Southwestern's Bob Brummel Pessimistic Re Energy Crisis

Prospects of solving the energy crisis any time in the near future are dismal, Bob Brummel of Southwestern Public Service Company told Rotarians in a talk before the club last Thursday.

Inactivity of the Federal Government, lowering of the depletion allowance for oil and gas exploration, refusal of Eastern states to allow offshore exploration, and government-induced delays in construction of the Alaska pipeline, and the environmentalists were some of the reasons he listed.

"The environmentalists have now moved from

Alaska to Wyoming," he said, and are now fighting the development of coal fields in that state and the railroads are fighting the

proposed coal slurry pipeline

from the coal fields to Texas. Our problem is confounded by the fact that the United States has six percent of the world's population and uses thirty-six percent of the energy.

Anticipating the imminent shortage, SWPS, a few years ago, started building a coal-burning plant to supplement natural gas north of

First unit of this \$540 million plant is now in operation serving the company's territory and is using two 110-car train loads of coal a week from coal fields near Gillett, Wyoming and a second unit is under construction. This plant will burn either coal, gas, oil or trash to produce electrical power. Even the coal cinders are processed for other uses.

Citing the rise in electrical costs, he declared that in 1966 Southwestern was paying 19 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas, but today, in 1977, this cost has risen to \$1.37. By comparison, coal is costing them \$1.05 to produce the same amount of electrical energy.

The company has one other major problem. It has to have production sufficient to meet the summer peak demand, whereas \$240 million of their investment is idle in the low-usage cold months of winter.

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

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



Tornadoes, which take an average annual toll of 184 human lives in the United States, usually travel southwest to northeast and stay on the ground about ten minutes. Their forward speed is about 30 miles per hour, but wind speeds in the

funnel of a tornado can get up to 300 miles per hour.

The National Weather Service issues a "tornado watch" when atmospheric conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. A "tornado warning" is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or detected by radar.

If you hear a tornado watch, stay tuned to a radio or television for weather reports. If a tornado warning
