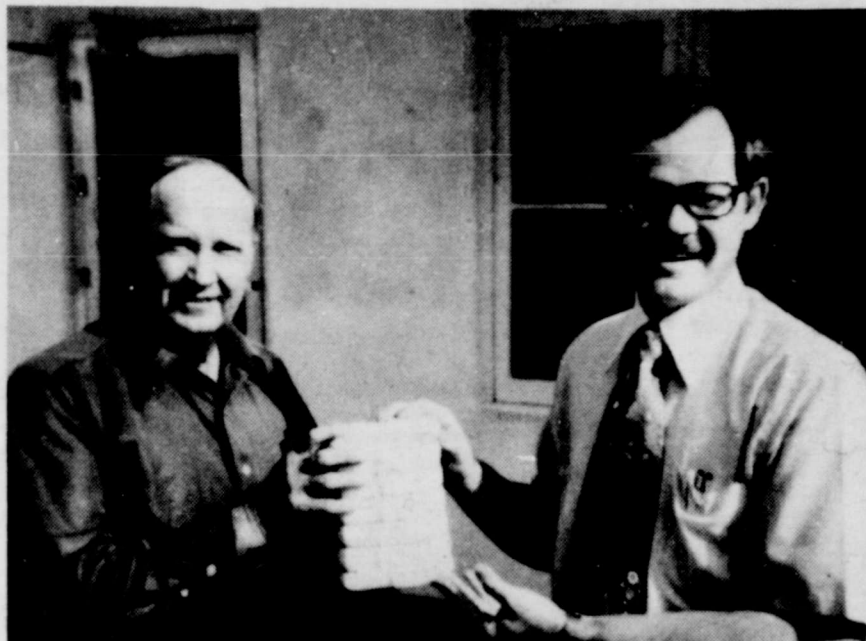
## Junior Class Dance Saturday

## Senior Play Friday

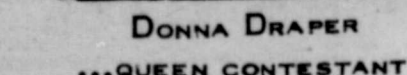

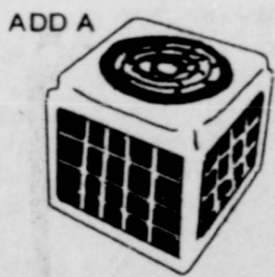

## Mrs. Allen Cox Receives Grant

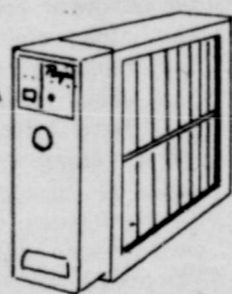

## Rites Held For Eugene Roland

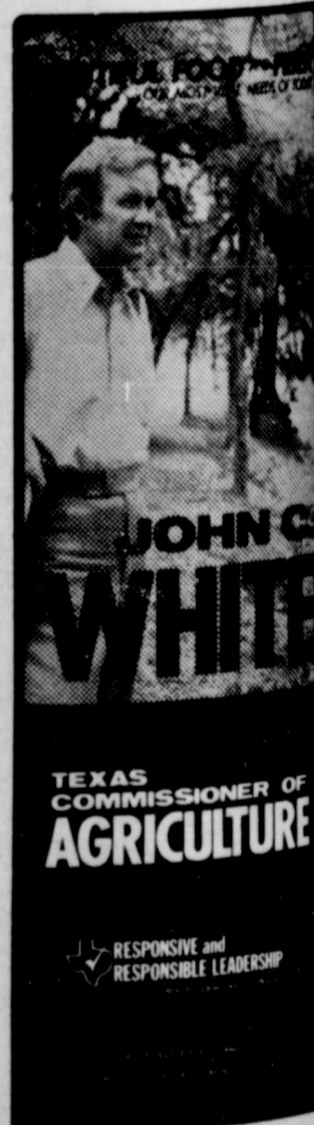
Eugene Roland, 72, of Pottsville, Ark., a native of Tennessee, died Wednesday, April 18, in Dardanelle Hospital.

## Carolyn Haley Says...

From their fathers, children need and want protection--from both external and internal forces. However, deciding how much protection is enough--or too much--plagues many parents. So, many look for a sensible middle course--somewhere between extreme strictness and great leniency.

Besides protection from external forces, a child looks to his father for protection against his own impulses. For example, a youngster engaged in minor wrongdoing may declare, almost with satisfaction, "Gee, I'll catch it when my dad finds out." But deep within, the child probably feels that "Dad will make me stop, even if I can't stop myself." If there's no one to make him stop, then responsibility for his action may become overwhelming--or he may lose altogether his slow gains in conscience made through the years.

Heavy-handed authority may defeat its purpose. Being a 'pal' isn't the answer either. Instead in the so-called 'middle-course' a father can be friendly with his children--without being a pal. As such, he can talk with them in

father-son or father-daughter fashion, admit his limitation--even ignorance on some matters--and still remain essentially a father.

Children also like hearing about the times "Daddy" did foolish things as a boy. Knowing he was a mischievous boy who grew up to be responsible gives them a hope they can do the same.

In this "middle course" relationship, the father is a person who is somewhat stronger, wiser and better able to control himself--or a situation--than another boy or girl.

This doesn't mean a father must stand on dignity--or that he can't take a little teasing or wholeheartedly enter children's play at times.

A father doesn't have to be a perfect example 24 hours a day, every day. Nor should he set unattainably high standards of behavior for his children.

Realistic standards that can be reached by normally forgetful, harum-scarum boys and girls--without excessive pressure--are much more healthful.

Turning to extreme strictness, a stern father whose rules can't be questioned--and whose every word sends the family running to please him--faces two disadvantages.

First, if completely successful in teaching thorough going obedience, his children may look for an absolute authority all through life--to tell him what to do in every instance. As a result, they may develop independence of thought and action--or self-respect.

Or these children could grow up being against everything--re-

bellling completely against authority in any form.

On the other side of the coin, men who have only "pal relationships" with their children actually may destroy all essence of fatherliness.

Children want and need leadership--not competition--from their fathers, and if he's their equal, he's probably their rival, too.

**Hearty Tuna Casserole**  
 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
 one-third cup milk  
 Pasteurized process cheese spread  
 1 7-oz. package elbow macaroni, cooked, drained  
 1 10-oz. package frozen peas, cooked drained  
 1 7-oz. can tuna, drained, flaked  
 one-third cup chopped onion  
 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 Dash of pepper

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning produc-

tion and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry--agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.
