Pecan is the state tree of Texas, and "Tejas" (the Spanish word for Texas) is a new variety which grows well throughout the state and produces abundant shade and tasty fruit.

The Bicentennial pecan is called a Liberty Tree after the famous elm in colonial Boston under which the first act of public resistance occurred in 1765 - the hanging in effigy of a newly-appointed stamp tax officer. This tree was a symbol of resistance to British rule, and many towns planted or dedicated their own Liberty trees.

The citizens of Lynn County are urged to attend this special ceremony as part of the Bicentennial celebration.

Tahoka's Bulldogs cinched the first half of District SAA Basketball play with a convincing 77-65 Victory over the Roosevelt Eagles Friday night, giving the Bulldogs a 6-0 record in District play.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 22-18 first quarter lead led by 10, 40-30 at half time, led 60-44 at the end of the 3rd quarter. And held on through the 4th quarter to win by a 12 point margin.

Earnest Bailey tossed in 26 points, followed by David Graves with 20. The Bulldogs hit 58% from the field and 75% from the free throw line.

The Bulldogs start the second half of District play Friday night, January 30 hosting the Slaton Tigers. Four of the Bulldogs 6 District games in this half will be played at home, playing Post & Cooper away. The Post game will be played at Post Tues, Feb. 3, and will be a key game for the Bulldogs, so all fans are urged to go to Post and give the Bulldogs all your backing.

## Eagles Defeat Tahoka 68-65

Lubbock Christian took the rubber match of its three - games series with Tahoka, overcoming a first - quarter deficit with a strong second and third periods and then holding on in the final quarter for a 68-65 victory at the LCC Fieldhouse.

LCHS raised its record to 25-2 with the win, while Tahoka is now 20-2, both of its losses to Lubbock Christian.

Both teams ran from the opening tipoff and the contest became ragged at times, the Eagles committing 31 turnovers and Tahoka 14.

The Bulldogs began as if they were going to make easy work of things, getting eight straight points late in the first quarter to take a 14-10 advantage and building that to an eight - point lead at 26-18 midway through the second period.

But Lubbock Christian then rallied, outscoring Tahoka 12-2 over the next three minutes to grab a 30-28 lead, and the Eagles never trailed after that.

The winners raced to a six - point advantage early in the third quarter, but Tahoka came back to within a point at 39-38 before the Eagles exploded. After a follow shot by Tahoka's Tommy Botkin, LCHS reeled off five more points in a row and was on top at the end of the period 52-42.

The clubs traded baskets for most of the fourth period before Tahoka put on a late rally to make things close.

A pair of free throws by Danny Moore, a driving layup off the fast break by David Graves and a short bank shot from the left by Botkin pulled the visitors to

within three points at 66-63 with 33 seconds left in the contest.

But Condor got an easy layup with Tahoka's defense spread out at the 0:17 mark to wrap up the game for Lubbock Christian.

The Eagles, getting a lot of close - in shots off the break, hit 33 of 54 attempts from the field for 61.1 per cent, while Tahoka sank 77 of 60 for 45 per cent. The visitors hit 55.4 per cent in the first half, while LCHS hit 59 per cent.

The Eagles outrebounded Tahoka 36-27, with Fortner grabbing 13 boards, Yocham eight and Paine seven.

to detect symptoms of chronic diseases and therefore to prevent complications. The clinic, through screening tests, can detect chronic diseases early and then will refer the patient to a private physician which the patient chooses. There are qualified medical persons

working at the clinic. The clinic is located next to the dentist office and across the street from the bank in Tahoka.

At the present time, the clinic is set up for multiphase screening for adults. The following areas can be checked: blood pressure, weight, height, vision, hearing, malnutrition, chronic skin disorder, anemia, sickle cell, syphilis, diabetes, pap smear, TB skin test, dental and gonorrhea. A person has the choice of whether or not he wants one or every screening test completed. There is no charge for any screening test that is done for the patient. The tests are sent to Austin and results return to the clinic. The patient is contacted and results of the test are given. If the need arises, the patient is then referred to a private physician.

To have all the screening

test made, it takes approximately 30 minutes to one hour.

Other services included are immunizations, well - baby clinic, crippled children programs and referral on speech and hearing. As of now, the clinic can screen for the previous areas mentioned above.

The clinic is opened from 8 to 5, Monday through Friday and prefer to work on appointment basis. If you have a question, call the clinic at 998 - 4604 or drop by and visit with them. They are here as a service to Lynn County and will be happy to help in any way they can.

**Frosted Apricot Punch**

Mix & Chill: 1 64 - oz. can apricot nectar, 1 46 oz. can pineapple juice (unsweetened) 1 6 - oz. can frozen lemon concentrate, 1 qt. cold water.

At serving time, add 1 qt. chilled ginger ale & 1 qt. apricot sherbert. This yields 30 - 40 servings.

**Orange Slice Cookies**

2 cups shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups firmly packed brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoons soda, 3 tablespoons water, 3 eggs, 3 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 20 slices orange slice candy (cut up), 1 can angel flake coconut, 1 cup chopped pecans, 3 cups oatmeal (quick cooking type).

Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Mix the water & soda and add to cream mixture. Beat eggs and add. Sift flour & baking powder together & add. Add orange slices, coconut, pecans and oatmeal. Drop the cookie dough onto a greased cookie sheet & bake at 350 degrees 10 to 15 minutes.

**Impossible Coconut Pie**

4 eggs, 1 cup sugar, beat together till smooth, 1/2 cup self - rising flour, 2 cups sweet milk, 1 cup coconut, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 3/4 stick oleo. Mix together and pour into a well greased oblong baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until set.

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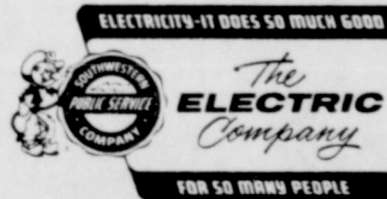

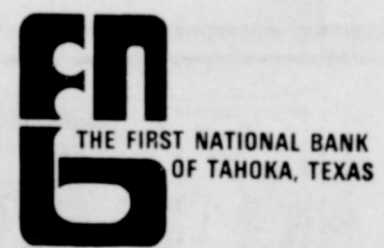


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#### JUSTIFIED BY FAITH (Part 3)

In Part 2 of this series we allowed the scriptures to explain that men acquire faith upon hearing the word of God (Acts 18:8), and not through a direct operation of the Holy Spirit (miraculous experience whereby one becomes a believer). The Spirit of God convinces one today through the Word. (John 20:31) We have been given the Word through New Testament authors inspired by the Holy Spirit. In Part 1 we explained how the Bible reveals that all faith is not saving faith or belief. (John 12:42; James 2:19) Saving faith is an obedient faith. (Heb. 11) It is not enough that we simply believe that Jesus is the son of God and that He died for our sins. We must, through this faith, be obedient to His Commandments. (1 John 2:4; 1 John 3:6) When we fail Him and sin, He is our advocate with the Father (1 John 2:1), provided we are willing to confess our sins (1 John 1:9). John 8:36 as rendered in the New American Standard version clearly reveals the necessity of obedience as a result of faith: "He who believes in the Son has eternal life; HE WHO DOES NOT OBEY THE SON SHALL NOT SEE LIFE; but the wrath of God abides in him."

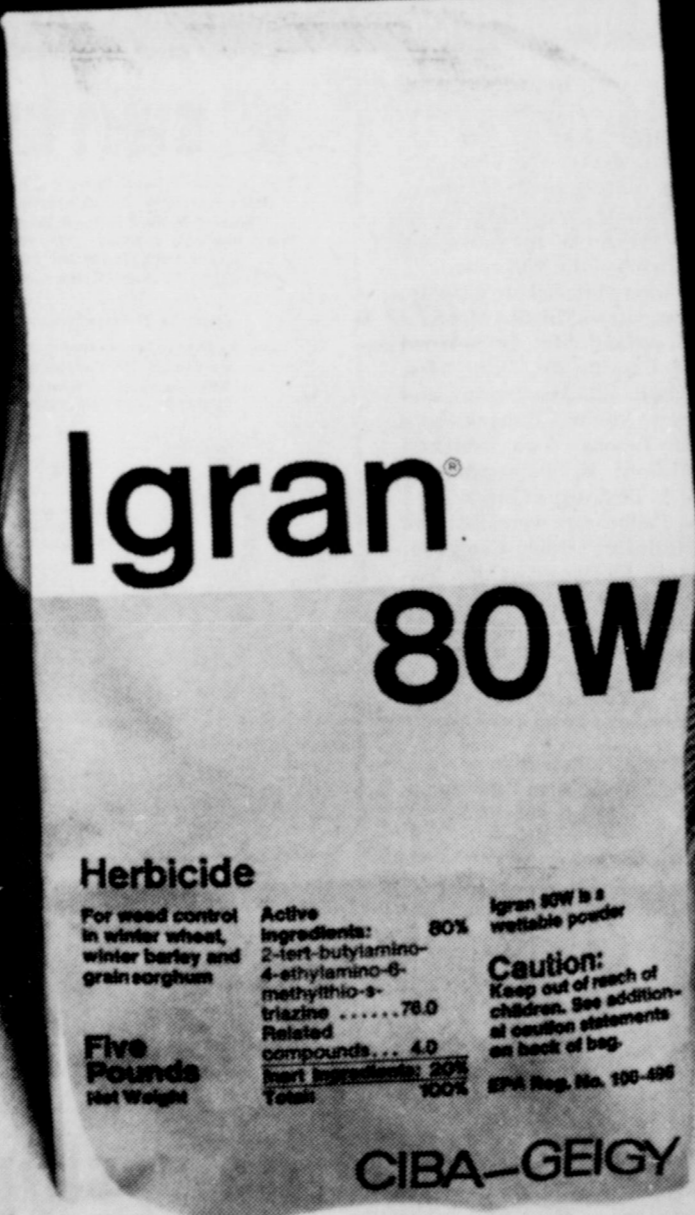

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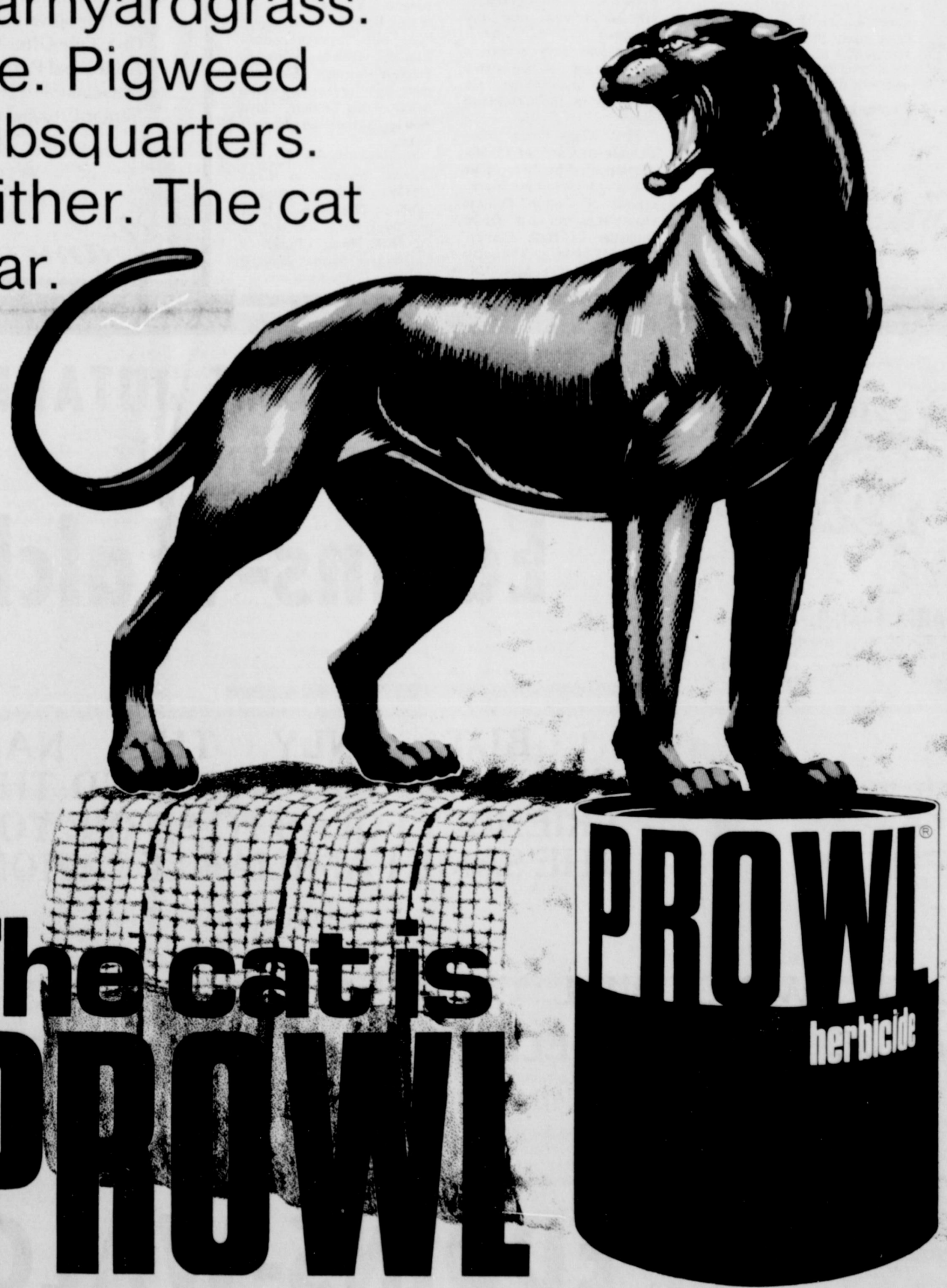
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## New Home News

### BILL GRIFFIN SAYS....

Internal parasites - worms - continue to burden cattle producers in Texas.

Internal parasites have been abundant this fall and winter for a number of reasons. Overstocking of pastures due to increased cattle numbers and reluctance of cattle producers to sell animals at depressed prices causes increased numbers of parasite eggs to be deposited. Poor nutrition due to the short pastures caused by dry weather lessens the ability of cattle to cope with parasite burdens in their bodies.

Cattle severely affected with worms may show diarrhea and loss of

condition. Most may not exhibit obvious signs but do not gain weight as expected. Internal parasites rob the host of protein and red cells from the blood, thus making the host more susceptible to other infections. The parasites also interfere with normal digestion of feed so that the host is not able to get maximum value from forage eaten. In addition, feed moves more rapidly through the gut, allowing a smaller portion of it to be absorbed into the body.

An adequate program for the control of internal parasites requires more than just the giving of occasional doses of worm medicine.

A pasture rotation program is important to allow sunlight, heat and time to kill a large portion of the immature larvae found in the pasture. Renovation of pastures usually provides greater amounts of forage as well as stirring the soil and killing many of the larvae there.

Producers need to realize that there are immature worms encysted in the wall of the stomach as well as adult worms in the gut.

While the worm medicine

does a good job of removing adult worms, it has little effect upon immature worms. With the removal of adult worms, the immature parasites complete their development and invade the gut, leaving the animal in about the same condition as originally. Therefore, a second dose of worm medicine is necessary three to four weeks following the first to do a thorough job of eliminating the parasites.

Products such as Trami-

sol, Thiabendazole and Lova are available for controlling internal parasites. But results will probably be obtained if these products are alternated so the parasites do not develop resistance to the drugs.

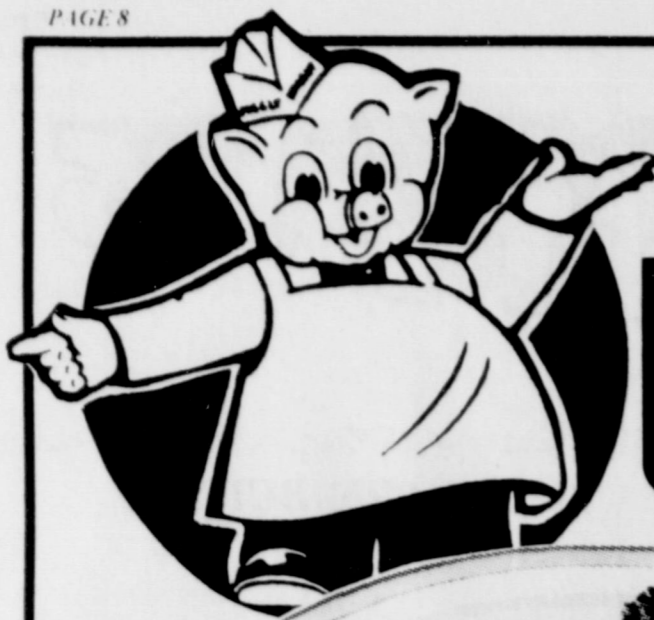

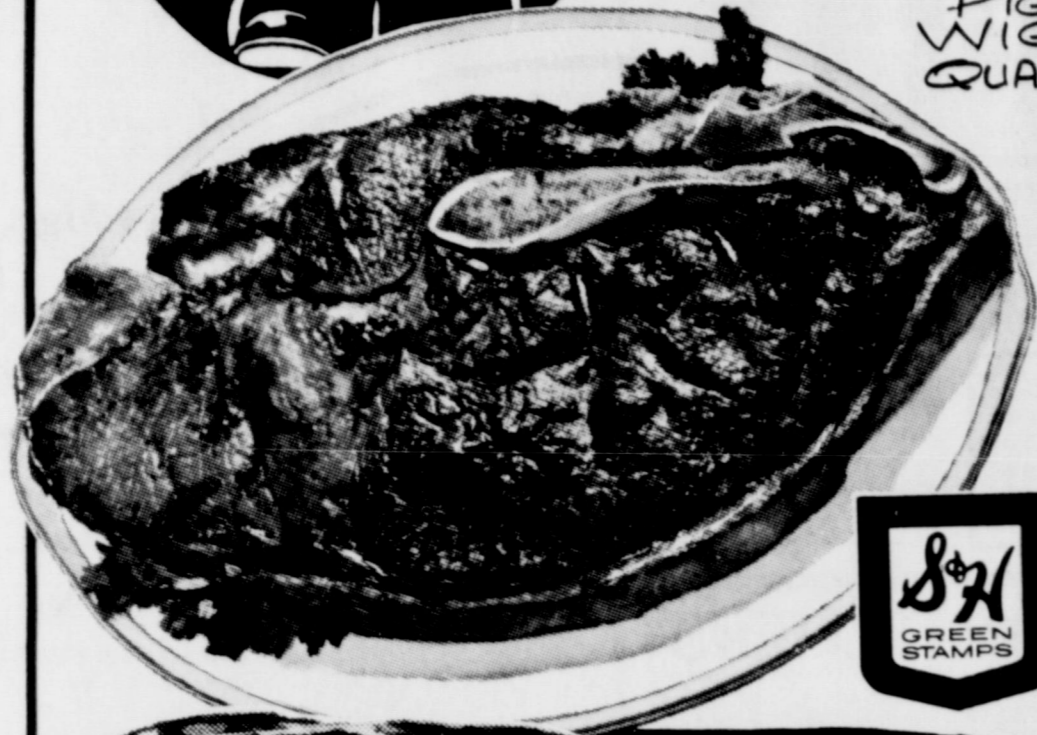

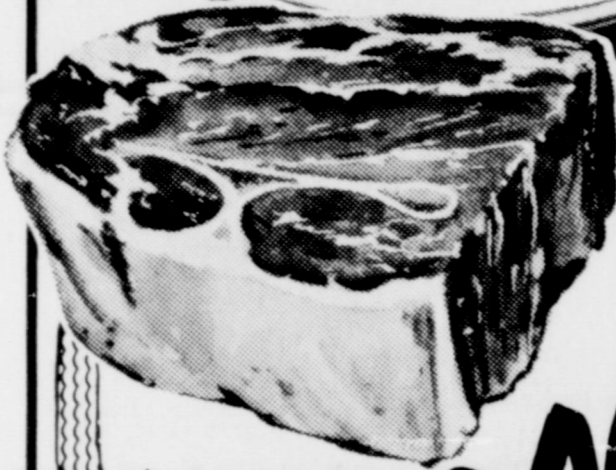
