Defensive Drivers Course To Be Held

A Defensive Drivers Course will be held February 16, 17, 19 at the First Baptist Church, Tahoka from 7 - 10 p.m. each night. It will be held by Mr. Bert Sinclair, Texas Dept. of Public Safety. Lubbock. It is sponsored by the Education Committee of the Lynn County Home Demonstration Council. This course is an eight hour course. It will begin at 7:00 and will be over by 10:00.

The council has made arrangements for baby sitters to be on hand to keep the children of those who want to attend and need this

It must be stressed that we need 50 people each night or Mr. Sinclair will not be able to complete the teaching of this course. Those who complete the course will be able to accept a 10% reduction on their family - type automobile insurance. For drivers under age 25 who have Drivers Training, their 10% reduction will stop at age 25, but the reduction for this Defensive Driving Course will not run out. However, please check with your insurance company for

One must pre - register for this course by going by the County Extension Office in Tahoka on or before February 9. The fee will be \$2.00, (\$1.00 for book and \$1.00 for registration fee). No test will be given, one must be present for all three nights in order to be eligible

The Bicentennial pecan is called a Liberty Tree after the famous elm in colonial Boston under which the first act of public resistance occured in 1765 - the hanging in effigy of a newly appointed stamp tax officer. This tree was a symbol of resistance to British rule. and many towns planted or dedicated their own Liberty

Bulldogs Win First Half

Tahoka's Bulldogs cinched the first half of District 5AA Basketball play with a convincing 77-65 Victory over the Roosevelt Eagles Friday night, giving the Bulldogs a 6-0 record in District play.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 22 - 18 first quarter lead led by 10, 40 - 30 at half time, led 60 - 44 at the end of the 3rd quarter. And held on through the 4th quarter to win by a 12 point margin.

Earnest Bailey tossed in 26 points, followed by David Graves with 20. The Bulldogs hit 58'% from the field and 75 % from the free throw line.

The Bulldogs start the second half of District play Friday night, January 30 hosting the Slaton Tigers. Four of the Bulldogs 6 District games in this half will be played at home. playing Post & Cooper away. The Post game will be played at Post Tues. Feb. 3. and will be a key game for the Bulldogs, so all fans are urged to go to Post and give the Bulldogs all your backing.

Eagles Defeat Tahoka

Lubbock Christian took the rubber match of its three - games series with Tahoka. overcoming a first - quarter deficit with a strong second and third periods and then holding on in the final quarter for a 68 - 65 victory

at the LCC Fieldhouse. LCHS raised its record to 25 - 2 with the win, while Tahoka is now 20 - 2, both of its losses to Lubbock

Christian. Both teams ran from the opening tipoff and the contest became ragged at times, the Eagles committing 31 turnovers and

Tahoka 14.

The Bulldogs began as if they were going to make easy work of things, getting eight straight points late in the first quarter to take a 14 -10 advantage and building that to an eight - point lead at 26 - 18 midway through the second period.

But Lubbock Christian then rallied, outscoring Tahoka 12 - 2 over the next three minutes to grab a 30 -28 lead, and the Eagles never trailed after that.

The winners raced to a six - point advantage early in the third quarter, but Tahoka came back to within a point at 39 - 38 before the Eagles exploded.

After a follow shot by Tahoka's Tommy Botkin, LCHS reeled off five more points in a row and was on top at the end of the period 52 - 42.

The clubs traded baskets for most of the fourth period before Tahoka put on a late rally to make things close.

A pair of free throws by Danny Moore, a driving layup off the fast break by David Graves and a short bank shot from the left by Botkin pulled the visitors to

within three points at 66 - 63 with 33 seconds left in the contest.

But Condor got an easy layup with Tahoka's defense spread out at the 0:17 mark to wrap up the game for Lubbock Christian

The Eagles, getting a lot of close - in shots off the break, hit 33 of 54 attempts from the field for 61.1 per cent, while Tahoka sank 27 of 60 for 45 per cent. The visitors hit 55.4 per cent in the first half, while LCHS hit

Cotton Prices

Grower prices were \$2.50 lower to \$2.50 per bale higher during the week ending January 23, according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing office. Farmers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 33, 43, 53, 44 and 54; staples 30 through 32; mikes 3.0 and lower for 39.00 to 42.00 cents per pound. Mixed lost of mostly grades 51, 42 and 52; staples 30 through 32, mikes 2.9 and lower brought 42.00 to 43.50

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was active and growers offered new crop cotton in moderate volume. Dickson said.

Demand was good. Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from 80 -100 dollars per ton, mostly 80 - 90 dollars.

Grades 51, 42 and 52 were the predominate grades classed this week. Grade 51

accounted for 13 percent. grade 42, 24 percent and 52 was 24 percent also. Bark reductions were assigned to 45 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 30, 31 and 33 were the predominate lengths. Staple 30 amounted to 30 percent; staple 31, 24 percent; and staple 33, 10

percent. Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to one percent of the total. Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for two percent; 3.0 through 3.2 range 10 percent; mike 2.7 through 2.9, 33 percent; and

2.6 and below 54 percent. Pressly tests indicated breaking strengths at Lubbock averaged 83,000 pounds per square inch.

High Plains samples classed totaled 18,000 for the week. Seasons total stands at 1,190,000. Total on this same date last year was 1.063,000, the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Friday.

Internal parasites - worms continue to burden cattle producers in Texas.

Internal parasites have been abundant this fall and winter for a number of reasons. Overstocking of pastures due to increased cattle numbers and reluctance of cattle producers to sell animals at depressed prices causes increased numbers of parasite eggs to be deposited. Poor nutrition due to the short pastures caused by dry weather lessens the ability of cattle to cope with parasite burdens in thier bodies.

Cattle severly affected with worms may show diarrhea and loss of condition. Most may not exhibit obvious signs but do not gain weight as expected. Internal parasites rob the host of protein and red cells from the blood, thus making the host more susceptible to other infections. The parasites also interfere with normal digestion of feed so that the host is not able to get maximum value from forage eaten. In addition, feed moves more rapidly through the gut, allowing a smaller portion of it to be absorbed into the body.

An adequate program for the control of internal parasites requires more than just the giving of occasional doses of worm medicine.

A pasture rotation program is important to allow sunlight, heat and time to kill a large portion of the immature larvae found in the pasture. Renovation of pastures usually provides greater amounts of forage as well as stirring the soil and killing many of the larvae




