Texas Tech Sophomore, Weldon Warren, a hopeful candidate for a Texas-based Medical School within the next two years, was recently re-elected Arts and Sciences senator in the Tech Student

Association. Warren, from Tahoka, is a Zoology major, minoring in

Chemistry and Psychology. In October Warren was initiated into Phi Eta Sigma, a freshman honorary fraternity for men. He is also a member of Kappa Alpha Order, a men's social fraternity, and the Pre-Med

Society for pre-med majors. In February Warren was appointed by a select nominations committee of the Student Association to fill a vacancy in the Arts and Science Senate.

SHORT REPORT

So many people were involved in my bid for re-election with their hard work, encouragement and prayers that I will be forever grateful to each and every

Since the election, a great number of people, both in this district and other areas of Texas, have encouraged me to request a recount of the ballots. The law provides that a candidate for public office may make such a request if the vote difference is 5% or less. The balloting showed a 200 vote difference; therefore I am asking the State Democratic Executive Committee for a recount of the total 16,546 votes cast. This will be done at my personal expense. Regardless of the outcome, I plan to devote my full time to representing this district until the expiration of this term. As Chairman of Intergovernmental Affairs, 1 will be assisting my subcommittees in writing their reports to the Governor and the next Legislature. The subcommittees are studying the impact on state and local governments of collective bargaining of state employees--revenue sharing and its effect on state and local governments--the Council of Governments Subcommittee will be making a comparison of all operational costs and grants approved--Firemen and Policemen's Subcommittee will establish some uniform

recommendations on salaries, benefits and work load from one city to another. Also as Chairman of the Joint Senate and House Textile Committee--I will

establish an industrial district by a vote of the people at the local level to get an industry of their own. As a

member of the Energy Committee, it was necessary that I be in Austin some during the campaign and on this Committee I will continue to oppose transferring natural gas jurisdiction to the Utility Commission simply because if this appointed body gets control they will probably regulate natural gas. This will hinder exploration and production and will eliminate jobs of

many of our oilfield personnel. It has been said teachers were against my re-election. I don't believe this to be true. Teachers in the 77th District were represented at the TSTA State Meeting in February and it was decided that neither me nor my opponent would receive and endorsement. The endorsement by TSTA for my opponent came from San Antonio. Many people down state declare that all taxable wealth should be spread equally for education. Also many people down state advocate destruction of the balanced budget schools and would prevent us in West Texas from supplementing teachers' salaries unless all teachers received an equal

supplement. I was proud to have not received an endorsement from an environmental group as my opponent did and I will continue to oppose those who would take away our right of private ownership and use of land: or those who would jeopardize our natural resource development that would take away employment from all kinds of energy related activities.

I shall continue to assist the people of my district on an individual basis, the towns and counties and the State of Texas as long as my energies will permit.
