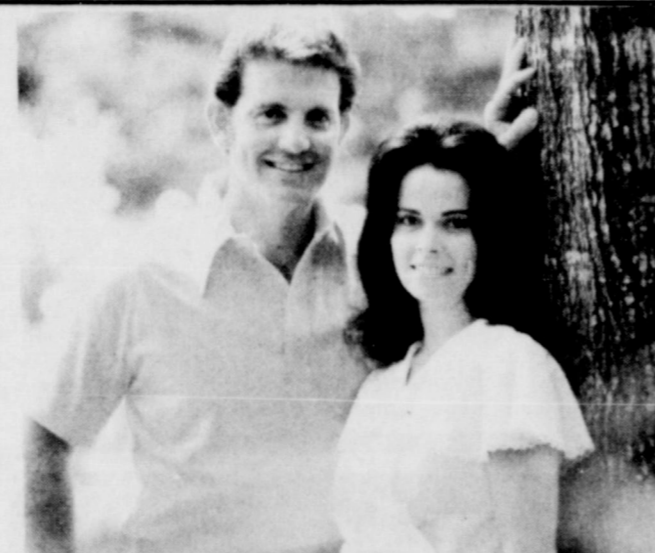

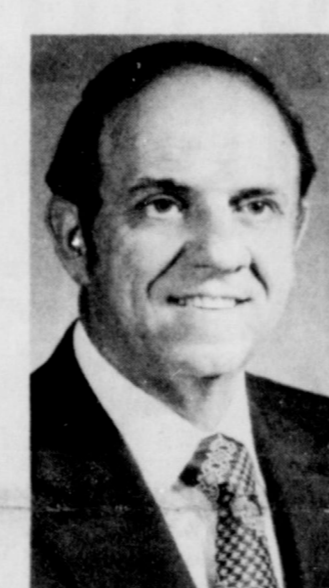
Lenten Services At Church Begins Sunday

...citric acid seem too similar to be grouped under one classification. But all three -- a binder, and a chemical preservative -- do something in common. They are food additives, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). According to USDA's National and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), additives approved for use in meat and poultry products are divided into three basic categories:

- Flavoring components, which are added to food for flavoring purposes only, such as sugar, garlic, pepper, oregano and other herbs.
- Nutritional substances and substances added to produce a physical effect and which have nutritional value as food. For example, when used in meat products, nonfat dry milk powder, flours, starches, and other similar extenders bind together ingredients as well as add nutritional value to meat products like sausages, luncheon meats, and meat products which are added only to affect the

product's physical characteristics, such as gums, curers, phosphates, and antioxidants. For example, citric acid, a chemical preservative, may be used in cured pork and beef cuts and sausage products to maintain color during storage. These substances usually have little or no nutritional value as a food.

The initial safety of food additives is determined by the Food and Drug Administration. However, if an additive is to be used in conjunction with meat or poultry products, it also must be approved by USDA.

USDA must determine that the additive will not cause a meat or poultry product to be adulterated or misbranded; establish appropriate limits or restrictions on the additive's use in meat or poultry products; and determine that the additive is effective and produces the intended result in the product.

Try This Recipe: Sour Cream Coffee Cake

Cream together 1 stick margarine, 1 cup sugar. Add 2 well beaten eggs. Mix 1/2 pt. sour cream and 1 tsp. soda. Add to the creamed mixture. Mix 1 1/2 cup cake flour and 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder. Add flour mixture to the creamed mixture. Blend in 1 tsp. Vanilla. Pour 1/2 batter into greased and floured pan. Sprinkle on 2/3 topping. Recipe for topping: 1/4 cup sugar, 1

tesp. cinnamon, 2 tbs. nuts. Add remaining batter; then rest of the remaining 1/3 topping mixture. Marbolize the mixture by slicing the batter with a knife. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 min.

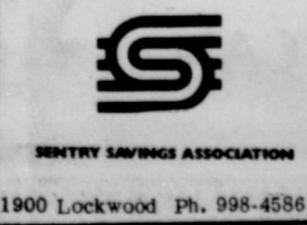
At present, Hutchison has the longest continuous span of service as Extension director in the nation.

Williams also announced that Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of agriculture at TAMU, will serve as acting director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

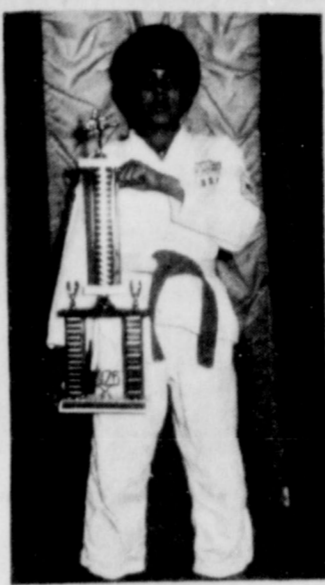
TEXAS TALK

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS.....

A new pruning technique could boost pecan production in Lynn County.

Called tip pruning, the technique involves removing shoot tips less than six inches long so that numerous small lateral shoots develop. This increases the density of foliage on the pecan tree, increases the potential number of fruiting shoots and reduces tree sizes.

The pruning technique could especially increase production from young pecan orchards.

In a demonstration started in 1972 in Guadalupe County, tip pruned trees produced at least 15 pounds more pecans per tree than those not pruned. Trees in the demonstration were nine-year-old Choctaws with a 30-foot by 30-foot spacing.

Looking at tip pruning from a dollars and cents standpoint, pointed out that a laborer can tip prune a seven-year-old tree with a 20-foot pole pruner in about 15 minutes. This means a cost of about \$1.50 per tree. Allowing 85 cents per pound income from the pecans, tip pruning can increase income per tree by more than \$10 a year.

A long-term tip pruning demonstration is under way at the U. S. Department of Agriculture Pecan Field Station at Brownwood. 39 different varieties and hybrids of pecan trees are in the test in an ultra-high density situation (17.5-foot by 17.5-foot spacings).

In early tests at the Brownwood Station, tip pruning resulted in an obvious increase in lateral shoots, but a pruning operation in which half the shoot was removed (simulating mechanical hedging) caused no increase in lateral shoot development.

Pecan varieties that have been most responsive to tip pruning are Cherokee,

Chickasaw, Western, Apache and Caddo while those less responsive include Mohawk, Shawnee, Mahan, Tejas and Cheyenne.

Cotton Prices Are Lower

Grower prices were weak to steady during the week ending February 27, according to Paul R. Dickson in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office.

Farmers sold mixed lots of mostly grades, 41, 32, 42 and 43; staples 29 through 31; mikes 3.2 and lower for 42.25 to 43.25 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41, 32 and 42; staples 29 through 31; mikes 2.7 through 3.2 brought 43.50 to 44.50 cents.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was moderate to slow and growers offered cotton in light volume, Dickson said.

Demand was light. Grades 41, 42 and 44 were the predominate grades classed this week in the Lubbock territory. Grade 41 accounted for 27 percent; grade 42, 23 percent and 44 was 20 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to seven percent of the samples classed.

Staples 29, 30 and 31 were the predominate lengths. Staple 29 amounted to 17 percent; staple 30, 23 percent; and staple 31, 30 percent.

Mike group 2.7 through 2.9 accounted for 50 percent and 2.6 and below was 40 percent.

High Plains samples classed totaled 1,100 for the week. Seasons total stands at 1,227,000. Total on this same date last year was 1,102,000, the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Friday.

Nurse Tells Of Free Clinic

Operation and services available free to citizens of Lynn County at the recently established Chronic Disease Screening Clinic in Tahoka were the subject of a talk Thursday at the Rotary Club by Mrs. Bebe Boren, registered nurse in charge.

The local free clinic is the result of a change made by Texas Department of Health in which the state has been divided into 10 regional offices with one in Lubbock, and this health service brought more directly to the people. The clinic here is located in the old Tahoka Hospital, where Mrs. Boren said they have the best facilities to be found in any such local clinic.

In addition to herself, a Licensed Vocational Nurse and two clerks are employed.

Free services available to any Lynn County citizen include blood pressure screening; blood diabetes, vision, and hearing tests; pap tests on women, and many others. When an ailment is discovered, the person tested is notified and referred to his doctor or hospital.

For an appointment or for further information, people may call 998-4604 or visit the office in the old Tahoka Hospital building next to Durham - Midkiff dental offices on South 1st. Street.

Farmers Get Emergency Loan

Congressman Omar Burlison announces that farmers in Dawson, Garza and Lynn Counties, Texas, may apply for emergency loans through the Farmers Home Administration to recover crop losses caused by natural disasters last year.

Dawson county had a severe hail storm in June, followed by cold rains in September which affected the growth of planted crops, and caused a lower yield of cotton produced. Hot weather and humidity in Garza county in addition to cold weather in September affected cotton, forage sorghum and sunflower crops. During most of September, wet weather caused similar losses of crops in Lynn county, including wheat and blackeye peas.

FmHA authorized emergency loans five times for Dawson and Garza counties since 1967 because of natural disasters, and six times for Lynn County.

Emergency loans are made to farmers and ranchers to recover losses resulting from designated natural disasters, and pay operating debts. Loans based on actual losses are repayable in their entirety with five percent interest. Loans for renewed operations are made at rates prevailing in the private market for comparable credit. All loan applicants must be unable to get sufficient credit from local commercial sources.

Farmers and ranchers may apply for emergency loan assistance at the local FmHA office. Applications for physical losses are authorized until April 20, 1976, and for production losses until November 22, 1976.

Farm Production And Marketing

Farm cooperative leaders were urged to focus strategy on close coordination of farm production and marketing activities as a means of maintaining freedom of choice and operation in agriculture.

The advice came from Dr. Tyrus R. Timm, research economist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who described the 1976 Bicentennial year as a "no nonsense" period for U.S. agriculture and farm co-ops.

Timm, Professor Emeritus in the Texas A & M University College of Agriculture, told members of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives annual meeting (Feb. 8 - 10) that the year "will call for the best in us in terms of brain power, strategy, cooperation and incisiveness."

He said if co-ops want to have a good year in membership, savings, government relations and with individual farmers, then those organizations should strive harder for effective coordination of farm products and marketing.

"Otherwise, Texas agriculture will likely witness additional farm problems and some loss in freedom of choice and freedom of operation this coming year," the economist emphasized.

Timm said the 1976 political and social environment for Texas co-ops appears to have more pluses than minuses. "But there are many unknown factors that could change the picture quickly," he warned.

On the plus side, current government estimates indicate that per-capita income and employment should be up slightly, and net farm income is expected to rise a little, he said.

Overseas markets for U.S. agricultural products, he pointed out, should be as large or even larger than in 1975. And not to be overlooked is the opportunity for people in agriculture to help elect one president, about 17 senators and 435 congressmen during the year, Timm said.

He urged the co-op officials to do their homework carefully before making decisions, for it could be

dangerous to set plans for one level of prices, income and costs.

Economists and statisticians can't predict which of those price, income and cost levels will materialize. They are sometimes asked to do so, the economist said, but they often respond when adequate information is lacking.

"This happens particularly in government agencies when Congress and the executive branch demand to have facts about what's going to happen," Timm said.
