## April Rains Boost Crop Prospects And Farmers' Morale

April rains, declared by farmers to be "the best ever" have greatly improved 1977 crop prospects.

Tahoka received an almost unprecedented 5.88 inches of rain during the month, the most received in April since 1915 when a total of 8.16 inches fell here. Other previous highs for the month have been 3.27 in 1942, 3.05 in 1957, and 3.03 last year, according to records of the local observer for the National Weather Service.

This year, however, Tahoka probably received more rain than most of the remainder of the county. All areas, however, have sufficient planting moisture.

Some cotton had already been planted before the last round of rains and most of this will have to be replanted. Many should be able to plant late this week.

barring no further rainfall, but some will not be able to get into their fields until next week.

Broken down, the Tahoka station recorded .63 inch on April 14, .96 inch on April 17 and 18, .04 on April 19, 1.07 on April 19 and 20, 2.53 on April 28, and .65 on the night of April 29, for a total of 5.88 inches. Hail during the month damaged some fruit and early vegetable crops.

Total for the year through April in Tahoka is 7.47 inches, with .47 inch coming in January, .24 in February, and .88 in March.

## County Deputy O. D. Woody Retires, Goes to Jones County

Deputy Sheriff O. D. Woody has retired and will move to Jones County in two weeks. His retirement was effective May 3rd.

He was born in Wise County and went to school in Oklahoma. He and Emma Lee Pryor were married on November 5, 1927 in Oklahoma and they have two daughters, Mrs. Betty Jo McCarty of Odessa and Mrs. Billie Jean Henderson of Hawley. They also have three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Some seven years ago, I had not even a personal knowledge of a subject which, since that time, has become quite an intricate part of my life.

Why how it is that we coast many years and give heed to circumstances until we are forced to look about and be aware of a whole new world which we really didn't know existed.

Today I know more of and can speak warmly of that ever-increasing number of people who are up the world in a nursing home, convalescent home, rest home--whatever one wishes to say.

My childhood, and much before that time, the citizen bordered on being a forgotten person, in some respects, though certainly not in every case. To tell the truth, a person's life expectancy was not so great as it is now. Medical progress has seen to it that people, for the most part, live longer. A debilitating stroke which might have caused instant death twenty years ago can be treated medically now and victims continue to live quite old.

Don't debate the issue of the advantages or disadvantages of living to be an old, old person, a time at that, but I will ad lib on the difference between the means of caring for those who find themselves in such circumstances.

Certainly I cannot say, without reservation, that nursing homes, nationwide, are without reproach. I can say that the one we have in Tahoka goes a long way toward serving the needs of its residents in a superb way.

Residents are there because they can no longer live alone in a normal home situation; more, first and foremost, it is the next-best arrangement. The employees are trained to take care of not only the physical needs of the residents, but also the emotional needs that most readily exist when near the end of one's life. In fact, he or she is transplanted to new and pleasant surroundings.

The adjustment is great to those within and without, but my hat is off to the devoted personnel who make my burden on the outside an easy one.

This week the nation pays homage to nursing during National Nursing Home Week. The Colonial in Tahoka is doing a little extra, to me say that they do their part every other day in the year too.

## Tahoka Schools Begin First Phase Of Accreditation Planning Process

House Bill 1126 and the 1975 Mandatory State Accreditation Law have made it necessary for every school in Texas to become accredited by the Texas Education Agency in order to qualify for foundation school funding.

The three-phase accreditation process will involve administrators, teachers, students, and patrons and will be completed by February of 1978 except for the continuous evaluation.

The Board of Education for Tahoka schools approved

the beginning of the process, at its April 14 meeting and appointed North Elementary principal Clifton Gardner to coordinate the first phase, that of goal setting.

Serving with Gardner are Mrs. Bettye Green and Jay Dee House, representing the school board; Mrs. Virginia Griffing, Mrs. Janette Harvick, Joe Downey, and Mrs. Barbara Jaquess, teachers; Gary White, Roy Salinas, and Ella Wilson, students; Mauricio Marez, maintenance staff.

Also, Adolph Chapa, Tommy Graves, Mrs. Edde Lockaby, and Mrs. Mabel McGinty, from the community.

Questionnaires pertaining to the goal-setting phase, will be mailed shortly to 187 people, including 124 from the school tax roll, 40 high school students, and 23 teachers.

Gardner emphasizes that the questionnaires are to be returned by May 23rd.

## Mrs. Ollie Riddle Sees Many Changes In 84 Years

May 12, 1909, in Lynn County, Texas, 16-year-old Miranda Perkins and her sister Ollie Riddle were on their way to a preacher's nearby and were

in May of 1977, 84-year-old Vivian Miranda, a resident of Colonial Nursing Home in Tahoka, is very positively that she never once regretted her decision to elope that day 68 years ago.

On the day in 1909, the boy and his neighboring farm, Ollie Riddle, took the buggy, borrowed the bride's signature, and about his own order to marry the lady whom he had loved most all his life and whom he had never loved on a date.

They grew up and grew together and he passed away on March 7 of this year, 10 months short of 60 years when their many friends will celebrate, have since 1969, the 68th anniversary of this time being the bride's 68th wedding anniversary. That family is traditionally the same and Sunday Memorial Day.

and Emma Perkins and her sister Ollie Riddle romance began. Little Vivian attended school in Ellis County through the third grade and dropped out to help with the seven younger brothers and

when they came west to Lynn County.

"The same doctor, a Doctor Thornton, delivered all of my children," said Mrs. Riddle, "and it just so happened that he owned the first car I ever saw."

Of those siblings, four brothers and two sisters are still living.

After their marriage in May of 1909, the Riddles lived the remainder of that year with her parents and then had their own home in that same vicinity until 1942

The Riddle children are T. R. (who was named Thornton, for the doctor) and A. D., both of Tahoka; Luther of Italy; Harvey of Garland; and Mrs. Ola Mae Christopher of Wilson.

She couldn't remember how many grandchildren, but her daughter-in-law, Mrs. A. D. Riddle, took a count--28 grandchildren, 65 great-grandchildren, and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

During the war years, 1942 to 1945, the Riddles lived in Beaumont where he worked in a shipyard; then it was back to Lynn County and they worked the W. H. May place, on the halves, for one year. In '46, they moved into Tahoka, from the Wilson community; Mr. Riddle was a night watchman and was later a Rawleigh Products dealer. Several years later, they bought a home in Wilson and lived there where they were members of the First Baptist Church, until he came to live in Colonial Nursing Home in August of 1975 and she in January of 1976.

"So many things are different today," she says. "I think TV is a good thing as long as people don't become slaves to it."

She is grateful for many things in her life, not the least of which is her family and she is awake to the change in customs which she says makes it impossible for

her to live with her children. "They would need to be going places and doing things which I couldn't do and wouldn't want to do, so I'm thankful for the rest home."

Her philosophy is perhaps summed up in a bit of advice given to a grand-daughter, Carol Riddle Higdon, upon the birth of one of her (the grand-daughter's) children. "If he wants to be held, you hold him--your housework will always be with you and he will grow up and leave you."

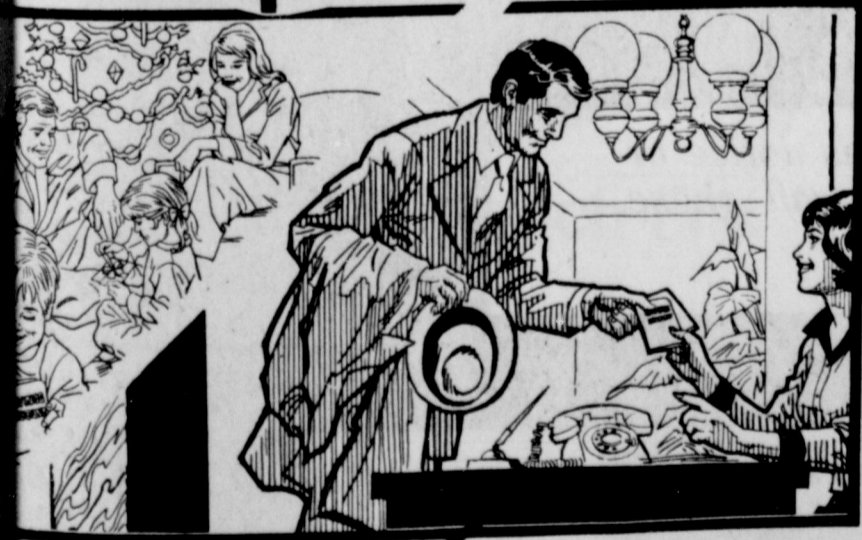

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# IMPORTANT NOTICE

Mr. Farmer,

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in Washington is trying to pass standards that would close all the cotton gins, oil mills, compresses and textile mills in the United States.

OSHA action is based on the theory that exposure to cotton dust causes byssinosis, a chronic respiratory disease, although the causative agent of byssinosis is unknown.

In order to meet the standards proposed by OSHA, cotton gins would have to be enclosed in completely air conditioned buildings and be equipped with highly sophisticated air filtering systems. The development and installation of such equipment, even if available, would be so expensive that cotton gins could not afford to operate. Added costs for energy to operate air conditioning and air filtering systems would be prohibitive. The net effect would be the collapse of the entire cotton industry. With billions of dollars invested in land and equipment, no one needs to tell you what this would do to the farmers and the whole nation.

Hearings will be held at the South Park Inn in Lubbock May 10 and 11. **It is vital that every farmer and any interested person attend, also write Washington and express your opinions.**

Mrs. Hallmark reports that she has had many phone calls, gifts, and cards from people in Tahoka. "I was so happy to know that people were concerned for me," she said.

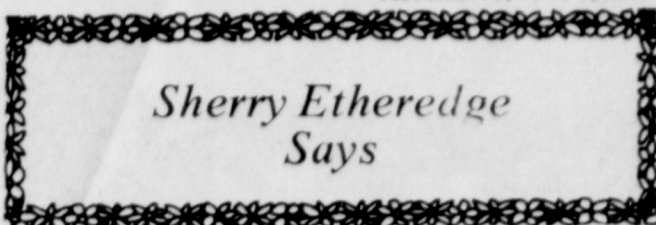

Get-Ready Guidelines For Pressure Canner A pressure canner in safe working order is the key to "get-ready" plans for home canning all vegetables (except tomatoes).

A "make sure" checklist for safe working pressure canners appears below. \*Take off removable petcock and safety valves, wash and dry thoroughly. Soak in vinegar to remove any corrosion.

\*Use a toothpick or pipe cleaner to clean openings in lid of canner. \*Use fine steel wool and soap to wash bottom part of pressure canner.

\*To remove any odors and stains, combine juice of one lemon--or two tablespoons vinegar--with two quarts of water. Process at five pounds pressure for five minutes.

\*Grease (using vegetable oil) the closing surfaces of metal-to-metal-sealing pressure canners if lid is difficult to remove or steam escapes.

\*Replace gasket if rubber has hardened. \*Check dial gauge on pressure canner. Clean weighted gauge thoroughly.

#### Senate OKs Hance Bill

The Texas Senate has approved by a vote of 26-3 a bill by Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock to speed up justice in Texas juvenile courts.

Senator Hance's bill would amend the Texas Family Code to allow a non-lawyer judge to hear and adjudicate juvenile cases. Presently, a non-lawyer judge cannot preside over juvenile cases, thus delaying the judicial process in many circumstances until a District Judge can hear the case (since a District Judge must be a lawyer).

"I believe this legislation will provide a speedier trial for juveniles who otherwise might have to wait weeks or even months before their trials come up on the docket of juvenile courts," said Senator Hance.

"There are many judicial districts across the state where the District Judge serves many counties--as a result, the District Judge cannot adequately hear juvenile cases throughout the district. County Judges know more about the juvenile's family situation and the local circumstances. The County Judge can make a speedier and better determination as to what should happen to the juvenile," stated Hance after the vote of approval by the Senate.

The bill provides that a juvenile defendant may appeal the order of a non-lawyer judge by filing a motion for re-hearing in the alternate court. The alternate court must rule on the motion within ten days. If the motion is granted, the judge of the alternate court would grant a new trial.



Nothing in recent history, and certainly nothing since the boll weevil invasion of the early 1960's, has aroused the concern of High Plains cotton people like the "cotton dust" standard proposed by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

"And every bit of that concern and more is justified," says Lloyd Cline of Lamesa, President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Effects of the proposed standard, Cline states, "would so severely cripple our industry that every individual and every organization even remotely connected with cotton should do everything possible to prevent its adoption."

Because of complaints that exposure to cotton dust in textile mills has caused byssinosis or "brown lung" disease in some workers, OSHA proposes to require that dust levels in all cotton processing operations be reduced to 200 milligrams per cubic meter. The standard would apply to gins, warehouses, oil mills, compresses, cotton waste processing facilities, textile mills and other cotton handling facilities.

"This extremely low dust standard, if not impossible to achieve from an engineering standpoint, is unmistakably impractical from an economic view," the PCG official asserts.

Hearings on the issue are scheduled by OSHA to begin at 9:30 a.m. May 10 in the Southpark Inn, Lubbock, with something over 120 witnesses registered to testify. The proceedings are expected to last at least two days.

Attendance at the hearings, from beginning to end, is one of the things PCG is urging on its members and all other High Plains people whose livelihood comes all or in part from cotton.

"An overflow crowd throughout the hearings," Cline believes, "will help to impress on OSHA officials just how grave will be the consequences in the Cotton Belt if the proposal becomes law."

PCG also suggests that OSHA, Congressmen, Senators and President Carter be deluged with letters of protest and appeals for help.

"The alternatives to beating back this unreasonable proposal," the PCG President says, "are padlocks on the door of many gins, greatly increased ginning and other processing costs, and a rapidly shrinking demand for cotton because of its inability to compete, price-wise, with synthetic fibers."

The list of witnesses registered to testify at the hearing, in addition to PCG, contains representatives of 23 other cotton-related organizations, 32 individual gins, five oil mills and nine area Chambers of Commerce with from 1 to 14 witnesses

each. Coming from Texas, California, Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma, the lineup includes cotton producers, bankers, realtors, doctors, retailers and others.

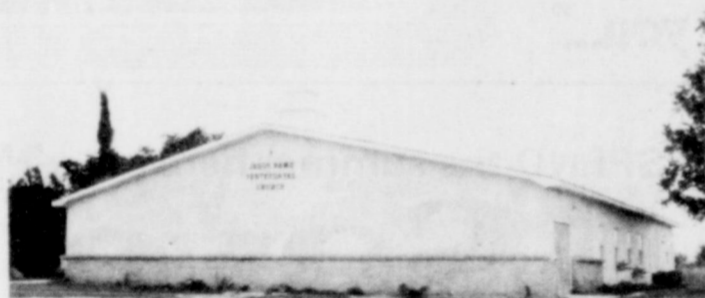

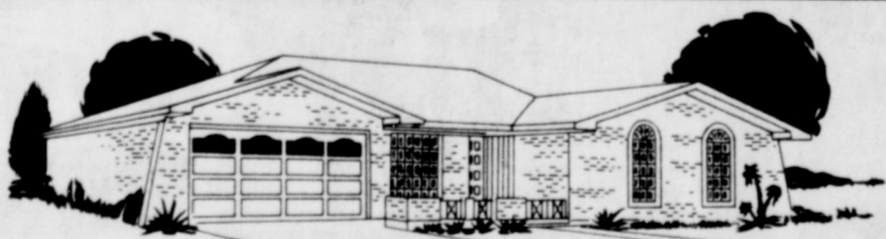

**Highways Are Funded By Legislation**

Legislation has provided the State Highway Department \$528 million of new money which will help return to a more normal construction and maintenance program that has been possible in the last few years.

This includes \$200 million as a one-time allocation to help restore some of the highway system to the level it had been before the financial crisis and before the past winter's bad weather.

The work will be accomplished without any increase in the number of permanent personnel in the Department; present employees will put forth every effort to get the job done.

The Legislation gives the Department a definite sum by which 20-year, five-year, and one-year programs may be developed in accordance with new procedures. Until these plans are developed, they cannot speculate with confidence on the effect these funds will have on any specific project, also keeping in mind such things as environmental and other clearances which also can affect scheduling of projects.
