Plans For Fair And Art Contest Revealed County Harvest Festival To Include October 8 Homecoming Spirit Parade

Entries on all four school buses in Tahoka are to be represented in the parade and a winner and runner-up will be announced in each category after the parade. The parade will originate at the school and wind its way through the downtown area at 10:00 a.m., at which time all players and coaches will be introduced.

Most Areas Of County Receive Good Rains

Rains after Friday midnight, Monday afternoon and night, and Tuesday afternoon ranging from a quarter inch up to three inches total were beneficial to most Lynn County crops, much of which had begun to wilt and throw off fruit. Tahoka received .37 inch Friday night, 1.21 inches Monday night, and .20 inch to 3:15 Tuesday afternoon, to bring the total for August to 2.41 inches and for the year to 16.24 inches in Tahoka. Tuesday afternoon, scattered showers were falling over the county and more rain was in prospect. Up to three inches of rain fell six to eight miles north of Tahoka and two and a half inches five miles southeast of Tahoka. Much of the county received an inch or more. However, some farming areas still need rain, including parts of the Draw area, the northeast part of the county, and parts of the northwest section. Rank and heavily fruited cotton had been wilting badly in spots and was throwing off young bolls. After six to ten inches of rain in July, cotton needed one more good rain about

mid-August, but the county still is expected to make a big crop, barring too much cool and wet weather in September and October, farmers say, this in spite of the approximately 35,000 acres that County Agent Bill Griffin estimates were des-

troyed or damaged by hail this summer. Additional rain Tuesday night in Tahoka measured .72 inch, bringing the week's total to 2.50 inches and total for the year to 16.95 inches.

The Spectator...

Many cities and towns are making the news these days due to deficit spending, crime reports, and name it--anything but good. However, Tahoka's Chamber of Commerce recently received a letter from a Mrs. Ralph Taylor, executive secretary of the Midland Motor Company, telling of an experience she had in the city of Tahoka. Quite a compliment to a community, especially when the men that go out of their way to be kind to a stranger in trouble, instead of trying to profit from other's misfortunes. To read recent newspaper accounts of people and their problems and the help from strangers, our visit to Tahoka was a revelation to us...in the future when anyone comes to Tahoka, Texas, I will tell them of a community that cares."

You doubt the statement "fools rush in where angels fear to tread", read on. I'm not "spouting off" without having first talked to City Manager Ray Mason. I'm not doing anything but complaining (for lack of a better word) in the shop or on the turnrow--I'm expressing my sincere concern. It assures me that necessary safety measures are being taken to better the situation. Speed limit signs have been posted and the school area is patrolled by city law enforcement people at critical times of the school day. You don't have an occasion to be in the area of schools during the time when students are arriving or departing, or during the noon hour, if you have lots of nerve and have your life insurance premiums paid, take a chance and see for yourself the situation about which I speak. I agree that there is a generation gap between students and me and I may not appreciate that peer pressure "causes" a youngster to get gravel in my face, but I do appreciate the fact that children's safety should not depend on the kind of thinking. We can't and don't put a price on a child's life. It may mean some injured egos and parents' feathers, but the time is now for our streets to be safer. The entire blame cannot be laid at the feet of our drivers; many mamas and papas ignore warning signs. Whatever or whoever--we have a problem and I doubt that its solution is the serious injury or death of a child. By that I mean that sometimes it takes a tragedy to shake us out of our complacency and lethargy.

'Who Can Find A Worthy Woman? ... Her Price Is Far Above Rubies'

Carrie Harvick Reminisces With Family And Friends On Her 90th Birthday

MRS. CARRIE HARVICK'S ninety years have been spent for her family and friends.

"It was a day that I will remember the rest of my life", said Mrs. Carrie Harvick when the sun went down on August 29, 1976. She had been the honored guest at a birthday party on that day in Tahoka's First National Bank Party Room. But it was more than the ordinary birthday party. It was a day when seven children were saying to their mother, "We thank you for a life of sacrifice." It was a day when those children told their friends that they were grateful that they had a mother such as she. And it was a day of reminiscing--remembering the good and the bad. There had been some of all. The festivities began at noon on Sunday when some sixty family members gathered at the Robert Harvick home in Tahoka for lunch. At three o'clock that afternoon in the Bank Party Room, more than fifty friends joined the family group. A special friend, Mrs. Beulah (Applewhite) Rutledge entertained guests with her rendition of "My Get-Up-

And-Go Has Got Up and Went". Guests registered from Fort Worth, Dallas, Throckmorton, San Angelo, Stamford, Lamesa, Lubbock, Gainesville, Monahans, Sargent, and Dumas. In September of 1974, Mrs. Harvick broke her hip and since that time she has resided in Colonial Nursing Home in Tahoka where she continues her handwork and spends leisure hours with her memories, most important of which are her eight (seven living) children, nineteen grandchildren, fifteen great-grandchildren, and one great-great-granddaughter. Ninety years has been a relatively short time to Carrie Harvick, in many ways, and the span of years has not dulled her memory in the least. She was born Carrie Rush on August 30, 1886 in Arkansas and is the only survivor in a family of three sons and three daughters. She recalls very vividly the meager schooling she had between the time she

began school as a six-year-old and when the Rush family moved to Honey Grove in Fannin County, Texas when she was seven. She remembers the long wagon journey to their new home and that they stayed there only three years before moving to near Houston. Outstanding in her storehouse of memories is the September 8, 1900 Galveston storm which wiped out the family's belongings and badly injured the parents. Fourteen-year-old Carrie stayed home from school to care for her injured mother and when the time was right for her to go to school, she was ashamed to go because of her age. Consequently, when she had children of her own, their schooling came first. The Rush family moved next to Jones County, Texas and there Carrie met Bill Harvick at church and they were married on September 15, 1908. Eight children were born to them. Lawrence, Roy, Dub, and Robert all live in Tahoka; Elmer lives in

Monahans; and Joe at Gainesville. Frankie (Mrs. Dale Williams) lives in Lubbock and another daughter, Corine Cathcart, passed away in 1963. The Harvicks moved from Stonewall County to Leveland in 1929 and to the Joe Bailey community in Lynn County in 1931. Mr. Harvick died in 1961. During World War II, five of the Harvick's six sons and both sons-in-law served in the armed forces, all at the same time. For that reason, Mrs. Harvick was speechless one day as she tried to purchase a scarce article and was asked by the clerk, "Don't you know there's a war on?" Surely the Harvick children would agree with the Biblical wise man, Solomon, as he penned the words in his book of Proverbs, "Who can find a worthy woman?... her price is far above rubies."

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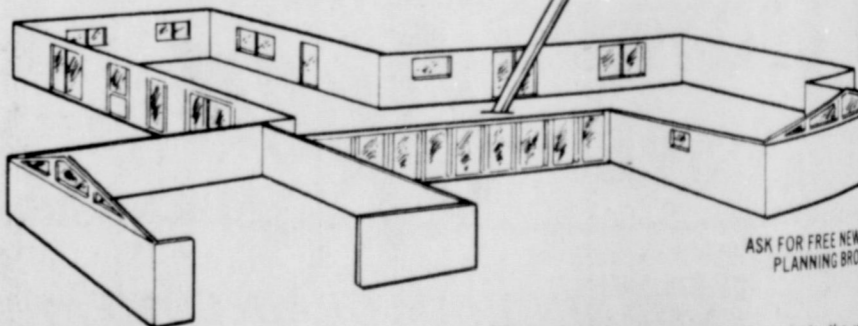

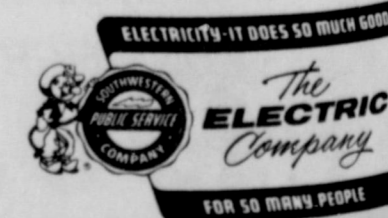
WALLS conform to one of three options: #ONE - 6" walls with R-19" insulation, #TWO - tongue and grooved styrofoam sheathing, 4" walls and R-11" insulation, or #THREE - R-15" minimum insulation. Walls must include a vapor barrier of 6 mil. polyethylene or foil-backed sheetrock. Sill insulation or sill caulking (under bottom plate) is also required.

CEILING insulation must equal R-30*

FLOORS (if pier and beam construction) must be insulated with R-13". In slab floors choose between Option #1, rigid urethane or styrofoam (3/4 minimum thickness) from top of floor along the outside edge of the slab down to the brick ledge, or Option #2, vermiculite poured in the cavity between bricks and slab up to the top of the floor.

WINDOWS AND DOORS are weather-stripped and caulked. Double pane glass or storm windows and insulated core or storm doors also ensure energy efficiency. It is recommended that glass area not exceed 8% of floor space.

*The "R" value in the guidelines indicates the "resistance" of the insulation to the flow of heat.

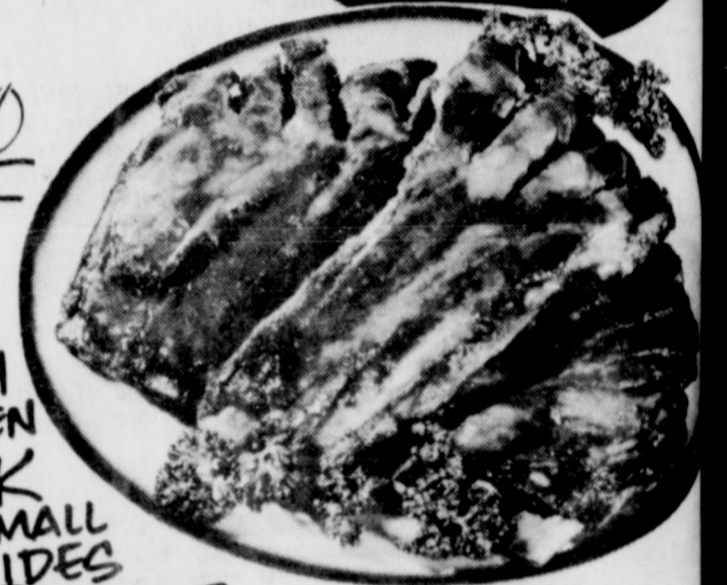
