

Continued progress toward cleaner water in Texas was assured by the favorable vote on Amendment 2 during Tuesday's general election, according to Hugh C. Yantis, Jr., Executive Director of the Texas Water Quality Board. Action by the voters makes possible state loans of up to a total of \$200 million for cities and municipalities needing funds to improve their waste disposal facilities.

The first \$100 million was made possible by legislation passed in 1971 under the sponsorship of Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells. and Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake. Also assisting in the passage of the bill were ex-Governor Preston Smith, FLt. Governor Ben Barnes, and ex-House Speaker Gus Mutscher.

# Harvest Gains Momentum; **Grower Prices Stay Steady**

Gin-bound trailers loaded ·with cotton are proof positive that the harvest is in full swing again, following more than a week's lapse due to an untimely October snowfall and resulting wet fields. Farmers throughout the

county are able to get into their fields and are hoping for continued favorable gathering conditions.

Gin operators in Tahoka, on Tuesday morning of this week, reported more than 5.000 bales had been ginned and more than 700 bales on the vard.

Ginners in the northern part of the county report some fewer bales being ginned due to the fact that a great deal of damage was done by hail in that area earlier in the season.

One O'Donnell gin reported 8,600 bales ginned, with 1,400 on the yard.

Grower prices were steady to firm during the week ending November 5, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office.



Senior citizens in Tahoka were guests at the fourth annual luncheon prepared and served by members of the Phebe K. Warner Study Club on Tuesday, November 9. at the Methodist Church Fellowship Hall.

The music was of an earlier era and the guest speaker did not make predictions about the state of the nation.

Many of the guests did not step as briskly as they may have at another time in their lives--there were some who needed assistance even, to serve themselves and be seated. Nevertheless, it was a day that had been eagerly anticipated by them.

Following the sumptuous meal, Mrs. David Midkiff, club president, made special introductions of those appearing on the program for the day and then introduced the speaker for the occasion, Dr. K. R. Durham.

One of the guests, 92-year-old Hall Robinson, listened intently throughout the program and even more so as Mrs. Midkiff made the announcement that "There is a special man in our midst today, one who has been in Lynn County perhaps longer than anyone here.

She continued, "Hall Robinson was born in Jacksboro on March 11. 1884...attended school in Fort Worth ... played pro baseball on the weekends, worked and learned the plumbing trade through the week...moved with his family to Lubbock at the age of eighteen...went to Brownfield where he and his brother, Ed, had their own abstract business... From then on, the hushed

crowd heard the life story of Hall Robinson and at the conclusion, many of his friends said, "She didn't tell about the time you ... '

And perhaps she didn't, but she did tell that he met his wife, Ethel Cooke, when she came into Tahoka from the T-Bar Ranch which was managed by her father. Jack Alley. You see, by that time, Hall and his brother owned a hardware store in Tahoka which they purchased from the late Happy Smith's father.

Ironically, he had just told the writer about his wonderful wife with whom he shared sixty-seven years of his life. He said she was the only child in Lynn County for three years ... and she was the best wife a man could have.

Mrs. Midkiff continued to tell her audience about the honoree ... "Hall was in the hardware business on the west side of the town (Tahoka) square when the north side of the town burned...after the new courthouse was built, he was the second District Clerk to fill office in the new structure...he was in the insurance business and had some land interests...about 1942, he and his son ...

nutrients. Although most soils contain some of all the essential nutrients needed for plant growth, the amounts vary greatly between soils due to past fertilization and cropping as well as native fertility. Thus a soil test is a good method for measuring soil nutrient levels. The first step in soil

testing is to use a map or sketch and divide the farm and fields into sampling units or areas. If the area represented by each sample is too large, the information obtained may not be much better than a general fertilizer recommendation.

Under today's conditions, a major objective in soil testing is to determine the level of available nutrients in a soil so that fertilizers can be selected that will supplement the soil supply and provide enough for top yields.

Soil test results for phosphorus are especially valuable for fields that have received regular applications of phosphorus for several years. The residual from row applications of phosphorus may be difficult to measure until it is thoroughly mixed with the soil. In addition, many soils are high in potassium, but most are low in nitrogen. The rate of nitrogen and time of application depends on the crop, soil, and other conditions. All this points to the importance of considering the level of each nutrient in a soil in selecting the most profitable fertilization practice.

If you have not included soil tests in your farm planning program, start now to prepare for next year. Information on collecting and mailing soil samples is available from the county Extension office or local fertilizer dealers. \*\*\*


