July Rains Set All Time Record

Rains Big Help To Crops

This July have set time record total month, and right now are excellent for crop harvest this year. July 17, total month now stands at 5.36 inches off-record in Tahoka.

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More than a week of rain damaged or ruined a number of crops in parts of the Grassland, and old areas, with more damage over in sandy principally US Highway 380.

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on Saturday and Sunday, July 19 and 20, and 1.48 on Monday, July 21, followed by .02 on Thursday, and .98 on Friday and Saturday morning for a total of 6.76 for the month. Some county areas doubtless had much more rain, some a little less. Total for the year here so far is 14.46 inches, exactly four inches above the normal for the first seven months.

Previous high for the month of July was in 1960 when 6.59 inches was recorded. Last year only .47 inch was recorded in July. Least ever recorded in July was .02 in 1930 and .05 in 1970. The 45 year average for the month is 2.15 inches.

Some people on the street have been arguing about when the heaviest rains came here. According to the local observer's records, Tahoka received 10.93 in June 1913, 10.11 in August 1972, 11.09 in May 1941, an all-time record of 13.58 in September 1936. The torrential rain at Wilson and NewHome the last of May, 1931 and the big one at Draw in July 1955, probably exceeded these rain records. Heavy downpours and hail about June 22 flooded the Newmoore Wells area wiping out many crops, but replanted.

Year 1974, a poor one for crops, though, had total rainfall of 21.52 inches, but 14.31 of that came in August, September and October.

The big year for crops, 1973, had only 16.43 inches of rain, but the year before 1972, the total had been 30.54 inches.

In addition to hail this year, many farmers were hurt by high winds and sifting sand, believe it or not, which followed immediately after rains that set off or burned cotton when fields were too wet to run sand-fighters.

Local people received a mild scare Sunday afternoon July 20, when a twister appeared southwest of town,

but the funnel only dipped down in the T-Bar pasture and did no damage. Again, last Thursday, a funnel was reported north of Tahoka but no damage was reported.

Some of the farmers out east receiving the latest hail damage included Bob Haney, Steve Greer, Vernon Lusk, Sam Edwards, Roy LeMond, the former Roy Appling farm John Curry, Freddie Martin, and Walter Dubree.

Outdoors in Texas

Trotling for channel catfish in lakes around the state is one of the most popular sports in Texas... but it's also hard work. A few tips before you head to the lake can be a great help. First, channels are hard to tell from blue cats, especially after they get older and the spots disappear. One sure way: count the rays on the anal fin (that's the fin on the bottom of the fish, just in front of the tail)... A channel will have from 24 to 29, and a blue will always have 30 or more. When setting the trotline, the mainline (or bull-line) should be heavy (400 lb. test or so) with 2-0 hooks attached to 12 to 24 inches of staging. Large shiners, small perch, crawfish, or liver are just some of the good trotline baits. **TIP OF THE WEEK:** Many fishermen have drowned running their trotlines alone. Keep a knife handy, and watch those hooks.

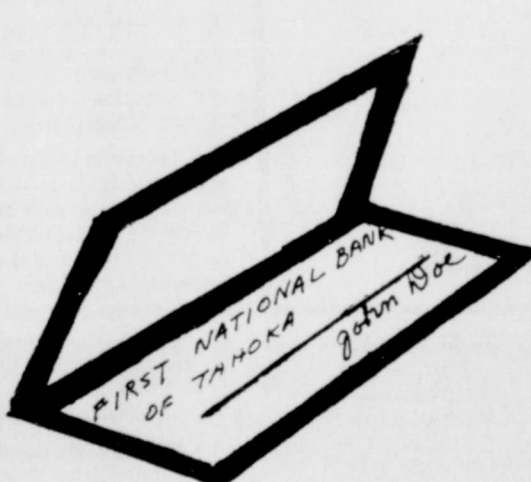

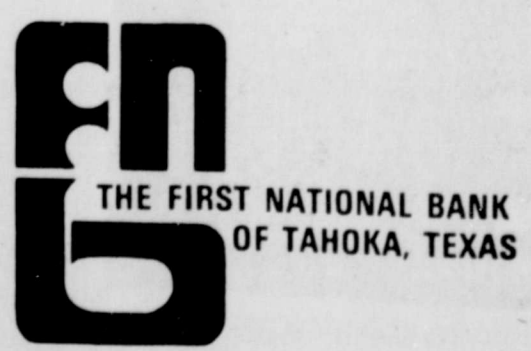

WORDS OF WARNING SOLZHENITSYN

Alexander Solzhenitsyn, a Nobel prize winner, in his first major public address since his exclusion from Russia in 1974, warned America of the dangers of Communism. The 90 minute address was delivered extemporaneously in Russian. The entire speech is printed in U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT of July 14, 1975, beginning on page 44. The editors emphasize the following basic points:

(1) "At the height of Stalin's terror, more than 40,000 per month" were executed.

(2) "Communists have become more clever. They do not say, 'We're going to bury you' anymore. Now they say, 'Detente.'"

(3) "The situation in the world is not just dangerous. It is catastrophic."

(4) "One capitulation after another" by the West.

(5) Vietnam: "A million persons will be exterminated."

(6) Ten years in prison for saying there are good roads in America."

(7) "Detente has to be based on a firm foundation -- not on smiles, not on verbal concessions."

(8) "The communist leaders respect only firmness, and have contempt and laugh at persons who continually retreat."

(9) "You're denfiding yourselves" by helping those persecuted by Russia.

(10) "In the Soviet Union today, Marxism has fallen so low it's simply an object of contempt."

(U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT, "Solzhenitsyn - Words of Warning to America", July 14, 1975).
