





Carolyn Haley Says. . .

Many of you are sewing for your menthesedays. If you do, you need to keep a few things in mind when buying fabrics.

The type yarn used for menwear doubleknits determine how well the garment will wear and how snag resistant it will be. The most common yarn used is 100 percent textured polyester filaments. Textured means crimped. Crimping the smooth, air-like strand of polyester gives the yarn more bulk, more 'give', and provides air pockets to allow better circulation.

Fabrics of textured polyester filaments are usually smooth, shinier than traditional mens wear wovens and have a harsher "hand" to touch than wool knits. When loosely knit, the slippery polyester fibers snag easily.

The second kind of knit used for menswear doubleknit is spun polyester. The long filaments are chopped into short pieces to look like cotton or wool staple lengths.

When spun into yarn, there are millions of microscopic fiber ends. Not only is the fabric softer, but there is less chance for a rough fingernail or an abrasive desk edge to snag fiber ends.

Spun polyester isn't used for all menswear doubleknits. Chopping up the filaments and spinning them like cotton costs more than twisting filaments together. Also, while spun polyester does resist snagging, the short fibers slither their way out of yarns during the abrasion of wear. This creates 'pilling,' which yarn makers are trying to correct.

The third kind of menswear doubleknit is the newest and considered the best. It is a combination of polyester and 25 percent wool. The spun polyester and wool fibers are combined for the surface of the fabric. The filament polyester provides greater strength and a smoothness on the underside.

ness on the underside.

The surface feels like wool and the fabric snags less and keeps the wind from blowing through the garment.

As you know, many knits have a tendancy to snag. Some of this is done during washing. To prevent snagging knits during laundering, fasten hooks at the neckline or elsewhere with a safety pin. Just slip a small safety pin through eye of the hook.


½ teaspoon cinnamon½ teaspoon nut meg

1/4 teaspoon nut meg 1/8 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup whipping cream

Place evaporated milk, cantalope, honey, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt in blender container; cover and blend until thoroughly mixed, about 30 seconds. Pour into refrigerator tray and freeze until mixture begins to stiffen. Whip cream and lightly fold into frozen mixture. Return to freezer and freeze until stiff, stirring once or twice during process. Makes 4 - 6 servings.





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
