Response Good In Clean-Up

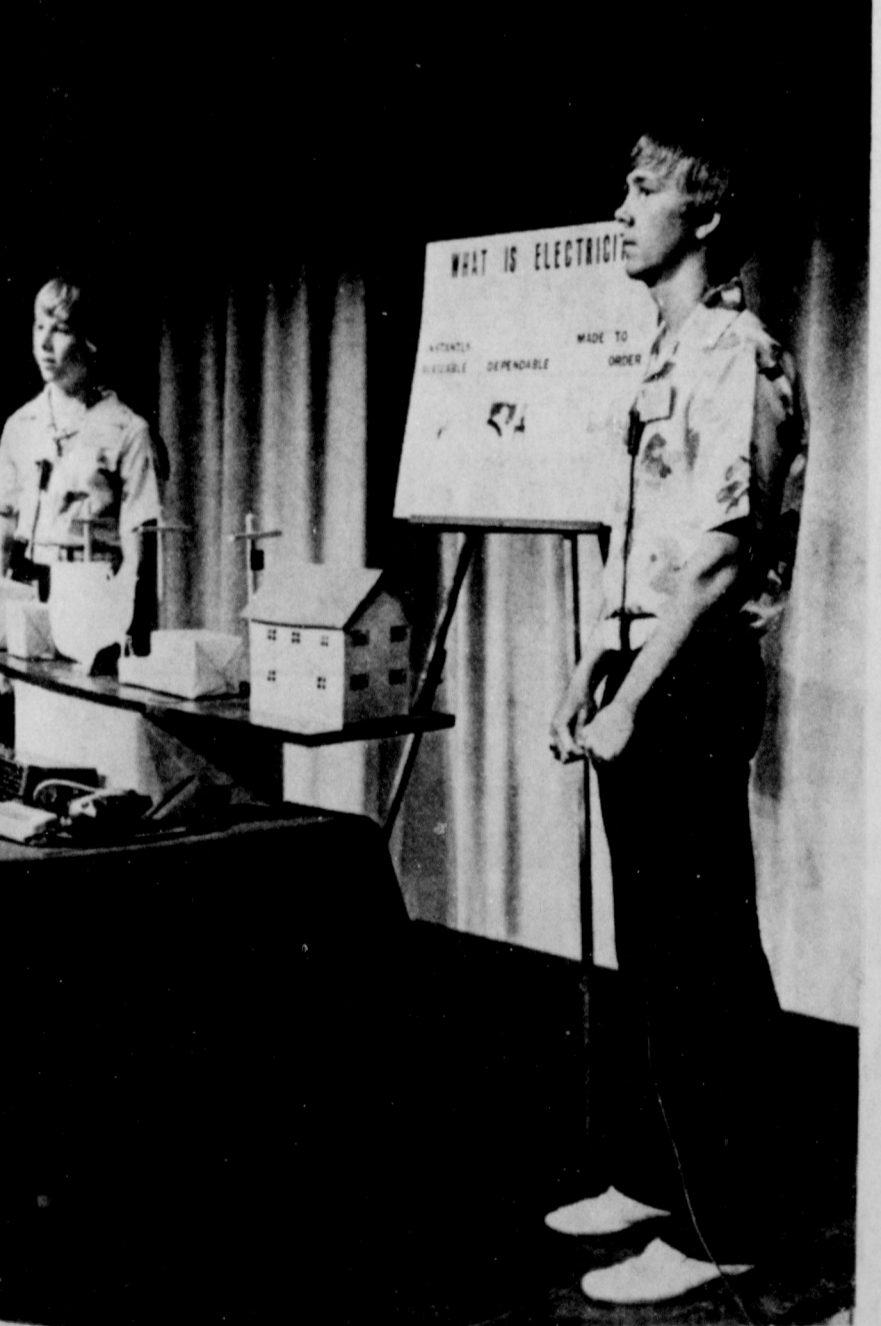
With only ten days remaining of the intensive Tahoka city-wide clean-up drive, individual citizens are being urged as a matter of community pride to cut the weeds on their premises, vacant lots, sidewalks and alleys and place trash and junk in or near the city dumpster containers. This final intensive drive, sponsors hope can be completed by June 19, preparatory to the Bicentennial celebration here on July 3-4. Many citizens have joined the clean-up drive this past week, state George McCracken and Winston Wharton of the sponsoring committee. "We sincerely appreciate you people who have cooperated with this move to make our town a cleaner and more desirable place in which to live," McCracken said Tuesday. "We just ask others to join us." In addition to the Chamber of Commerce and City of Tahoka, the Lions Club and the Bicentennial Committee have been helping this clean-up campaign. Another eye-sore improved recently is the old Rose Theatre building and lots, which were bought by Wharton a few weeks ago. Several businesses are also painting and repairing store fronts. Still another eye-sore that needs to be remedied, sponsors say, is weeds growing in sidewalks and vacant lots downtown. The residence section is possibly cleaner than it has been in several years, but more beautifying and removal of weeds and junk is needed. Abandoned car bodies and other junk need to be removed. Sponsors urge cooperation of others in these instances to help make this a cleaner town.

Rains Benefit County Crops

A very heavy downpour of rain last Friday over the north central part of the county, and scattered showers since then have benefitted many of Lynn county's crops. Friday's downpour gauged 2.00 inches in west Tahoka, flooded streets, drenched some cars, and damaged some crops, but was of more benefit than loss as whole. Most of the 1.50 to 2.00 rain in Tahoka fell in about 40 minutes between 4:30 and 5:30 p.m. Electric power was disrupted by the storm for about an hour and 45 minutes. Heaviest part of the rain extended only a short distance east and west of town, but several miles to the north and grew lighter near the Lubbock county line. The New Home and T-Bar and Wells areas also received heavy downpours. Showers since then have covered much of the county, although some areas still need rain. Most farms of the county have cotton and milo up and doing well to fairly well. Milo and sunflower acreage is reported smaller than last year. The rain last Friday in Tahoka brought the total for the month of 2.04 inches, the total since April 12 to 5.52 inches, and the total for the year so far to 5.81 inches.

Pirates Lead In Minor League

After eight games of Minor League Play, the Pirates are still leading the pack with 7 wins and 1 tie game. The Dodgers are in the second position with 5 wins, 2 losses and 1 tie game. The Astros are in third place with 2 wins, 6 losses; and the Orioles are in fourth place with one win and 7 losses.

The team standings don't really tell the whole story - as you would have to be at the games to see how really close the games are sometimes. The Orioles are in fourth place currently, but they had a very close race with the Dodgers last Tuesday night, losing by only 1 run - and in an earlier game played this season against the Pirates, they were down only 3 runs when the game ended. Unfortunately, coming close only really counts when you are tossing horse shoes.

There have been 445 Minor League runs scored in the eight games played to

date. The Dodgers are ahead in total runs for the season with 143; the Pirates have 136; the Astros have 88; and the Orioles have 78.

The first game played Tuesday night was won by the Pirates over the Astros 28 to 10. AGRICULTURE HAS VITAL IMPACT ON STATE'S ECONOMY

When all agricultural receipts are in, Texas farmers and ranchers are expected to market products totaling near \$6 billion for the 1975 crop year.

The \$6 billion total is expected to be rather equally divided between crops and livestock, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Strong hog and poultry prices should keep cash receipts from livestock at about the same level as the previous year, while crop income should be up sharply due to strong prices for wheat, sorghum, sunflowers, fruits and vegetables.

Cash receipts are only one side of the ledger, notes the Extension Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System. Farmers and ranchers have been faced with an estimated 11 per cent increase in total production costs over the previous year, so despite higher cash receipts, net income is expected to remain near the 1974 level of \$545 million.

Governor Dolph Briscoe has set as one of the primary goals of his administration that of making Texas No. 1 in agriculture. "I want our Texas agriculture to be a factor in helping not only Texas and America, but the world to live more abundantly."

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, under the leadership of Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, is joining in the intensive effort

Sherry Etheredge Says

Eggplant may darken when frozen, but treatment with lemon juice and blanching helps prevent this problem. Frances Reasonover, a foods and nutrition specialist, says.

She is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Her specific recommendations for freezing eggplant begin with washing, peeling, cutting into one-third to one-half inch slices or cubes. Then dip into a solution of three tablespoons lemon juice per one quart of water.

"Blanch in boiling water for four minutes. Cool under running water and dip again into the lemon juice and water mixture. Pack dry."

"One-half cup of eggplant furnishes 10 International units of Vitamin A and three milligrams of Vitamin C. It also contains one gram of protein and small amounts of other minerals and vitamins," she noted.

Some recipes to add eggplant's flavor variety to family meals follow.

Eggplant Casserole: 2 large or 3 small eggplants 1 large onion, grated 1 bell pepper, chopped 1 small garlic button, minced 3 eggs, beaten 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

1 can tomatoes and chilies salt and pepper to taste 1 can mushroom soup 1/2 stick oleo 2 cups grated cheese 2 cups cracker crumbs Cook eggplant until tender; drain and mash. Add remaining ingredients except cheese and crackers; mix well. Alternate layers of eggplant mixture, cheese and cracker crumbs in casserole. Butter last layer of cracker crumbs; sprinkle on top. Bake 50 minutes at 325 degrees F. Serves 12.

Stuffed Eggplant: 1 2-pound eggplant 6 tablespoons butter or margarine 1/4 teaspoon finely minced

garlic 1/2 cup diced celery 1/4 cup coarsely shredded carrots 1/4 cup chopped onion 1/2 teaspoon salt 3/4 teaspoon chili powder 1/2 teaspoon oregano leaves 1/2 cup sliced stuffed olives 1 cup toasted croutons 1/2 cup chopped tomatoes, fresh or canned

Cut eggplant in half lengthwise. Parboil 25 minutes. Cool and scoop out pulp to one-fourth inch of skin. Cut pulp in cubes. Melt butter or margarine in medium skillet. Add garlic, celery, carrots and onion. Cook until onion is transparent. Blend in eggplant pulp and other ingredients. Spoon mixture into eggplant shell. Place in buttered baking dish and bake at 400 degrees F. for 20 minutes. Serves six.

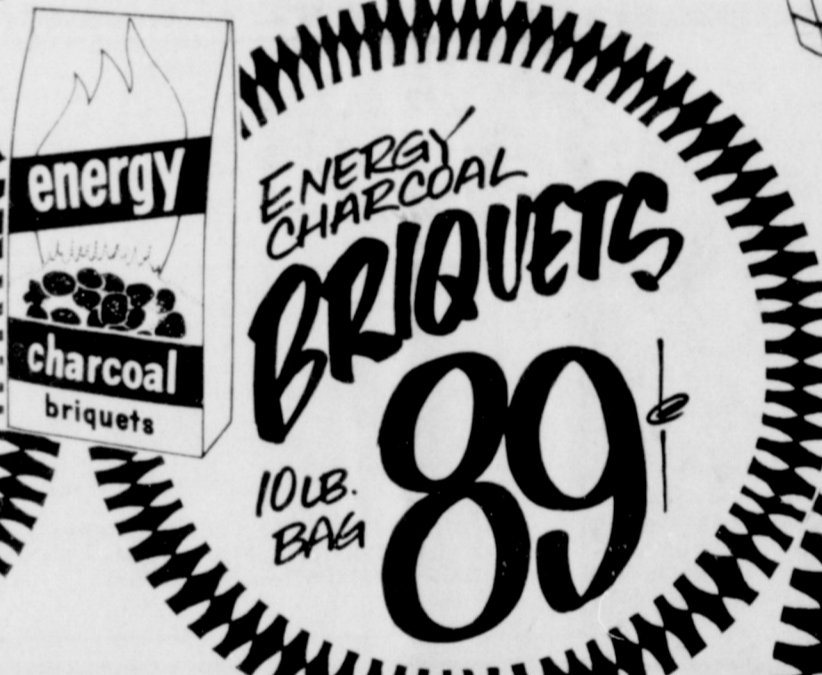
