Recent weeks, many individuals have expressed their concern and their "disgruntled" over the fact that the city of Tahoka is littered with an excess (to put it mildly) of stray dogs. When I say "stray", I mean dogs who are not registered, and, as is usually the case, no respector of person nor property.

Granted, some alleys and yards are none the less off after being paid a visit by a scavenger, but I'm crying out for the ones whose yards are a mess of hours of hard work and a touch of the forgotten pride we should feel in our neighborhood.

Tahoka's City Ordinance Number 135 addresses the problem more forcefully than I--in all respect to the mongrels who crave the next neighbor's garbage--an owner is to keep his dog in a pen and such animal is to be vaccinated for rabies. Further, I understand, the owner is to have a license and its owner is liable to be fined from \$10 to \$100 a day for every day the animal is loose.

Pride is one of those abstract ideas favored by members of Commerce everywhere, "defined" by community leaders, and neglected by the rest of the people.

It is hard one to define, but let me throw out a definition for size. I say civic pride is what makes a person to adopt, as a personal project, an improvement of his surroundings.

It doesn't at all suggest that one has to serve on a committee nor be forever on a soap box about his love for his town, etc.

It suggests, however, that when he sees a great or small, he takes care of it even if it is going "beyond my property line."

It is the downtown Tahoka and highways approaching suffering because of the weed situation. It is every vacant lot (and some that are not) that are covered in unsightly weeds and trash; it is the fact that recent rains have made the dirt "keeping house outside" nearly unbearable.

Mason tells me that the city crews are extremely thin in this situation and he is asking us as citizens to let some of our civic pride show. If you will, surface and lick the problem.

Superintendent Horace Strickland is doing this week, leaving the awesome task with Mr. Dan Garcia, Rudy Fuentes, and John Martinez try to be "a dozen places at once" and Mr. Hardt does the cemetery work. For a town with better than 1100 water meters to service, add the extra chores connected with the mill problems, and on top of that, this is a weed thing--if ever there were a time when the Public needed to harness up, I think it's time.

Minutes a day on a downtown lot or the sidewalk cracks down the street from us make a whole of a difference and maybe help us understand a bit about civic pride.

Belton Howell Pauses To Celebrate His 90th Birthday

Most of it has been said--his life has been one filled with rich experiences. Newspaper folks have interviewed him and he has told his version of the growing pains suffered by Tahoka and the surrounding area. "He has been there", as the old saying goes.

He didn't watch history being made--he played an active role in that making.

Belton Howell was ninety years old last Thursday, September 9th. That may come as a surprise to people who meet him on the street every day for most 90-year-olds have "thrown in the towel" and turned the driving over to the younger generation.

Not so with the "Oldtimer." Someone once said, "When one finds company

in himself and his pursuits, he cannot feel old, no matter what his years may be." And such is the case with one of Tahoka's most colorful citizens.

Howell was born in Comanche County on September 9th, 1886 and came to Lynn County in 1902. His parents were Sam Houston Howell and the former Anna Lyles. "My father lived to be

eighty-four, but my mother died when she was forty-seven," he remembered.

He is the oldest of three boys. Paul lives across the street from the Belton Howells in Tahoka and L. G. (Babe) lives in Seminole.

"I remember meeting Mrs. W. H. Mays and her family when we first came to Lynn County," Mr. Howell said. Mrs. Mays will soon be 100 years old and she attended the Old Settlers Reunion in Tahoka last June 26.

He and Miss Birdie Walters were married in 1915 in Brownfield. Their only child, Wade, was born in 1921 and is a licensed land surveyor and engineer in Odessa. Wade and his wife, an Odessa teacher, have three children.

A visit to the Howell home is a treat to the antique buff. There are the more-than-50-year-old chairs on the front porch, the rocker he brought for his mother 47 years ago, a Victrola--those are the things you can touch. But the thing that stays is the genuine friendliness and concern of Belton and Birdie Howell.

The party on his 90th birthday was a quiet one--the invitation said,

"Some of my friends are going to eat cake and ice cream with me; would you come?" I did and it was a party that I shall not soon forget.

A friend, Mrs. Jack Hoskins, provided the cake. Other guests, besides Mrs. Hoskins, were the Lynn Cooks, whose daughter, Dusti, was celebrating her 13th birthday, and Mr. and Mrs. Oran Short.

Swine Course Scheduled For Sept. 20-23

A Swine Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held September 20-23 under the sponsorship of the Tahoka High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Edwin Roberson, superintendent, and Don Ballard and Mike Reid, agriculture teachers.

Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Swine Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A & M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M University.

Dr. Cohen received a B.S. degree in Animal Science in 1965 and a masters of science degree in Animal Nutrition in 1972 from Texas

A & M. He has also received the Ph.D. in Animal Nutrition from Texas A & M in 1975.

He was raised on a swine and beef cattle ranch in southeastern Llano County and was active in FFA and 4-H programs. During the early 1960's, he was employed at the Texas A & M Swine Center. Between periods of formal training, he worked for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Williamson and Eastland Counties and completed active duty with the U.S. Air Force Reserve.

The short course at Tahoka High is scheduled to begin September 20 at 8 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held on the 21st and 22nd and 23rd. During the dates the short course is in progress, Doctor Cohen will be available to assist swine producers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Ballard and Reid.

Producers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Roberson, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Ballard or Mr. Reid.

An enrollment fee of five dollars will be charged.

RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976

NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir.

La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Río Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueve el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encarecimiento de la calidad de agua y remueve el limite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."

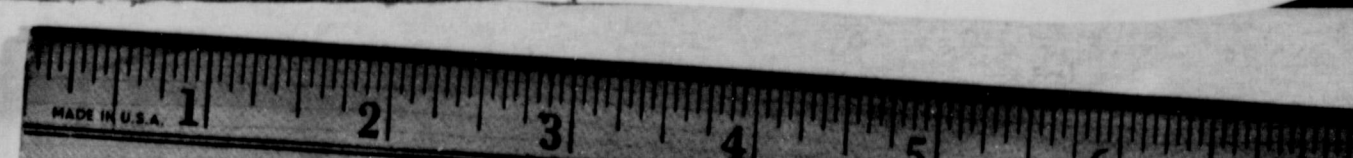

Booster Club Will Meet Next Tuesday

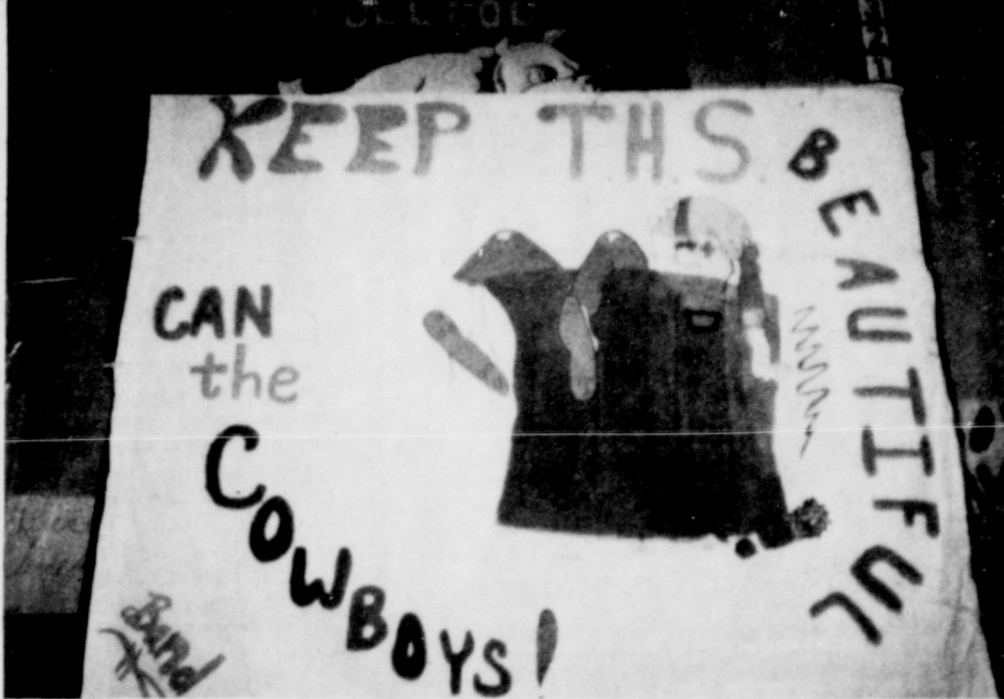

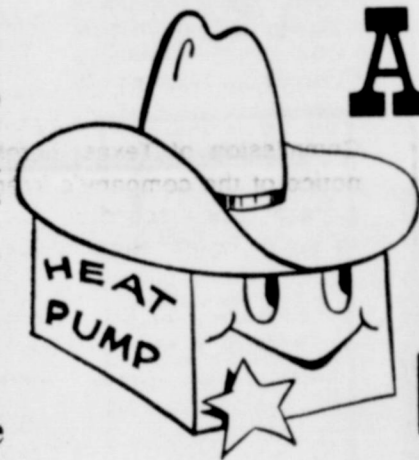
Time For Soil Sampling

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 51

An ordinance providing that no building or other structure shall be built within the city limits of the city of New Home, Texas, without first obtaining a building permit from the city of New Home, Texas; providing for the requisites to be complied with before a building permit will be issued; providing for the appointment of a building inspector; and imposing a penalty for the violation of said ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of New Home, Texas, as follows:

SECTION 1

It shall be unlawful for any person, corporation or other business entity to commence the building of any building or any other structure within the City Limits of New Home, Texas, without first obtaining a building permit pursuant to the terms and provisions hereof.

SECTION 2

The office of Building Inspector is hereby created, and said office shall be filled by the appointment of the City Council. The City Council can appoint any individual to hold said office including one of the aldermen of said City Council.

SECTION 3

Any person, corporation or other business entity desiring to build any type of building or structure within the City Limits of New Home, Texas, shall first submit to the Building Inspector, written plans and specifications of said building or structure, together with written information as to where said building or structure is to be built, together with cash in the amount of \$10.00 for a building permit.

SECTION 4

It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector, to inspect said written plans and specifications, as well as the location where said building or structure is to be built and to determine whether or not said building or structure will be in violation of this ordinance or any other building and zoning ordinance in effect in the City Limits of the City of New Home, Texas, including, but not limited to the restrictions set out in Ordinance No. 42 passed on the 11th day of September, 1969 by the City Council of New Home, Texas. If said building inspector determines that said proposed building or structure is in violation of this ordinance or any other ordinance concerning building restrictions and zoning heretofore passed by the City of New Home, Texas, then he shall refuse to issue a permit and said building or structure shall not be built within the City Limits of New Home, Texas. If said proposed building or structure does not violate any of the terms or provisions of this ordinance or other building or zoning ordinances heretofore passed by the City of New Home, Texas, then said building inspector shall immediately and forthwith issue a building permit for said building or structure.

SECTION 5

Said Building Inspector shall also have the right to refuse to issue a building

permit to any applicant if he deems that said proposed building or structure would not be to the best interest of the citizens of the City of New Home, Texas.

SECTION 6

Any person, corporation or other business entity which is refused a building permit shall have the right to appeal the decision of the Building Inspector, to the whole City Council of the City of New Home, Texas. Said appeal shall be made by giving written notice to the City Council within 30 days from the date that the Building Inspector has refused to issue a building permit. Upon the receipt of said notice of appeal by the City Council, the City Council shall, within 30 days thereafter, set down a hearing on said permit, at which hearing the applicant for said building permit shall have the right to appear in person and present any and all evidence that he desires as to why said building permit should be issued. At said hearing, if a majority of the members of said City Council vote to overrule the decision of the Building Inspector, then a building permit shall immediately be issued.

SECTION 7

It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, and to refuse to issue any permit for any building or structure which would violate any of the provisions of this ordinance (this does not include normal maintenance of your home and property). In case any building or structure is erected, constructed, reconstructed, altered, repaired or converted in violation of this ordinance, the Building Inspector and the City Council are authorized and directed to institute any suit or other lawful action to put an end to any such violation. Any person, corporation or other business entity who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith, or with any of the requirements thereof, or who shall build or alter any building or structure in violation of said ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$100.00, and each day such violation shall be permitted to exist, shall constitute a separate offense. The owner or owners of any building or premises or part thereof where anything in violation of this ordinance shall be placed or shall exist, and any architect, engineer, builder, contractor, agent, person, corporation or other business entity employed in connection therewith and who may have assisted in the commission of any such violation shall be guilty of a separate offense and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined as herein before provided.

SECTION 8

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and declared of no further force or effect.

Fire Safety Week

In the time it takes to read the next few paragraphs, several homes in this country will catch fire. A residence burns every 45 seconds, adding up to 1,900 a day and almost 700,000 a year. Nearly 7,000 persons die in these fires and at least one-fourth of the victims are children under 14.

Most children are pathetically helpless to save themselves in a fire. Through lack of knowledge and practice, they make deadly mistakes, such as rushing into smoke-filled hallways or down burning stairways when they could go safely out a window. Some don't even try to escape. They wander in bewilderment or panic. Many hide in closets or under beds and firemen find them dead, waiting in vain for parents to rescue them.

The tragedy is that youngsters could get out alive if parents would take a few minutes to show them how. Parents would be appalled to discover that their child's school did not hold fire drills. Yet, have you ever held a home fire drill with your child? He is about 200 times more likely to be caught in fire at home than at school.

New Uniforms Arrive For Tahoka Band Students

An extra loud cheer arose from the band section during "Two Bits" at last Friday's pep rally when it was announced to the band that the new uniforms had arrived. The arrival was well timed and came after several calls to freight companies in Lubbock in an attempt to locate the uniforms which had been shipped from the San Antonio factory on August 31.

Actually, parts of the uniforms arrived on Wednesday. The trousers and blazer-cut coats, which make up the concert uniform, came in on Wednesday about 5 p.m. However, the "overlays" (shown in photo) which transform the simple "basic" uniform into the marching attire that will be seen at Tahoka football games, were still in a truck "somewhere in Lubbock"

until about 2:30 last Friday. Since the coats and pants arrived earlier, there was ample time for the uniforms to be issued before Friday. Had the coats not arrived until Friday with the overlays, it is doubtful the band could have been fitted before game time.

The uniforms came from Sol Frank Uniform Company in San Antonio at a cost of just over \$12,000. The band will be working to earn half the cost of the uniforms over a period of three years and the school will finance the other half. The band will be involved in numerous projects to raise its share of the money, so don't be surprised when a bandsman knocks on your door hoping to interest you in one of his products.

In truth, the uniforms are still incomplete. The white

Cub Scouts To Organize September 16

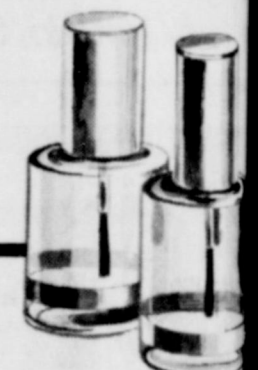
Cub Scout Pack 782 will meet tonight (Thursday), September 16, at 7:30 in the Community Center.

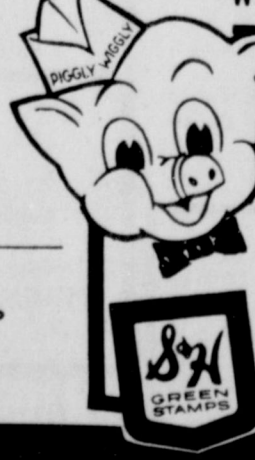
