### Lamesa game played Tuesday ny Armes. City Installing **New Stop Signs**

The city of Tahoka is in the process of installing new stop and yield signs. These signs are paid for by the state thru the Texas Traffic Safety Program on a 50-50 basis -- the city earning their part by furnishing posts and labor installing signs. The cost of the project is estimated to be \$5,016.00.

The signs are put on higher posts to conform with the national code for uniform signs all over the state.

We have not finished installing the new signs and already one sign has been shot with a shotgun.

The city is offering a reward of\$100.00 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone guilty of defacing street signs or any public property in the City of Tahoka.

It is not necessary to test-

ify in court to collect the reward. Merely furnish the necessary information to the proper authorities and the identity of those furnishing such information will be held in confidence.

### Savings Bonds 67% of Goal

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$7,460 in Lynn county were reported today by County Bond Chairman F. B. Hegi. Sales for the 5-month period totaled \$86,998 for 67 per cent of the 1974 sales goal of \$130,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$18,911,460 -while the year-to-date sales totaled \$99,368,274 with 42 per cent of the \$236.8 million 1974 sales goal achieved.

Land Use Planning is be coming a major issue in the state and nation. There is no question that land use planning is needed and will eventually come. It was the aim of th Texas council to bring together several speakers, well quali fied in their fields, to discusthe "how" and "by whom" por tion of our theme. A good example would be our Saturday morning session where we hear L. D. Whitehead, President of the South Texas County Judger Association and Bob Arm strong, Commissioner, Ge eral Land Office at Austin. M Whitehead supported the nee for local planning without out side controls from the state of national governments. Mr Armstrong agreed with the local planning idea, but stated tha some decisions involve severa counties and-or have state im plications and therefore th state must be involved. Unfor tunately this is true. It ca also be argued that some lan use planning involves two more states or nations (Mex ico and U.S.) and effects m tional defense, etc. Therefore the national government should

be involved.

It is evident from these discussions that all individuals local governing officials, etc must become more informed a land use planning. This was the aim of our meeting and will be glad to share this in formation and knowledge with those interested.

### Donna Stone Attends Worksha

Donna Stone, recently appointed home economics teacher at Tahoka High School, has completed training at a five-day workshop in Austin for Home Economics Cooperative Education(HECE) teachers. Donna is now qualified to teach it Tahoka High School's HECL program, Harold Reynolds sperintendent of schools announced.

Superintendent Reynolds saithat the vocational program will enroll about 12 students the fall. It includes in-class in struction and on-the-job training for students who are interested in home economics related occupations.

Reynolds said that during the past school year students the HECE program were en ployed by 6 local businesses. Each student in the progratements classes at school during a part of each day and is en ployed for a minimum of light hours each week in a hom economics related occupation.
