Cotton Prices

Grower prices were \$1.00 lower to \$2.50 per bale higher during the week ending January 2, 1976 according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office. Farmers sold mixed new crop lots of mostly grades 32, 42, 52, 33 and 43, staples 29 and 30, mikes 3.0 through 4.9 for 46.00 to 47.00 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 32, 42, 52, 33 and 43, staples 29 and 30, mikes 3.0 through 4.9 brought 42.50 to 43.00 cents.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was moderate and growers offered new crop cotton in moderate volume, Dickson said.

Demand was moderate. Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from 80 - 100 dollars per ton, mostly 80 to 90 dollars.

Grades 42, 52 and 43 were the predominate grades classed this week. Grade 42 accounted for 38 percent and grade 52, 23 percent and 43 was 11 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to 36 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 29, 30 and 31 were the predominate lengths. Staple 29 amounted to 16 percent; staple 30, 34 percent; and staple 31, 27 percent.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to two percent of the total.

Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for three percent; 3.0 through 3.2 range 16 percent; mike 2.7 through 2.9, 39 percent; and 2.6 and below, 40 percent.

Samples classed at Lubbock totaled 661,000. This compares with 609,000 on the same date last season, the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Friday.

Tax On Telephone Bills Reduced

The excise tax on telephone bills will be reduced 1 per cent -- from 7 to 6 per cent -- beginning January 1, 1976, as a result of the fourth step of a 10 year reduction.

The tax elimination was enacted as part of the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment Act of 1970 calling for successive 1 per cent reductions in the excise tax on telephone bills on the first of each year, until the tax expires on December 31, 1981.

General Telephone customers paid an estimated \$2.1 million less in Federal Excise Taxes on telephone bills during 1975 because of

the 1 per cent reduction in the tax beginning January 1, 1975.

Based on the 1975 excise tax of 7 per cent, General Telephone will have collected an estimated \$15 million from customers by the end of 1975.

The excise tax on telephone bills were first imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure. Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was reinstated during the depression and has continued ever since at varying rates as high as 15 per cent on local service and 25 per cent on long distance calls. From 1954 until 1971, it stood at 10 per cent.

Burleson For Re-Election

Congressman Omar Burleson, who represents the 17th District of Texas in the United States House of Representatives, has announced for re-election. He has filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary Election on May 1, 1976.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House. In addition, Congressman Burleson served on the newly created Budget Control Committee which has, as its purpose, relating Federal expenditures to Federal revenues with the goal of reaching a balanced budget.

Health Agency Public Comment

South Plains Health Systems is holding a public hearing on a \$250,000 application for designation and funding as the Health Systems Agency for the 15 county South Plains Region. Written comments from all interested persons are solicited for the January 5 hearing in the Community Room of the George and Helen Mahon Library in Lubbock's new Civic Center.

The application is available for review and copying at 1217 Avenue K. SPHS Board members, representing all areas of the region, have copies of the application should anyone in the non - metropolitan areas wish to contact the representatives from his own county.

SPHS Board members voted to authorize up to \$35,000 as the annual salary for the chief executive officer of the new health planning agency. The Health Systems Agency, when fully designated, will make local grants of up to \$1 per capita for developing new health services.

Congressional aides have been quoted as saying that the new Health Systems Agency is the last chance for local determination of planning for health services. The aides said that, if the local agencies are not successful, then in the future HEW will control all of health services in the nation.

Public attendance and participation is invited and encouraged at the hearing. Oral testimony and written comments will be taken into consideration before the final application is approved on January 8, 1976.

Industrial Growth To Bolster SWPS Economy

Industrial growth and job opportunities should continue to bolster the economy of the Southwestern Public Service Company service area, an existing industry survey conducted by the public utility company reveals.

53% of the 280 industries surveyed planned to expand their plant facilities some during the next five years with 57% of the total respondents saying they would add to their number of employees. A reasonable number of new jobs created by the survey would be 2500", Mlinar, Southwestern president, said. "In addition, our Area Development Department said it is reasonable to expect another 2000 - 2500 new jobs from existing industries which, for one reason or another, didn't respond to the survey and new industries coming to the region", he added. Mlinar pointed out that the area's unemployment

rate, ranges from 50 to 60 percent of that of the national average. "More than 25% of the companies who said they didn't plan to expand cited labor supply as the reason. An increased number of available skilled workers could very well improve the industrial expansion picture in the region, and we are going to work on some programs with communities and industries in our region to see what steps can be taken to make the labor supply picture more attractive to additional growth", Mlinar said.

Finally, Mlinar said availability of electric energy was never mentioned as a deterrent to expansion and he pointed out that the electric company proposes to invest nearly \$400 - million in new facilities in the next five years to assure the region of the energy for economic opportunity.

Southwestern serves more than 250,000 electric customers in parts of four states, Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Tularemia In Area

Dr. Dean Evers, D.V.M., Public Health Veterinarian with Public Health Region 2, asks that the public be notified that human cases of Tularemia have occurred recently in the South Plains area. One of the cases, occurring in Lubbock, did result in death to the patient infected.

Tularemia is a disease that can be transmitted from infected wild animals to man. The contact with infected animals, usually rabbits, comes when the hunter handles or dresses the game he kills. Another source of infection for Tularemia is transmission by vectors, such as ticks or fleas, that can carry the disease form the infected animal to man.

The rabbit population is unusually high this year and many hunters will be adding rabbit stew to the menu. Dr. Evers stresses that hunters should be warned not to dress or handle animals with bare hands. Rubber or plastic gloves in good condition should be used. The raw meat should not be handled without protection until it is thoroughly cooked. In addition, care should be taken to see that the raw meat is not exposed to other meats.

Tularemia causes symptoms of acute illness soon after exposure. There is a sudden onset of headache, chills, nausea, vomiting and high temperature. Confirmed diagnosis can be made only through laboratory tests.

Thelma received her nurses training in the Prohl Clinic Hospital and received her LVN degree in Austin, she worked two years with Dr. Cole in the Lynn County Hospital. Some of the services available to home bound Medicare patients upon orders of the attending physician, are surgical dressings, catheterizations, catheter irrigations: injections, insertion of stomach tubes, intravenouses, vena puncture for blood analysis, monitoring blood pressure, and other vital signs exercises, training in ambulation, physical therapy, speech therapy, enemas, sitz baths, and teaching family members to care for patients, this nursing care is not a continuous service but an intermittent service once a day, two or three times a week, or what ever the Dr. advises. It is noted that home bound patients requiring care need skilled services. The West Texas Home Health Agency provide these services to patients confined to their homes because of illness or injury, after treatment in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, to help avoid an inpatient stay. Thelma says she enjoys the work and feels that it is a very important and helpful work.

JUSTIFIED BY FAITH (PART 1)

"Wherefore, that we are justified by faith only is most wholesome doctrine, and very full of comfort. Article 9 of the 'Articles of Religion'."

The above quotation from a denomination "discipline" teaching salvation by "faith only" sound Bible doctrine as long as we understand that "SAVING FAITH IS OBEDIENT FAITH". The denominations teaching the "faith only" doctrine err from the truth in that they believe salvation by faith excludes obedience. Hebrews Chapter 11 explains obedient faith. Verse 8 states "By FAITH Abraham, when he was called, OBEYED by going out to a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out not knowing where he was going." Faith which lacks obedience is no saving faith. (John 12:42, 43)

What is faith? Faith is simply what one believes as a result of testimony. The Old and New Testaments are books of testimony -- "These things are written that ye may believe." (John 20:30, 31) Hebrews 11:1 explains that faith is the assurance of things hoped for, a conviction of things not seen." This means that faith assures us and convicts us of things we can not see. I never knew George Washington, yet by faith in history I am convinced that he was our first President.

Often people become confused and fail to differentiate "faith" from "opinion". "Well, I believe ----" cannot take the place of "The Bible says ----". (1 Peter 4:11; 2 Peter 1:18 - 21) More to follow.
