Denver City Defeats Post

Friday, Feb. 6 the Bulldogs defeated D.C. 71 - 70 and Tues. Feb. 10, defeated the Frenship Tigers 85 - 61.

In the D.C. Game the Bulldogs eased into a 16 - 14 first quarter lead but with 41 seconds left in the first half D.C. took the lead for the first time 35 - 34 and led 37 - 34 at halftime. The Mustangs then stretched that lead to 8 points 59 - 51 after 3 quarters.

The Bulldogs came out strong in the 4th quarter scoring 11 quick points while holding the Mustangs to only one field goal. With 6:15 left in the game a jump shot by Tommy Botkin put the Bulldogs ahead 62 - 61. The teams then traded baskets until a jump shot by Earnest Bailey with 1:25 left put the Bulldogs ahead for good 71 - 70 the final score of the game. David Graves led the Bulldogs with 19 points. The Bulldogs hit 50 % from the field.

In the Frenship game the Bulldogs controlled the opening tip and from that point the game was never really close as the Bulldogs led 29 - 8 at the quarter mark 50 - 33 at halftime, 67 - 45 after three quarters and ended the game with two free shots after the final buzzer for an 85 - 61 victory. David Graves led all scorers with 36 points, hitting on 18 of 28 shots for a 64 % shooting percentage.

Tahoka two victories coupled with Denver City's 45 - 44 win over Post threw the 2nd half of District play into a three way tie involving Tahoka, D.C. and Post. The Bulldogs undefeated the first half can avoid a play-off by winning their remaining two games, playing Cooper at Cooper, Friday, Feb. 13th and hosting the Roosevelt Eagles, Tuesday, Feb. 17th.

Cotton Prices Are Mixed

Grower prices were \$5.00 per bale higher to \$1.25 lower during the week ending February 6, according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office. Farmers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 33, 43, 34 and 44; staples 28 and 29; mikes 3.2 and lower for 40.00 to 41.00 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 33, 43, 53, 34 and 44; staples 30 through 32; mikes 2.9 and lower brought 41.75 to 42.75 cents.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was active and growers offered new crop cotton in moderate volume, Dickson said.

Demand was good. Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from 80 - 100 dollars per ton, mostly 80 - 90 dollars.

Grades 51, 42 and 52 were the predominate grades classed this week in the Lubbock territory. Grade 51 accounted for 16 percent, grade 42, 41 percent and 52 was 22 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to 41 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 30, 31 and 32 were the predominate lengths. Staple 30 amounted to 40 percent; staple 31, 21 percent; and staple 32, 14 percent.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to one percent of the total. Mike group 3.3 through 3.4 accounted for none; 3.0 through 3.2 range three percent; mike 2.7 through 2.9, 30 percent; and 2.6 and below 66 percent.

High Plains samples classed totaled 9,200 for the week. Seasons total stands at 1,218,000. Total on this same date last year was 1,093,000, the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Friday.

SAYS....

Today's farmer is getting bigger and more highly capitalized. Since he's handling greater amounts of money in his everyday

operations, accurate farm records are becoming more important.

In addition to being just good business, farm records can help a farmer in event that the Internal Revenue Service audits his tax return. Complete records help a farmer file a more accurate tax return and limit his problems if an audit is made. Furthermore, farm credit

institutions are asking for more accurate profit and loss statements and net worth information when granting credit to farmers. As loans become larger, fewer credit institutions will grant credit without complete financial data. A simple financial statement is no longer sufficient.

Good financial management requires a monthly

cash flow statement so a farmer knows exactly how much money is coming in and going out. A complete record provides the basis for establishing a cash flow budget for the coming year. By doing this a farmer does not get into financial difficulty in meeting current operating expenses and debt payments.

A sound businessman makes an analysis of his business for the year, and good records allow the farmer to do the same. It's important to know how much money is being made and where the weaknesses are in a business before adjustments can be made to improve income.

Brown married the former Verna Lee Wilkins on Feb. 27, 1936, in Post.

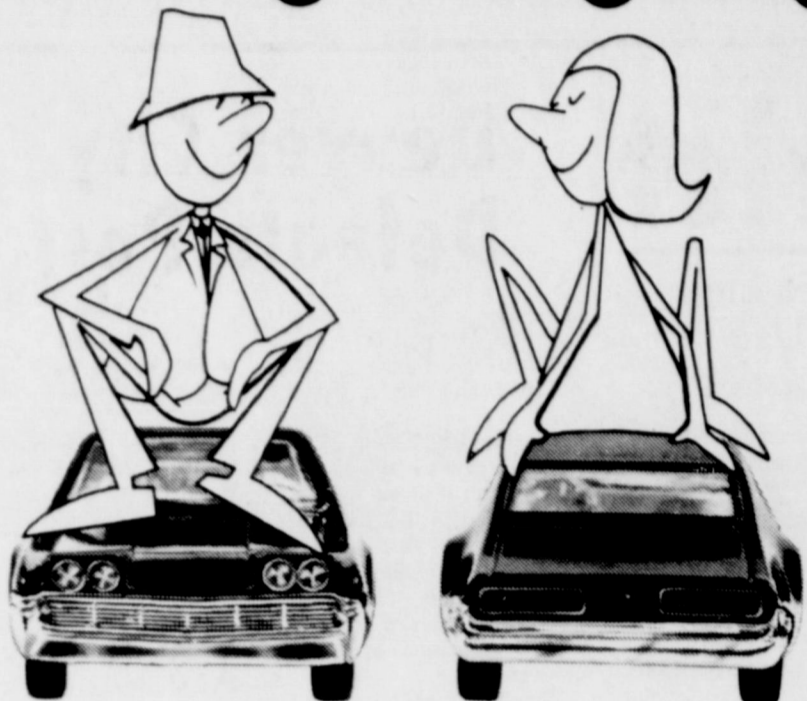
He was a member of Sweet Street Baptist Church. Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Leroy

She has written gospel songs and has recorded her first two albums and is back appearing on "Hee Haw".

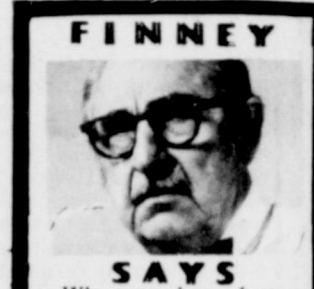

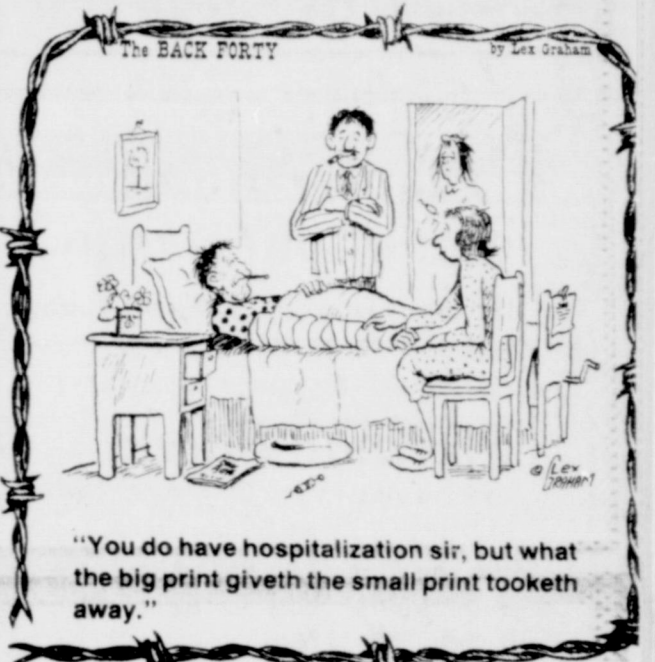

TEXAS TALK

Farmers may be leaving 850 million dollars out in the field. That's the amazing figure some scientists have come up with during a special study on energy alternatives. First some basics... all oil products come from cellulose materials... plants, especially plant stalks are largely cellulose... a lot of stalks are left in the field. Testing the fuel efficiency of this farm residue was General Motors engineer, F. L. Green. In a test already completed, General Motors used a mixture of 10 percent cornstalks for boiler fuel. They say the result was positive enough that mixtures of as high as 60 percent cornstalks are feasible for fueling the boilers. Economic determinations made on the basis of the current value of coal indicate that high cellulose farm residue could be worth 20 dollars a ton. Estimates of the amount available each year range as high as 450 million tons.



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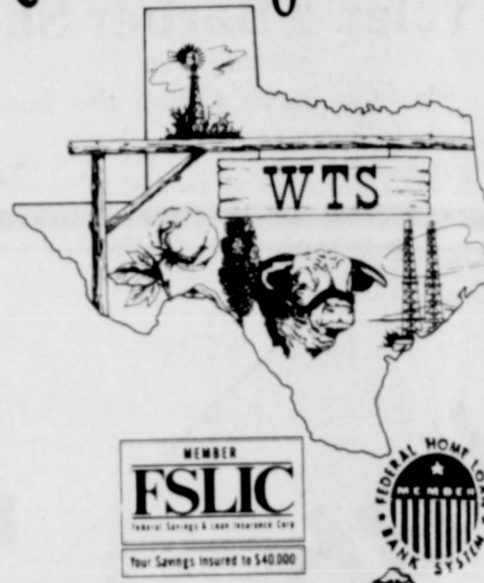

Flour

Flour is the essential ingredient for making yeast breads and quick breads as well as cakes and pastries. Flour is made by grinding cereal grains to a fine powder. The term "meal" means that the grain has been less finely ground. Wheat is the preferred grain for flour. It contains the proteins gliadin and glutenin which when combined with liquid form gluten, an elastic part of the dough that lets the dough expand as yeast or other leaven releases gasses. When the dough is baked, the gluten coagulates and gives structure to the finished bread. For home baking we can get many other kinds of flour, including those made from potatoes, chestnuts and soybeans, as well as buckwheat, rye, corn, rice and millet.

All-purpose flour is a blend of hard and soft wheats. It can be used for all general cooking and it makes good bread.

Unbleached flour is similar to all-purpose but it has not been bleached. It is a little more nutritious than bleached flour, since bleaching removes part of the nutrients. You can sometimes find this flour with added wheat germ, which makes it especially healthful. It is somewhat heavier than all-purpose flour.

Pastry flour is not available everywhere, but if you can find it, it does make good pastry. This is unbleached flour usually made from soft wheat.

Bread flour is usually available only to professional bakers, but it makes excellent bread. This is a mixture of both spring and winter hard wheats.

Cake flour is made from soft wheat and is very finely ground and always bleached. Do not use this for bread because it will not develop enough gluten for proper rising.

Self-rising flour is a mixture of flour, baking soda and baking powder; it can be used for cake making, but special recipes are needed.

Whole-wheat flour is the whole grain, with nothing removed and no bleaching. Often this is ground between stones in the old-fashioned way, which makes it especially nutritious.

Rye flour is darker than wheat. The gluten properties are similar, but in different proportions so the gluten lacks stability. Rye flour is often used, therefore, in combination with wheat flour. An all-rye bread will have a very dense texture because the dough will not rise as much.

Oats, corn and barley do not form gluten. Although they are used in breads, they cannot make good breads when used alone. This sad discovery about corn by early American colonists, who were unable to grow wheat, led to experiments that have given us almost endless versions of corn bread.

A recent development is the so-called instantized flour. This has been ground much finer than all-purpose and is so soft and silky it needs no sifting. While it is possible to use it for bread, it is more successful in such cooking procedures as sauce making, where it dissolves smoothly without lumping. Do not use this very soft flour for cookies that are shaped in a cookie press or for foods that must hold their shape without a mold or pan.

All flours can become unfit for use if not stored properly. Keep them in a cool, dry place free of

insects. Whole-grain flours, which contain the fatty germ, can become rancid if stored too long, or at too high temperatures. It is best to buy them only in small amounts and store them in airtight containers in your refrigerator. Buy only from dealers whose stocks are fresh and properly stored.

Try this recipe Quick Pie Crust

By Virginia Dulin
 Mix the following ingredients in pie plate: dash of salt, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 cup cooking oil, 1/4 cup milk.

Stir well in pie plate, spread evenly, flute edges. Fill with pie mixture, or for cream pie bake crust 350 degrees until golden brown, cool, and fill with cream mixture.
