Solution To Estate Tax Crunch Here

A solution to the estate tax crunch that forces many families to sell businesses and farms to pay estate taxes may be at hand.

The Burleson-Curtis Estate Tax Reform Bill now in Congress contains increased exemptions that will help alleviate the tax burden when an estate is passed on

The Burleson-Curtis Estate Tax Reform Bill now in Congress contains increased exemptions that will help alleviate the tax burden when an estate is passed on to heirs. The bill: (1) increases the exemption from \$60,000 to \$200,000; (2) increases marital deduction from 50 percent of gross estate to \$100,000 plus 50 percent of gross estate; and (3) provides an option to value farm and ranch estates at their agricultural value rather than speculative

The need for passage of the Burleson-Curtis Bill is obvious, especially in agriculture. A 640 acre farm valued today at \$1,000 per acre could have a net estate value in excess of \$800,000 -including farm machinery and improvements. The federal estate tax on this amount would be approximately \$252,200 payable within nine months after death of the owner.

Under these circumstances, the present \$60,000 federal estate tax exemption would help very little. Heirs to this property would probably have to sell it to pay the taxes. Very likely, both the land and the heirs would be taken out of agriculture--at a time when food and fiber production are

Board Adopts Finance Plan For 1976-77

The School Finance Bill passed by the State Legislature has placed a greater amount of responsibility for financing public education upon local school The Tahoka districts. Independent School District will be required to increase the amount of local effort by \$70,747 for 1976-7

Faced with a maintenance tax rate ceiling of \$1.50 per \$100 of assessed value, the Board can not raise the required \$70,747 without drastically reducing services now being offered for the students attending Tahoka Schools.

The Board in special session, faced with this difficult financial situation, decided that the best interest of the students of Tahoka Independent School District would be served by increasing the assessment ratio of real and personal property now rendered for taxation in Tahoka Independent School District.

\$26,739 Grant for SPCA

Congressman Omar Burleson announced the approval of a \$26,739 community services grant to the South Plains Community Action Association Inc., with headquarters at Levelland.

The grant is effective April 1, 1976 and will run for 3 months. The areas served are Garza, Lynn, Anton, Terry, Yoakum, Cochran, Morton and Lamb counties. The funds will be used for the administration of the central staff facilities and equipment, collection of information planning program development and evaluation of Community Action Association activities.

They will also be used to operate neighborhood centers which provide outreach, placement education training and general assistance for low income participants. The funds will also assist in administering programs in human services, delivering comprehensive manpower. summer employment, summer youth recreation, family planning, non-emergency medical assistance, women, infants and children nutrition, alcoholism counciling and retired senior volunteers.







In 13 x 9 inch baking pan. stir sour cream, sugar and lemon juice until mixed.

In covered blender container, with blender at medium speed, blend strawberries, about one-third at a time until pureed; stir into sour-cream mixture, mixing well. Cover pan with plastic wrap or foil and freeze until almost firm, about 2 hours.

Spoon mixture into chilled, large bowl; with mixer at medium speed. beat until mixture is smooth. Return mixture to pan. Cover, label and freeze until mixture is firm. Makes about 4 pts. or 12 servings.

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
