Mayor Leslie Attributes 'New Spirit' To Chamber of Commerce Leaders

Tahoka's Mayor Mel Leslie, in his spontaneous remarks to more than forty Chamber members at a breakfast meeting on Tuesday of this week, said that the "new spirit" evident in city and council matters is due to a cooperative attitude within the Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber President H. B. McCord, Jr. had asked Leslie to talk "off the cuff" to the early-morning gathering about the "ship of state" in city matters.

The Mayor emphasized that the recent fee increase

for sanitation services was necessary because the city had to compete in the labor market the same as others do and it gets more difficult all the time. "The council's feeling is that the needed income should come from a fee for services rendered rather than a tax raise, thereby placing the burden on everybody, not just the taxpayer," he said.

One thing not commonly

known, said Leslie, is that the city will be completely free of debt in 1979. probably the only city in West Texas in that category. Tahoka receives approxi-

revenue sharing and sales taxes come to about \$25,000 per year, he said.

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RALLEL TERRACES need maintenance on a regular basis if they are to function ectively for a long period of time. If terraces are five years old or older and have not had ular maintenance, chances are good they are not doing the job for which they were inned. Some landowners keep their terraces in wheat every year, thus eliminating most of maintenance problems. Others work them with a one-way or chisel-type plow while y use a mold-board. Using this method, one starts in the top of the terrace, works both s, and throws the dirt uphill. While doing maintenance work on a system of terraces, one uld not forget end blocks and all internal blocks, keys to an effective terrace system.

Called "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms, the campaign is designed to create a new vigilance on the part of livestock producers in handling and treating livestock to eliminate the screwworm completely from Texas in 1977. The special effort will be launched at a conference called by Gov. Dolph Briscoe in Austin on February 24. The conference will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Municipal Auditorium.

Through a concerted effort by producers and an effective educational program to promote this campaign throughout the year, this goal can be reached," emphasizes Dr.

'The Extension Service is totally dedicated to this effort and will continue to support the screwworm eradication program to its utmost," he points out. 'Our county agents will continue to work closely with producers to emphasize regular livestock inspections, treatment of wounds, and the sending of worm samples to the Mission Lab for identification.

Pfannstiel believes the campaign against screwworms can be successful this year due to several factors: -the cold winter will reduce the number of screwworm

flies this spring. -- the new screwworm plant in Tuxtla Gutierrez, Mexico which opened last July will double the sterile fly production capacity.



This letter is in reference to my affidavit of Complaint I forwarded to the Attorney General of Texas yesterday, February 3, 1977, pertaining to the District Attorney, Taylor County, Texas, Mr. Lynn Ingalsbe. He failed to properly dvise and counsel the Grand Jury of Taylor County (Abilene, lexas) in its investigation into abuse of power by the Texas

Alcoholic Beverage Commission of Texas. First let me say that I would not have had to be in the position I am in if the District Attorney had been willing to, and had done his job properly as the counsel for the grand ary. The only statement he made in regard to the Law was when he interrupted my questioning of a witness and angrily houted at me "that the portion of the Law I was questioning the witness about (Section 5, Article 1, of the Liquor Control (ct) was subject to interpretation.

Information came back to me that at least seven (7) lawyers have agreed, in private of course, that I was right, in their opinion, that it was a violation of the law for TABC personnel to have any connection with a private club. Mr. Gordon's connection with a private club as legal counsel, is a serious conflict of interest for the people of this state. The preamble to the Law states that "This entire Act shall be deemed an exercise of the police power of the State for the protection of the welfare, health, peace, temperance, and safety of the people of the State, and all its provisions shall be liberally construed for the accomplishment of that purpose." Note that it will be construed, when conflict arises, for the "people" not for the advantage of any or all members of the Alcoholic Beverage Commission or any corporation engaged in the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Would an inspector of the TABC report and prosecute a violation found to exist at the club in which Mr. Gordon is serving as legal counsel? I think not! I doubt that a thorough inspection for compliance with the Law is ever made at the private club he represents as legal counsel. If an inspection were made and a violation found by an honest inspector, and brought action against the club, would he win the case? I seriously doubt it! In fact I know he would not. I know that you know that the inspector would not win, regardless of the severity of the violation

For your information, Mr. Gordon admitted to me and the other grand juror's present, that it was definitely a violation of Section 5, Article 1, of the Liquor Control Act, for Mr. Tom Head to accept the honorary membership and that "he (Head) would not be an honorary member by tomorrow." I thought at the time, since he had agreed with me that a lie detector test should be given an inspector who was the subject of serious allegations, to find the truth, that he intended to do what was needed to clean up the TABC operation throughout the State. I told Mr. Gordon at that time, that since in my opinion he had a good attitude and seemed to be close enough to my interpretation of the Law, that I would be willing to let him interpret the Law for his Commission.

When he stated later in the investigation that he was serving as legal counsel for the Abilene Petroleum Club and did not feel it was a conflict of interest, I knew then that he did not intend to do what he told the grand jury he would do. I still waited two weeks before I gave my report to the Reporter News. To my knowledge, Mr. Gordon is still serving as legal counsel for the Petroleum Club and Mr. Head retains his honorary membership in the Abilene Country Club. I am very

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sorry it all had to come out and be made public the way it has; however, I took an oath that I would uphold the laws of this State and have a deep conviction that the oath is legitimate and should be honored by all who are willing to take it. I pray that the people can see the need and that action can be taken to remove Mr. Ingalsbe from office for cause on ground which lies in my affidavit to the Attorney General, John Hill.
