#### Tahoka School Enrollment Totals 1,021

Enrollment figures were at 1,021 as the Tahoka Schools began the second day of the 1974-75 school year. On Tuesday of this week 251 students had enrolled in grade K-3 while 178 had enrolled in grades 4-5 at North Elementary School. Tahoka Junior High School had 291 in grades 6-8 and Tahoka High School had enrolled 301 in grades 9-12. The total enrollment in the schools is exactly the same as during the first two days of the 1973-74 school term.

As these figured were released Superintendent Harold Reynolds stated that more students were expected to initially enroll during the remainder of the week. The enrollment in the schools is expected to exceed 1,100 during the first 3 months of the school term.

### BILL GRIFFIN SAYS



Cases of blackleg in cattle are increasing over Texas, according to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A & M University. Thus, County Extension Agent Bill Griffin urges cattlemen to take the necessary precautions to protect young animals from the fatal disease.

Raising calves without immunization is hazardous, emphasizes Griffin. Most cattlemen realize the danger of blackleg and routinely vaccinate their calves. However, some become complacent because they don't hear of blackleg outbreaks and therefore fail to vaccinate.

Griffin points out that vaccina-

ting calves too early can cause blackleg. Calves up to three months of age fail to develop a lasting immunity. Vaccination should be at the age of four months and should be repeated annually until the animal is at least two years old.

Before beginning a preventive vaccination program, Griffin suggests a visit to the local veterinarian for adiv

veterinarian for advice on disease problems in the particular area. Certain vaccine combinations are available at a relatively low cost that will protect calves from a series of diseases.



regular commercial fertilizers, many products appear on the market with fantastic and unrealistic claims as to their value. Thus customers would beware of such products and should take close note of the label before making a purchase.

Texas fertilizer laws and regulations require that products sold as fertilizer show on the label the percent nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and other nutrients, if claimed. Those products which do not indicate specific percentage of plant nutrients should not be purchased for application to soils as fertilizers. Fertilizers supply needed for plant nutrients growth. Since most soils contain some of all the essential nutrients, plants will grow without fertilization. Fertilizers just make them grow better.

Nitrogen and phosphorus are most often deficient in Texas with potassium being third. Therefore, the primary purpose of fertilization is to supply on or more of these 3 major plant nutrients. Wide variation exists between soils as to the levles of available nutrients present. A soil test can provide valuable information about these levels and serve as the basis for determining what nutrients should be in the fertilizer.

Carolyn Haley Says. . .

Failure to keep potentially hazardous food cold causes a large percentage of food-borne disease outbreaks every year.

Potentially hazardous foods are those containing milk or milk products, eggs, meat, poultry, fish, and shellfish. This includes custards, cream pies, and potato salad.

The disease-producing bacteria or bacterial toxins in these foods are tricky. It's not enough that the food looks all right and tastes delicious -it may still contain the organisms to cause sickness.

One reliable way to avoid food-borne disease is to refrigerate the hazardous foods tmmediately after buying them and again after cooking them.

Spoilage organisms which survive cooking cause souring of foods--but prompt refrigeration eliminates the problem.

Who sets the prices on items at the grocery store? Surprisingly enough, we, the consumer play a large part in determining what the final price of a retail item will be.

Pricing is controlled basically by the principle of supply and demand. And the consumer's shopping decisions influence the démand for a given product.

For example, the homemaker's decision to buy ground beef because steak is too expensive may reflect a lower demand for steak--ultimately affecting the price.

It's up to the producer and marketer to set their prices, but this isn't entirely a random process. They look closely at consumer behavior.

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If conditions continue to deteriorate throughout the grain sorghum production area, the total overall production level will be near disaster, according to A.W. Anthony, Jr. of Friona Tx., president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Assn.

Anthony made the remarks during an address at the annual meeting of the U.S. Feed Grains Council this week (Aug. 7-9) in Stratton Mountain, Vermont.

"This year adverse weather conditions, including severe drouth, have caused prices to soar, but only a few producers will be wearing broad smiles with the increased prices," Anthony said. "A farmer whose production has been wiped out because of drouth will receive no benefits, even if grain prices were to go up to \$10 per hundred pounds."

"Those of us who have irrigated but will have a short crop because of the extremely hot, dry summer will not be receiving the income that the higher prices might indicate due to reduced yields. The farmer who has only half his normal yield would have to receive twice the normal price in order to maintain the same income."

In summarizing sorghum crop conditions throughout the U.S., Anthony said the only bright spots are the valley area of South Texas and the Gulf Coast area. Crops in the Blacklands, East Central Texas, Rolling Plains, South Plains, eastern New Mexico, High Plains and throughout Kansas and Nebraska are far below earlier expectations and production levels will be down considerably

"Just a rough extimate at this time is that our total production will be at least 20 percent below last year's crop," Anthony said. "I'ms would grop the total production for 1974 to 750 million bushels or less. And we feel that it is quite possible for it to drop another 10 percent, even without further crop deterioration."

Including stocks on hand, Anthony estimated this country's total supply of grain is very likely not to exceed 811 million bushels for the coming marketing year. "Earlier predictions by the USDA showed an export market of 200 million bushels and a domestic market of 700 million. With the higher price levels of this fall's crops, both the domestic and export markets will be cut somewhat but taking everything into consideration, it appears that we will be about 100 million bushels short of earlier demand estimates," Anthony said.

## SOIL CONSERVATION



Farmers in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District are facing a critical wind erosion problem for the coming year. Crop residues which normally protect much of our soil just have not been produced this year.

Since the Dust Bowl days blowing sand has been accepted as a part of poor crop years. However it is not too late this year to raise some crops for this needed soil protection.

With our recent showers, several farmers are now planting forage sorghums. A late frost could even give cattlemen some grazing in addition to soil cover. To get a good growth, sorghum needs to be planted as

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of July,1974 according to Sergeant H.E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

## Greenbugs In Grain Sorghum

An infestation of greenb continues to beseige High Plain grain sorghum crops. But in tensive research, funded by the Texas Grain Sorghum Pro ducers Board, reveals that certain chemicals used in low rate are relatively effective.

Entomologists with the Text Agricultural Experiment Ste tion at Lubbock feel the fa ure of known chemicals to pr vide control may lie in gree bug resistance.

Jack King, research directo for TGSPB and the Grain Sor ghum Producers Association says research indicates Cygo if available, or Parathion, give excellent results. Either o be applied effectively at to low rate of a half pint per acr

King points out, however, the Parathion has a tendency cause an explosion in the gras mite population, making it les desirable to use than son other chemicals.

"Thimet granular is alsogive ing good greenbug control! King said. "But since it pro vides good control in mites well, and since it can be applied only once a year under Environ mental Protection Agence standards, it should be reser ved for use in areas where the mite problem exists, along with the greenbugs," he said.

"The use of low rates is en couraged since high rates built resistance much faster," King said. "If a half pint will do the job and allow the benefic ials to remain, then why use pint."







The views of Texas cotton farmers with regard to proposed Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requirements for protective devices on farm machinery and equipment will be voiced September 4 at a hearing in Oklahoma City by Woodrow Hart of Sinton, Texas, cotton producer and Executive Vice President of the South Texas Cotton and Grain Association.

The decision that Texas cotton producers would speak with a united voice on the issue was made August 14 at a Dallas meeting of the Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations. TACPO is composed of seven cotton commodity groups in Texas representing growers of over 80 percent of the state's production.

It is also planned that a qualified, experienced agricultural engineer will accompany Hart at the hearings to back up TACPO's contention that some of the proposals, especially as they would apply to machinery already in existence, are both economically and physically impractical.

The requirements proposed by OSHA in the February 8 Federal Register would call for protective devices on power transmission, electrical and other farm machinery components, to be installed on all tractors, harvesters and other farm equipment, whether existing or yet to be manufactured.

Hart's testimony before the hearing examiners will reflect and expand upon sentiments already expressed to OSHA by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock, TACPO's largest member organization. The PCG Board of Directors resolved on April 18 of this year that OSHA's final regulations for agricultural machinery should not be adopted until each requirement was determined beyond all doubt to be effective and practical and "that new protective devices be required only on new machinery manufactured after the publication of such final requirements."

PCG was among the many agricultural organizations and individuals requesting that hearings be held to determine the desirability and practicality of OSHA farm regulations. In addition to the Oklahoma City hearing, a hearing is scheduled August 22 in Washington, D.C., August 26 in Madison, Wisconsin, and August 29 at Phoenix, Arizona.

"Many of the measures proposed by OSHA would require customized protective equipment on each of the many makes and models of all types of machinery in existence," notes Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of PCG, "which makes compliance with the proposed regulations impractical if not impossible. And we hope OSHA officials can be made to recognize this fact before issuing their regulations."

The most recent guidelines for appraising weather-damaged cotton crops, received the week of August 12 by county offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), "are considerably improved and should permit more reasonable application of the disaster provisions in the present government program for cotton," according to Don Marble of South Plains, President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

PCG has been seeking changes in the "formula" used for appraising hail and drought-damaged cotton since early in the Spring when farmers complained that appraisals were not reflecting realistic yield potentials, and the criteria for judging drought-stricken crops have now been changed for the second time.

Currently ASCS has authority to appraise at "zero" potential fields where plants are no more than eight inches tall with only one or two blooms. Previously it was required in addition that plants be gray in color and remain in a curled or wilted condition overnight.


