Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals.

This survey is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Sherry Etheredge Says

"Versatile" is the word milk—and since June is Milk Month, this is a good time to check the family's drinking habits. Adults and children under 18 years of age need two ounces servings each. Children aged nine to 12 and pregnant women need three or more servings a day, while teenagers and nursing

Milk is an excellent source of calcium to help form bones and teeth and keep them strong. It's hard to get enough calcium in the diet without consuming milk in some form daily.

The protein in milk builds and repairs body tissues, helps the body fight infection and supplies energy. Milk is also rich in riboflavin, a B-vitamin that helps keep skin healthy and vision clear.

To give family members their recommended amount of milk each day, serve it as a beverage, in products made with milk such as ice cream and cheese or use milk in preparing main dishes, soups, sauces and pudding.

Ham-vegetable chowder, sunshine fruit-cream mold and homemade vanilla ice cream all contain the nutrition and flavor of milk.

Quick Ham-Vegetable Chowder

10½-ounce can cream of mushroom soup, condensed

10½-ounce can cream of celery soup, condensed
2½ cups milk
1 cup frozen peas
½ cup green onions, thinly sliced
1 cup cooked ham, cut in thin 1-inch strips

Mix all ingredients in a two-quart saucepan and heat to simmering. Simmer 5-10 minutes or until vegetables are done.

Makes six servings, about one cup each.

Calories per serving: about 220. For fewer calories, use skim milk in place of whole milk. About 195 calories per serving.

Menu Suggestion: Serve with apple-and-celery salad and oatmeal cookies for dessert.

Sunshine Fruit-Cream Mold
3-ounce pkg. lemon-flavored

gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 cup pineapple liquid and cold water
6 lettuce leaves
20-ounce can drained pineapple chunks
6 mint sprigs
1 cup seedless grapes, halved
½ cup whipping cream
½ cup process Cheddar cheese, coarsely shredded
6 small grape clusters

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water; stir in pineapple liquid and water. Chill until thick but not set. Fold in cheese, pineapple chunks, grapes; mix gently. Whip cream; fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into a 1½-quart mold or six individual molds. Chill until set. Unmold on lettuce. Garnish with grape clusters and mint sprigs.

Makes six servings, ¼ cup each
Calories per serving: about 235

Vanilla Ice Cream

2 cups sugar
¼ cup cornstarch
¼ teaspoon salt
1 quart milk
4 eggs, beaten
2 tablespoons vanilla
1 quart table cream

Mix sugar, cornstarch, and salt in a large saucepan. Stir in milk gradually. Cook over low heat stirring occasionally until thickened, 12-15 minutes.

Stir a small amount of the hot cornstarch mixture into the beaten eggs; then stir the eggs into the remaining cornstarch mixture.

Cook over low heat, stirring constantly four or five minutes longer, or until the mixture is about the consistency of pudding. Chill thoroughly. This step is essential for a smooth ice cream. Stir in vanilla and cream.

Pour into a one-gallon ice cream freezer canister; fill not more than two-thirds full.

Freeze in a hand-cranked or electric ice cream freezer packed with a mixture of one part ice cream salt and six parts crushed ice.

In handcranking, the ice cream is frozen when the crank is difficult to turn. An electric freezer shuts off automatically when ice cream is frozen.

Remove dasher. Repack ice cream freezer with a mixture of one part salt and eight parts ice. Let ice cream stand about two hours before serving. Or, pack ice cream in freezer containers and harden in a home freezer.

NOTE: For this recipe, use only clean eggs with no cracks in shells.
Makes 28 servings, ½ cup each.
Calories per serving: about 165.

For fewer calories, use chilled evaporated milk (not diluted) in place of table cream. About 140 calories per serving.

VARIATIONS
Fruit Ice Cream: Stir two cups crushed or pureed sweetened fruit into ice cream after dasher is removed. Repack freezer with salt and ice; allow ice cream to harden. About 180 calories per serving if frozen strawberries are used in basic recipe; 160 in recipe for fewer calories.

Chocolate Swirl Ice Cream
Swirl 2½ cups mocha dessert sauce or any chocolate sauce through ice cream after dasher is removed. Repack freezer; allow ice cream to harden. About 220 calories per serving if mocha dessert sauce is used and 230 if chocolate sauce is used in basic recipe.

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One Body In Christ (Part 3)

The Relationship Between Christ and His Church

Some denominational people have tried to justify the division of which they are a part by degrading the Church or by saying the Church is not important. Read Ephesians 5:21-23 and you can understand that the relationship between Christ and His church is compared to the relationship between husband and wife. Some degrading statements often heard are—"One church is as good as another."—"Join the church of your choice."—"It doesn't make any difference which church one belongs to as long as he is truly serious." If the church is no more important than the above statements indicate, then Christ is not very important either because THE CHURCH IS HIS BODY. (Eph. 1:23).

Acts 8:3 teaches that Saul made havoc of the Church, or in other words, he persecuted the Church. Acts 9:1-4 says that Jesus appeared to Saul as he went to Damascus to persecute the Church, and Jesus said to him: "Saul, why persecutest thou ME?" This scripture indicates that when the Church is persecuted, Christ is persecuted. Why? BECAUSE THE CHURCH IS HIS BODY. (Eph. 1:22-23).

Members of the church of Christ are ridiculed at times because of their doctrine regarding the importance of the Church. Doesn't it stand to reason that just as one cannot persecute the Church without persecuting Christ, so one cannot teach Christ without teaching about His church. He purchased the church with His blood; He gave Himself for the church (Acts 20:8; Ephesians 5:25). "The Church" is singular. The Head has only one body (Eph. 1:22-23, Eph. 4:4-6). Just as the husband has only one wife, (Eph. 5:21-23). Friend, don't let anyone deceive you by their teaching that Paul in the 12th chapter of I Corinthians condoned denominationalism by stating that "the body has many members." Study the context of this scripture to see that Paul was writing about individuals and their spiritual gifts within the body of Christ or church of God in Corinth. Paul preached against denominationalism which is division. (1 Cor. 1:10 ff). More to follow.

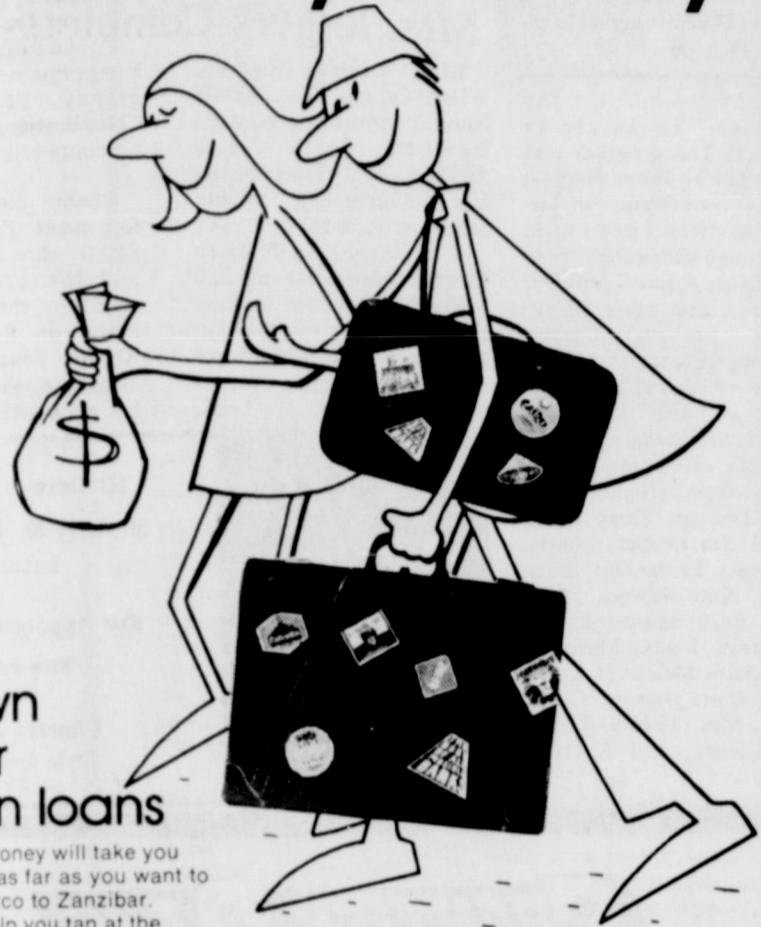

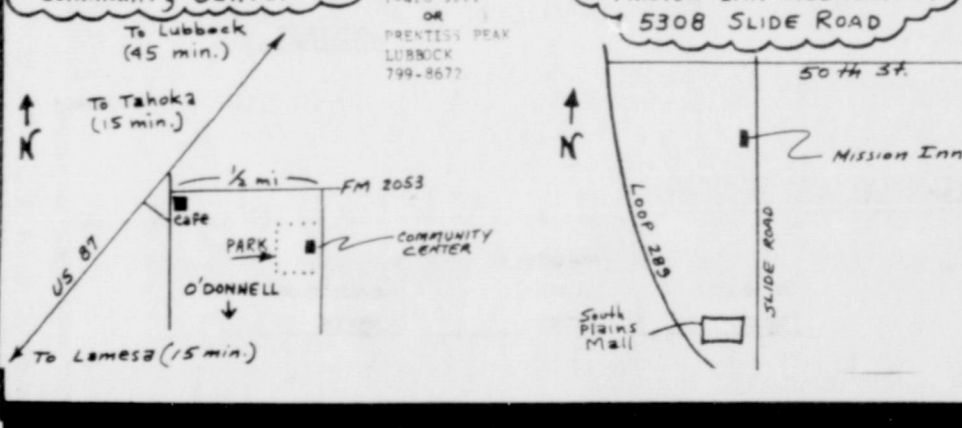

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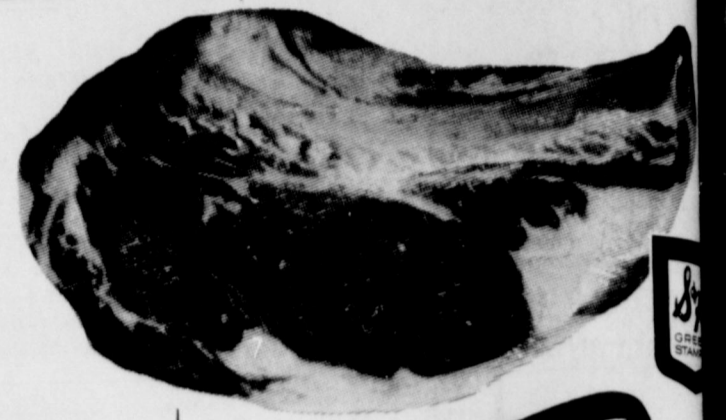
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
