Uranium Search in Lynn County

A special survey team led by the Energy Research and Development Administration will be working in the Tahoka area for several weeks to collect samples as part of a program to assess United States uranium resources. The objective of this program, which is being conducted on a nationwide basis, is to complete a geologic survey of the surface waters, streams and rivers in the area by 1980. One of the objectives of the program is to provide uranium information which will help determine potential new areas for uranium exploration.

The program is being conducted under the overall management of the Grand Junction Office of the Energy Research and Development Administration, Union Carbide Corporation, a contractor for ERDA, is responsible for the Tahoka area.

The survey will include collecting water and stream sediment samples at various locations throughout the area. The samples will be analyzed and the data plotted on maps. As the survey is completed, these maps will be placed on open file at various locations across the United States.

Last Saturday, April 3, a large number of voters turned out to elect 3 city councilmen and 2 school board members.

Three incumbent councilmen were re-elected, Jesse Dorman, drawing 394 votes, James Roberts, 388 and John Ed Redwine, 376. Tom Cloe polled 100 votes. A total of 441 votes were cast in the City election.

A total of 614 ballots were cast in the Tahoka School Board Election. Six candidates had filed for the two places. Elected were Jay Dee House, drawing 192 votes, and Bob Haney, 180. Other candidates were Jacky Henry, 164, Billy Tomlinson, 164, Lyndell Wood, 147 and Kenneth Farr, 73.

New Home
 Incumbent Charles Smith polled 77 votes and Lynn Maeker received 72 votes to take the two available seats in the race of New Home Independent School System Board of Trustees. Other vote totals, in what was termed a heavy election, included Leland Zant, 64, Dennis Haley, 35 and write in candidates J. W. Barnett, 26 and Clifton Clem, 1.

O'Donnell
 Incumbent mayor J. A. Hogg was re-elected with 148 votes over write in challenger Oscar Yeach, who received 52. Incumbent council members Tommy Modisette and David Bessire collected 181 and 180 votes, respectively. Write in council candidates Rochelle Howard got 30 votes. A total of 219 were described as heavy.

Wilson
 Incumbent councilman Victor Steinhauser and newcomers Alfred Clary and Alle Day were elected with 42, 42 and 43 votes respectively. Fourth hopeful for one of the three open council seats were Lupe Arellano, who polled 29 votes, John Henderson received 2 write-ins. Total vote was 54, which election judges termed as average turnout.

Rep. Short Named To House State Affairs

State Rep. E. L. Short of Tahoka, has been named to a subcommittee of the House State Affairs Committee to undertake a 60-day study of the advisability of placing natural gas utility rate regulations under the jurisdiction of the new State Utilities Commission.

Rep. Short and nine other members of the subcommittee will be seeking to determine if consumers would be better served if legislation was introduced to transfer regulation authority from the Texas Railroad Commission.

Sherry Etheredge Says

As summer months approach, many will be taking advantage of going fishing. According to Mrs. Mary Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist, a little fish goes a long way to provide many nutrients.

"Most fish and shellfish contain low amounts of fat and high amounts of protein. And most fish -- except shrimp and crayfish -- contain small amounts of cholesterol in comparison with other foods. Certain organ meats and egg products contain 10 times as much cholesterol as fish and shellfish," she added.

Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

"Fish provides complete protein essential for good nutrition -- protein builds and repairs. This nutrient is needed by every cell in the body. Children need it for building strong muscles, and adults need it to repair muscles and other cells.

"Fish products are easily digested because they contain little connective tissue. They are good for diets of young children and elderly people, where ease of digestibility is important,"

the specialist added.

She noted that calcium, iron, iodine, potassium, phosphorus, copper and manganese are minerals found in fish, and all are essential for good health.

"Calcium and phosphorus help maintain strong bones. Calcium also helps clotting of blood and regulating of the heartbeat. Fish containing small bones, such as salmon, are good sources of these minerals.

"Iron is another mineral present in fish and is needed by all cells -- the red blood cells in particular. These cells carry oxygen in the air through the blood vessels to all cells in the body. Lack of iron in the diet makes a person feel tired and run

down and can lead to anemia," she explained.

Seafood is a rich source of iodine, a mineral often found lacking in the diet, according to a nutrition survey. When seafood is a major part of the diet in certain iodine-deficient areas, the iodine deficiency simple goiter can be prevented, she added.

"Certain fat-soluble vitamins A, D, E, and K are present in fish. Specifically, Vitamin A is necessary for growth and helps night vision, and Vitamin D helps the foundation of strong bones and teeth. Vitamin E plays a role as an anti-oxidant that inhibits the oxidation of unsaturated fatty acids and Vitamin A. It also helps maintain normal

resistance of blood cells to rupture by oxidizing agents.

"Vitamin K is necessary for the synthesis of prothrombin, an enzyme essential for the normal clotting of blood. Also, the B-complex thiamin, niacin and riboflavin is present in fish. The B-vitamin content of fish is about the same as that of meat from animals.

"These vitamins help use energy from food and keep the nerves and skin in good condition," she said.

Try this Recipes:

Tuna Divan

1 10-ounce pkg. frozen broccoli spears, 2 6 1/2 or 7 ounce cans tuna, flaked, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 10 3/4 ounce can condensed Cheddar - cheese soup, 1 tablespoon seasoned fried bread crumbs.

About 40 minutes before serving:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Cook broccoli as label directs; drain well. In medium bowl, mix well tuna, lemon juice and undiluted soup. In 8 x 8" baking dish or shallow casserole, even arrange broccoli. Spoon tuna

mixture over broccoli; sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake 25 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Make 4 servings.

Tuna Tetrazzini

1 8 oz. package spaghetti, 2 1/2 oz. cans sliced mushrooms, 1/4 cup all-purpose flour, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1 1/4 cup milk, 1/4 cup medium sherry, 1/2 pound American Cheese, cubed (2 cups), 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 2 6 1/2 or 7 ounce cans tuna, drained.

About 1 hour before serving:

Cook spaghetti as label

directs; drain and saute. Drain mushrooms, 1/3 cup liquid. Preheat to 350 degrees F.

For sauce, in 2 saucepan over low heat, melt 1/2 cup butter. Add flour into hot margarine, until blended. Gradually stir in milk, then mushroom liquid and stirring, until thickened in cheese, seasoned with nutmeg until cheese is melted. Stir in spaghetti, mushrooms.

Pour mixture into 2 shallow baking dish. Bake 15 minutes or until golden. Makes 8 servings.

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS...

Swine producers on the Texas High Plains have a unique opportunity to hear views on selection and management of sows and boars from some of the top experts in the business.

The annual Texas A & M University Swine Short-course, this year being offered on the High Plains of Texas as well as on the campus of Texas A & M University, will be held in Plainview, Texas on Saturday, April 10, at the Hale County Agricultural Center (says County Extension Agent Griffin).

Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. and the program begins at 8:45 a.m. A registration fee of \$5.00 will be charged to help defray expenses of the shortcourse. A copy of the proceedings and a lunch will be provided each participant.

The morning session will get underway with a discussion on modern trends in visual selection, followed by a live evaluation of breeding gilts. Shortcourse participants will also have an opportunity to evaluate these gilts and offer their comments.

A third topic will center around a discussion on the value of records in a swine breeding program.

The morning session will conclude with a discussion on the boar's role in disease transmission. This topic should help answer the speculation as to whether or not pathogenic organisms can be passed in the semen of boars to females at breeding time.

Taking a punch at public opinion, Nobel prize winner Dr. Norman Borlaug speaking recently in Houston, said the basic attitude toward farmers has been a hindrance to greater food production. Borlaug, now associated with the Rockefeller Foundation in Mexico City, said the public does not understand the necessity of the profit motive to increase production. The Houston Chronicle quoted the scientist as saying, "If a farmer can't improve his standard of living, he will not adopt the new technologies". He said the hope of feeding a growing world depends on technological advances. Pointing to last year's uproar over foreign grain sales, Borlaug said the public talked about "our grain" as though it was public property. This in effect was making a decision which affected the income of the producer without consulting the producer himself.

The afternoon session will convene at 1:00 p.m. with a discussion on pathogenic organisms that have been isolated from aborted pig fetuses during a five-year study. Producers who may have had sows or gilts abort just prior to farrowing, even though they vaccinated for Leptospirosis would be particularly interested in this topic.

A discussion on the training and management of young boars in commercial operations will be followed by a discussion on managing sows and pigs to obtain optimum efficiency.

The importance of minerals, particularly the use of trace elements, for efficient sow reproduction will be presented, and the short-course will conclude with a presentation of the results of the latest swine nutrition research being conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Swine producers and any related industry personnel are urged to take advantage of this shortcourse (Griffin adds).

"The New Evolutionist" Read II Peter II Verse I

There is a new breed of evolutionist with us today attacking the integrity of the Genesis - creation - account. The "Theistic Evolutionist" is one who claims to believe both the Bible and evolution. They say that it doesn't make any difference what opinion one may have concerning the "how" of man's creation. Then they attempt to present their opinion of "natural - selection - over - millions of years" as a fact rather than the theory that it is.

The Faithful Christian does believe it makes a difference whether the Genesis account is taken at face value. One's attitude toward Genesis account is an indicator of his attitude toward the entire Bible. If the "theistic evolutionists" disbelieves the Genesis account of creation they will soon begin to pass judgement on the remainder of the Bible.

When men want to accept all of the Bible by faith, save the Genesis account of creation which they subject to human judgement, we face not atheism but modern liberalism. Liberalism which places Christians within man's biologically arranged "Animal Kingdom" rather than "Christ's Kingdom". An atheist accepts it in order to fill the emptiness that results from rejection of God (my opinion). In essence they accepted the wisdom of the creature rather than that of the creator and so today's pseudo - intellectual evolutionist becomes a replica of ancient pagan darkness. (Rom. 1:25) Darkness resulting from blind faith in those who are "seemingly superior" in wisdom. Normally these liberal thinkers are not thinkers at all but followers of those higher up the intellectual - status - ladder.

"Theistic Evolution" rejects the literal Bible account of creation and in order to remain constant must eventually reject the doctrines of sin and salvation. Theistic evolutionists claim Christianity, yet reject the only source from which Christian faith is derived.

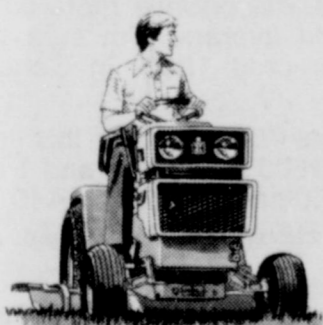

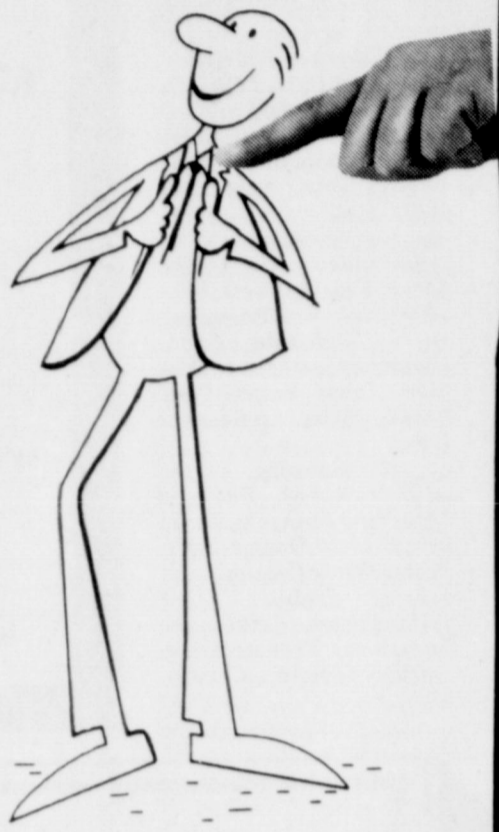

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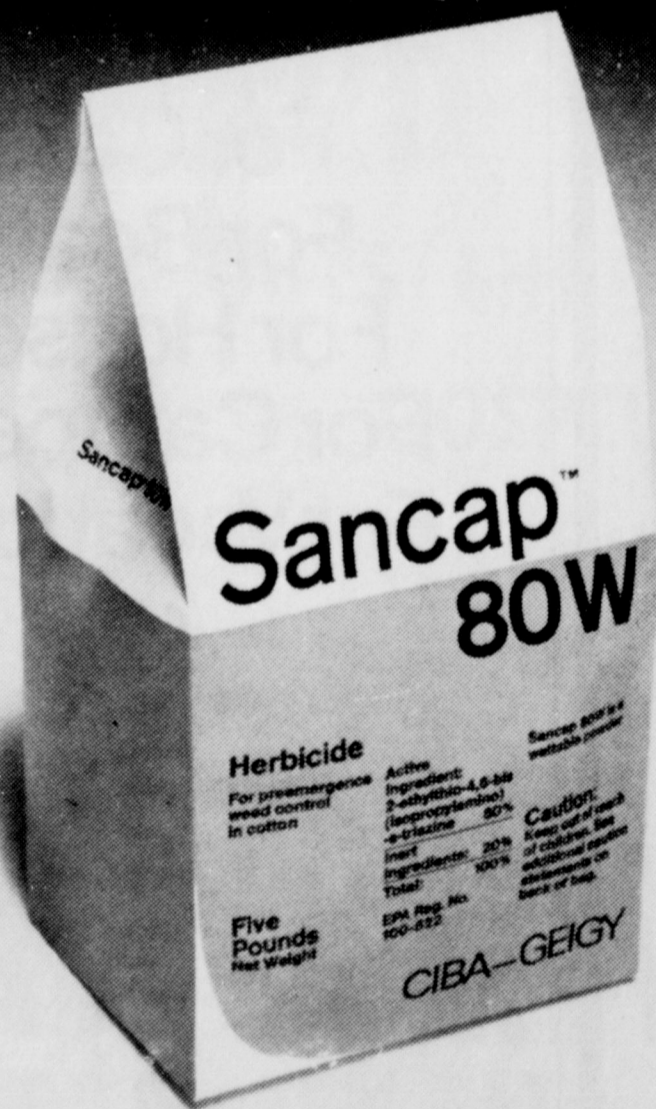
