### Delayed Harvest Gets Underway

With return of fair weather following a light freeze on November 14, a few farmers were able to begin harvesting cotton and milo this week. However, this will be the smallest crop Lynn County and most other South Plains counties have produced since 1953. Even irrigated crops have been damaged by the unusually wet fall, which followed seven months of extremely dry weather. There is very little dry land cotton or milo this year, virtually none in the south half of Lynn County.

Rainfall early this month totalled only .60 of an inch but this came over a ten-day period. Total for the year now stands at 22.23 inches, nearly five inches above normal, but nearly all the rain has been since August.

Normal killing frost date in Tahoka is November 9. There was a very light frost on No-

vember 5, a very light freeze on November 14, and since that time three or four light frosts have helped defoliate cotton and dry out sappy unopened bolls.

### Reynolds Resigns To Accept New Position

Harold Reynolds, Superintendent of Tahoka Schools for the past ten years, has submitted his resignation to the Board of Education effective December 31. In a special meeting Wednesday night the Board accepted Reynolds' resignation releasing him from his contract. On January 1, 1975, he will assume the su-

perintendency of the Beeville Independent School District.

Reynolds was elected to the Tahoka superintendent's post in 1964, having previously held similar positions at Bellvue, Paducah and Vernon.

The Board of Education has announced that it will begin a search immediately for Reynolds' successor.

### Melvin Burks Named Interim Superintendent

The Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Education, Wednesday night, named Melvin Burks, Director of Guidance and Special Services, Interim Superintendent of Schools effective January 1, 1975, until a successor to Harold Reynolds is determined. The Board accepted Reynolds' resignation in order that he might accept the Superintendency of the Beeville schools.

Burks has been with the Texas A & M University and 1964. He holds degrees from Texas A & M University and Sam Houston State University. Before coming to Tahoka he served as principal at Wellington and Superintendent of Schools at Leggett.

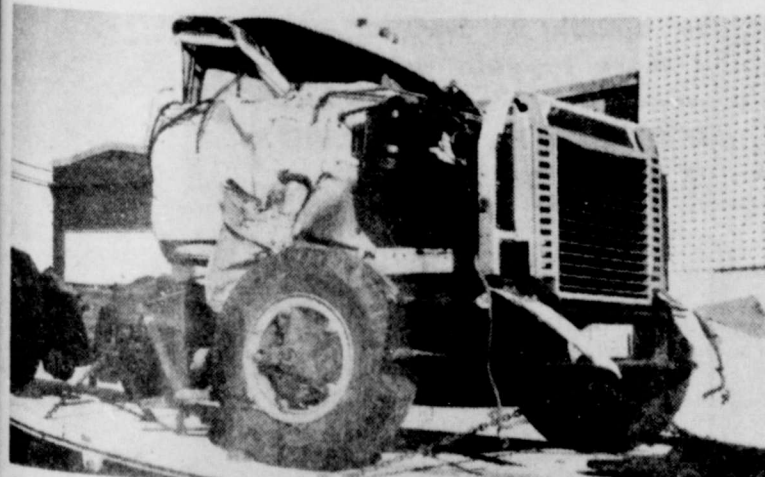
They have groceries, some lumber, and farm implements.

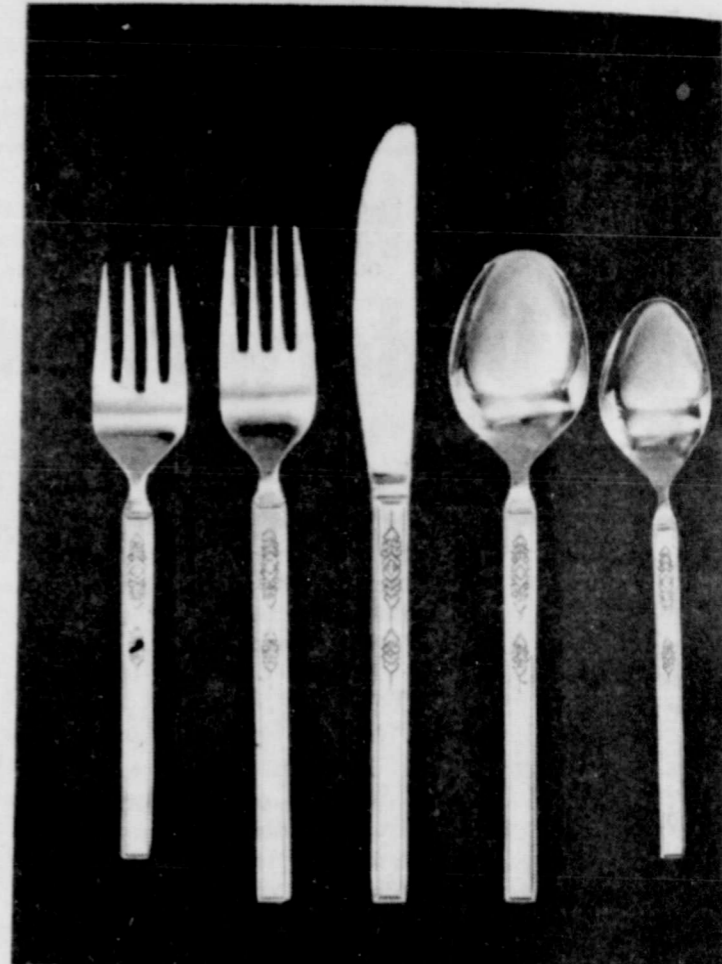

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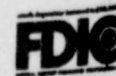
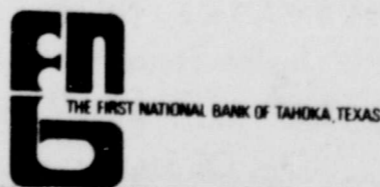

### Job Commuters Go In All Directions

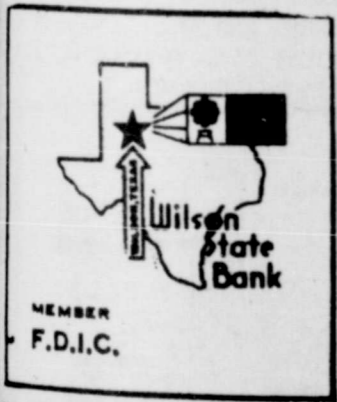
Job commuters don't always travel from outlying areas to big cities.

Indications are that a growing number of city dwellers are commuting to jobs on the farm.

A recent survey by the USDA's Economic Research Service shows that off-farm commuters made up 40 percent of the total agricultural employment in 1973. This was a 15 percent increase since 1960.

Farm residents, on the other hand, were busy commuting to jobs off the farm. Nearly half of all employed farm residents were working off the farm in 1973, up from one-third in 1960.

Southern farm dwellers were most likely to have a non-farm job as their principal employment largely because small, low-income farms prevail in that region.

# Equal Rights Ammendments

 The Equal Rights Amendment began many years ago. It finally gained momentum by Business and Professional Women's Organizations that in 1967 it was introduced in Congress, whereas it passed as a recommendation that the 50 states may adopt the ERA proposal (with only 38 of the states needed). Recently the president of the Women Who Want to be Women organization stated at Brownfield that the Honorable John Tower, Senator from Texas was a co-author to the amendment. Many believe that the text of this amendment was not widely distributed before the

people voted on it in 1972. In February, 1964, the State Bar of Texas conducted a referendum of its members and it was overwhelmingly defeated by a vote of 2-1. The State Bar's objection was uncertainly with respect to matromonial property laws and would imperil the community property system. Having the benefit of testimony in committee, the above was one of my objections and also was the effect on child custody. I personally believe it is an amendment designed for men's advantage rather than being helpful to women. In April, 1971, the ERA was adopted by the Texas

Legislature in the house 118-25 (I was one of the 25.) In the Senate, the vote was 29-0, voice vote. It was put on the ballot for the people to vote up or down, November 1972. In Lynn County it passed by a vote of 1506 for and 575 against, statewide the margin was 4-1 for the ERA amendment. Before this vote I made at least 2 public talks in my district against the ERA.

What can we do to repeal the ERA? It is a monumental task but already some national leaders have been quoted in saying final radification is at a stand still and is at a stand-still because women are writing letters and getting involved which leads me to make the following recommendations to you:

1. Write personal letters to elected officials of the Texas House and Senate. It would be most helpful if I receive a copy of the letter

you write.

2. Write elected members of Congress (House and Senate)

3. Write friends and relatives of other states, mainly those states that have not yet radified the amendment namely Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia. If any five of these states pass this amendment it will become a part of the U. S. Constitution.

There is a legal question at this time pending answer pending answer in the courts at this time, if a state can rescind an amendment to the Constitution once it has been approved by the people, therefore Texas may be at a loss due do anything other than individual citizen imput stres-

## Five Accidents In Lynn County During October

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October, 1974, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1974 shows a total of 55 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 35 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1974, shows a total of 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured as compared to October, 1973, with 644 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 377 persons injured. This was 162 less accidents, 12 less killed, and 162 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Hale; two each in Haskell, Lubbock, Palo Pinto, Wise, and one each in Clay, Briscoe, Hall, Ochiltree, Oldham, Roberts, Swisher and Wheeler.

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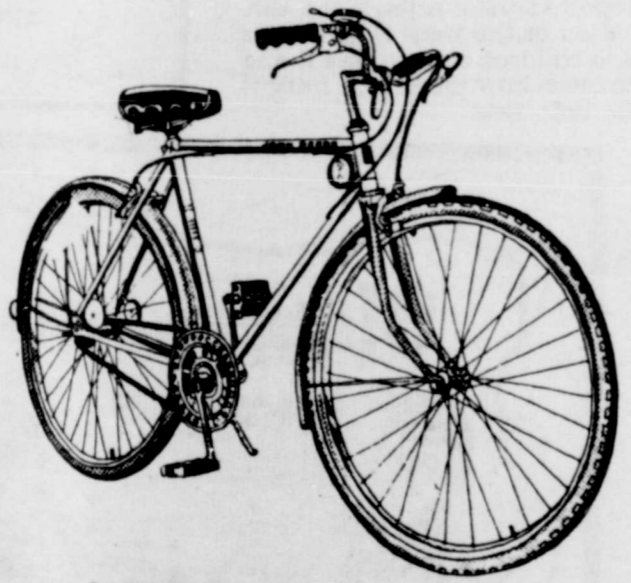

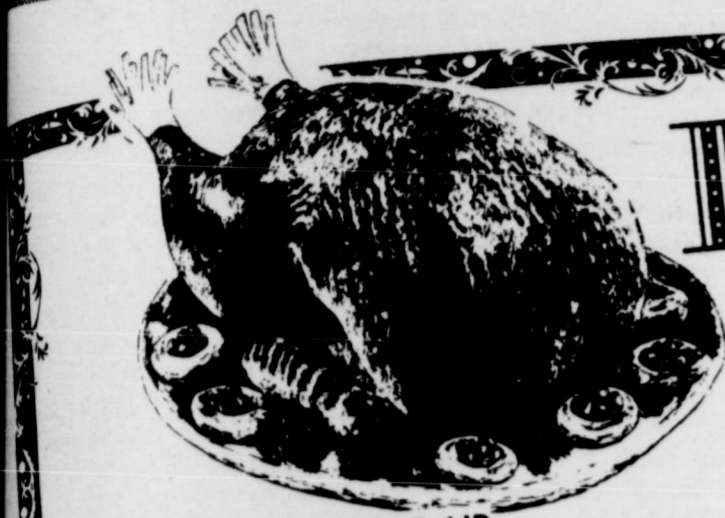

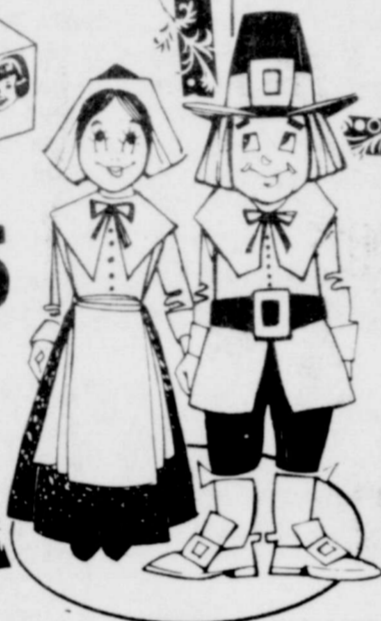

Have your fireplace thoroughly checked over by a professional. Poorly constructed and maintained fireplaces are a common cause of home fires. A clogged flue can also cause deadly gases to drift into the living area.

### Iowa Leads In Cash Receipts For Farming

Iowa emerged as the state with the biggest cash receipts from farming in 1973.

Farm commodities sold by Iowa farmers brought in \$7.3 billion. Livestock, corn, and soybeans were the state's top money-earners.

California, which led the nation for the previous 23 years, was second with cash receipts of \$7.2 billion.

For the first time since 1968, North Dakota edged out Kansas as the leader in cash receipts from wheat.

Cash receipts from all farm commodities in the nation totaled a record \$88.5 billion, up from the previous high of \$60.9 billion in 1972.

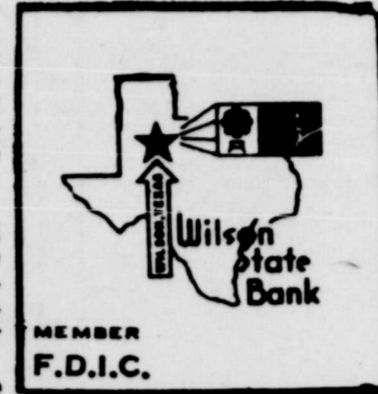
determine the amount of horsepower the engine will produce when run off soybean oil. General feeling among engineers seems to be that engines can't extract as much power from vegetable oils as from diesel fuel. Some believe a suitable fuel could be produced in the future by blending petroleum and plant oils.

Tractors powered by vegetable oils may not be as far-fetched as they sound. Iowa State University agricultural engineers point out that Rudolph Diesel first used palm oil to fuel some of his early engines.

With this in mind, the Iowa engineers recently staged a demonstration in which they ran an engine off of pure soybean oil. Earlier tests on the same engine were run with corn oil.

While current prices would make these oils too expensive as gasoline or diesel fuel substitutes, engineers are not ruling out the possibility of their use in the future.

### HOW TO WRAP CHRISTMAS

Charles Postmaster, offers the following suggestions on how to prepare Christmas parcels for mailing:

Each single item in a package should be cushioned with crumpled paper, excelsior, pressed tissue paper, or expanded plastic

Two or more items are packed in the same carton or cushioning material should protect all items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual wrapper.

Cardboard containers, including large soap, cereal boxes, etc., larger than the being mailed should be packed down to about the size of the gift to minimize shaking and breaking in transit.

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

Age used to seal containers should be durable and should be or firmly secure all sides. Do not cover parcels with slick adhesive tape. Postage stamps will not stick to any kind of tape.

Paper for the outer wrapping should be at least equal in quality and strength to the stock used for grocery bags. Incidentally, such bags, in good condition, provide excellent wrapping when trimmed to the proper size to fit the package snugly.

Trapped packages also should be secured with strong string, not ordinary light string. The string should be knotted at several intersecting points to keep it from loosening.

All packages that contain delicate articles should be marked - FRAGILE. Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address retained inside is insurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on the package. And, finally, address the package correctly and legibly. Be sure to include the ZIP Code. (Call your local post office if you don't know your

ZIP Code.) Mail with the proper ZIP Code is processed more rapidly.

Be sure to put only one address on the outside of the parcel. Do not address on more than one side.

#### SUGGESTED DATES FOR CHRISTMAS MAILING:

Urging all customers to mail as early as possible, Postmaster, Charles Townes, recommends the following dates by which residents of Tahoka should deposit Christmas mail to all points indicated:

November 25 - Surface mail and Space Available Mail (SAM) to armed forces in Canada, Greenland, Labrador, Japan, Newfoundland, and the

Azores, Viet Nam and Korea. November 27 - Parcel airmail (PAL) to armed forces in France, Belgium, Denmark, England, Finland, Germany, Greece, Italy, Norway, Spain, Netherlands, and Portugal.

Parcel Air Lift (PAL) mail to armed forces in Antarctica, Australia, Burma, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Okinawa, Philippines, Taiwan, Thailand, and Vietnam.

November 30 - Parcel Air Lift (PAL) mail to armed forces in Canada, Greenland, Labrador, Newfoundland, and the Azores; all surface parcels to Alaska and Hawaii

December 2 - Airmail greetings and parcels to Armed Forces in South and Central America, Ethiopia, Iran, Israel, Saudi Arabia, Turkey, Antarctica, Australia, Burma, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Philippines, Taiwan, Thailand, Okinawa, and Vietnam; International surface parcels to Canada and Mexico

December 7 - International surface greeting cards to Canada and Mexico;

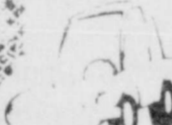

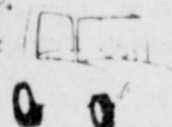

# BILL GRIFFIN SAYS



Despite feedlot losses, high costs, and large supplies of feeder calves, some faint hope are beginning to appear in the cattle industry. Several factors indicate improvement is coming to the cattle industry.

The slaughter of yearling steers and cows has gone up sharply in recent weeks. There will probably be about 10 million non-fed steers and heifers slaughtered this year, which will greatly reduce supplies of carried-over feeders.

Yearling slaughter should be 26 percent greater than last year, which will also help reduce supply of feeder animals.

At the same time, retailers are moving this younger beef

in increasing quantities, using such fancy names as "baby beef, thrifty beef, and junior beef."

The increases in cow slaughter indicates some breaking up of breeding herds, which is probably the only real solution to the overall beef problem.

There is also relief in sight for feedlots. If fed steers continue to increase in price and if feedlot marketing continue at a low level, feedlots should finally show some profits in the coming weeks.

Another good indication for an improved beef situation is the fact that imports of beef and veal into the U.S. during August were down 29

percent from last year. Also, imports of cattle from Mexico were down 47 percent and Canadian cattle imports were down 87 percent.

All these factors are positive in effect, but the real results may not be felt until late 1975 or early 1976.

### Gypsy Moth Damage Declines in Northeast

Gypsy moth damage to woodlands in the northeastern states was less this past summer than it was in 1973.

However, the deadly caterpillars still managed to eat their way through 750,905 acres of woodlands in the area.

The decrease in damage was attributed to an unusual combination of weather conditions, an insect virus, parasite control, and extensive state, federal, and private control programs.

About 400,000 acres were treated with control chemicals.

Leo Iverson, federal deputy administrator for plant protection and quarantine programs, says the gypsy moth remains a serious tree pest. History shows, he said, that the moth population will decline for a few years and then show an upward trend over vast areas.
