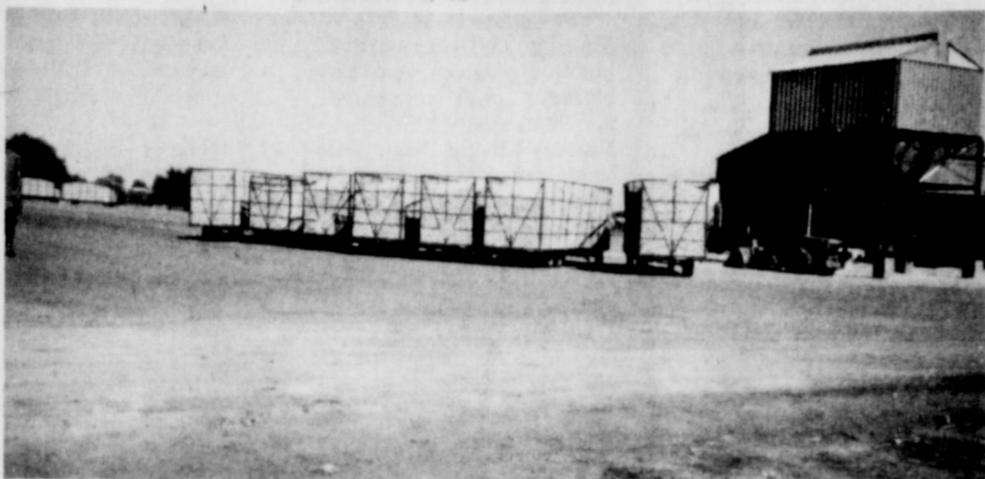
I'm sure that these Presidential campaign speakers are trained to leave no stone unturned when it comes to knowing what appeals to the voters.

## Texans Approve Amendment No. 2 In General Election; Funding For Water Quality Assured

Continued progress toward cleaner water in Texas was assured by the favorable vote on Amendment 2 during Tuesday's general election, according to Hugh C. Yantis, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Water Quality Board. Action by the voters makes possible state loans of up to a total of \$200 million for cities and municipalities needing funds to improve their waste disposal facilities.

The first \$100 million was made possible by legislation passed in 1971 under the sponsorship of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, and Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake. Also assisting in the passage of the bill were ex-Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Governor Ben Barnes, and ex-House Speaker Gus Mutscher.

## Study Club Will Sponsor Local Appeal For Blood Donations

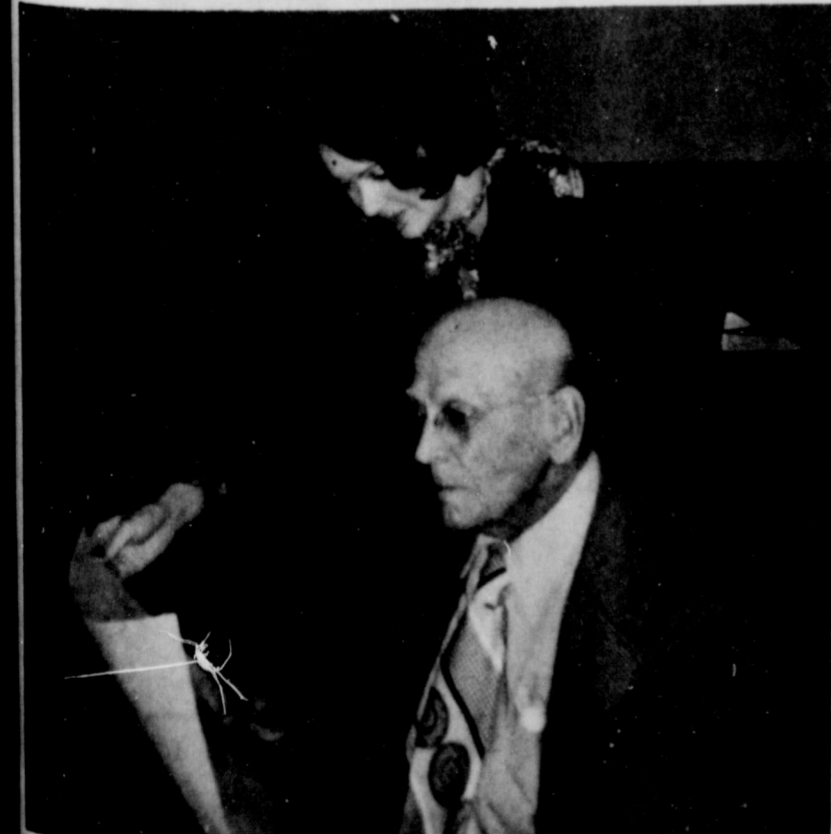
Phebe K. Warner Club will sponsor the local blood drive for Blood Services of Lubbock on Monday, November 15, from 4 to 8 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

Mrs. Elmer Owens is chairman of the drive in Tahoka.

Blood Services is a system of not-for-profit, self-supporting community blood centers. It began in 1943 as the Salt River Valley Blood Bank in Phoenix, Arizona. As the system developed and the service area grew, it became Southwest Blood Banks, Inc. That geographic

title was outgrown, thus the present title. Blood Services. Its community blood centers serve more than 800 hospitals nationwide. Blood Services of Lubbock was organized in 1952 at the request of the Lubbock-Crosby-Garza County Medical Society and became the community blood center for Lubbock and the South Plains. Service is extended to 38 hospitals in a 22-county area. Healthy people between the ages of 17 and 66 can be donors. Exceptions are those who have had hepatitis or cancer, other than skin cancer.

## Harvest Gains Momentum; Grower Prices Stay Steady

Gin-bound trailers loaded with cotton are proof positive that the harvest is in full swing again, following more than a week's lapse due to an untimely October snowfall and resulting wet fields.

Farmers throughout the county are able to get into their fields and are hoping for continued favorable gathering conditions.

Gin operators in Tahoka, on Tuesday morning of this week, reported more than 5,000 bales had been ginned and more than 700 bales on the yard.

Ginners in the northern part of the county report some fewer bales being ginned due to the fact that a great deal of damage was done by hail in that area earlier in the season.

One O'Donnell gin reported 8,600 bales ginned, with 1,400 on the yard.

Grower prices were steady to firm during the week ending November 5, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported trading was slow to moderate. Growers offered small lots of new crop cotton in moderate volume.

They sold small mixed new crop lots of mostly grades 32, 42, 33, and 43; staples 30 through 32; mikes 2.7 through 4.9 in a range of 68.00 to 69.00 cents per pound. Mixed lots of mostly grades 33 and 43, staples 32 and 33, mikes 2.7 through 3.2 brought 65.00 to 66.00 cents.

Demand was good, Dickson said.

Prices paid growers for cottonseed ranged from 80 to 90 dollars per ton.

Grades 41, 32, and 42 were predominant grades classed at Lubbock this week. Grade 41 was 11 percent, grade 32,

33 percent, and grade 42, 31 percent. Bark reductions were assigned to 16 percent of the samples classed.

Staples 30, 31, and 32 were predominant lengths. Staple 30 was 23 percent, 31 was 25, and 32 accounted for 21 percent.

Mike readings 3.5 through 4.9 amounted to 76 percent of the total. Mikes above made up 12 percent and mikes below were 12 percent also.

Pressley tests indicated breaking strengths at Lubbock averaged 84,000 pounds per square inch.

About 9,400 samples were classed by the Lubbock Classing Office during the week ending November 5. This season's total stands at 38,000 samples compared to only 19,000 on the same date a year ago.

Tahoka residents will be given the vaccine on Saturday and Sunday, November 20 and 21, at the Community Center.

The hours for the Saturday clinic will be from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and on Sunday, from 2 until 6 p.m.

## Senator Hance Is Speaker At Rotary Club

Problems facing the 77th Legislature which goes into session in January were discussed by State Senator Kent Hance at the Rotary Club last Thursday noon.

He opened his remarks by pointing out that the rural area representatives have been put at a great disadvantage by the growth of metropolitan areas. For instance, he said, 16 of the 35 State Senators now represent the big four metropolitan areas.

Among the problems coming up this session are public school financing, property tax reform, medical malpractice insurance, a new Texas water plan, oilfield unification, and the coal field pipeline proposal. (see Senator Hance, p. 2)

Mrs. Stice is a registered cardiology technologist.

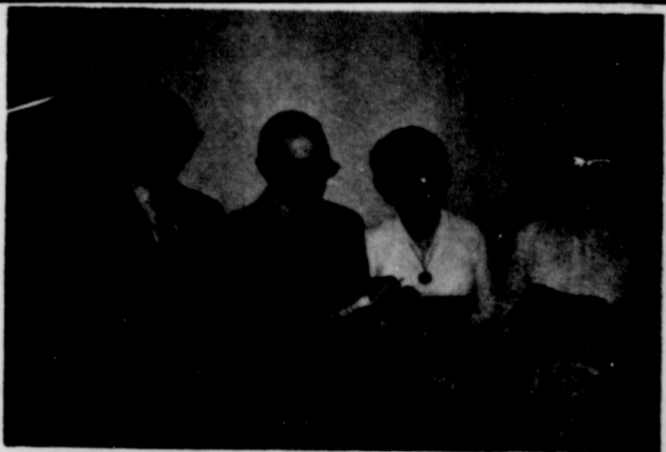

## Film To Be Shown At New Home

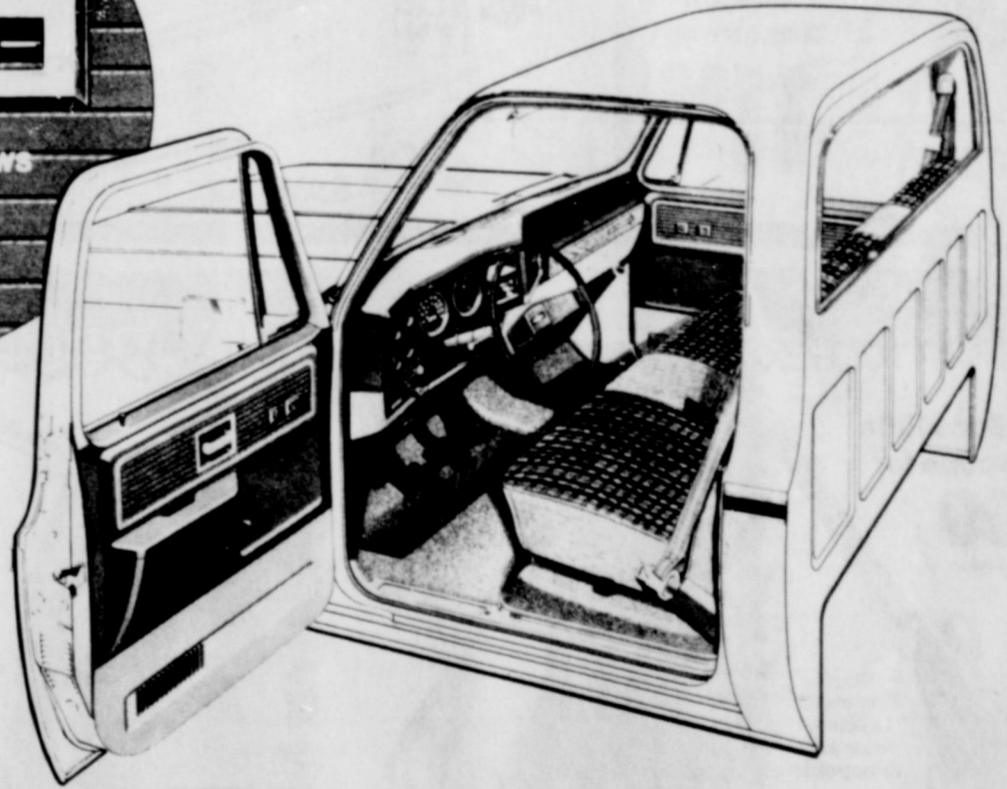
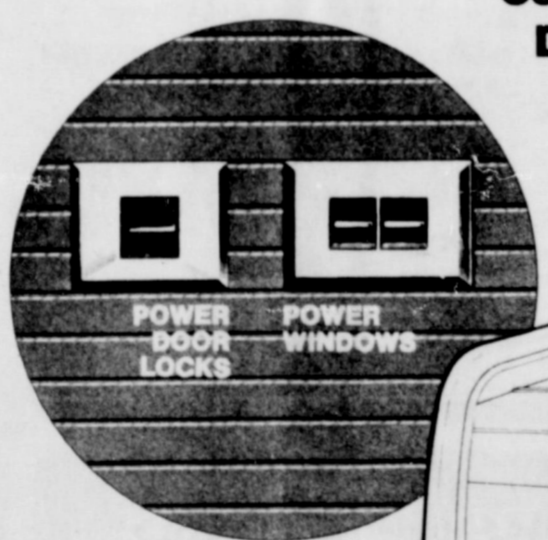

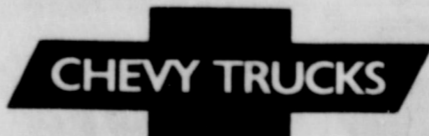

**Sherry Etheredge Says**

Today's turkeys are a far different product from the wild turkey served up for the holiday feast by our Pilgrim fathers. They've been scientifically bred and nourished on a diet of specially prepared and blended feed to bring you a bird of high meat quality and yield.

To roast, place the turkey breast side up on a rack in an open roasting pan. Do not cover and do not add water. Basting usually is not necessary, but may be desirable if the skin has little fat. If the turkey browns early in the roasting pan, cover lightly with aluminum foil or moisten a thin cloth with fat and place over the breast and legs.

For an elegant golden brown glow to your Thanksgiving turkey, use this time chart and roast at 325 degrees. The times are figured for stuffed turkey.

**Two Grants Approved For South Plains**

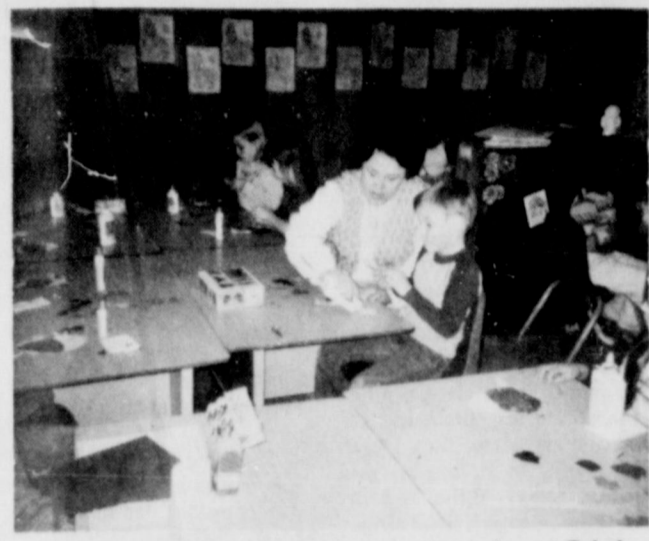
Governor Dolph Briscoe has approved two criminal justice grants to South Plains Association of Governments.

The local grants are among 101 approved by Governor Briscoe with funding from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.



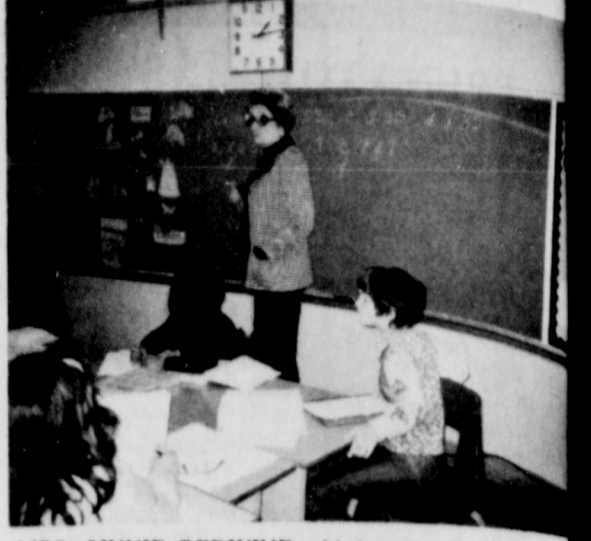

### West Texas Chapter of Lung Association Begins Campaign

The West Texas Area, American Lung Association, officially kicked off its 1976 Christmas Seal Campaign at its monthly Advisory Council meeting November 5th at noon at the Lubbock Club. Bill McAlister, President and General Manager of KMCC-TV, was introduced as the Christmas Seal Chairman. McAlister will head the campaign here in cooperation with Dick Cavett, noted national TV personality, who is serving as 1976 National Christmas Seal Chairman.

"Christmas Seal Memories" is the theme of the 1976 seals--an American tradition for seventy years. He has served on many boards and commissions; he is a past Vice-President of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and is currently serving a term on the Lubbock City Council.

"I'm honored to share leadership with Dick Cavett in the drive to prevent and control lung diseases," McAlister says. "Together we hope to alert the public to the seriousness of these crippling diseases that threaten the breathing of millions of our citizens. They include emphysema, chronic bronchitis, and asthma. Our fight also is against air

### Livestock Reports Requested

Some 75,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during the period from mid-November to early January.

This roundup survey of crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, The Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, work together to provide comprehensive information on Texas agriculture.

Producers from each of the 254 counties in Texas are selected proportional to size of operation. The small producer sampled represents many others of comparable size while the very largest producers will

represent only themselves. It is equally important for all farmers and ranchers receiving a questionnaire to complete and return it promptly. The individual report is confidential--available to no other government agency or anyone except the few persons required to process the data. The state and county estimates published are available for everyone at the same time.

County statistics for 1975 and January 1, 1976 are available on Livestock, Poultry, Dairy, Field Crops, Small Grains, Cotton, Vegetables, Fruits and Pecans, and Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities. Bulletins can be obtained from the Texas

Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin 78767, or by writing John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin 78711.

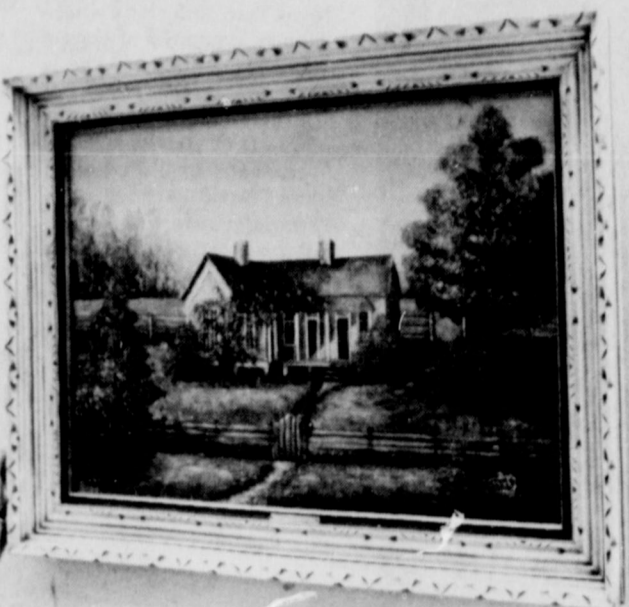

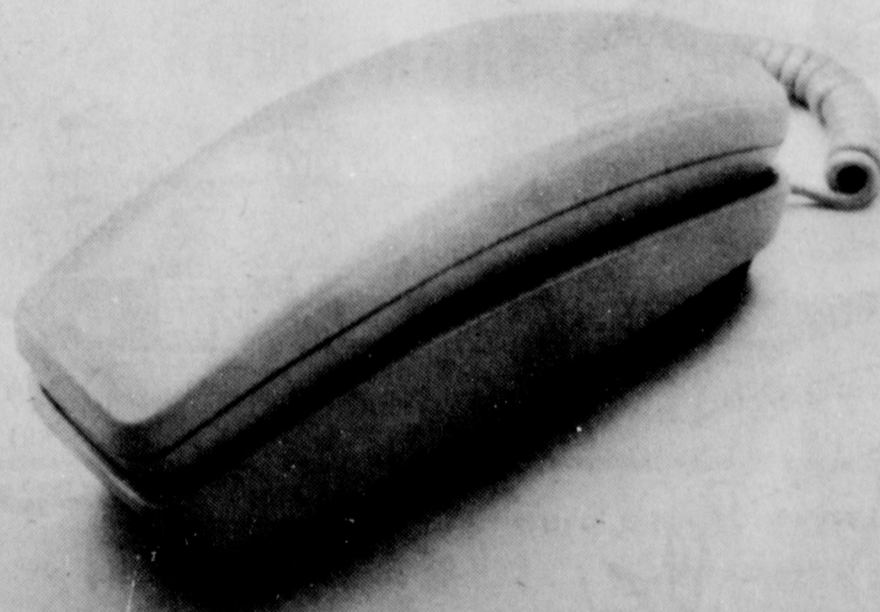

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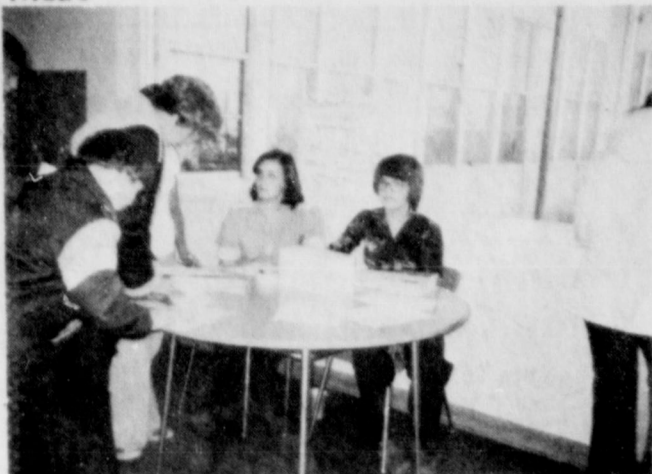

Approximately 387 students, out of an estimated 570 students in Tahoka High and Junior High, voted in a mock election on November 2. The number represented about 68 percent which was well above the national average of 53 percent.

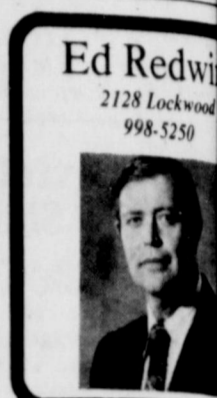

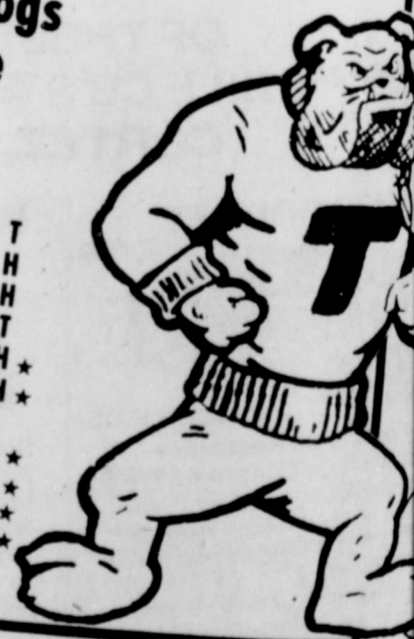

**BILL GRIFFIN SAYS....**  
November, December A Good Time To Collect Soil Samples!  
Profitable fertilization depends on utilizing soil

nutrients. Although most soils contain some of all the essential nutrients needed for plant growth, the amounts vary greatly between soils due to past fertilization and cropping as well as native fertility. Thus a soil test is a good method for measuring soil nutrient levels.

The first step in soil testing is to use a map or sketch and divide the farm and fields into sampling units or areas. If the area represented by each sample is too large, the information obtained may not be much better than a general fertilizer recommendation.

Under today's conditions, a major objective in soil testing is to determine the level of available nutrients in a soil so that fertilizers can be selected that will supplement the soil supply and provide enough for top yields.

Soil test results for phosphorus are especially valuable for fields that have received regular applications of phosphorus for several years. The residual from row applications of phosphorus may be difficult to measure until it is thoroughly mixed with the soil. In addition, many soils are high in potassium, but most are low in nitrogen. The rate of nitrogen and time of application depends on the crop, soil, and other conditions. All this points to the importance of considering the level of each nutrient in a soil in selecting the most profitable fertilization practice.

If you have not included soil tests in your farm planning program, start now to prepare for next year. Information on collecting and mailing soil samples is available from the county Extension office or local fertilizer dealers.
