City Wide Clean Up Campaign Now In Progress

Tahoka's Clean-Up, Fix-Up, Paint-Up campaign as part of the Bicentennial program is in progress, and citizens hope the drive can be completed by June 18. The success of this town beautification program is up to every individual citizen and every business institution that has already been contacted, but there still is much to be done, and the participation of each citizen is requested as a matter of pride and community spirit.

trash possible in the dumpster containers, or pile excess next to them, and call City Hall for special pick-ups, if necessary. However, citizens are asked not to fill the dump containers with dirt.

In some cases, the City shredder will be available to clean up weeds on vacant lots.

Citizens are asked to cut weeds around their property, in the alleys and sidewalks both down-town and in residence sections, and gather up trash for city pick-up, paint and repair premises, and otherwise eliminate unsightly spots.

More clean-up progress has already been achieved than in a number of years, and the committee is highly complimentary of this progress. Just recently, the burned out Gagnat buildings and old theatre lots have been cleared, a number of abandoned houses razed and cleared and lots cleaned up.

Much more can be done to beautify the town, the committee says, and an appeal is now made to other individual citizens to cooperate in making Tahoka a more desirable place in which to live.

In order to make this program a success, we hope to get as many people as possible to participate in this work.

Lusk, chairman, said he thinks approval is almost certain but negotiations are still in progress for a site, which must be secured very soon to take advantage this year of FHA regulations.

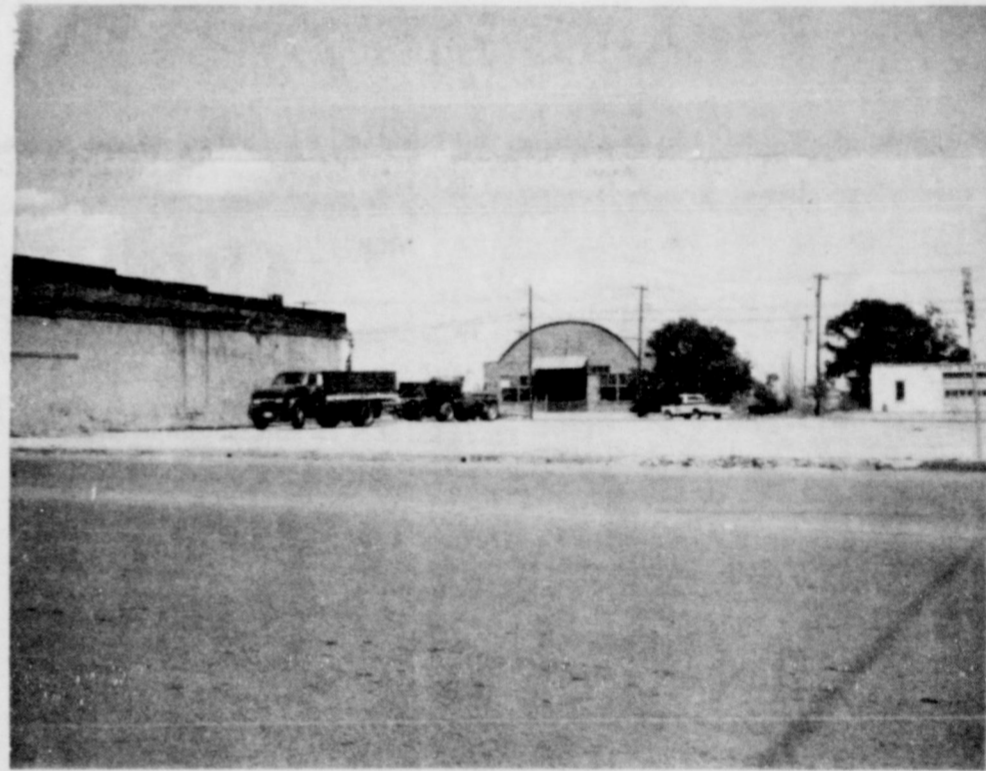

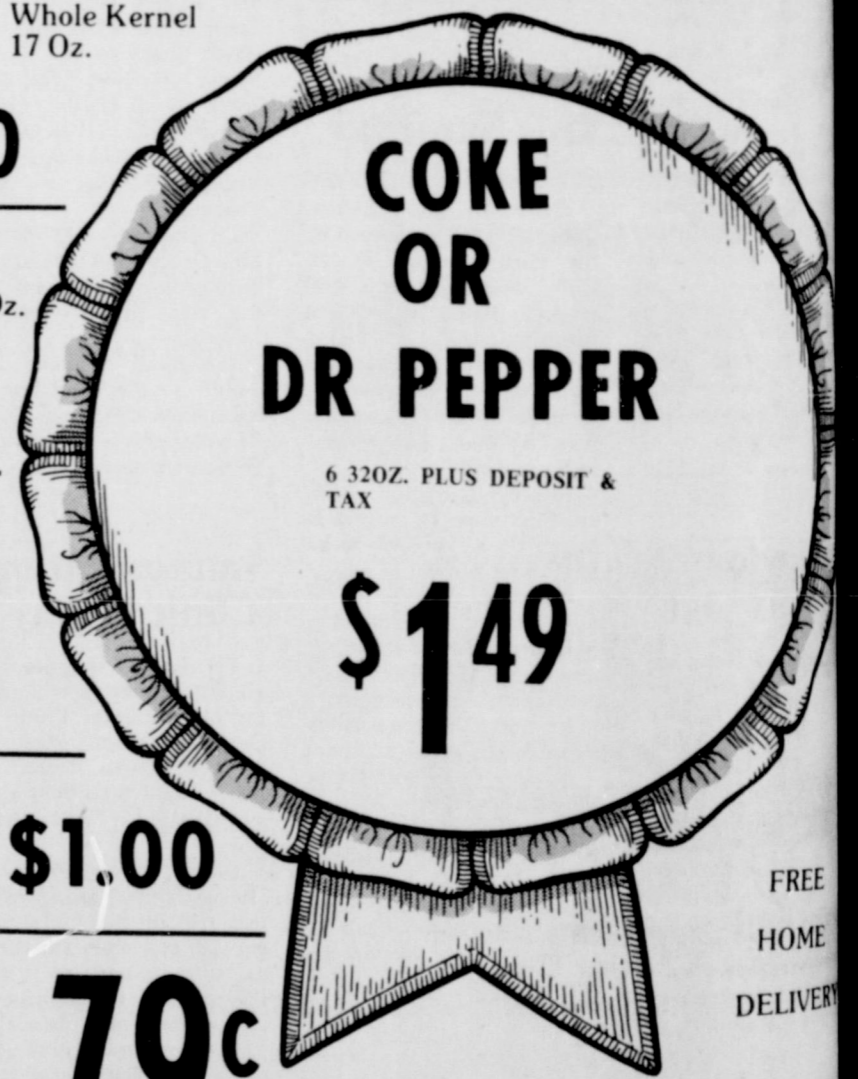

Texas Department of Agriculture. It was hosted this year by the Nacogdoches County Chamber of Commerce.

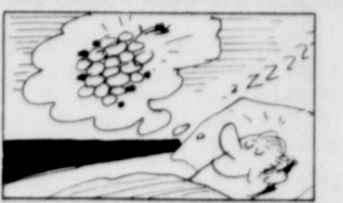

CHOCOLATE PIE CAKE:
G. G. Fillingim

Crust: 1 cup flour
1 cup chopped pecans
1 stick melted butter
Mix in sheet pan and pat down for crust. Bake 375 degrees for 20 minutes.
Then Mix: 1 8 oz. cream cheese
1 cup powdered sugar
1 cup cool whip
Mix and spread over cooled crust.
Then Mix: 2 small boxes instant chocolate pudding
2 cups milk
Spread chocolate over cheese mixture then top with cool whip to cover. (Grate hersheys chocolate bar and sprinkle over top.) Cool in refrigerator.

JELLO SALAD: Moena Burnett
1 package lemon jello
1 cup hot water
1 can pineapple pie filling
2 cups marshmallows
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Dissolve jello in hot water. Add pineapple pie filling, marshmallows, pecans. Mix together well and chill.

PEACH ICE CREAM: Mrs. Truett Smith
5 eggs - well beaten
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar - beat into eggs
1 can Eagle Brand Milk
1 carton whipping cream
1 carton half & half
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring
2 or 3 cups fresh peaches (mashed)

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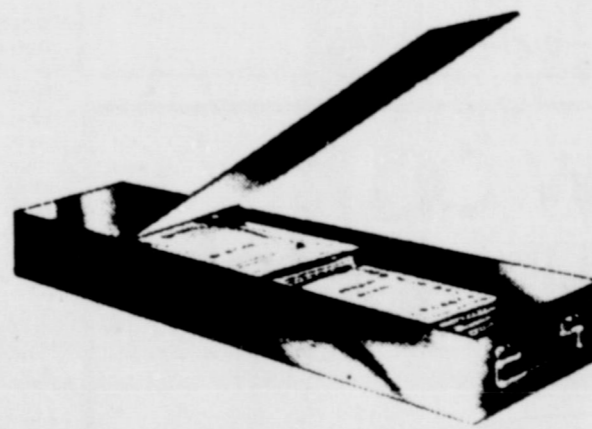
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AUSTIN—Every tomato lover looks forward to those times of the year when vine-ripened tomatoes are in supply. But what about those in-between times of the year when tomatoes are out of season?

Greenhouses, with their

carefully controlled climates, supply at least part of the answer for Texas consumers, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

At last count, there were over 300 greenhouses in the state. The majority of them

produce tomatoes, with a few producing alternate crops of lettuce or cucumbers. About 80 acres of tomatoes are grown under glass.

That acreage may seem insignificant when compared with the 7,300 acres of commercial tomatoes forecast to be planted in Texas in 1976. However, greenhouse yields are approximately fifty times greater than outdoor field yields, and in addition, most managers grow two or three crops each year, White pointed out.

The New Morality And The Authority Of God

(Part 2)

Last week I affirmed that the "new morality" is the logical outcome of the denial of God's authority. There is a second way closely related to the first whereby modern moralists bear their lethal fruit. It is rooted in the teaching that the Christian is under grace in the sense that he is released from all obligations to the authority of God. Those believing this assert that anything a Christian can do is right for him to do and anything he can leave undone is right for him to leave undone. Why? Because no one is perfect (Rom. 3:10), and we are not under law but under grace. (Rom. 6:14)

Paul in Romans 6:14 did not mean that law in no sense applied to the Christian, for in the very next verse he told the Romans they SHOULD NOT SIN. If they were exhorted not to sin they must have been under law because SIN IS TRANSGRESSION OF LAW. (1 John 3:4) The Christian is under law to Christ. (1 Cor. 9:21) He is not under the Mosaic Law of the Old Testament. (Heb. 9:15) No, there is nothing we can do to merit eternal life, for all of us have sinned, but we must do something in faith in order to become children of God, and remain faithful children in order that we may inherit eternal life. Since we live under the Law of Christ, Christians are called on to live on a higher moral level than was required of God's people under the Old Law. (Matt. 19:1-9; Heb. 2:1-4; 10:28-31; 12:25-29). The lawlessness of the "new morality" is not of God's authority.

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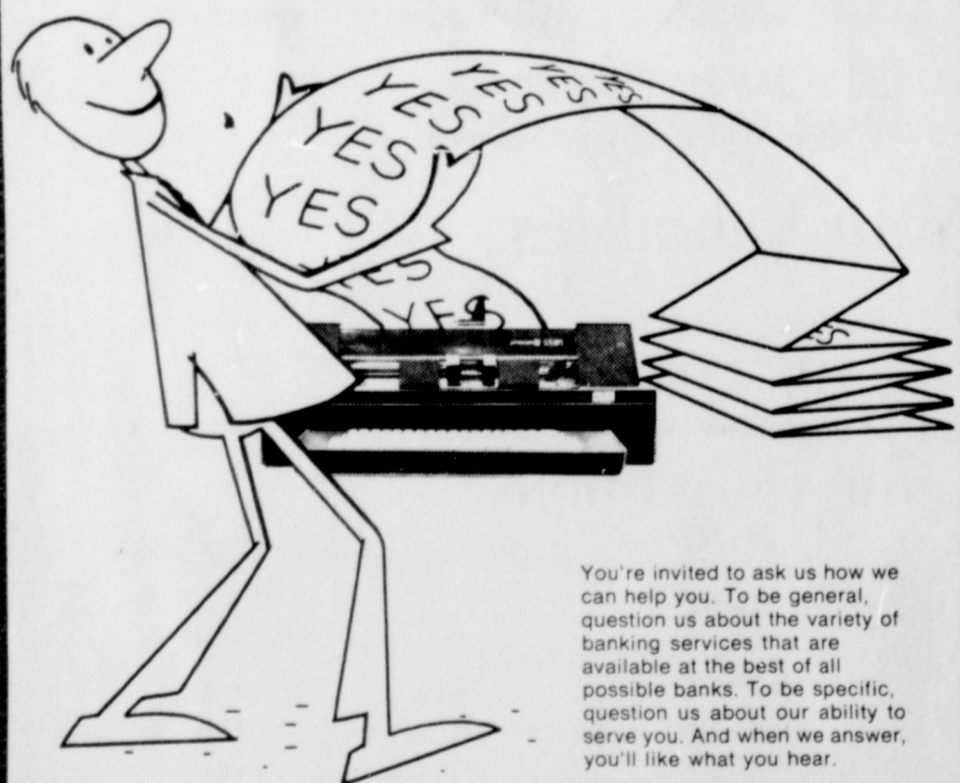
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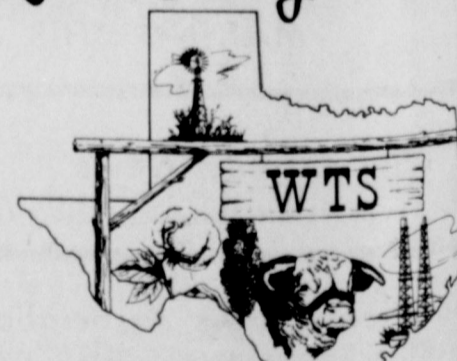
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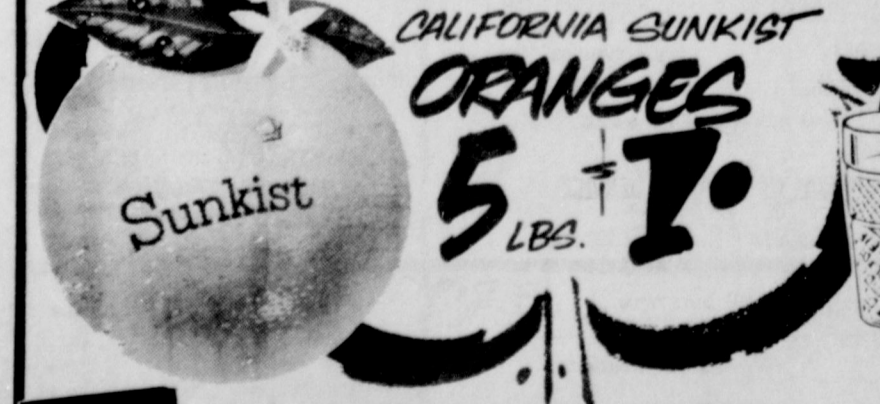


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
