Warren Is TTSA Senator

Texas Tech Sophomore, Weldon Warren, a hopeful candidate for a Texas-based Medical School within the next two years, was recently re-elected Arts and Sciences senator in the Tech Student Association.

Warren, from Tahoka, is a Zoology major, minoring in Chemistry and Psychology.

In October Warren was initiated into Phi Eta Sigma, a freshman honorary fraternity for men. He is also a member of Kappa Alpha Order, a men's social fraternity, and the Pre-Med Society for pre-med majors.

In February Warren was appointed by a select nominations committee of the Student Association to fill a vacancy in the Arts and Science Senate.

This spring he ran for re-election and was one of the 14 out of 25 candidates to win an office. He is now the Vice-Chairman of the Senate Rules Committee.

As a senator, it will be his obligation to represent the feelings of his fellow students, over 7,000 of them.

Warren feels that such political and student governmental involvement will better prepare him for Medical School and life outside the university.

He has an overall grade point average of 3.83 on the scale of 4. Warren is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Warren of Tahoka.

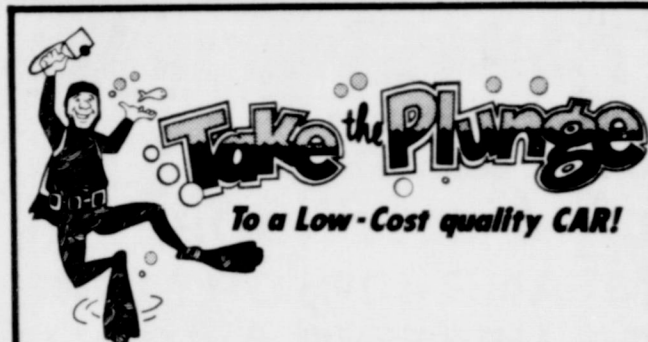

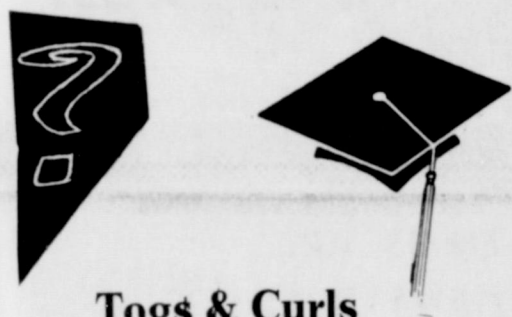

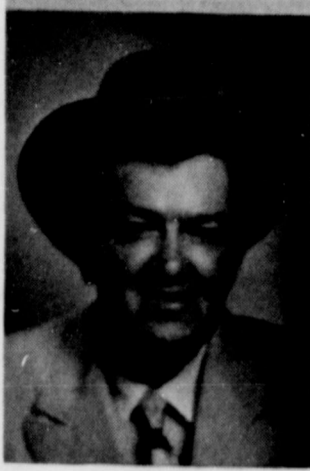
Band Booster Meet

Survivors include his wife, Earline; a daughter, Linnie Redwine of Tahoka; a

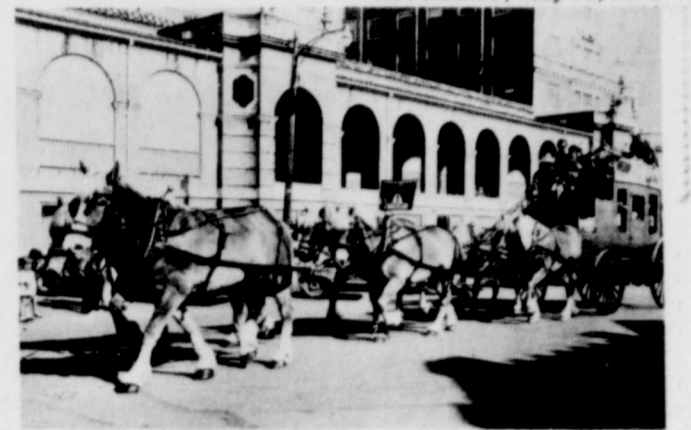

Speaker Compares US To England

"The United States is following the same path toward socialism that has led England to its present state as a weak nation," was the theme of a talk at the Rotary Club last Thursday by Gary Stacy, young Levelland businessman who was member of a team of six men from area who spent six weeks in London, England this spring.

Stacy was a member of the Group Study Exchange Team sponsored by this Northwest Texas Rotary District No. 573 to District 113, London. A similar London team will visit his district, including Tahoka.

Stacy said the West Texas men stayed in homes of London Rotarians, and each of the six men relayed stays in 11 sections of the English city.

He was very favorably impressed with the people, their hospitality, and greatly enjoyed visiting historic places. But, he gained the impression Londoners are proud of their heritage and the past, but found them somewhat apologetic about the present and a questionable future. That great nation has lost most of its colonies, has to import most of its supplies, faces grave financial crises, and appears headed toward a complete Socialistic state. Already, the government owns the railroads, communications, and much of the industry.

Warren Embree was in charge of the program and introduced the speaker.
