The great newspaper columnist Erma Bombeck had a column entitled "So Long, Volunteers" in the Chicago Sun-Times which was reprinted in our Digest.

She began by saying, "I had a dream the other day that every volunteer in this land had set sail for another country. I stood smiling on the pier, saying, 'Goodby, phone committees. Goodby, month-of-the-month. No more playground duty, sales, and three-hour meetings.' As the boat pulled away, I reflected: Serves them right, that's what you get for yes people."

Erma Bombeck went on to describe the hush that settled on the land, in her dream. The town was quiet, the home for the aged was like a tomb, the infirm were imprisoned in wheelchairs never moved. Health agencies had signs in their windows which read "Cures for cancer, birth defects, multiple sclerosis, heart disease, etc. have been canceled because of lack of interest."

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A bit melodramatic maybe, but she gets her point across. She closed the short article by saying, "I fought in my sleep to regain a glimpse of the spirit of volunteers just one more time. It was my last glimpse of a decent civilization."

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Tahoka called for a show of volunteers last Saturday and the result was not too gratifying.

It was a case of quantity versus quality and the quality far surpassed the quantity. In other words, a few showed, but those who did come did turn out to work!

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It's true that we tend to overlook faults in those we love and the same theory is true in our own places we love.

Those who have lived in Tahoka a long time have become accustomed to the weedy lots and lots that have the appearance of a dump ground, but just admit that Tahoka has some rather promising sights. It basically is a matter of an abstract quality which you don't alter, but we want to live in trashy, weed-infested surroundings, we will. If we don't, we won't. It's simple.

Little Producers Given Toll-Free Number For Referendum Questions

Texas Beef Development Force has established a toll-free "hotline" for questions from producers about the referendum.

"Beef producers who have a question about the program can call 1-800-682-4106 weekdays between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.," says Texas BDT Chairman J. D. Sartwell of Sealy. The Referendum, if approved by two-thirds of the cattle producers voting, would authorize the first nationwide self-help program for the beef industry. Using the value-added system, each cattle producer would contribute 3/10 of 1% (see Referendum, p. 2)

When young Jacky Henry was a lad on his father's farm in the Midway community in Lynn County in the 1940's, little did he expect that someday he would know what made the "tractor tick."

And not only would he someday know many things about tractors and other farm equipment, but he would be the source of information for others.

manager goes to school to teach what's needed back home. Henry, as service manager of Taylor Tractor and Equipment, attends select John Deere schools in Dallas and in turn, teaches what's needed to everyone in the service department at home, "at home" meaning service people in the Deere dealerships in Post and O'Donnell, as well as Tahoka.

Since 1971, Jack Henry has been associated with Taylor Tractor and Equipment Company in Tahoka and in June of last year, he became part of a program called "Train the Trainer," initiated by the Dallas branch of John Deere Company.

According to Henry, the John Deere Company has a school each month, but he chooses the training session which is most relevant to the needs of service men in the West Texas area. "For example," he says, "I would not be apt to attend a school on haying equipment because we don't have much

demand for that particular thing in this area."

When asked his opinion of the success of the "Train the Trainer" program, Henry said that it may be a bit soon to evaluate, but his personal conviction is that the future will demand more of this type of training, due to the complexity of farm machinery. He has written letters of recommendation to the branch manager who, in turn, recommended the program to other territorial service managers.

Tahoka's unique teacher of a trade is a 1957 graduate of Tahoka High and his wife is the former Dolores Lamberson of O'Donnell. The couple has three sons--two in college and one a high school freshman.

Henry and five of his students have appeared in advertising in six national dealership publications including Implement and Tractor, Northwest Farm Equipment Journal, South-

He is one of the seven children of Mrs. George Henry and the late Mr. Henry, both pioneer Lynn Countians.


If anything has changed more drastically, since his childhood, than farming methods, it's got to be the machinery aspect itself. Henry is quick to agree.

North Elementary's Olympics Makes Money For Mini-Park

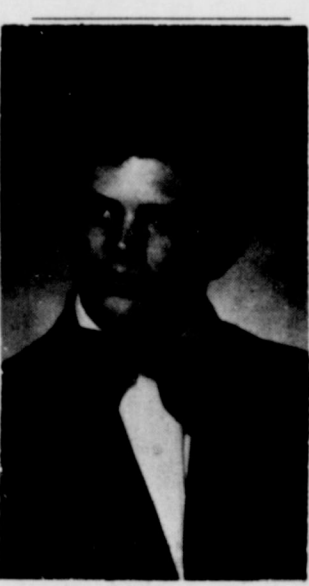
On the day before school was out, May 26, students at North Elementary School in Tahoka participated in their version of Olympic Games, proceeds going to the Mini-Park Fund.

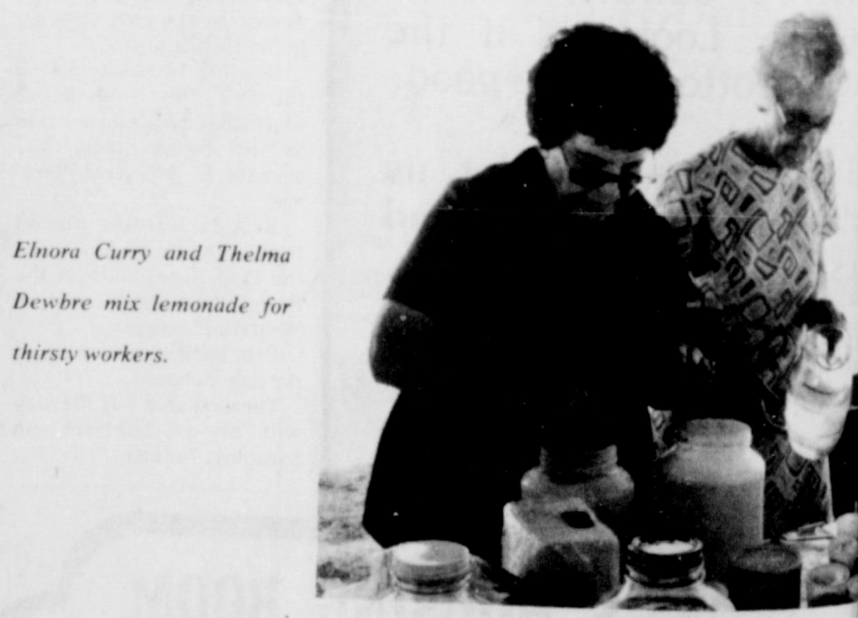

Billion Dollar Cotton Crop Is Reported

AUSTIN--Cotton production during 1976 totaled over \$1 billion, just under the record set in 1973, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Total value of last year's crop was 84 per cent over the 1975 crop, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

A total of 3,307,000 bales were produced last year.

"All indications point toward an even bigger crop in the state this year," Brown said. "There is little indication so far that foreign demand will lessen and prices should remain good, despite the increased acreage."

The average price per pound of lint in 1976 for Texas upland cotton was

62.4 cents, over a third higher than 1975. American Pima sold for an average of \$1.18 a pound. Cottonseed prices moved up to \$99 a ton, above the \$89.80-mark set the previous year.

Upland cotton lint brought \$990,513,000; American Pima, \$4,191,000 and cotton seed \$127,314,000.

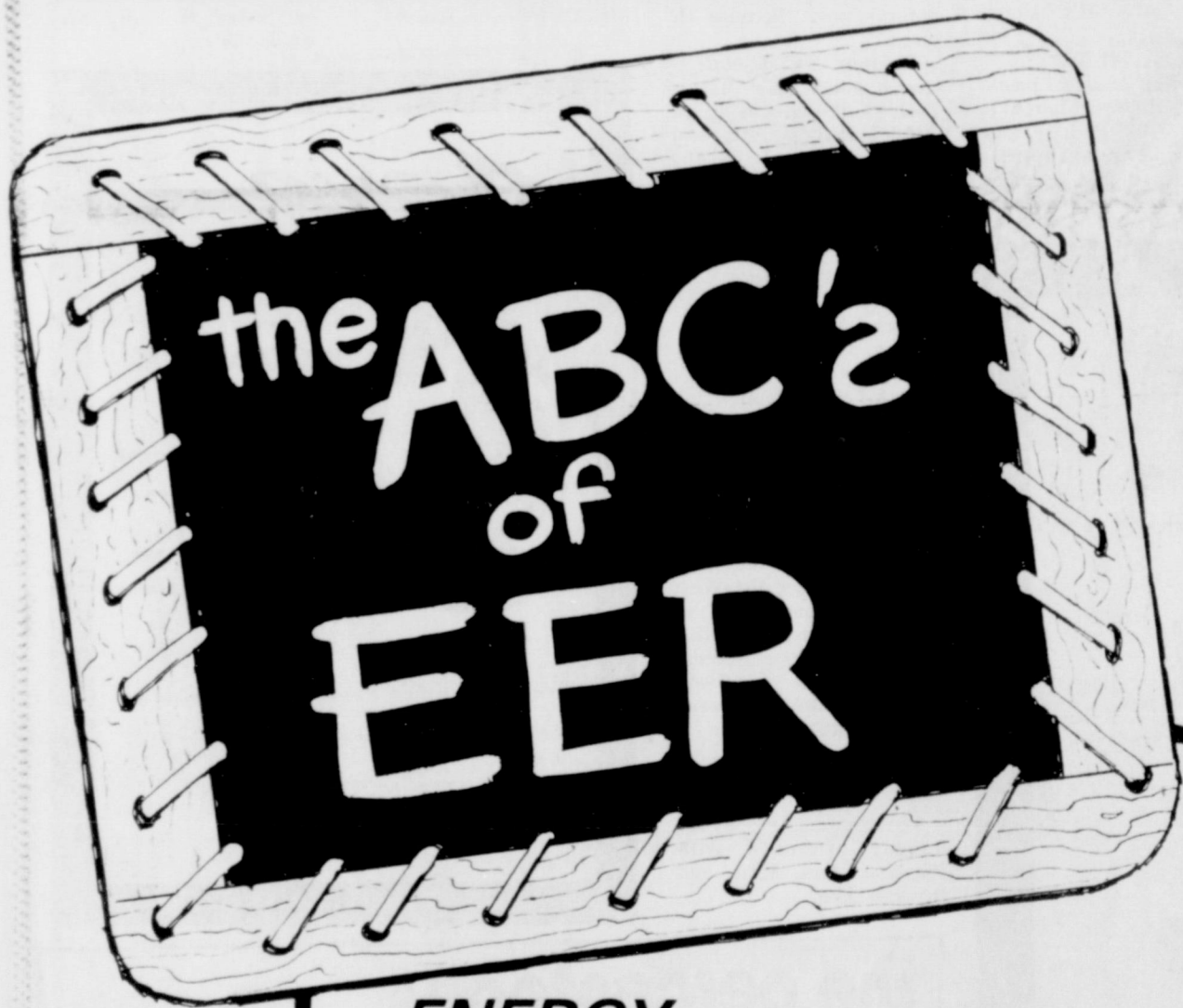

Rotarians Hear Program On Tornadoes

Tornadoes and the local watch system were explained by City Administrator Ray Mason and Rudy Johnston, local coordinator for the National Weather Service, at the Rotary Club last Thursday.

Mason presented a film on tornadoes and what can be done to weather out such storms, and Johnston explained the local watch program set up by the fire department and city and

county officers. Any time conditions are right for possible development of a tornado in this area, Johnston is informed by the National Weather Service at Lubbock, and at least ten or twelve local watchers go out to key spots to watch for development of a possible funnel or at least turbulent clouds. These men are in almost instant touch with the weather center at Lubbock.

Four blasts from the local fire siren warn the public of a possible funnel cloud approaching the area; later two blasts will indicate an "all clear" signal.

Among precautions to be taken is for citizens to go to a place of safety, preferably a basement, hallway, or closet in the home; open north and east doors and windows to prevent the house from exploding if a tornado strikes; refrain from gathering in large rooms or trying to escape in a car; to remain cool and act sensibly.

All tornadoes in the Northern Hemisphere travel northeast in a general direction, but may zig-zag slightly north and south. Jesse Dorman was in charge of the program.

SAYS....

Lightning kills more people in the United States than do tornadoes, floods, or hurricanes. And spring is the time when thunderstorms and lightning are generally common over much of Texas. A few simple rules that could possibly save lives during an electrical storm are as follows:

Lightning seldom kills more than one person at a time.

The first rule is simply to learn to recognize the signs of an oncoming thunderstorm, from which bolts of

lightning emanate. Watch for towering "thunderhead" clouds, distant rumbles of thunder, and distant flashes of lightning which indicate an approaching storm. Also, heed National Weather Service forecasts and warnings on radio and television to "get in out of the weather."

All experts on lightning agree that, when a thunderstorm threatens, the most important single thing is to get inside a home or large building, or inside an all-metal vehicle. An enclosed car or truck is described as an excellent shelter from lightning for, if struck, it will allow the current to be discharged harmlessly into the ground.

When inside during an electrical storm, avoid using a telephone, except for emergencies.

If outside, with no time to reach a safe building or an automobile, there is another set of rules to follow:

Don't stand under a natural lightning rod, such as a tall, isolated tree in an open area. Also, avoid standing in small isolated sheds or other small structures in open areas.

Equally important is to avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape, such as standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on a beach, or fishing from a small boat.

Get out of and away from open water. If you're swimming, the electrical current from a nearby lightning strike can flow through the water to you.

On the farm, get away from tractors and other metal farm equipment.

Also get away from motorcycles, scooters, golf carts, and bicycles. Put down golf clubs. Stay away from wire fences, clothes-

lines, metal pipes, rails and other metallic paths that could carry the electrical shock from lightning from some distance away.

In a forest, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees, but in open areas go to a low place, such as a ravine or valley.

If isolated in an open field, drop to the knees and bend forward, putting the hands on the knees. In this position, if lightning strikes near you, the chances of it using your body as a conductor are minimized. Kneeling provides a low profile while at the same time keeping as small an area of the body in contact with the ground as possible. Lying in a ditch or hollow is discouraged, for surface water or saturated soil is a better conductor of electricity than the surrounding area.

Groups of persons in exposed situations, such as hikers, should spread out—staying several yards apart—so if lightning strikes nearby, the smallest number will be affected.

Ten Counties Get Drought Assistance

Congressman Omar Burleson announces that the following counties in the 17th Congressional District have been designated for emergency drought assistance: Borden, Coleman, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Garza, Howard, Kent, Lynn,

Individuals and communities in emergency drought impact areas are eligible for special loans and grants from the Departments of Agriculture, Interior, Commerce, and Small Business Administration. Applicants must meet special eligibility requirements, established by each agency before assistance may be provided.

Participants in agricultural programs authorized last May 4 must sign up for specific drought assistance no later than September 30 and must complete whatever work is being financed by the aid by November 30.

Grain Sorghum Board Slates Election Soon

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time—C. C. Reed of Kress, Worth Jones of Happy, Lee Hill of Dalhart, and A. R. Dillard of Hereford. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and pays the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are also eligible to vote.

Application must be filed by August 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th, Lubbock 79401. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TBSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 2, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.
