## 'Who Can Find A Worthy Woman? . . . Her Price Is Far Above Rubies'

## Carrie Harvick Reminisces With Family And Friends On Her 90th Birthday

MRS. CARRIE HARVICK'S ninety years have been spent for her family and friends.

"It was a day that I will remember the rest of my Went" life", said Mrs. Carrie Harvick when the sun went

down on August 29, 1976. She had been the honored guest at a birthday party on that day in Tahoka's First National Bank Party Room.

But it was more than the ordinary birthday party. It was a day when seven children were saying to their mother, "We thank you for a life of sacrifice." It was a day when those children told their friends that they were grateful that they had a mother such as she. And it was a day of reminiscing-remembering the good and the bad. There had been some of all.

The festivities began at noon on Sunday when some sixty family members gathered at the Robert Harvick home in Tahoka for lunch. At three o'clock that afternoon in the Bank Party Room, more than fifty friends joined the family group. A special friend, Mrs. Beulah (Applewhite) Rutledge en-tertained guests with her rendition of "My Get-UpAnd-Go Has Got Up and

Guests registered from Fort Worth, Dallas, Throckmorton, San Angelo, Stamford, Lamesa, Lubbock, Gainesville, Monahans, Sagerton, and Dumas.

In September of 1974, Mrs. Harvick broke her hip and since that time she has resided in Colonial Nursing Home in Tahoka where she continues her handwork and spends leisure hours with her memories, most important of which are her eight (seven living) children, nineteen grandchildren, fifteen great-grandchildren, and one great-great granddaughter. Ninety years has been a

relatively short time to Carrie Harvick, in many ways, and the span of years has not dulled her memory in the least. She was born Carrie Rush on August 30, 1886 in Arkansas and is the only survivor in a family of three sons and three daughters.

She recalls very vividly the meager schooling she had between the time she

began school as a six-yearold and when the Rush family moved to Honey Grove in Fannin County, Texas when she was seven. She remembers the long wagon journey to their new home and that they stayed there only three years before moving to near Houston.

Outstanding in her storehouse of memories is the September 8, 1900 Galveston storm which wiped out the family's belongings and badly injured the parents. Fourteen-year-old Carrie stayed home from school to care for her injured mother and when the time was right for her to go to school, she was ashamed to go because of her age. Consequently, when she had children of her own, their schooling came

The Rush family moved next to Jones County, Texas and there Carrie met Bill Harvick at church and they were married on September 15, 1908.

Eight children were born to them. Lawrence, Roy, Dub, and Robert all live in Tahoka: Elmer lives in

Monahans; and Joe at Gainesville. Frankie (Mrs. Dale Williams) lives in Lubbock and another daughter, Corine Cathcart, passed away in 1963.

The Harvicks moved from Stonewall County to Levelland in 1929 and to the Joe Bailey community in Lynn County in 1931. Mr. Harvick died in 1961.

During World War II, five of the Harvick's six sons and both sons-in-law served in the armed forces, all at the same time. For that reason, Mrs. Harvick was speechless one day as she tried to purchase a scarce article and was asked by the clerk, "Don't you know there's a

Surely the Harvick children would agree with the Biblical wise man, Solomon, as he penned the words in his book of Proverbs, "Who can find a worthy woman?... her price is far above

Giving In Worship

Worship in truth and spirit must include giving according to God's plan. Scriptural giving is a sacrifice to God--- 'an odor of sweet smell, a sacrifice well-pleasing to God." (Phil. 4:10-20) Giving of our Best, not in a way that deprives us of our needs, is the sacrifice required of true worshipers in both the Old and New Testaments. Late August or early September fertilization of summer grasses can improve their quality and extend the grazing period. This can result in a substantial reduction in the amount of hay and winter pasture needed What nutrients to include

in the fertilizer depends on current soil levels and management planned for 1977. Phosphorus for next year along with some nitrogen can be applied this

Among the advantages of fall fertilization of summer grasses are these: -- Increase the amount and quality of fall grazing. Avoid the spring rush to

fertilize. Allow the time of applying nitrogen in the spring to be based on temperature.
