### Senator Speaks At Rotary Club

State Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock was speaker at Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday noon, and in his talk explained some of the action of the last Texas Legislature and reviewed briefly the proposed new Constitution up to voters in the Nov. 4 election.

He said 3,400 bills were introduced in the last legislative session, and declared a majority of them were not passed. He thinks legislators should be judged more on the bills they killed than on those passed.

Kent pointed out that 15 of the 31 Senators are from the cities there will be 18 or 31 next session), which makes it very difficult to put over legislation favorable to the rural areas.

As a member of the Senate finance committee, he said he and other tried to make sure the taxpayer's dollar will be well spent.

Federal programs, he said, must be funded by matching amounts in most cases, by the state, and this makes financing difficult.

Hance said he is opposed to the way the food stamp program is being administered.

Texas is having trouble continuing its highway building program due to declining income from the gas tax and inflation, and the Highway Department is having to lay off many of its personnel.

He said he was opposed to most of the provisions in the proposed new Constitution, but thought Proposition 5 may be good for the farm and rural areas.

Mrs. Marrett is filing suit for the amount of \$250,000 damages, and \$75,000 each for the three children; Donna Sue, Mark Edward, James Dee, plus burial expenses. Total amount \$478,709.40.

Victim was Odis Dee Marrett and the accident was July 18, 1975.

The couple plans to live in New Orleans, La., where Burchett is enrolled in the graduate program of Tulane University School of Business.

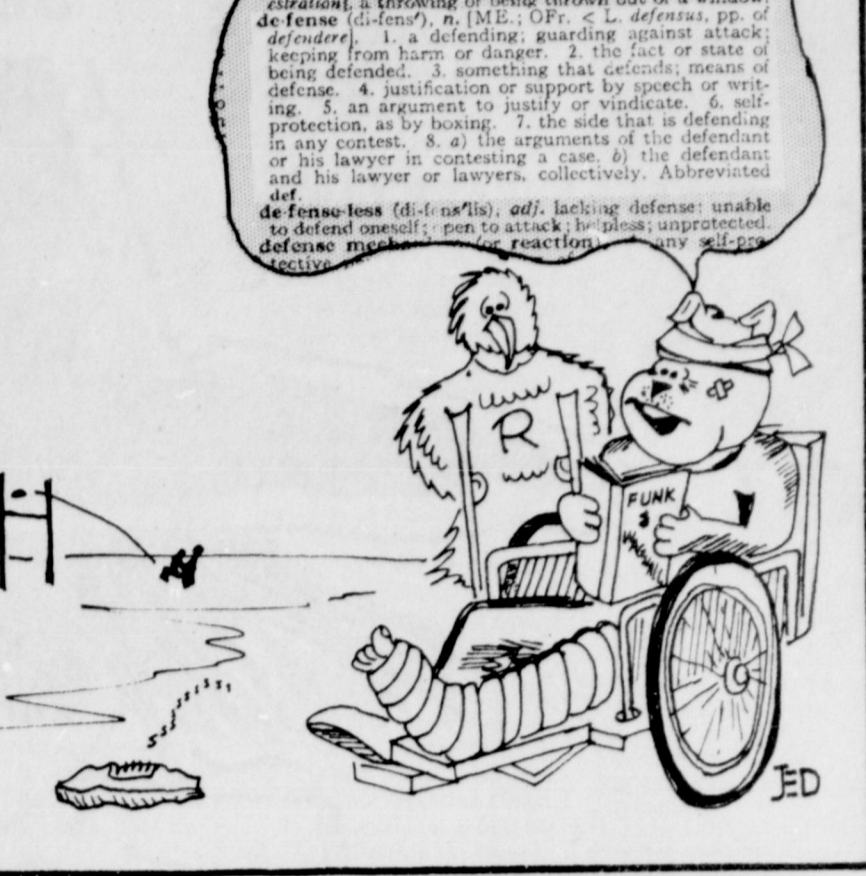

## No State Employees In County Laidoff

Inflation, declining revenues and a slow down in major construction has made it necessary for a reduction in personnel and the consolidation of some offices in the Lubbock District has been announced by Mr. George C. Wall, Jr., District Engineer, Lubbock, of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Mr. Wall said 55 employees of the Lubbock District payroll of 571 persons have been asked to find other employment prior to the end of this year.

The Resident Engineers office in Floydada will be combined with the Plainview office on November 1, 1975, and the work will be consolidated with the Plainview Residency under Mr. Merlin Bennett. The Lamesa residency was closed previously and all work in that area will be handled by Mr. Herschel C. Brown, Resident Engineer in Brownfield, Texas.

A 90 day study was conducted statewide by all the department's 25 districts and the Houston Urban office to assess work loads. The object of the study was to determine the number of people of pertinent skills needed to implement and carry out responsibilities in all phases of Departmental responsibility under available funding.

"All of the people who are being laid off have been notified and they are being given reasonable time to find other employment. We will assist each person in every way possible to secure other employment, or unemployment benefits for which they may be eligible", Wall said.

The department has been practicing a no hire policy hoping attrition would reduce personnel to the required level. At the beginning of the fiscal year, September 1, 1975, division and district budgets were formed on the basis of bare minimums for personnel, services and facilities.

The August and October letting of contracts for road repair and construction were not held due to lack of funds.

The Lubbock District encompasses 17 counties of the South and High Plains area, including a highway network of some 4,760 miles or 11,036 lane miles.

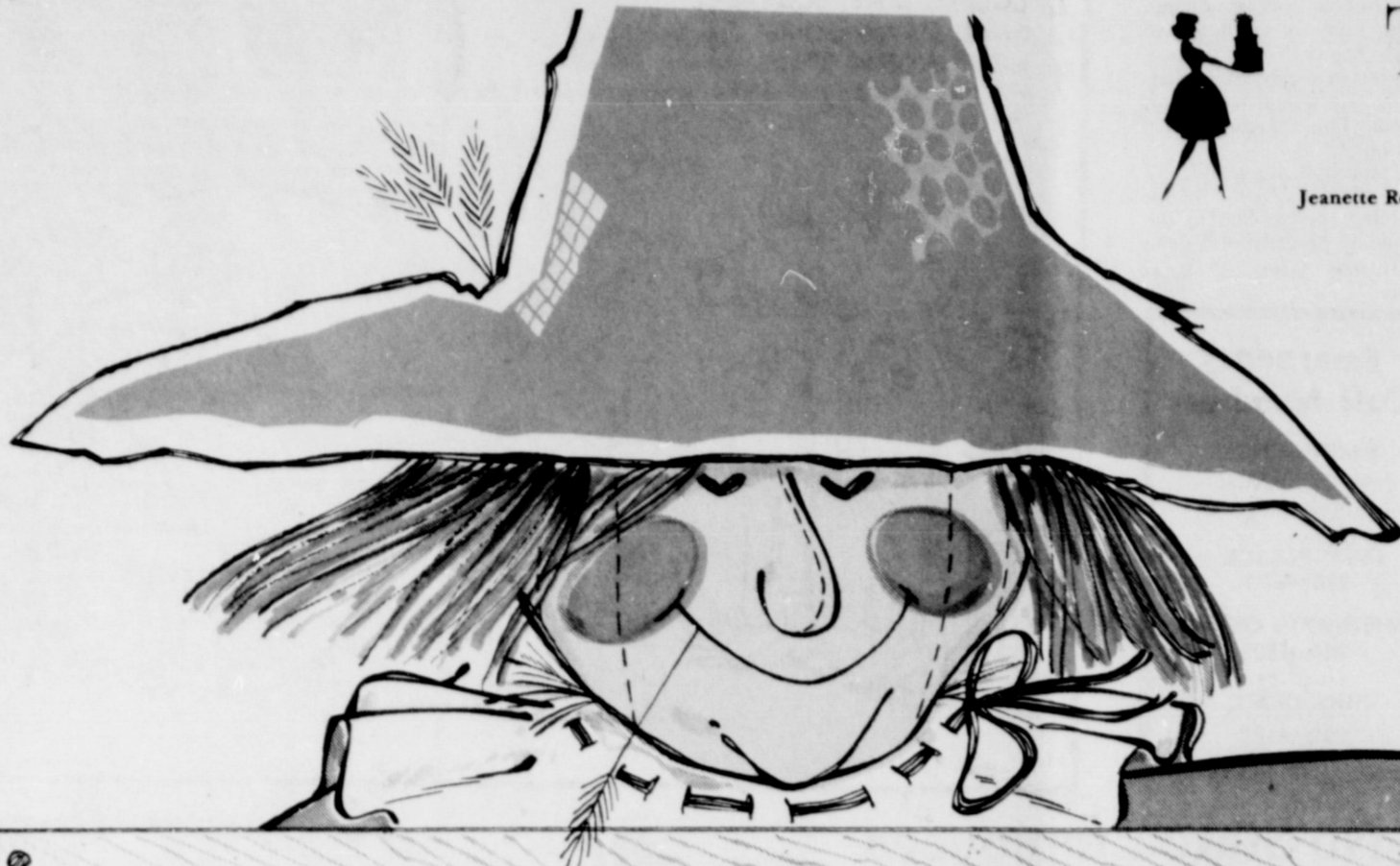

# Cherry Etheredge Says . . .

Unbasted turkeys offer holiday cook the convenience of convenience. Unbasted turkeys are U.S. Grade A birds with a limited (three per cent) of solution. As the bird solution is released throughout the meat, improving the texture and flavor. Basting solutions range from straight butter to mixtures of oil and water. Oils used are the same ones normally found in margarine --such as cottonseed, soy, coconut or corn oil.

The USDA approves these solutions under regulations for federally-inspected turkeys. It also protects consumers from fraud by requiring the label to state a basting solution has been added to self-basting turkeys.

Unbasted turkeys are also available. These birds don't have any basting solution to add weight, so they will "weigh in" lighter than a basted turkey of comparable size.

Unbasted turkeys will be just as good as self-basting ones--but more care in cooking is required.

Turkeys are a wise market choice all year, but consumers should take time to examine the turkey--choosing

one with firm flesh, free of blemishes. Also, read the label carefully and make the purchase a matter of choice, not chance.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's shield is a sign the bird is wholesome, that the poultry came from a healthy animal and was inspected throughout the packing operation.

## Jim Bob McAtee Is Buried Here

J.R. McAtee, Jr., formerly of Wilson and a prominent businessman of Henryetta, Okla., died last Thursday night in a hospital in that city following a long illness.

Following funeral rites Saturday in Henryetta, his body was brought here for burial "in the land he loved very much". Graveside rites were conducted at Tahoka Cemetery at 11 a.m. Monday by Rev. Frank Oglesby, First United Methodist Church pastor.

Familiarly known as "Jim Bob", McAtee was born at Junction, March 13, 1902, and came to Wilson with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James Robert McAtee, who operated a general mercantile store in Wilson during the 1920's.

He and Jimmie Cile Cobb were married in Plainview May 25, 1925. A resident of Henryetta for more than 40 years, he had owned several businesses, including a dress shop along with his wife. 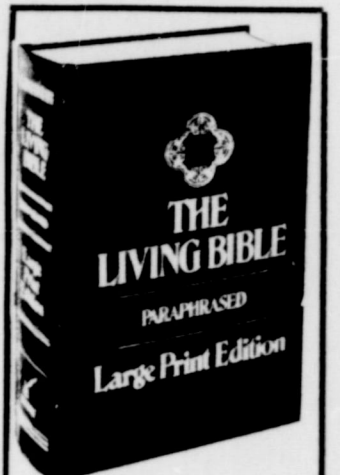

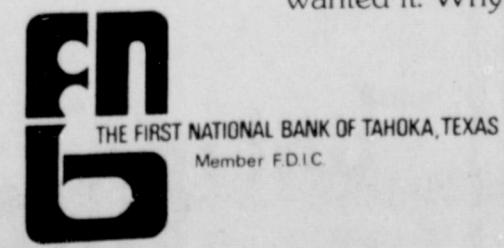
