County Elections Set For April 5

County Hospital. city elections will be held in all four Lynn County towns, April 5, with voting beginning on Tuesday. In Tahoka, six candidates have filed for the positions of the Tahoka City Council. The terms of Mayor Dan Currier and councilmen George Warren and Dan Currier will expire on Tuesday. Those running for re-election are: Walter Terry, Marjorie, Mike Taylor, and Wood, Marlin Hawwood, and John Curry. Hold-over incumbents are: Kenneth Joe Brooks, Othel Dayton Parker, and

Those filing for the four councilman places at Wilson are Victor Steinhauer, Mike Gatzki, Truett Stone, Lowen Young, Alfred Clary and Jackie Bishop. Virgil Henderson has filed for the Mayor position. The terms of Mayor Victor Steinhauer and councilmen George Ascher, Jackie Bishop, Robert Lamb, and Jim Coleman expire. The two councilmen that receive the most votes will serve 2 years and the next for one year. Two

places will be filled on the Wilson School Board. Those filing are Loyd Hagen, Jo Ann Cook and Roy L. Kahlich, incumbent. Dale Zant chose not to run for re-election. J. W. Edwards has filed for Mayor of New Home and Bob Poer and Charles Smith incumbents, have filed for councilmen. Dick Turner did not choose to run for re-election of Mayor. Wendell Morrow, Lynn Maeker and Willie Nieman

have filed for the places of Dick Turner and Orville Phifer, who are not seeking re-election on the New Home School Board. David Franklin, Kenneth Eaker and Hal Singleton have filed for the two vacancies on the O'Donnell School Board. Three vacancies for O'Donnell City Councilmen will be filled. Those filing are R'ichard Mansell, Thomas Woolam, incumbents and Weldon Brownlow. Harold Barrett did not choose to run.

Melvin Burks, interim superintendent, explained changes being made in the school program locally and state-wide in a talk before the Rotary Club last Thursday.

The schools are changing over to a four quarter system whereby the regular term is being divided into three 60 day periods, whereas a few school in the state will operate a fourth 60-day quarter in the summer months.

He also discussed briefly school finance plans being proposed by the Governor, State Board of Education, the Legislature, and the Texas State Teachers Association.

He warned that schools like Tahoka may be faced with the necessity of a tax increase if the present system of financing is changed. J. D. Atwell arranged the program and introduced the speaker.

Another Fine Texas Recipe

GRAPEFRUIT PIE

1 1/3 cups sugar 1/2 cup water 1/2 cup tapioca flour 1/2 cup water 1 Tbsp. lemon juice 1/8 tsp. salt 3-4 drops red food coloring 7-8 Ruby Red grapefruits 1 9-inch pie shell Whipping cream

Mix sugar and water and bring to boil. Dissolve tapioca flour in water. Combine two mixtures and cook 10 minutes on low heat. Blend lemon juice, salt and food coloring. Cool and pour over grapefruit sections. Mix gently and placed in baked pie shell. Chill. Serve with whipped cream.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Nibbled by a Horse

Pupils in a suburban school of-
ten walked to a nearby pasture,
where they would stand beside
the fence and commune with the
horses. One day, one of the horses
reached over the fence and nipped
a little boy on the ear.

In short order, the boy's parents
aimed a damage suit at the owner
of the pasture.



"Our son was outside the fence,
doing nothing wrong," they point-
ed out in a court hearing. "The
defendant should have warned the
children that the animal was
dangerous."

But they offered no evidence to
prove that the horse had ever mis-
behaved before. Denying their
claim, the court said the owner
was entitled to assume--until
there was reason to think other-
wise--that the horse would not
hurt anybody.

Horses, because of their tradi-
tionally peaceable disposition,
generally do get this "benefit of the
doubt." But, of course, there are
circumstances in which a horse's
owner can and should foresee
trouble.

Thus, the proprietor of a livery
stable was held liable for allowing
an inexperienced rider to go out
on a horse known to be tempera-
mental. The court said the tumble
that ensued could have been fore-
seen and prevented by a reason-
able exercise of caution by the
proprietor.

Then too, the law will take into
account the behavior of the vic-
tim as well. He himself is expected
to take elementary precautions for
his own safety.

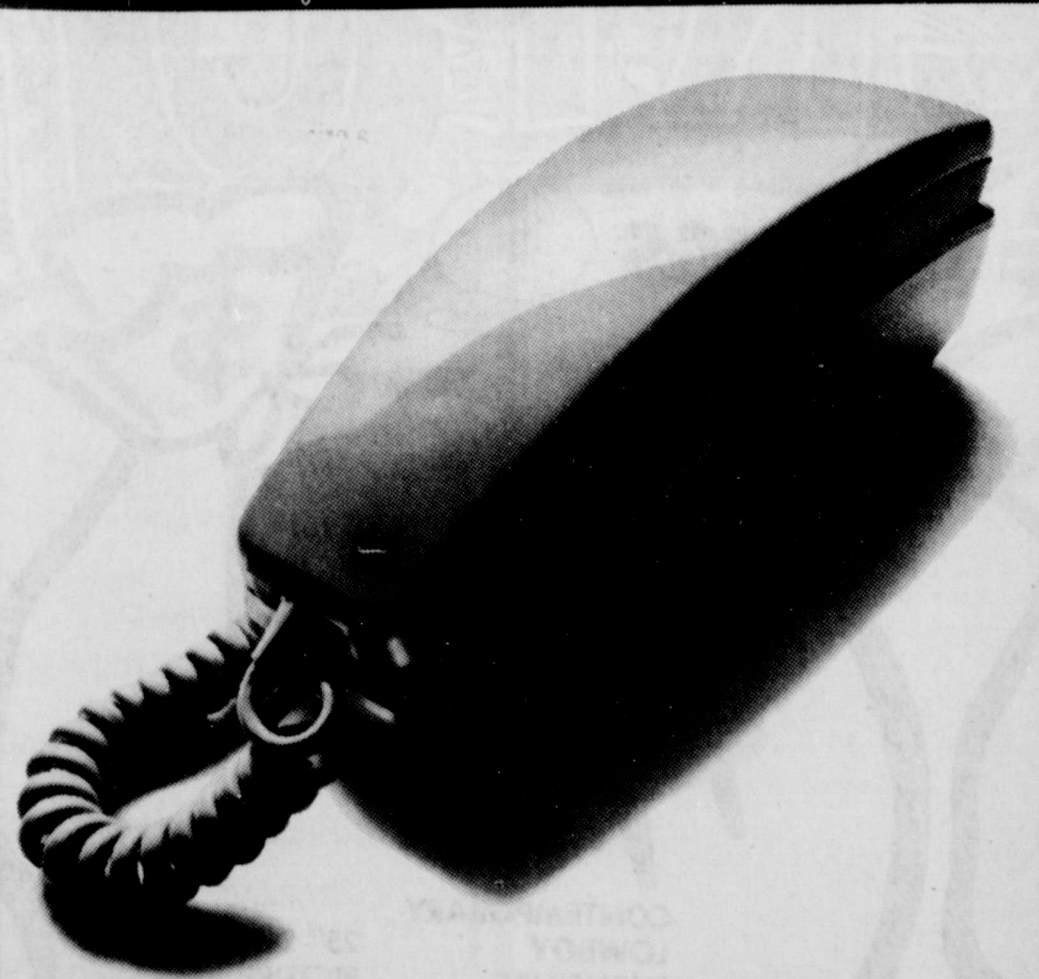

startled, that their principal means
of defense is to kick, have for cen-
turies been among the simple facts
of life. People who approach
horses from the rear, without first
making their presence known, are
very apt to be kicked."

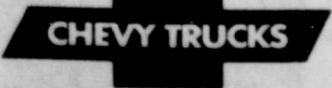

An attorney, Preston acknowledged he believes Congress will ignore any revisions of the amendment

CBS Television in their regular program called "60 Minutes" took some time last month to talk about grass-fed cattle. Charles E. Ball, executive V.P. of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association told Texas Talk why he wrote a letter to CBS taking exception to some of the comments. Mr. Ball indicated the program implied that feeding grain to cattle was immoral. Saying that grain not fed to cattle would not prevent starvation in another part of the world. Mr. Ball pointed to the practical problems of transportation, storage and economics as factors which would prevent the grain from reaching starving people. Ball said the cattleman is already using grassland as effectively as possible without intensifying the energy problem (use of fertilizer). Other points were made by Mr. Ball including the fact that much of the grain fed to cattle is not suitable for human consumption. Many of us will be watching now to see if a reply to his letter is forthcoming from CBS.

Texas Farm Bureau

...ationally provides for the exclusion from Social Security coverage farm rental income received by a landowner or tenant who turns over the management of his farm to an agent or does not himself maturely participate in the farms operation.

The income referred to here is that part of the landowner or tenant's income received from a farming operation which is managed by a professional farm management company, or other person who is responsible to make the basic choices on the farm. In summary, rental income, under the new regulations, received by retired persons from farming operations managed by professional farm management company or other persons who are primarily responsible for making the determinations on the farm, is not to be considered as self employed income. Under these conditions, the income will now be considered as investment income.

Churches and Farm Labor

The governing board of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States approved a resolution on February 28, 1974 in support of the United Farm Workers Organization. The governing board's resolution in part reads as follows:

National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE UNITED FARM WORKERS Adopted by the Governing Board, February 28, 1974

WHEREAS: The National Council of Churches and its predecessor organizations have for 54 years carried on a ministry to migrant and seasonal farm workers; AND WHEREAS: In recent years farm workers under the leadership of Cesar Chavez have developed their own union, won collective bargaining contracts and are providing a sense of part-

icipation, a measure of political and economic strength and needed medical and social services to farm workers and their families; AND WHEREAS: The National Council of Churches, has in the past supported the nonviolent efforts of the United Farm Workers of America (UFW) as they work to achieve a measure of dignity and justice for all farm workers in this nation; AND WHEREAS: There is evidence of exploitative paternalism and racism in the efforts of most employers to avoid collective bargaining with the UFW; AND WHEREAS: UFW is currently under attack by powerful employer interests in collaboration with key leaders in the Teamster Union THEREFORE: The Governing Board of the National Council of the Churches of Christ:

(1) Reaffirms its support and appreciation for the heroic Christian leadership provided by Cesar Chavez and other leaders of the UFW in their tireless and self-sacrificing labors to deliver farm workers from economic bondage.

(2) Directs the Office of Administration to ensure that all units of the NCCC in their meetings, conferences, retreats, etc. refrain from purchasing head (iceberg) lettuce and table grapes from California and Arizona (unless they carry the UFW Aztec eagle label) until such time as agricultural employers agree to negotiate with the union of the worker's choice.

(3) Asks the Division of Church and Society to follow up on the 1973 NCCC study entitled "Report of the Governing Board Task Force on the Farm Labor Dispute in California" with a comprehensive ecumenical strategy designed to:

a) Inform constituent denominations

b) Implement the Task Force recommendations

c) Anticipate and eliminate strategies of violence and intimidation that may be planned by Teamster leadership

d) Help bring closer the day when the Teamster Union will leave the fields and honor previous jurisdictional agreements reached with the AFL-CIO and the UFW

(4) Endorses and promotes the establishment of an annual "Farm Worker Week" and urges constituent denominations to do likewise. "Farm Worker Week" in 1974 will be celebrated after Easter to coincide approximately with the California grape harvest. And in subsequent years will be celebrated immediately before and after Thanksgiving as a way of calling attention to the contribution that farm workers make to our lives

and as a way of calling us into practical solidarity with those farm workers who are giving leadership in the struggle for justice.

(1) Asks that each member denomination work closely with the National Farm Worker Ministry in recruiting and sending persons to be with the United Farm Workers in the strikes and picket line confrontations that will be coming and in support of the farm worker's boycott of grapes, lettuce and Gally wines.

WATERGATES? A DALLAS MORNING NEWS editorial December 22, 1974 by Dick West, reveals the following:

(1) "A historian noted recently that the West was won, and railroads flung across the continent, not by killing Indians, but by bribing Congress."

(2) "Between 1866 and 1872 one railroad spent \$500,000 in bribes. Daniel Webster was on the take from Nicholas Biddle, who also 'greased the palm' of three presidents and prominent editors."

Mr. West quoted Horatio Seymour as saying "Our people want men in office who will not steal but who will not interfere with those who do."

MEAT LABELING: There are a number of laws now active both at the Federal and State level directing importers of meat to label an imported meat. The national laws were reviewed in FACTS FOR YOU of November 15, 1974 beginning on page 273. The first of these laws at the Federal level were enacted in June of 1930 and were last amended in June of 1938. All county leaders are encouraged to review this law in detail before asking for additional laws.

With regard to Federal labeling laws, it appears that importers can be required to label imported meat, but when it is accepted into the United States, it then becomes U. S. meat and is no longer foreign meat, according to the law.

There is a state law approved in 1965. A copy of this law is reproduced here for your information.

ART. 4476 -- 6 Imported Fresh Meats Wholesale or retail sales

Section 1. No person shall knowingly sell at wholesale or retail any fresh meat imported from any foreign nation without complying with all of the rules prescribed by this Act.

Definitions

Section 2. As used in this Act --

(a) "Fresh meat" means any quarter, half or whole carcass of beef, pork, or mutton, or any cut or portion thereof which has not been canned, cooked, or otherwise processed.

(b) "Person means any individual firm, partnership, association or corporation.

(c) "Retail store means any retail grocery store, butcher shop, delicatessen, or other place where fresh meat is sold at retail for consumption off - premises.

(d) "Ground meat" includes any meat subsequently ground or commingled and any portion of which is imported from a foreign nation.

Labels, brands or signs, contents

Section 3. (a) On each quarter, half, or whole carcass of imported fresh meat offered for sale at wholesale or retail, and also on any individually wrapped or packaged cut or portion thereof, there shall be placed a label or brand bearing the words, "Product of _____" (naming the country), or other words clearly indicating the country of origin of the meat. Where wrapped or unpackaged cuts or slices are displayed in a tray or case for selection by the patron, each tray or case shall have a conspicuous legible, and clearly visible sign and label bearing such an inscription. Every tray or other container of hamburger, ground meat, sausage, or other fresh meat displayed in the bulk shall have a sign or label conforming to the same requirements.

Violations, Penalties

Section 4. (a) Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this Act shall, for the first offense, be fined not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.

(b) For a second or subsequent violation of this Act, a person shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, or confined in the county jail for not less than 30 days nor more than 90 days, or both.

(c) The State Department of Public Health shall enforce the provisions of this Act and shall file a sworn complaint against any person who violated the provisions of this Act. Acts 1965, 59th Leg., P. 88, ch. 32.

State laws have been reviewed from time to time in FACTS FOR YOU and this information reveals that

at one time, there were more than 12 states with laws requiring foreign meat to be labeled and at least 16 states considering similar laws. The many state laws resulted in a number of court cases, all of which were ruled unconstitutional. This office has maintained a file with regard to five of these court cases which have resulted in rendering state labeling laws ineffective.

Armour and Company v. State of Nebraska:

The Nebraska statute requires labels on products in which any imported meat is used. The label must state that imported meat in contained therein, name of country of its origin and date when it was exported. A U.S. three-judge District Court in Nebraska ruled this statute unconstitutional and unenforceable. Specifically, it violated the Commerce Clause of the Constitution (Article I, Sec. 8).

Ness Produce Company v. James F. Short, Director of Agriculture, State of Oregon:

The Oregon law required that the seller of imported meat must post signs as follows: (a) Foreign Meat Sold Here or (b) Imported Meat Sold Here. The law also required that packages of meat conspicuously labeled (a) Imported From ... or ((Produced in ... A United States District Court in Oregon ruled that this law also violated the Commerce Clause of the U.S. Constitution (Article I, Section 8 and therefore was unenforceable.

International Packers Limited v. Harold E. Hughes, Governor of Iowa:

The Iowa law required retailers who ultimately sold meat to display a conspicuous sign to that effect A. U. S. district court in Iowa held they could find no legitimate state interest justifying the burden imposed upon interstate commerce by the Iowa Meat Labeling Act. Article I, Section 8 of the U.S. Constitution was again cited as the basis.

The Tupman Thurlow Company, Inc. v. W. F. Moss, Commissioner, State of Tennessee:

The Tennessee law required that any person selling foreign meat or meat

food would be required to identify each produce and its foreign origin. In connection with this Act, there was a Tennessee licensing act requiring registration and annual licensing of anyone engaged in the business of handling import meat or meat products. Again, the federal court in Tennessee ruled that the Tennessee labeling and licensing act violated the U. S. Constitution's commerce clause (Article I, Section 8) and therefore could not be enforced.

MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION EXEMPTIONS

State laws requiring motor vehicles to be registered for a fee contain the following exemptions.

(1) Owners of farm tractors, farm trailers and farm semi trailers with a gross weight not exceeding 4,000 lbs. and implements of husbandry operated or moved temporarily upon the highways.

(2) Owners of motor vehicles, trailers, and semi-trailers which are the property of and used exclusively in the service of the United States, the State of Texas or any county, city or school district thereof, owners of vehicles designed and used exclusively for fire fighting.

(3) Owners of motor vehicles used in the conduct of consular affairs in the State of Texas by the representatives of any foreign government which maintain friendly relations with the United States.

(4) A Veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States who, as a result of military service, has suffered at least a 70 percent service - connected disability, and who receives compensation from the Federal government because of such disability, is entitled to register for his own personal use, one passenger car, or light commercial vehicle, having a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less without the payment of the prescribed annual registration fee.

(5) An organization which owns a motor vehicle used exclusively for transportation of disabled veterans without the payment pre-

scribed annual registration fee.

THE FEDERAL BUDGET

During 1974, the U.S. Congress passed and the President approved the Congressional Budget and Improvement Control Act of 1974. The 1976 Federal Budget is for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1975 and ending on June 30, 1976. However subsequent fiscal years will start on October 1, and end on September 30. As a result of this change, there will be a three month transition quarter between the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1976 and the one beginning on October 1, 1976.

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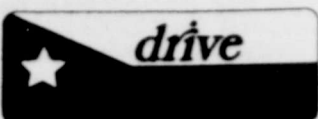

AUSTIN—"Special early-bird Easter Sale! One-third off regular price!" Many businessmen agree that there's nothing like such a sale to draw potential buyers to a store.

And most merchants feature a variety of special sales during the year. There may be mark-down sales, holiday sales, pre- or post-season sales, discontinued merchandise sales, or a host of others.

All of these sales could result in savings for bargain-minded consumers, too. But there is a small minority of businessmen who may attempt to attract consumers with deceptively advertised or misleading sales, according to lawyers in the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.

They warn that a few merchants advertise "sales" almost continuously and that such "sales" may not offer prices that are any lower than regular prices.

The term "sale" generally should be used only to advertise significant reductions from a merchant's usual and customary price for the merchandise, and should continue for a reasonable period of time, not continuously.

Special "limited time" sales should be carefully observed by merchants. For example, a "one-day only" sale should be just that. Prices for goods should go back to regular prices immediately after expiration of the stated time.

"Introductory" sales should be for a limited time only, too, and the price should be increased to advertised regular price after such a period is over.

"Emergency," "fire," or other "distress" sales, or "going out of business" or "liquidation," sales should not be advertised unless the stated or implied condition is true. And these sales also should continue for only a specified time. A few merchants are reported to have been "going out of business" for several years, Consumer Protection attorneys note.

General claims by some stores that their prices are "guaranteed lowest in town," that they are "never under-sold," or that they offer the "highest trade-in allowances" should be taken with a grain of salt. It's highly unlikely that a merchant could have accurate, up-to-date knowledge of all prices at all stores.

However, some careful merchants who strive to make valid "lowest price" or similar claims advertise that they will

refund the difference in price if a customer can bring proof that an item could have been purchased elsewhere in town for less.

Advertised savings of "up to 40 per cent off" for a group of items offered at a range of reduced prices could be misleading if only a few items in the group sold at such a savings. Advertisements in such cases should note maximum and minimum savings to avoid confusion, such as "savings from 10 to 40 per cent off on advertised items."

If you have a consumer complaint about misleading or deceptive advertising, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

The House Agriculture Committee deserves a full round of applause for the dispatch with which it reported emergency farm legislation March 6, according to Don Marble of South Plains, President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

The bill approved by the committee, if passed and signed into law, would raise the support prices for cotton, wheat, feed grains and milk, plus reinstate a loan program for soybeans, "measures which are badly needed if financial ruin is to be avoided by thousands of farmers," Marble said.

Committee Chairman Tom Foley, Democrat of Washington, expects the bill to go to the Rules Committee in the week of March 10 and it could reach the House floor as early as March 18. Foley is quoted as saying the bill has a good chance of passage in the House, but there are others who are much less confident and point also to the possibility of a Presidential veto.

The bill as reported by the committee calls for raising the CCC loan on cotton to 40¢ per pound, basis Middling one inch, from the 34.27¢ announced as a "preliminary" loan in October of last year. Cotton's target price under the new measure would be 48¢ per pound, up from 38¢ under present law.

Two other changes would be made in the cotton program. Producers using the Commodity Credit Corporation loan program would have the option to extend the 10-month loan period for an additional eight months. Currently, the law calls for all loans to expire ten months from the first day of the month in which they are written.

The other change, which came as a last minute amendment and also concerns the loan program, has not been fully explained as of this writing. It would call for the Secretary of Agriculture to "... insofar as practicable establish the same terms and conditions on storage costs and interest for each of the commodities cotton, wheat and feed grains."

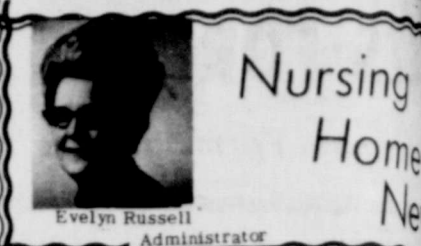
Under the present act, feed grain and wheat producers using the loan program have been required to prepay storage costs for the term of the loan, while cotton producers have paid the storage only if and when cotton was redeemed from the loan. Washington sources indicate that the language of the new law, if the Secretary so desired, would permit him to require cotton producers also to pay storage charges in advance.

The CCC storage rate on cotton is currently 70¢ per month per bale. Therefore a requirement that 10-months' storage be paid on cotton in advance would have the effect of lowering the proposed 40¢ loan level to about 38.5¢.

USDA had previously announced there would be no loan program for soybeans in 1975, but if the Ag Committee bill should pass, that loan program would be reinstated, reportedly at about \$3.81 per bushel.

The Ag Committee agreed on target prices of \$3.10 per bushel for wheat and \$2.25 per bushel for corn (about \$3.81 per cwt for grain sorghum), and set loan rates of \$2.50 for wheat, \$1.87 for corn (about \$3.17 for grain sorghum).

CCC recently announced that CCC loans would carry an interest rate of 6.125 per cent, down from 9.375 per cent. The Ag Committee bill would require that CCC interest rates on commodity loans be reviewed quarterly and be set at a rate no greater than the current cost of money to the government.

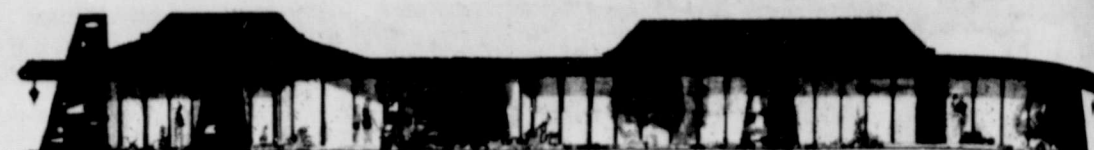

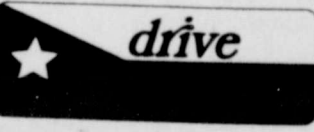
