Beef Referendum Registration Set For June 6-17 In Tahoka's ASCS Office

The 1977 beef referendum will be held in July among cattle producers to determine if they favor the Beef Research and Information Order issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. Any individual, group of individuals, association, cooperative, corporation, or partnership that owned one or more cattle at any time during the period from January 1, 1976 through December 31, 1976 is

eligible to register and vote. The registration period will begin June 6 and run through June 17. Each producer who wants to vote must register at the ASCS office in the county where his farm or ranch is located. Registration can be done in person at the office or by mail. Registration cards cannot be mailed before

d its beginning nearly ears ago, in 1919, at S. Wells and Sons Store, at the location of the present-day Tahoka Food Mart. Ivan Cathcart was a 14-year-old lad who helped to support a family of ten children by selling candy to children who attended the old South Ward School in south Tahoka. One of his candy patrons was little Miss Mattie Pearl Jones, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Jones and who, on June 13, 1936, became his

Cathcart had been born in 1905 in Coryell County and BY MARY BRECHEEN

came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Cathcart, to Snyder when he was a year old. Then when he was seven, the family moved to Draw, in Lynn County.

In 1914, Mattie Pearl Jones was born at Fluvanna, in Scurry County, and the Jones family also eventually came to Lynn County where he was a ginner.

Before he married Miss Jones in 1936, Cathcart was making a name for himself in Tahoka as a whiz in the slaughter and meat market business. It was in '27 that he operated a market for E. A. Park, behind Collier Drug (now Parker Pharmacy). facing the west. Then he had a market in a store operated by Al Smith and J. B.

McPherson. After his marriage, he leased the market in the Guarantee Food Store (next door south of George Glenn's Barber Shop) and following that, he had the market in the Piggly Wiggly Store. During World War II. he worked at the Co-op Locker, in the Larkin Building, and then to his present location on West

Lockwood Street. Except for a span from 1940 to 1952, Mrs. Cathcart has been his most trustworthy employee (his words). It

was during that period of time that she stayed home with their only child, Retha, who is now Mrs. Leonard Dunn.

For the last half century, Ive Cathcart has sold candy to many youngsters and his fine cuts of meat have graced the tables of virtually every home in the county and every restaurant in town. He could continue doing so, for he has a thriving business, but in order to have a vacation, he has had to close his market, no small task in itself.

So he is yielding to progress, he says. Another young man with a dream, Richard Williams, proprietor of Rim Rock Grocery, has bought the Cathcart building and lot and he will erect a grocery business in the location.

And Ivan and Mattie Pearl Cathcart will give their undivided attention to their grandchildren--Vickie, Jimmy, and Ronnie Dunn. They also will dust off their memories of the "good old days" while they can enjoy remembering the past, and she will devote more time to her art work.

Their absence in the business world will leave a void in the day-to-day routine of many a one in Tahoka and Lynn County.

Statutes, Statutes--Status? Money, Money - Monition!

The upper center portion of page 3 of your Thursday, May 19, 1977 issue contains an item or article that raises eyebrows and initiates study. I quote "The Board of Education of Tahoka Independent School District, in its regular meeting on Thursday, May 12, set the charge for use of the Tahoka High School gymnasium at \$10.00 per hour, with a maximum of \$75.00 per day.

I qualify myself as a thoroughly experienced former Board of Education member in another city in Texas prior to changing my residence. With these qualifications I ask the

following questions: What statute allows a governing body to initiate a "charge for use of" a public, tax supported, state instituted, facility to any civic event or activity, whether academic,

atheletic or, in general, community contributive? 2. Is your school board making this charge to groups made up of school students? How?

3. How are monies collected by a budgeted institution accounted for without a complete itemized disclosure to the

4. Is this "charge for the use of" included in your budget? If so, please explain how. This explanation could solve major problems in all our political subdivisions by supplying an nstant-money source.

Constructively--I have been a part of discussions and accepted solutions to the apparent problems Tahoka School District is experiencing. In rather earthy terms I submit the following

1. Public facilities are administered by and the responsibility of public elected "custodians" (Board of Education, Commissioners, Sheriffs, etc.)

2. Public facilities are constructed and maintained by taxes and are intended for public use.

3. Public facility maintenance and expenses are budget items and the responsibility accepted by the elected 'custodians." Advice and requests of employed personnel (School Administrators, Principals, Teachers and other Administrative employees) are to be given due process only. Policy dictation strictly on the basis of requests or reccommendations made by employees is perilously objective

4. I have never understood nor accepted the inability of custodians of public facilities to trust and accept the word-of-responsibility of an adult taxpaying member of the

5. I do understand and do reccommend that a party or parties, qualifying as in 4 above, using these public facilities should be responsible for damage to the facility and share in excessive expenses above normal. Damage expense and excessive expense costs to be at the descretion of the user, after all, being a taxpayer they own the place anyway. 6. Violations of 5 above led our Board of Education to

require damage and expense deposits of the few violators we encountered. Deposits were applied to receipted damage repair and/or receipted excessive expenses. Deposit balances were returned to depositor Ms. Editor, won't you agree with me that the action of your

Board of Education of "charge for the use of" is in bad taste, unethical, inflammatory and just possibly illegal? Do 1 perceive or am I correct in assuming that prejudice and descrimination exists in your community. Food for thought

The article also indicated a large difference in the "charges for use of" the Tahoka High School gymnasium and the North Elementary gymnasium. Conceded, a difference in the size, quality and location of the gymnasiums. Question is - does the North Elementary gymnasium need repairs or, more possibly, needs to be improved and updated. After all, your Board of Education indicated by the dollar value what they think.







To make home improvements be "just that," consumers should follow some simple precautions:

*Before calling a contractor, know what you need done. This will help identify the work you believe most important--and it will help make sure you don't "get talked into" additional jobs.

*Get at least three estimates on any job. Be sure the estimates are comparable, that each contains what will be done, and that each says exactly how much the entire job will cost.

*Before deciding on a contractor, check out the firm's reputation. Check that the company has a permanent place of business in the itinerant community--an contractor will not be around later to handle complaints. Request references from the company--and check them out. Ask other customers if they were satisfied with that company's work.

*After deciding on a contractor, carefully read the contract that is drawn up. Don't sign a contract with any blank spaces--and do not sign a contract before reading it. Be sure the contract spells out what is to be done, the starting and completion dates, types of materials, the total cost, and has a provision outlining who is responsible in case of

or damage to your property. *Never hand over pay ment for the entire job in advance. Pay at the end of the job--or make only a small down payment in advance, if necessary. Another alternative is paying in portions--as the job is completed.

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
