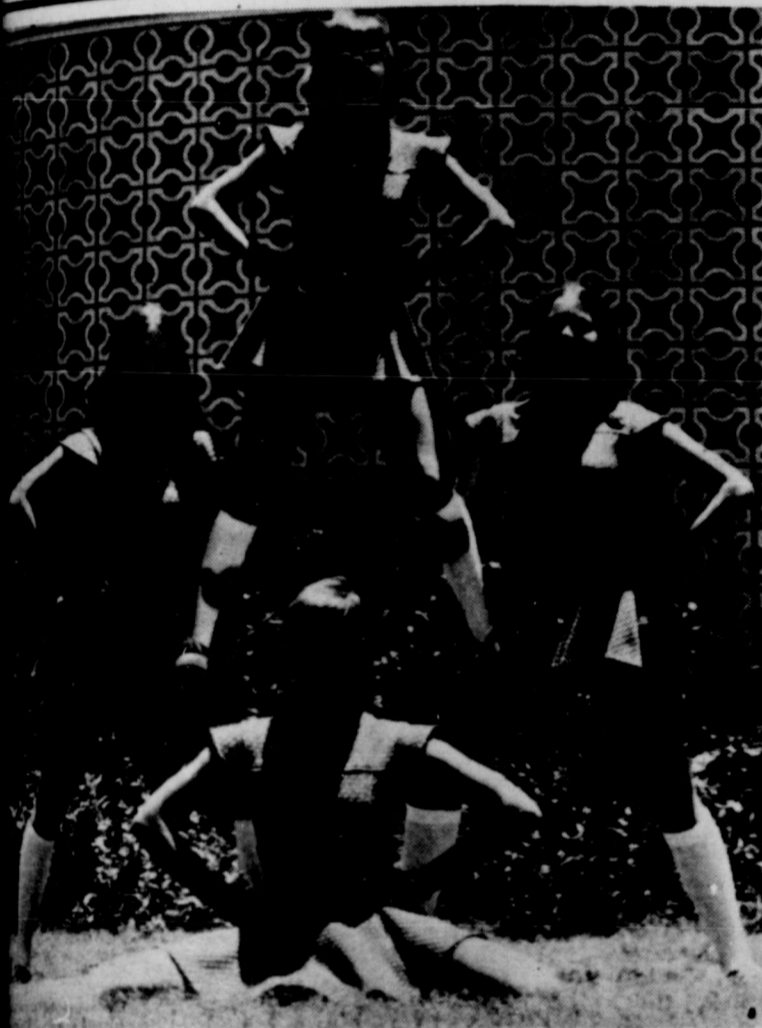

City Installing New Stop Signs

The city of Tahoka is in the process of installing new stop and yield signs. These signs are paid for by the state thru the Texas Traffic Safety Program on a 50-50 basis--the city earning their part by furnishing posts and labor installing signs. The cost of the project is estimated to be \$5,016.00.

The signs are put on higher posts to conform with the national code for uniform signs all over the state.

We have not finished installing the new signs and already one sign has been shot with a shotgun.

The city is offering a reward of \$100.00 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone guilty of defacing street signs or any public property in the City of Tahoka.

It is not necessary to test-

ify in court to collect the reward. Merely furnish the necessary information to the proper authorities and the identity of those furnishing such information will be held in confidence.

Savings Bonds 67% of Goal

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$7,460 in Lynn county were reported today by County Bond Chairman F. B. Hegi. Sales for the 5-month period totaled \$86,998 for 67 per cent of the 1974 sales goal of \$130,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$18,911,460--while the year-to-date sales totaled \$99,368,274 with 42 per cent of the \$236.8 million 1974 sales goal achieved.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

"Land Use Planning, How and by Whom?" This was the theme of the Texas Council of the Soil Conservation Society of America annual conference at the Green Oaks Inn in Fort Worth, Texas on July 12, 1974.

Those attending from Tahoka were Eual Davis and Buddy Pitman with the Soil Conservation Service. Both are members of the South Plains chapter, SCSA. Most members of the society are professional conservationists, scientists, teachers, and planners. Approximately 500 people from across the state registered for the meeting.

National president of the SCSA, William L. Vaught, Fort

Worth, Texas, keynoted the meeting following a welcome to Fort Worth by mayor R. M. Stovall.

Land Use Planning is becoming a major issue in the state and nation. There is no question that land use planning is needed and will eventually come. It was the aim of the Texas council to bring together several speakers, well qualified in their fields, to discuss the "how" and "by whom" portion of our theme. A good example would be our Saturday morning session where we heard L. D. Whitehead, President of the South Texas County Judges Association and Bob Armstrong, Commissioner, General Land Office at Austin. Mr. Whitehead supported the need for local planning without outside controls from the state or national governments. Mr. Armstrong agreed with the local planning idea, but stated that some decisions involve several counties and-or have state implications and therefore the state must be involved. Unfortunately this is true. It can also be argued that some land use planning involves two or more states or nations (Mexico and U.S.) and effects national defense, etc. Therefore the national government should be involved.

It is evident from these discussions that all individuals, local governing officials, etc. must become more informed on land use planning. This was the aim of our meeting and we will be glad to share this information and knowledge with those interested.

Donna Stone Attends Workshop

Donna Stone, recently appointed home economics teacher at Tahoka High School, has completed training at a five-day workshop in Austin for Home Economics Cooperative Education (HECE) teachers. Donna is now qualified to teach HECE at Tahoka High School's HECE program, Harold Reynolds superintendent of schools announced.

Superintendent Reynolds said that the vocational program will enroll about 12 students this fall. It includes in-class instruction and on-the-job training for students who are interested in home economics related occupations.

Reynolds said that during the past school year students in the HECE program were employed by 6 local businesses. Each student in the program attends classes at school during a part of each day and is employed for a minimum of 16 hours each week in a home economics related occupation.

In addition to regular school classes, the student receives daily instruction related to the world of work and the occupation in which the student is employed, Mr. Reynolds said. The Homemaking Education staff and other experts working with the Department of Occupational Education and Technology of the Texas Education Agency conducted the training sessions. The workshop was held at the Joe C. Thompson Conference Center on the University of Texas campus July 8-12.

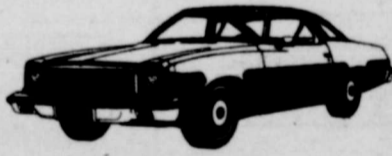

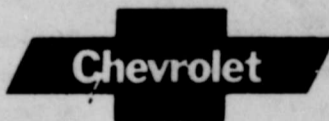

A reception followed the ceremony in fellowship hall. After a wedding trip to Glacier National Park, the couple will make their home in the Dallas area.



Carolyn Haley Says...

Recycling old clothes for new life, fit and fashion is as "in" today as recycling paper, glass and metal.

Concern over fabric shortages and energy conservation--as well as clothing costs--can take credit for this trend.

Whether it's simply a button change, shorter hems, new applique or complete garment renovation, recycling offers you rewarding, creative experience.

Check your closets, most families have closets of stored clothes full of clothes they no longer wear regularly. This stems from rapidly changing fashions, larger, more varied wardrobes and strong synthetic fibers and blends--which mean clothes don't wear out as quickly.

With a little time and imagination, these items can turn into wearable fashions.

Before recycling a garment, consider the following:

Is the fabric worth using? Is it stained or worn out? Can an adequate portion be used?

Will the fabric successfully combine with others?

Do you possess necessary sewing skills to make the garment wearable again--without it looking "homemade" or like changes were tacked on?

Are compatible trim and notions available?

After asking these questions it may be wiser to either purchase or sew a completely new item.

Even though recycling clothing isn't new, mending, altering, repairing and renovating existing garments has taken on new fashion excitement.

Why waste time by removing eggs from their carton to store them in the refrigerator egg tray? Leave them in the covered egg carton. The covered carton helps to maintain their quality. Eggs in an uncovered container will lose moisture and the white will become thin and watery.

CANTALOUPE SOUP
1 large ripe cantaloupe
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 (6 oz.) can frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed
2 orange juice can water
2 tablespoons lime juice
mint for garnish
crackers

Remove the seeds from melon. Scoop out pulp; put into blender with cinnamon; puree. Combine orange juice, water and lime juice; add melon puree. Chill thoroughly. Garnish with sprig of mint. Serve with crackers. Makes 6 (about 3/4 cup) servings.

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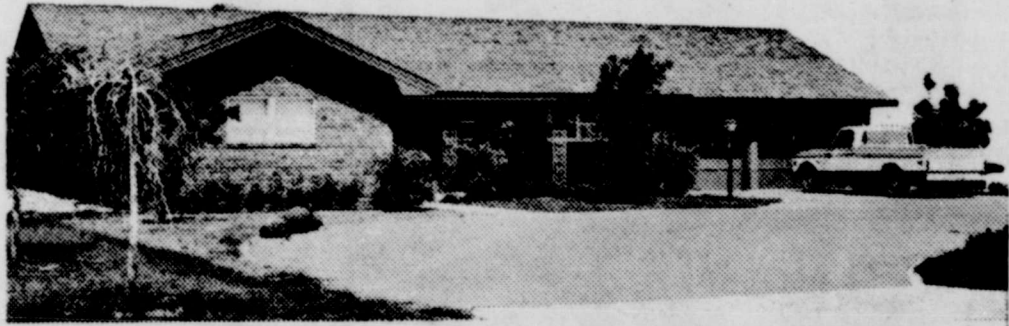

Tractor passenger fatalities are a major contributor to accidental farm deaths each year.

Tractors are not built to accommodate extra riders, whether they be young or old, male or female, experienced or novice. They offer neither passenger seat, protection, nor hand holds adequate for that type of use.

Tractors are of particular danger to children who think it fun to "hitch a ride."

With the week of July 25-31 designated as National Farm Safety Week, special attention should be given to tractor safety, especially regarding tractor passengers.

Griffin lists these precautions:

Keep children off and away from farm machinery, and don't

permit any worker or family member to give children joy rides.

Before moving a tractor or other machinery, check to see that no one has climbed aboard without your knowledge.

Don't use working farm machinery as a place to babysit children. Arrange for proper child care.

Insist that no one ride on farm equipment except those necessary for its operation and the job being done.

Take time to be safe every day of the year.

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
