## Large Crowd Attends Chamber Of Commerce Banquet

MRS. JAKE DUNLAP, chairman of the first Lynn County Harvest Festival, was honored at the Tuesday night banquet. Winston Wharton and Dr. K. R. Durham were also recognized for their outstanding contributions, but Doctor Durham was out of town and Wharton was unavailable for a picture immediately following the event.

Two hundred sixty-nine people applauded at last Tuesday night's banquet as five fellow Tahokans and two area citizens were praised for their extraordinary accomplishments.

Mrs. Jim (Chloie Jan) Wells received a standing ovation as Mayor Mel Leslie announced that she had been chosen Outstanding Citizen for 1976.

Also receiving honorable mention for their community involvement were Mrs. Jake (Nadine) Dunlap, Winston Wharton, and Dr. K. R. Durham, who was out of town and unable to attend the event.

Mrs. Wells was recognized for her leadership in many activities, but especially for the role she played in staging a successful Bicentennial celebration in Tahoka. Both she and Mrs. Dunlap were instrumental in organizing the Bicentennial Queen Contest last summer and the first Lynn County Harvest Festival in October.

Wharton has spearheaded the most successful clean-up

campaign in the city's history and has obtained more than fifty new members for the Chamber of Commerce since this time a year ago.

Doctor Durham has practiced dentistry in Tahoka since 1928, was Mayor from 1947 to 1951 during which time the city built a new water system and erected the water tank in the west part of town on Lockwood Street. He is a charter member of the Tahoka Rotary Club, serving as the club's first secretary in 1936.

Mrs. Alvin Kitten and Leonard Dube were named Outstanding Conservation Homemaker and Outstanding Conservation Farmer, respectively, by Eual Davis, district soil conservationist.

H. B. McCord, Jr., outgoing Chamber president, was presented a plaque of appreciation by director Carl Reynolds, in the absence of 1977 president, Gerald Moore.

Mayor Leslie read a resolution proclaiming the many services of E. L. Short, 77th District Representative from 1969 to 1976. Short was given a standing ovation as he accepted the resolution and a plaque from the Mayor.

## Mrs. Jim Wells Named Outstanding Citizen At Farmer-Businessman Banquet

The fact that Chloie Jan Wells has been officially named Citizen-Of-The-Year comes as no surprise because she has spent the greater part of her life being an outstanding individual.

Probably her long-range goals did not include, per se, the honor bestowed on her at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, but the praise came about as a result of her above-and-beyond-the-call-of-duty activities in her hometown.

Circumstances caused her to live in other places temporarily, but Tahoka is really home to the former Chloie Jan Huffaker, born to Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Huffaker in 1949.

She is an honor graduate

of Tahoka High School and has a degree in Home Economics from Texas Tech University, an achievement which perhaps contributes somewhat to her success as a homemaker.

Her husband, Jim, is also a native of Tahoka and a Tech graduate. After the couple's military duty, they "came home" for Jim to operate a feedlot operation with his father, George Claud Wells.

Mrs. Wells' "main job" is that of being a mother to two small daughters, Jennie and Kelly.

But along with the domestic work, 27-year-old Chloie Jan Wells has literally put Tahoka on the map in the past year and the

town's citizens paid their respects at last Tuesday night's get-together.

Few fund drives, appreciation dinners, or civic activities have been undertaken in Tahoka in recent years without her guidance and effective leadership. She was Outstanding Clubwoman in the Caprock District of Federated Women's Clubs in 1974-76, having been nominated by Phebe K. Warner Study Club.

In 1976, she served as general chairman of the Bicentennial activities in Tahoka and the activities were countless--her study club made a Bicentennial quilt; she organized a Flag Wavers' Page in *The Lynn County News*; she planned a

vivid re-enactment of "A Shot Heard Round The World Day"; she helped the city obtain a grant for a mini-park; she worked tirelessly in organizing the climactic July 4th celebration in Tahoka, part of which was a queen contest, a parade, a community picnic.

She is active in all phases of work in the First United Methodist Church.

Members of Phebe K. Warner Study Club, in nominating her for her most recent honor, said "...she does her work quietly and efficiently and in a fair and loyal way. Our community and citizens benefit greatly from the leadership and untiring energy of this very capable young woman."

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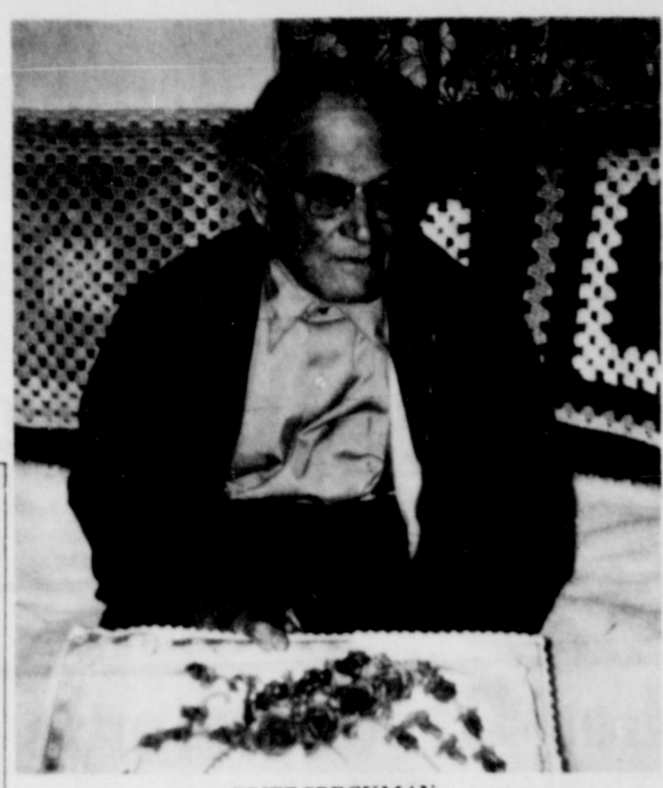
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**Fritz Speckman Celebrates 90th Birthday On March 3rd**

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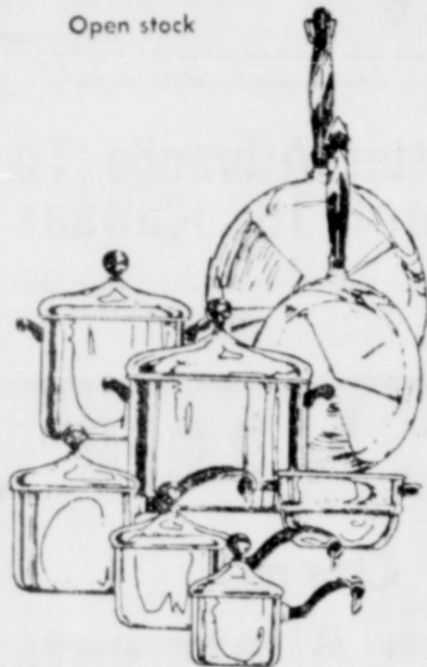
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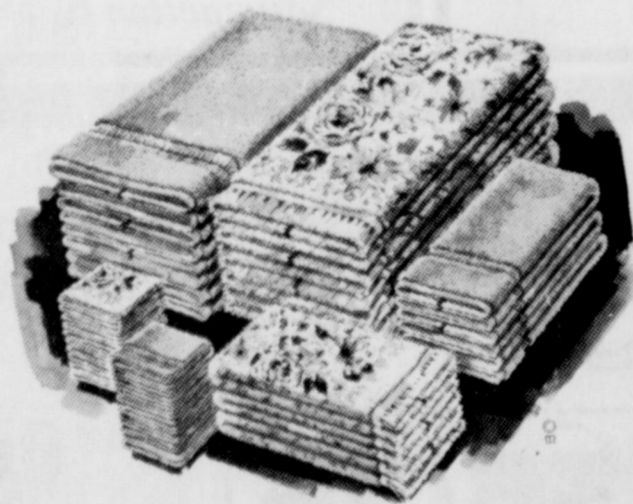



### Training Meetings Scheduled for Area Pesticide Applicators

A series of training meetings have been scheduled for farmers and other pesticide applicators of the county who wish to be certified under a new federal law which goes into effect on March 21 of this year. County Extension Agent Bill Griffin says the training sessions, though not mandatory for private applicators, are of considerable help in learning the requirements for the use of pesticides. Between 50 and 75 Texas farmers are expected to be certified this year, says Griffin, "under these training sessions. Completion of this training program we are conducting is the first

A local meeting is scheduled on March 22nd at 1:30 p.m. at the Lyntegar meeting room. Griffin said that it is possible for applicators to be certified by reviewing self-study materials and completing a questionnaire for the Texas Department of Agriculture. A third option, he adds, is for emergency situations in which a single-product, single-purchase, single-use certification is available through TDA. The law which requires certification of private applicators is the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA), which will be enforced by the Environmental Protection

Agency. Under this act, all uses of pesticides will be classified as either registered use or general use, and all applicators—both private and commercial—will be certified as a requisite to legal use or supervision of the use of registered pesticides.

To implement the law in the state, the Texas Pesticide Control Act was passed in 1975 authorizing the Commissioner of Agriculture to establish a program whereby private applicators could be certified.

"A private applicator," says Griffin, "is a person who uses or supervises the use of any registered use pesticide for the purpose of producing any agricultural commodity."

Griffin says that all states are required to have

enabling legislation and devise their own plan for fulfilling this statute. In Texas, the task of providing information belongs to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. TDA monitors these training sessions and certifies the farmer as a full-fledged private applicator of restricted pesticides.

The training program prepared by the Extension Service includes a slide-tape presentation, a review of provisions of the Texas-Federal law, pesticide safety, labels and chemical labeling, pest identification and equipment calibration. No formal testing or scoring of papers is involved.

The program requires about 3½ to 4 hours and upon completion and certification, each person will be mailed a certificate and

wallet-sized card showing he is approved to buy registered chemicals from his dealer. Dealers must keep such records for two years.

"The best thing a person can do to be certified," says Griffin, "is to attend one of these training sessions and get the benefit of the specially prepared materials."

"For producers who for some reason cannot attend a training meeting, there are two other ways to become certified under the Texas plan. One is a home study course. Under this method, a person can obtain a 'study manual' from the county Extension office with an application and review questions attached. A farmer fills out this application form, completes the review questions and mails the materials to the Department of Agriculture for review and certification."

Griffin says a third way to be certified is under emergency conditions in which instructions can be given to a producer in his home by either a TDA employee, an Extension agent, or by a qualified local dealer.

No fees will be charged, Griffin adds, and no advance registration is required.

The full implementation of the amended Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act is scheduled for October 1977. On this date, barring any changes in the law, producers of agricultural commodities must be certified applicators as a requisite to the use of restricted-use pesticides.

entertaining experience for any horseman.

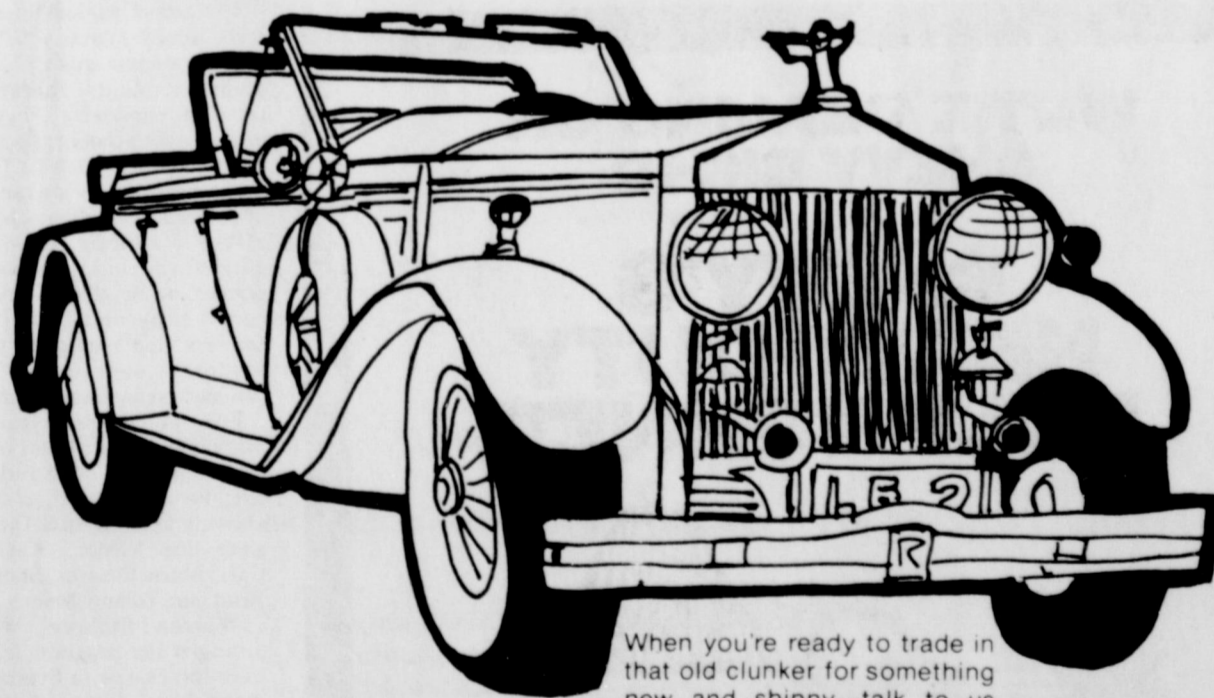

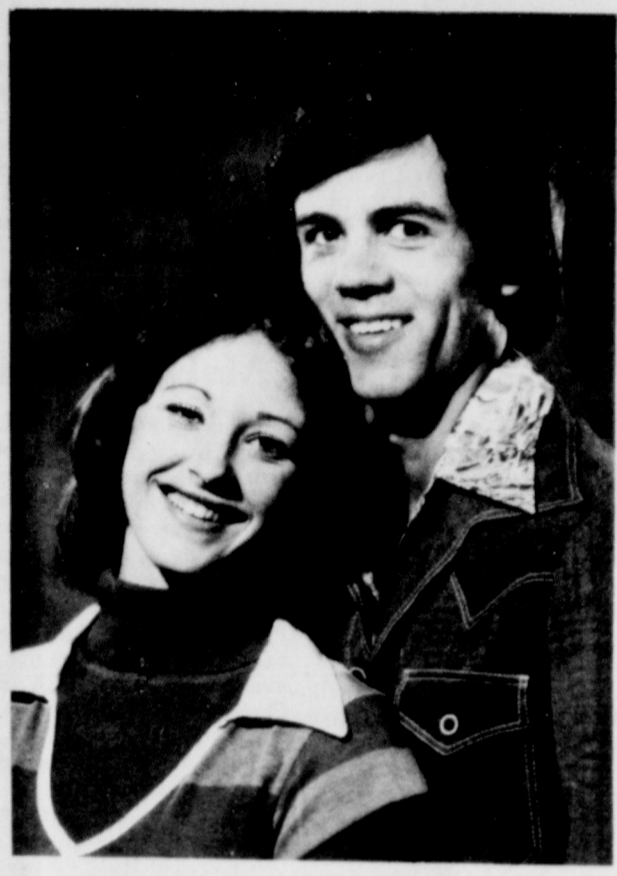

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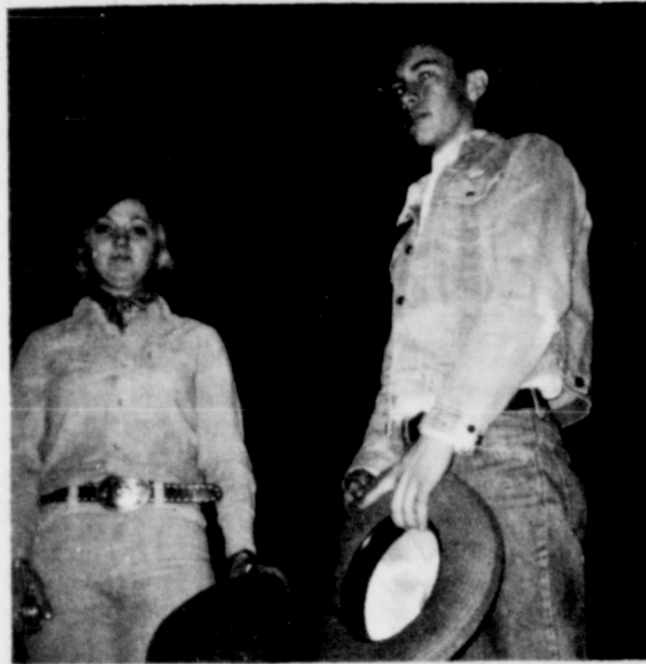

Broccoli makes a change-of-pace treat for winter meals. Frances Reasonover, a foods and nutrition specialist, says.

Miss Reasonover is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

When selecting fresh broccoli, look for a firm, compact cluster of small flower buds with none opened enough to show the bright yellow flower. Bud clusters should be dark or sage green—an even green with a delicately purplish cast. Stems should not be too thick or tough.

Avoid buying broccoli with spread bud clusters, enlarged or open buds, yellowish-green color or wilted condition—signs of overmaturity and overlong display. Also avoid broccoli with soft, slippery, water-soaked spots or bud clusters. These are signs of decay.

Store frozen broccoli in the freezer for one year or less.

Twenty-five pounds of fresh broccoli will yield 24 pints of frozen product.

One 10-ounce package of frozen broccoli is equal to one and one-half cups of frozen broccoli. Try this broccoli recipe for family treats.

**Chicken Broccoli Casserole**  
2 boned chicken breasts, halved  
1 pound fresh broccoli, or 1 package (10 ounce) frozen broccoli spears  
1/4 cup butter  
1/4 cup regular flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups milk  
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese  
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan Cheese

Cook chicken and broccoli; keep warm. Meanwhile, in saucepan melt butter; blend in flour and salt. Remove from heat and gradually add milk; return to heat and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and loses starchy taste. Remove from heat; add cheddar cheese and stir until cheese melts. Place broccoli in casserole; place chicken breasts on top; pour cheese sauce over all. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese; place under broiler until well browned. Serves 4.
