'Regardless of what we did for a living, Lee and I always worked together". Gertie felt that that fact was significant during the times when the sand blew a crop out and years when it didn't rain. "One thing that is so different from now, we were afraid to live beyond our means because we knew there was no way we could get a big debt paid and we have always believed in paying our debts"

In 1922 Lee and Gertie adopted an infant, William Thomas, whom they called W. T. He went to war and was killed in New Guinea the last year of the war. They still remember their letters containing bad news from the War Department.

Remembering days of yore was pleasant for Gertie McFadden even though it

brought to her mind some not-so-good times. "We ate red beans and potatoes and still love them. When we had fresh vegetables, my, how we loved green peas and

roasting ears!" Outstanding in their memories of other early-day settlers is the R. L Littlepage family.

Mrs. McFadden, when asked what she felt was most drastically different from her days as a young woman, said without hesitation, "Oh, girls just don't wear clothes these days. Why, when I was a girl, we were ashamed to show our ankles and it was awfully hard to get into a buggy and not show your

Our thoughts have been geared to this fact in the news office and I have taken my thoughts home with me--not necessarily as "part of a day's work", but because reunions, get-togethers, homecomings, etc. are an interesting part of the human make-up.

Whether we want to admit it or not, we relish the idea of a reunion with friends and relatives. Nostalgia plays an important part in our lives. Technically, the word ''nostalgia'' means homesickness, but the word connotes to me anything that brings back fond memories. Father Time is a wonderful friend in that he erases unpleasantness. For example, were it not for this fact, there would be many an "only child" because mothers could not but remember the pain of childbirth and the throes of sleepless nights because of a newborn baby in the house.

All of this I've said to prove a point--at reunions we remember just the good times and pay special tribute to those of our acquaintances who are no longer here, all of which is great. Many in my generation are living off the interest, so to speak, of deposits made by our parents and grandparents in Lynn County. We're grateful.

HOWEVER, there is another facet to this. Recently someone asked me why we still prescribe the reading of the novel Silas Marner for high school students. Offhand, I suggested, because of the moral to the story--Marner was a miser and lost all his money before he learned a lesson. But there's a deeper lesson, one that pricks at my conscience. In case you are not familiar with the story, Silas Marner came to the village of Raveloe as a weaver. He was always seen carrying a large bag on his back, was not a very sociable fellow--even the dogs barked at him and the children threw sticks at him. Folks were suspicious of him! The reason for this suspicion, primarily, was that the "old timers" didn't know who he was. Where did he come from? Who were his parents?

I'm suggesting that we're guilty of the same offense. Many times people who move into our midst are not "accepted" because we're suspicious until we can come to grips with their

J. E. Parker


J. E. Parker, 80, former Garza County Judge, died June 21 at his home after a lengthy illness. He had lived in Garza County since 1916.





One Body In Christ (Part 3)

The Relationship Between Christ and His Church

Some denominational people have tried to justify the division of which they are a part by degrading the Church or by saying the Church is not important. Read Ephesians 5:21-23 and you can understand that the relationship between Christ and His church is compared to the relationship between husband and wife. Some degrading statements often heard are---"One church is as good as another."---"Join the church of your choice."---and, "It doesn't make any difference which church one belongs to as long as he is truly serious." If the church is no more important than the above statements indicate, then Christ is not very important either because THE CHURCH IS HIS BODY. (Eph. 1:23).

Acts 8:3 teaches that Saul made havoc of the Church, or in other words, he persecuted the Church. Acts 9:1-4 says that Jesus appeared to Saul as he went to Damascus to persecute the Church, and Jesus said to him: "Saul, why persecutest thou ME?" This scripture indicates that when the Church is persecuted. Christ is persecuted. Why? BECAUSE THE CHURCH IS HIS BODY. (Eph.

Members of the church of Christ are ridiculed at times because of their doctrine regarding the importance of the Church. Doesn't it stand to reason that just as one cannot persecute the Church without persecuting Christ, so one cannot teach Christ without teaching about His church. He purchased the church with His blood; He gave Himself for the church (Acts 20:8; Ephesians 5:25). "The Church' is singular. The Head has only one body (Eph. 1:22-23, Eph. 4:4-6). Just as the husband has only one wife, (Eph. 5:21-23). Friend, don't let anyone deceive you by their teaching that Paul in the 12th chapter of I Corinthians condoned denominationalism by stating that "the body has many members." Study the context of this scripture to see that Paul was writing about individuals and their spiritual gifts within the body of Christ or church of God in Corinth. Paul preached against denominationalism which is division. (I Cor. 1:10 ff). More to follow




