Area Airports Discussed

A Texas Airport System joint planning conference will be held at 10 a.m., Wednesday, May 28 in the Arnett Room of the Texas Commerce Bank, Lubbock.

Airport development needs of Hale, Lubbock, and Lynn Counties will be discussed.

Participating in the meeting will be representatives of the South Plains Association of Governments, city and county elected officials, airport board members, airport managers, and other citizens.

All area citizens with an interest in air transportation and airport development are invited to attend.

Benefits of air transportation to a community are not always well understood. General aviation airports will be examined in relation to community and county development goals.

The Texas Airport System Plan is being developed for Texas and the Federal Aviation Administration by the Texas Aeronautics Commission. Technical assistance is provided by the Texas Transportation Institute of Texas A&M U niversity.

Major activities of the Plan include inventory of existing aviation facilities, forecasting of aviation demand, comparison of present capacity with forecast needs, evaluation of alternative airport systems, developing schedules of required improvements, and identification of alternatives for financing system growth.

First Schools Started in 1902

Lynn was the first officially established public school in Lynn County, established in the fall of 1902 on petition of J. E. Ketnerx and others to Lynn County Commissioners Court. The entire county was then declared one school district, and a tax rate of 5 cents granted for its operation. Mrs. Jessie Randall, was the first teacher. Her Husband had filed on land in Terry County, and her uncle, H. E. Randall was postmaster at Lynn.

However, the same fall, a "subscription" school was started at T- Bar, after Tahoka Cattle Company's brand, with B. Humphries, Dee Harris, and George Small among the supporters.

The district was not officially created until 1904. In the summer of 1903, Lynn County Commissioners

created Tahoka District, comprising the south half of the county, leaving the north half to Lynn. School started in the fall with W. S. Norton and wife the first teachers. Until a one-room building could be erected, classes were held in the district court room of the new two-story frame court house. J. B. Walker and Miss Min-

nie Chambers (later Mrs. J. W. Elliott) were the second teachers. Later, as many as

28 schools were established in the county, but today these have been consolidated into only four, Tahoka, O'Donnell, Wilson, and New Home.

Five Accidents In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of April, 1975, according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1975 shows a total of 15 accidents resulting in no persons killed and two persons injured. The rural traffic accident

summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1975 shows a total of 425 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 251 persons injured as compared to April, 1974 with 390 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 35 more accidents, one less killed, and 33 more injured in the 1975 at the same period of time. The 18 traffic deaths for

the month of April, 1975 occurred in the following counties: four in Lubbock: two each in Bailey, Clay, and Garza; and one each in Hockley, Wise, Yoakum, Briscoe, Castro, Hartley, Ochiltree, and Potter.

Carolyn Haley Says. . .

Are you anticipating buying a new food freezer soon? If so, before having it delivered, you need to consider where to locate it. Location of a freezer is important because it will not function well in direct sunlight, near a heat source or in an unventilated area.

Most freezers are designed for operation within certain temperature limits. When the temperature goes below freezing, the life of the compressor may be shortened.

Temperatures above a certain point will cause the freezer to run frequently, and this increases operating costs and decreases the life of the appliance.

A freezer may weigh as much as 1500 pounds when fully loaded. So it's necessary to be sure the location can support the load and has a level floor for quite operation.

Unless the unit has a forced air condenser, it needs at least a three-inch space above it to allow warm air to circulate.

Since the appliance will probable be used frequently, locate it in an easily accessible place -- next to a table or countertop. If space is a problem, the unit may have to be stored in a laundry room or garage. Before these areas are considered. the humidity also should be checked. If the area is too damp, some of the metal on the freezer may rust.

For maximum safety, the freezer must be grounded. Consult the owner's manual for instructions.

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

The term "Crop Camel" is used as a reference any crop that gets along or little water but in this area generally reserved for sorghum Primary reason for the develop ment of sorghum as a feed grain was because it provided essentially the same nutritive value as corn but had unique growing properties. Propertie uch as becoming practically dormant during a drought and then resuming growth as soon as water is available. Most ommon of the grain sorghum types are the kafirs and milo or a hybrid developed from the two varieties. According to authorities such as J. Martin, sorghum originated in east Africa with the kafir variety coming to the United States from South Africa in 1876. Milo followed in the early 1880's. Hybrid developments and farm improvements have moved average yield from under 20 bushels per acre in 1950 to a current average of close to 65 bushels.





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mals for tracing, investigation of infected herds, and vaccination of replacement calves in high-risk areas.

Although the TAHC has the authority to quarantine entire herds as well as adjacent areas when the situation warrants it, the general policy is to quarantine only the group of cattle where the infected animal was located.

The eradication program is hampered severely when industry segments fail to cooperate in locating herds where reactors have been found. The seriousness of the disease warrants that producer and related interests work together for the benefit of the livestock in-

dustry. Working with the TAHC in a cooperative educational program on brucellosis eradication are the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Farm Bureau and Texas Agricultural Ex-

Although the TAHC has the authority to quarantine entire herds as well as adjacent areas when the situation warrants it, the general policy is to quarantine only the group of cattle where the infected animal was located.

The eradication program is hampered severely when industry segments fail tocooperate in locating herds where reactors have been found. The seriousness of the disease warrants that producer and related interests work together for the benefit of the livestock in-

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

CONSTITUTIONAL AMEND. MENTS - STATE

Texas voters approved on April 22, 1975, two constitutional amendments: (a) compensation and expenses of members of legislature; during the sessions and (b) state and local retirement systems. The first of these amendments mentioned above substituted new language reads as follows:

ARTICLE III Sec. 24, Compensation and expenses of members of Legislature; duration of sessions.

Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury a salary of Six Hundred Dollars (600) per month. Each member shall also receive a per diem of Thirty Dollars (\$30) for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage at the same rate as prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas. This amendment takes effect on April 22, 1975. (Approved by voters at election held A. pril 22, 1975.)

This amendment also repealed the following sections of Article III:

(1) 48a, Funds for Retirement Disability and Death Benefits For Employees Of Public Schools, Colleges, as also may be authorized by law. (3) Each statewide benefit

system must have a board

of trustees to administer the system and to invest the funds of the system in such securities as the board may consider prudent investments. In making investments, a board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing that persons of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence ex-

ercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income there-from as well as the probable safety of their capital. The legislature by law may further restrict the investment discretion of a

board. (4) General laws establishing retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers ineffect at the time of the adoption of this section remain in effect subject to the general powers of the legislature extablished

in the subsection. (b) State Retirement Systems. (1) The legislature shall establish by law a Teacher Retirement System of Texas to provide benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the state. Other employees may be included under the system by

(2) The legislature shall establish by law an Employees Retirement System of Texas to provide benefits for officers and employees of the state and such statecompensated officers and employees of appellate courts and judicial districts as may be included under the

system by law.

(3) The amount contributed by a person participating in the Employees Retirement System of Texas of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be established by the legislature but may not be less than six percent of current compensation. The amount contributed by the state may not be less than six percent nor more than 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals participating in the system. In an emergency, as determined by the governor, the legislature may appropriate such additional sums as are actuarially determined to be required to fund benefits authorized by

(c) Local Retirement Systems. (1) The legislature shall provide by law for:

(A) The cration by any cior county of a system of

benefits for its officers and employees; (A) The creation by any city or county of a system of

benefits for its officers and employees; (B) A statewide system of benefits for the officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the state in which counties or other political subdivisions may voluntarily

participate; and (C) A statewide system of benefits for officers and employees of cities in which cities may voluntarily participate.

(2) Benefits under these systems must be reasonably related to participant tenure and contributions.

(d) Judicial Retirement System. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the system of retirement, disability, and survivors' benefits heretofore established in the constitution or by law for justices, judges, and commissioners of the appellate courts and judges of the district and criminal district courts is continued in effect. Contributions required and benefits payable are to be as provided by law.

(2) General administration of the Judicial Retirement System of Texas is by the Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas under such regulations as may be provided by law.

(e) Anticipatory Legislation. Legislation enacted in anticipation of this amendment is not void because it is anticipatory. (Approved by voters at election held April 22, 1975.)

This amendment also repealed the following sections of Article XVI:

(1) Section 62 - State and County Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Funds

(2) Section 63 - Teacher and Employees Retirement Systems, Service Credit

In summary, the two amendments approved by the voters on April 22, 1975 will on April 22, 1975 increase state legislators' salaries from \$4,800 to \$6,000 per year and increase per diem from \$12.00 per dayfor the first 120 days of regular sessions, and 30 days for special sessions, to \$30.00 per day for all sessions and a 140-day limit on regular sessions. The a. mendments also provided for an increase in mileage pay to state legislators from 10 cents a mile for travel to the same rate prescribed by law for employees of the state. The new amendment has no limits on the number of miles. State employ-

ees are receiving 12 cents

per mile for travel in per-

sonal car within the state. State legislatros are to receive 16 cents per mile for travel in their own airplane within and without the state. These rates are established in the general appropriation bill each two years. Rates are being reviewed at present for the two fiscal years beginning on September 1, 1975 and 1976. The law directing the state legislature to establish travel rates is

Article 2823a section 3(b). Amendments to state and local retirement systems will result in the state legislature's largely determining the provisions of retirements plans and fewer stated restrictions in the Constitution.

JOB RIGHTS The DAILY WORLD, the mouthpiece of the American Communist Party, often uses the phrase, "right to a job." The latest reference to this subject was in the April 26 edition under the heading of "Right To A Job Insured by USSR Constitution."

Man's material progress is equaled to natural resources, plus human energy, (both physical and mental) multiplied by tools. a row at a time. The point of this discussion is that there are many Americans today who think that government should guarantee each individual a job. The simple truth is that when government guarantees each a job, it removes his personal freedom and abundant production. For example, the WALL STREET JOURNAL, May 7, 1975 reported that fertilizer concerns are predicting a halt to the increased use of fertilizers. The reduced use of fertilizer is certainly to result in less food. This will in turn force more people to attempt to produce food.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMEND.

The Equal Rights Amendment is designed to remove from the Constitution the equal rights women now have and place that determination in the hands of Congress. The first section of the proposed amendment definitely states the equal rights principles but the second section also says, "as determined by Congress." (See FACTS FOR YOU, pgs. 97-

MEAT IMPORT AGREE-

The U.S. Government has completed its negotiation with major meat importing countries. These countries have voluntarily agreed to restrict shipments of meat to the United States to 1.18 billion lbs., carcass equivalent, this year. This amount of meat would be about 100 million lbs. more than imported last year and 176 million lbs. below the record level imported. The largest importers, Australia and New Zealand, have agreed to limit shipments to 615 and 253 million lbs., respectively.

Social Security taxes must be raised to 17 per cent trustees concluded.

The Ford administration today will forecast that the \$56 billion fund for paying retirement and disability benefits will be exhaused by 1983 without higher payroll levies. It will recomment a long-range increase of 5.3 percentage points, almost double the increase trustees called for a year ago, in the current combined payroll levy of 11.7 per cent on em-

ployers and employees. Social Security officials believe the financing problem is manageable in the short run by an infusion of more money and in the long run by a restructuring of the benefits system.

The Social Security trustees, the Secretaries of Labor, Treasury and HEW, predicted nearly a doubling of the system's long-range deficit.
